





#### Today's Graduates are Tomorrow's Leaders

Graduation is major milestone in any young person's life. It is the gateway to higher education or early entry into the job market. Whatever a graduate's choice for the next step, it is a time to reflect on the accomplishments of the past and the excitement of the possibilities that lay ahead. It is also a momentous occasion for the parents of the graduates. Most students will acknowledge the support and encouragement of their parents who helped them get to where they are today; on the doorstep of their future. My own parents played a critical role in terms of helping me make correct choices and I owe them my deepest gratitude.

Many of today's graduates will emerge as leaders in our community as they take their place in society in whatever role they choose for themselves. It has been said that education is the mother of leadership. I want to share with the graduates of 2016 some of my perspectives of leadership and what it often takes for an individual or a group of people to realize a common goal or objective.

A simplest definition of leadership is the art of motivating a group of people to act towards achieving a common goal. A leader inspires and directs the action. He or she is the person in the group that possesses the combination of personality and skills that makes others want to follow. A leader doesn't need a title to be one. A leader usually emerges because he or she is the type of person that people choose to follow. I think a good leader doesn't try to create good followers; a good leader tries to create more leaders. The leader must have conviction in the face of criticism, make tough decisions, and yet have the patience and compassion to listen to the needs of others. It can get lonely at the top, but as the saying goes, "If you want to lead the orchestra, you have to turn your back to the crowd."

One of the hardest things about leadership is to be forthright. You cannot be afraid to always tell people the truth. A leader has to be practical and realistic but must offer vision and hope. As a leader, I try to think and talk about solutions. Let others dwell and talk about problems. I always try to simplify things, get to the essence of the issue, cut through the noise and offer solutions that people can understand. A good leader is realistic and practical. Like a military general, the leader can see the

way to victory, but also recognizes when to cut the losses. It is during times of trouble that we advance most as a society because that is when the greatest opportunities often present themselves. Anyone can captain a ship on a calm sea, but real leaders are forged in times of danger and difficulty. As President Truman once said, "Men make history and not the other way around. In periods where there is no leadership, society stands still. Progress occurs when courageous, skillful leaders seize the opportunity to change things for the better."

There is no simple formula for being a good leader. Situations will dictate the need. Even so, good leaders are essential for any organization to survive and thrive. Work hard and never give up. I leave today's graduates with the words of the great anthropologist Margaret Mead. She said, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, concerned citizens can change world. Indeed it is the only thing that ever has."

Trees whose branches are growing into power lines can conduct electricity to the ground, putting anyone who contacts the trees at risk of being shocked.

#### For your safety, remember these important tips:

- Avoid coming into contact with overhead power lines directly or indirectly.
- Don't climb trees whose branches are growing into power lines.
- Don't pick fruit from trees whose branches are growing into power lines.
- Keep yourself and your ladder, fruit picker, pole, or other tools at least 10 feet away from power lines.

To report a hazard caused by trees growing into power lines, call Hawaiian Electric's Trouble Line at 1-855-304-1212.

# Senator **Gil Riviere**

Serving Oahu's North and Windward Shores

#### 2016 Session in Brief

The 28th Legislature wrapped up its regular session earlier this month. While a couple of bills are stinkers, for the most part, good work was accomplished this year. The Governor will likely sign into law most of these initiatives, but he may also veto some.

Cooling schools was undoubtedly a top priority. Governor Ige has already signed the bill that appropriates \$100 million dollars to provide air conditioning, heat abatement and energy efficiencies to our public schools. This money will not cool all classrooms, but it should make a significant difference for hundreds of our hottest rooms. Let us offer a hat tip here to groups like Keep Laie Cool, who bring improvements through their own determination.

We approved \$160 million to replace the obsolete and overcrowded Hawaii State Hospital in Kaneohe. We also appropriated nearly \$100 million to support development of affordable rental housing and rental assistance programs. Twelve million was provided for homeless programs through coordination by the Governor.

Because the state had a positive carry over balance from last fiscal year, we were able to set aside \$150 million into the Rainy Day Fund and we increased contributions to reduce the unfunded pension and health benefits liability. Believe it or not, Hawaii is the most aggressive state in the nation when it comes to managing future retirement obligations.

Hemp is an incredibly versatile and useful crop, estimated to have as many as 25,000 beneficial uses from soil remediation to building material to clothing and so much more. A pilot project approved last year to study the viability of growing hemp in Hawaii greatly exceeded expectations. This year, the legislature approved a robust industrial hemp program that could become a new economic driver for local agriculture and multiple product developers.

Thanks to strong leadership by Senator Donovan Dela Cruz, the state will invest \$31.5 million to acquire 1100 acres of agricultural lands from Dole Food Company. Morning radio listeners may have heard me talk to Mike Buck, Rick Hamada and Beth Ann Koslovich about the benefits of securing this land. Farmers need long term leases and water in order to expand local food production. This land acquisition assures availability of quality land for generations to come.

HB1850 is known as the Airbnb Bill because it will allow that company to collect GET and TAT for vacation rentals booked through its website. That, in itself, is not a bad thing. The problem is that the bill exempts vacation rental owners from acquiring any tax license and the result will be that illegal activity can hide behind Airbnb. Illegal rentals such as the ones we found selling tent camping on the beach will explode; there will be no chance to get this problem under control. This bill passed the Senate by a slim margin, 14-11 (One Yes, with Reservations).

HB2501 is the A&B Water Bill, special legislation written for Alexander and Baldwin to ignore Hawaii's Public Trust Doctrine and state law. In January, the court ruled uninterrupted diversion of hundreds of millions of gallons of water from East to Central Maui on temporary, never-reviewed permits since 2001 was illegal. An administrative process exists to lease water, but A&B wants to continue diverting water without having to document its need. The court got it right. The Senate got it wrong by passing this bill 17-8 (Five yes votes were With Reservations.)

The Governor has not yet signed these bills and may be waiting to see what the public thinks. If you think he should veto HB1850 and HB2501, then call 586-0034 or submit written comments at http://governor.hawaii.gov/contact-us/comments-on-legislation/

Congratulations on your achievement, and know that there's even more opportunity ahead of you than what you have already accomplished.

To Principal Moore, Principal Nanbu, and to the wonderful teachers and administrators —thank you for the time, energy, and resources you pour into your students every year! I hope that you are encouraged by the success and growth of the students in your care and know how much the community appreciates your efforts. At the Hawaii State Capitol the legislative session has officially come to an end! All of the bills that were submitted in January of this year, have passed every committee and floor vote are now on the Governor's desk waiting to be signed and enacted into law. I want to thank all of you who reached out to my office to express your support or opposition to active bills, and to those who formally submitted testimony during the legislative process this year.

One bill that I would like to highlight that is close to my heart is HB1902, Relating to Sex Trafficking, which I was proud to introduce on behalf of the Women's Legislative Caucus. This bill is victim-oriented and strengthens the enforcement of Anti-Sex Trafficking laws. It changes the offense of Promoting Prostitution in the First Degree to Sex Trafficking and makes it an A Class Felony. It also increases the penalties against convicted sex traffickers. I believe this measure to be of utmost im-

portance in Hawaii and I am sincerely grateful to the many citizens and legislators who have supported it and helped get it through the legislature this year! If you want to check on a particular bill, the Hawaii State Capitol Website is always available to you (Capitol.Hawaii.gov). The Public Access Room is also a wonderful and user friendly resource for information (LRBHawaii.org/par/). Also if you live in District 45 a legislative wrap-up will be soon arriving in your mailbox. And of course, feel free to reach out to my office with any questions or comments!

#### **Restless Leg Syndrome**

Restless Leg Syndrome (RLS) is a neurological disorder causing uncomfortable sensations in the legs (and rarely in other parts of the body) resulting in an uncontrollable urge to move them. It is a lifelong condition, affects 10% of the U.S. population and affects women twice the rate of men. 80% of those with RLS also suffer from a more common condition called Periodic Limb Movements, which is characterized by involuntary leg twitching or jerky movements during sleep. RLS can also go through remission during its early stages, where there are no symptoms for weeks or months. Severity varies among individuals. In severe cases, symptoms occur more than twice a week, causing significant sleep disruption resulting in poor function during the day.

What causes RLS? The exact causes are unknown. There may be a genetic factor and in these cases RLS appears before 40 years of age. Another potential factor is low iron in the brain. The theory for RLS is that a disruption in the pathway in the brain causes the involuntary movements. Certain chronic conditions may aggravate RLS, such as kidney disease, diabetes and peripheral neuropathy (tingling and numbness in the hands and feet). Pregnancy can also trigger RLS in the 3rd trimester. In pregnancy, symptoms resolve within four weeks after delivery.

Treatment focuses on relieving symptoms. If there is a vitamin or mineral deficiency, supplements are prescribed. If there is a chronic condition, the particular condition is treated and stabilized. Leg massages, heating pads, ice packs and a vibrating pad called Relaxix may help. Anti-seizure medications may also help. Some people claim that drinking tonic water also helps. Tonic water contains quinine, an ingredient that is controversial as to whether or not it relieves RLS symptoms.

#### Membership Spotlight

IL Gelato Cafe – Bringing "la dolce vita" to Haleiwa, one world-class scoop at a time...

Dirk Koeppenkastrop and his wife, Nicole Lueker, founded IL Gelato Hawaii to combine their passion for Hawaii and the fine Italian ice cream known as gelato. The couple first opened their business for wholesale and catering operations in Honolulu in 2010. Since then they have added a retail operation opened in 2013 in the Kahala Mall and a restaurant opened last year in the North Shore Marketplace next to Cholo's. The Haleiwa location is open seven days a week, 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Weekend hours often extend to 10 p.m. since Cholo's customers usually wander next door for an enticing dessert treat. The North Shore location also serves freshly baked cones and coppas (Italian sundaes) along with a broad gelateria style menu including Italian coffee, smoothies, acai and pitaya bowls, Belgian waffles and crepes.

Why choose a North Shore location? The couple holds Haleiwa dear to their hearts. Twenty seven years ago, they married on Pupukea Beach. While living in the Honolulu area in the 80's and 90's, they'd travel to the North Shore most weekends and beyond so Dirk could pursue his passion for surfing and kite surfing at Mokuleia Beach Park and Laniakea. They'd regularly enjoyed gourmet coffee at the Coffee Gallery, a favorite spot. So when the location nearby at the North Shore Marketplace became available, they jumped at the opportunity.

Because of the area's romance and emotional

draw, Dirk hopes to eventually live on the North Shore, at least part of the time. The business, however, keeps the couple extremely busy. After adding their restaurant in Haleiwa, they now work two retail, one wholesale and one catering operation on Oahu. IL Gelato supplies its gelato wholesale to hotels, restaurants, gelato bars and coffee shops. It uses local farmers and suppliers in order to support the local economy and the "farm to table" movement in Hawaii. But, according to Dirk, it's the Haleiwa restaurant that's the most fun. Because his classic Italian gelato machine here is smaller than the ones he uses in town for wholesaling, he has the opportunity to experiment in full view at the front of his restaurant.

"The development (of gelato) is very manipulative," says Dirk, "I make smaller batches here and I work with a paddle using a variety of flavors and variations. Whenever I make gelato, there is always a long line (of customers.)" As a graduate of University of Hawaii with a Ph.D. in physical chemistry, he has a solid knowledge of experimentation. "Making gelato is all chemistry!" according to Dirk.

In 1998 the couple returned to Munich, Germany, to raise their family and Dirk ended up working his way into higher administration at a large corporation. However, he had a friend who had a gelato business in Berlin, which got him hooked. He studied the Italian art of gelato making at Carpigiani Gelato University in Bologna, Italy, and later trained with "world champion" gelato makers in Europe. With his know-how and experience, Dirk earned a spot as team captain and gelato maker of Culinary Gelato Team USA in 2014 and 2016. Most recently, Team USA honors included top spot in the Ice Carving discipline and 3rd place in the Mystery Box Gelato Challenge. The team had a number of fourth and fifth places and overall placed seventh.

Indeed, Dirk's scientific background and fervor bring gelato to a whole new level of indulgence. But that's the whole idea. The mission of IL Gelato

is, "...to make people happy by serving great tasting and natural gelato. With our gelato, we want to introduce 'slow food' as well as bring the joy of 'la dolce vita' to Hawaii."

#### **North Shore Coastal Erosion**

Our coastlines throughout the state of Hawaii are continuously subjected to erosion. Short term changes in the shoreline vary with the tide, waves, and storm activity. Long term coastal changes take place through a number of environmental factors such as natural sediment supply, rising sea level and human interference through near shore development. A beach undergoing chronic erosion has a hard time recovering from the natural changes in the sand levels that happen seasonally. Another erosion concern is sea wall construction of coastal properties which negatively affects the supply of sand as it gets pushed into deeper water.

Planting Hawaiian native plants adapted for the coastal environment in diverse combination can be an effective tool at reducing erosion. Low lying vegetation could be created with a mixed planting of common natives such as naupaka and 'ilima, combined with unique shrubs such as naio, ma'o and 'ohai. Intermingling these plants with some vines like pa'u o hi'iaka and pohuehue can create a diverse root structure to effectively hold together sand from the effects of wind and human sourced erosion. 'Aweoweo and 'ulei also do well in this harsh environment. A strong sedge like 'ahu'awa can also be a fast growing and beautiful plant that can help protect our coastlines and your property. These plants can act as a buffer zone for the winter swells, as these plants are well adapted for sunny hillsides, and are very salt and wind tolerant. Once established, these plants are un-phased by drought. A great example close to home is the restoration area at the Pupukea Marine Life Conservation District at Sharks Cove. Waimea Valley and other sponsors & volunteers helped Malama Pupukea-Waimea removed invasive weeds and installed over 3,000 native plants. These coastal plants will hold soil and sand in place to prevent erosion and unwanted sediment into the ocean.
