Iconic Hale'iwa Signs Get an Uplift

Every couple of years parttime Hale'iwa resident creator and caretaker Carole Beller repairs and touches up the popular Hale'iwa signs (one boy and one girl).

In 1996 the town commissioned Carole to create three signs. She made three surfer boy signs which soon became frequent targets for thieves and vandalism, within a month two signs were stolen simultaneously the signs were later recovered on the side of the road. Once again two signs were stolen but never recovered. In 2006, with only one boy sign left Carole decided to make a surfer girl sign which is posted on Kamehameha Hwy. and often seen with tourist posing for pictures. Other signs created by Carole include the North Shore Marketplace sign, Global Creations, Raging Isle, Tropical Rush and Wyland Whale tail signs.

They recognize Him as their creator and sustainer, ultimate authority, beloved Savior, and eternal hope. They absolutely, without question, seek to glorify Him and to help others see Him for who He truly is.

The North Shore needs a church that is "In the country, for the county," that proclaims the hope of Jesus and shares His love. Harbor Church North Shore is doing just that, and we recommend you pay them a visit if you are looking for a church that is lovingly standing firm on the eternal truth of the gospel in these ever-changing times.

Aloha!

As health care delivery models transform, from urgent care centers to telemedicine, a more patient-centered continuity of care is expected for communities. Many individuals have received the benefits of Smart911 and you can too! The service has been invaluable residents and businesses. Simply, Smart911 offers a free and effective way to communicate with public safety in advance of an emergency.

Smart911 provides First Responders with a "safety profile" of the caller, in order to facilitate a more efficient, better informed response. Smart911 is a public-private partnership, that creates a database which integrates with the 911 system. The caller's safety profile is immediately displayed during a 911 call, and information such as existing medical conditions and disabilities, locations of bedrooms, residents with special needs and even if pets are in the home, offer emergency medical technicians important insight into the situation. Smart911 also allows the dispatcher to pull up medical information including allergies, heart conditions, and medications. Additionally, police benefit by knowing from the safety profile if the caller has been threatened previously, and officers have access to photos of children and their personal information should they go missing. The Honolulu Police Department unveiled the new system that gives 911 operators more information, more quickly, when an emergency happens. Oahu residents can go to a website to fill out a profile with information that could help in a medical emergency, a fire, or a crime. Residents are encourage to create their safety profile to help first responders in emergencies. This information could be the difference between life and death. The data is private and secure, and will only be used for emergency purposes and made available only during an emergency call.

Aloha!

The 2016 Legislative Session ended just over a month ago. Although we had another productive year at the Hawaii State Legislature, there are a number of issues that still need to be addressed, both in our district as well as statewide. I remain committed to working and collaborating with community members, businesses, organizations, state agencies and my fellow legislators to help our district and state move forward together.

A total of 272 bills were passed by the Legislature this session and subsequently sent to the Governor for approval. While 219 bills are currently Pending Governor's Action, 51 bills have already been signed into law by Governor Ige. 1 bill (SB2181 SD2 HD2 - RELATING TO ACCESS TO TREATMENT FOR TERMINALLY ILL PATIENTS) has been vetoed by the Governor. Below is a summary of selected bills which have been signed into law so far:

ACT 10 (HB2494) RELATING TO BLOOD GLU-COSE MONITORING. Authorizes DOE employees to volunteer to administer or assist a student with blood glucose monitoring.

ACT 16 (SB2312) RELATING TO THE PENAL CODE. Expands the definition of the term "sexual conduct" as that term is used in the offenses of promoting child abuse to include specific types of conduct. Amends the definition of "sexual conduct" as that term is used in the offenses of promoting child abuse and obscenity to repeal references to homosexuality and lesbianism.

ACT 25 (SB305) RELATING TO USE OF TOBAC-CO PRODUCTS AND E-CIGARETTES ON HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION PREMISES. Prohibits the use of tobacco products and electronic smoking devices on the premises of Hawaii Health Systems Corporation facilities.

ACT 34 (SB2916) RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY. Includes misdemeanor offenses under chapter 134, Hawaii Revised Statutes, relating to firearms, ammunition, and dangerous weapons, to the offenses that disqualify retaken and reimprisoned parolees from provisions regarding reincarceration and credit for time served.

ACT 44 (SB2383) RELATING TO THE HAWAII HEALTH CONNECTOR. Repeals the Hawaii Health Connector (Connector) as part of the transition to a federally supported, state-based exchange. Specifies that any debts and liabilities of the Connector remain that of the Connector and do not constitute the debts and liabilities of the State. Specifies that

the provisions in the measure shall not diminish or limit the consumer protections contained in or alter the provisions of the Hawaii Prepaid Health Care Act.

ACT 46 (SB2315) RELATING TO JURY DUTY. Exempts from jury duty a woman who is breastfeeding or expressing breast milk for a period of two years from the birth of the child.

ACT 47 (SB3126) RELATING TO PUBLIC SCHOOLS. Provides for air conditioning, heat abatement, and related energy efficiency measures at public schools by appropriating general funds to the DOE for these projects.

Preserving a Sense of Place

Built circa 1930, the single story, gabled roof Visitor Center is a prime example of plantation-style architecture. The building housed the Mutual Telephone Company (now Hawaiian Telcom), and was the site of the telephone exchange that enabled direct dialing from the North Shore to Honolulu in the 1950s.

Originally located behind Pioneer Ace Hardware and generously donated to the Chamber by the Fujiwara family, the Chamber restored and relocated the building to its current location. With the help and support of donations, grants, and volunteers, we completed work and opened our new doors in 2010. One year later, the Chamber received a Historic Preservation Commendation from the Historic Hawaii Foundation for our restoration efforts.



Please learn more about this important theft of a rare Hawaiian Cultural artifact that is in process right now.

THE ARROGANCE OF ANDY ANDERSON

Dear Editor:

Now that the Star-Advertiser has exposed developer D.G.


"Andy" Anderson's violation of the permit process regarding his Haleiwa Beach House restaurant ("Bloated Expansion" by Andrew Gomes in the issue of May 29, 2016), it's time to recall that such behavior is not new to Anderson. His antics across the years indicate that he considers himself above the law.

- 1) To quote a story from the Honolulu Advertiser (September 5, 2002), "Anderson's impatience and perhaps some arrogance were on display in 1983, when the city ordered him to stop work on a restaurant-retail complex in Waikiki because he never obtained building permits for the project." He pleaded no contest. His punishment was a slap on the wrist: a \$900 fine and 75 hours of community service.
- 2) In 1999, his plans for "Kewalo Pointe," a development at Fisherman's Wharf, included a 130-foot high, oceanside Ferris wheel, were rejected by the Hawaii Community Development Authority.
- 3) In 2004, he had another vision for the same locale: a trade center that would be designed to resemble a huge canoe, with Hokule`a-style sails. It was rejected.
- 4) In 2003, Anderson developed "Sunset Colony," a 19-acre, 29-parcel gated residential fortress featuring a massive rock wall fronting Kamehameha Highway, effectively blocking access to the popular surf spot Velzyland.
- 5) He also (illegally) dumped a four-foot high pile of boulders in front of his personal beachfront parcel in this development.
- 6) As part of the development deal, he agreed to include a public park at "Sunset Colony." He created a tiny park with nine parking spaces. Because the City & County declined to place a lifeguard station at the beach, the park never opened and the public has been denied access for the past 13 years. (Blake McIlheny wrote an excellent piece on the lack of progress with the park in a recent edition of the North Shore News.)
- 7) In 2010, he attempted to acquire land designed for the expansion of Haleiwa Beach Park to build an enlarged replica of the 1899 Haleiwa Hotel. It would have involved privately acquiring public property zoned for expansion of Haleiwa Beach Park. Thanks to North Shore community opposition, this project failed to fly.
- 8) But Anderson had already purchased Jameson's restaurant and the land it sat on. He expanded the seating from 114 to 388, once again without obtaining the proper permits. If you've dined there, you know that the capacity of the dirt parking lot adjacent to the restaurant is frustratingly inadequate. And newly-created parking on the mauka side of Kamehameha Highway effectively blocks views of the ocean from the ground floor portion of the restaurant.

Possibly Anderson's blatant denial of civic responsibility and subsequent immunity from stiff legal punishment is connected to his long political career. He was a Republican state representative from 1962 to 1966, and a state senator from 1967 to 1983. He was the Honolulu City & County managing director for two years. In 1968 and 1972 he ran for mayor, losing to Frank Fasi. In 1982 and 1986 he ran for governor, losing to George Ariyoshi and John Waihee. In 2002 he switched his allegiance to the Democratic Party and lost to Mazie Hirono in the gubernatorial primary election.

Given these years of government experience and longheld connections, I wonder if Andy Anderson still has friends in high places who look the other way when he continues to ignore the law? Maybe the punishment (or lack of it) for his recent violations at Haleiwa Beach House restaurant will provide us with the answer. In the meantime, the public might make a statement by refusing to patronize the establishment. I dined there once, but I'm never going back.





Haleiwa Fishpond Under Siege

The Honolulu City Council planning & zoning committee recently approved a Major SMA permit for a retail strip mall on the shores of Loko Ea Fishpond. Loko Ea is one of our greatest assets and development on land that borders this extremely sensitive habitat must be discouraged. Fishponds are centers for food production, education, economic development, cultural revitalization, and the practice of conservation based on aloha 'aina. When 90% of our food is imported into Hawai'i, it is critical we protect this valuable fishpond.

Our community recognizes Loko Ea as a cultural and ecological treasure. The North Shore Sustainable Communities Plan specifically mentions Loko Ea and the need to protect this fishpond from development. A recent public hearing at Ali'i Beach Park on the SMA permit was standing room only, with 80% of community testimony opposed to the development. Many individuals took off from work and school to attend. The intent of the SMA process is to determine if the public purpose and benefits of the development outweigh adverse effects. Public testimony cited environmental and cultural degradation, view--plane obstruction, increased traffic/parking issues, and resistance to corporate encroachment on our community.

The construction of buildings, a parking lot, a subsurface wastewater treatment system and leach fields on the shores of Loko Ea will have adverse effects on fishpond ecology. The mauka portion of the small parcel sits on the Board of Water Supply's No Pass Zone. The BWS prohibits the installation of waste water systems in this zone due to potential ground water contamination. Run-off from the development on this low--lying coastal plain is alarming as sediments are harmful to fishponds and near--shore waters.

Developer Lokea Kai Partners and planning firm Group 70 insist the 2 tenant strip mall will benefit the community. They assert economic revitalization and vague public benefits yet lack concrete details on how a few retail jobs benefit our community. In comparison, an operational fishpond brings economic prosperity by creating new opportunities for meaningful employment, restores cultural connections to place, revives aqua-cultural methodologies, and contributes toward science and resource management knowledge. Fishponds provide an efficient and wise method to farm local fish, including the raising of limu, crabs, and oysters and provides fish to restock our surrounding reefs.

The developer/planners utilize the term "dirty use" as a description of the parcel and as a frame of reference to diminish the long and continued traditional Hawaiian use of this fishpond and surrounding environment. A gas station occupied this parcel for less than 50 years. These limited years of commercial use pales in significance to over 400 years of traditional "clean use" as a renowned, productive royal fishpond. It is time to reverse the vicious cycle of exploitation and return the landscape to its greatest, traditional use and pono resource management.

The public benefits and/or revitalization promised by the strip mall developers/planners are insignificant compared to the major socio-cultural and economic benefits of a protected and productive fishpond. Loko Ea is under siege, on both flanks, by encroaching, destructive development. Contact Council Chair Ernie Martin and the City Council members to express your thoughts before the full council vote.

Koolauloa Health Center (KHC), which has 3 sites, Kahuku, Kahuku High & Intermediate School, and Hauula, has added 2 mental health providers, 3 medical providers and a pediatric dentist. The Hauula site, located at the Hauula Kai Shopping Center, is now open 8am-7pm on M, T, Th, F and 8-5 on Wed. The Kahuku site is next to the hospital and has extended its Sat hours to 8am to 6 pm.

The new services are in the area of mental health. Dr. Rodney Yamaki, a psychiatrist, will provide mental health servies for children and adults two afternoons per month. In addition to practicing medicine, Dr. Yamaki enjoys collecting shells (sometimes converted into jewelry). Helen Bressler, who has a nursing degree, a Master's in Counseling Psychology and experience as a prison minister, provides smoking cessation, substance abuse counseling and marriage and family counseling. Public Schools Offering Summer Meals to All Children 18 and Younger

The Hawaii State Department of Education (HIDOE) announced that 71 public schools will serve meals through its summer food service program, Seamless Summer Option (SSO).

Beginning in early June, the SSO program will be available at public schools around the state free of charge to all children 18 years and younger. Meals will be served at select locations Monday through Friday, except June 10 and July 4.

SSO is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and was established too ensure that low-income children continue to receive nutritious meals during the summer. An eligible school must have 50 percent or more of its regular enrolled students qualifying for free or reduced-price lunches or some type of summer program on campus. However, meal recipients do not have to be enrolled in those classes to be served.
