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

Alec "Ace Cool" Cooke

At 59 years of age, Alec Cooke is an incredible, larger to surf giant Kaena Point hoping to ride 40 foot surf. He than life personality. He has been described as many characters in many stories but he himself always told the best ones. His life started with one of the strangest stories of them all. He was born as one of the first inseminated babies from the sperm of a Harvard Medical School doctor, a Swedish athlete. His father then a student at Harvard had Huntington's Chorea and did not want to pass it on. Cooke never knew his genetic father and has talked about himself as an experimentation. In fact, he was an experimenter of many life paths.

We recall a story a friend told. When Hurricane Iwa hit in November 1982, Alec went surfing at Waimea Bay. The roommates were frantic, it was dark and Alec was not back yet. He came home that night excited, wet with leaves in his straggly blond hair screaming about the great 30 foot waves he rode solo, no other surfer could make it out! He said it was dark, there were people with blankets and a fire when he washed up at the Waimea River. As he told the story he said "a star was born." This was the beginning of "Ace Cool, the Evel Knievel" of big wave surfing.

Cooke did pull off some heroic stunts that took much planning. He had a mind like a genius. He thought about things intently and was an impeccable speller. He was the first to ride giant waves on the outer reefs, reefs that he studied for many days. In 1984 he "promoted" a plan

to surf giant Kaena Point hoping to ride 40 foot surf. He produced a t-shirt, "Ace Cool Kaena Point Challenge" some said it was a bit over promoted. That stunt never happened but the following year he was dropped off by helicopter outside Pipeline, January 1985, into some of the biggest surf ever seen. Famous surf photographer Warren Bolster documented the venture and it became known as the "Biggest Wave." A documentary was also completed in 1986, "In Search of the Biggest Wave."

Punahou graduate of 1974, "Ace Cool" self named to do radio surf reports for the Surf News Network. Alec organized the first North Shore Tow-In Surfing competition that later developed into the start of the first ever world tour. Cooke also appeared in many TV shows including Jake and the Fat Man, recurring roles in Hawaii Five-0 and the Sea Will Tell. He also once jumped out of a helicopter with a white suit on and a briefcase for a Japanese commercial.

Above all, Alec was an environmentalist when it was not so cool. He always found time to do good deeds. He was one of the first to protect the turtles at Laniakea, he swam around Oahu for ten days to raise awareness about the dirty ocean water. The campaign was named "Keep the Ocean Blue" and yes, he made a sticker. Alec wrote the Surf Newz for the North Shore News from 1995-2010. He never missed the opportunity to volunteer for the North Shore News annual Christmas event Operation: Toybox.

Alec "Ace Cool" Cooke had a generous heart, he is a true legend and will be missed. Aloha, Betty Depolito.

Serving You in District 2

For most of the year at the City Council, the serious business of the Honolulu City Council provides little opportunity to speak at length about hope and inspiration. So it is a rare pleasure for me to share with you a story that is rich in history and flush with valor.

On December 7, 1941 Pearl Harbor suffered one of the worst attacks on American soil. When the Japanese bombing began around 9:20 a.m., the U.S.S. Honolulu, affectionately nicknamed the Blue Goose, was moored next to the U.S.S. St. Louis. On board the Honolulu was a young sailor named Ray Emory. The Blue Goose survived the attack and went on to engage in some of the most memorable naval battles of World War II. But that fateful night, as Emory recalled, "there was only one light in Honolulu that night, it was the (U.S.S.) Arizona burning. It was kind of spooky."

The Blue Goose was a Brooklyn-class light cruiser, commissioned on June 15, 1938 and its motto was "Lanakila Mau – Always Victorious." It was one of the few ships of its class retained by the U.S. Navy after decommissioning – most of the others were sold to South American countries. Through most of its valiant career from 1942 to end of the war, Ray Emory was aboard the Blue Goose. From Kiska, Alaska to Espiritu Santo in the New Hebrides, from Guadalcanal to Saipan and Guam, the Blue Goose was a force to be reckoned with in the Pacific. Ironically, it was a Japanese torpedo, launched from an aircraft in the Gulf of Leyte, Philippines in October 1944 that ultimately shot down the Blue Goose. She never returned to battle again.

Emory once said that Pearl Harbor survivors share a commonality that was stronger than any other group in the war. Following his naval career, Emory became a mechanical engineer and finally retired to Hawaii in the 1980's. He has since dedicated himself to ensuring that the events at Pearl Harbor on that fateful day are recorded accurately. He has obtained burial records and archives to match with dental records and DNA when available to help identify former "unknowns." It has brought peace and closure to many families.

Ray Emory embodies a legacy of service and honor. His story as a crew member of the U.S.S. Honolulu serves as an inspiration to all Americans and will endure for generations. And that is why, with the approaching Veteran's Day holiday, I was honored to recognize Ray Emory and all veterans for their legacy of service to America.

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Turtle Bay Conservation and Town Halls

The Turtle Bay Makai Conservation Easement became official on October 23, 2015. In this transaction, the State acquired 55 acres of lands at Kawela Bay, the City owns about 10 acres, and more than 600 acres of resort lands are now off limits for future development. The old rally cry, "Save Kawela Bay" has been realized.

The agreement was made possible through an amazing level of collaboration and collective effort by many diverse, and often competing, interests. Special thanks go to Governor Ige for closing the deal and to former Governors Abercrombie and Lingle for their commitment to make this a reality. My predecessor, Senator Clayton Hee played a critical role at the Legislature. Drew Stotesbury brought the resort owners to the table. Honolulu City and County and the U.S. Army helped fund the effort. Trust for Public Land, North Shore Community Land Trust, the hotel workers, Keep the North Shore Country, Defend Oahu Coalition, the entire conservation community and many dedicated individuals all played vital roles.

Three contentious decades have passed since the City approved an eight-fold expansion of the Turtle Bay Resort - an expansion that, in retrospect, could not be supported by the market, location, or highway infrastructure, and was strongly opposed by residents throughout Hawaii and visitors from around the world. I am very pleased to have been involved in this huge milestone for voluntary land conservation in Hawaii.

Next up is the Turtle Bay Mauka Conservation Easement, an agreement to protect 468 acres of prime agricultural lands mauka of the resort lands. This easement has been in the works for more than four years and has funding approval from State, City and Federal partners, but it appears to be hung up in negotiations over the fine print. The delays are disappointing, especially in light of the successful, timely closing of the more complex Makai deal.

Finally, in regards to the Turtle Bay lands, an opportunity exists to conserve additional acreage near Kahuku Point. This parcel, where 100 resort residential units are contemplated, was excluded from the Makai Conservation Easement; however no action to develop it will occur before 2018, so that more discussion can occur.

Our series of Town Halls on Pesticides and Clean Water were very well attended and we are holding a follow up meeting at Waialua Elementary School on Tuesday, November 10th, beginning at 6:30 p.m. The September 29th Waialua Town Hall was recorded

by Olelo and can be viewed online at SenatorRiviere. com. Apologies for the audio problems early in the meeting.

Nearly 40 Haleiwa Harbor Users attended a special meeting we convened on October 15th to address their frustrations with harbor management and policies recently implemented. State boating directors Ed Underwood and Meghan Statts described challenges within the department such as chronic job vacancies and limited funding, while hearing first hand concerns from the public. My office continues to follow up on specific requests and we will be encouraging coordinated support from the boating community on relevant measures in the upcoming Legislative Session.

Starbucks Stimulates Interest in Hale'iwa Queen Liliu'okalani Children's Center

On October 27 the North Shore Neighborhood Board heard a presentation regarding the "Shops at Anahulu" Project that is proposed for Queen Liliu'okalani Trust ("Trust") lands bordering Loko Ea Fishpond.

A Starbucks Coffee Shop, a Rip Curl Surf Shop, 5,200 square feet of commercial space, and 21 parking stalls are being proposed on .5 acres where the Chevron service station closed in 2008. Current activity at the site is remediation work to clean the soils dirtied by the former uses by Chevron. As a result of concerns raised about the Project at the meeting the Board did not take any action.

In addition to the Project Developer, Michael Wright of Lokea Kai Partners, LLC, four Trust personnel were also present including Trust Vice-President LeeAnn Crabbe. Many residents expressed questions and concerns to the presenters about the "Shops at Anahulu" Project and the North Shore Outdoor Circle presented a letter to the Board saying "We believe the proposed project site should be conservation land providing open space and view planes at the Loko Ea Fishpond for the community and visitors giving people an opportunity to learn about the rich history and culture of the area."

Those types of proposed uses would be in alignment with former plans for a portion of the Loko Ea holdings by the Trust. In 2000 the Trust completed an Environmental Assessment for the Queen Liliu'okalani Children's Center (QLCC), Windward Unit, Hale'iwa Office Project ("Hale'iwa Children's Center"). The official ground-breaking ceremony for the Hale'iwa Children's Center occurred in July 2001 with the expectation that construction would be completed by the end of that year. The financial downturn that took place after September 11, 2001 is often referenced as the explanation of why the Hale'iwa Children's Center was not completed at that time

The original plans for the Hale'iwa Childrens Center Project included utilizing 2 Trust parcels on either side of Loko Ea Place bordering both Loko Ea Fishpond and Anahulu Stream. The proposed uses included: a QLCC Office Building and Meeting Facility; Hula Pa (earthen mound); Halau (Pavilion); Parking Lot for program participants and community events; and a Halau Wa'a (Canoe Shed). The Project description included

uses such as hosting community events and gatherings as well as cultural learning programs. Since the Project was planned and then stalled, Trust assets have grown from approximately \$400 million in 2001 to roughly \$600 million today.

The North Shore Sustainable Communities Plan also appears to support the former plans for the Hale'iwa Children's Center: "Support efforts to restore Loko Ea Fishpond as an interactive, productive and functioning aquaculture resource. Promote the development of a cultural learning center providing both visitors and residents opportunities to experience the unique environment around Loko Ea Pond and 'Uko'a Marsh. Possible activities may include tours of a working aquaculture farm, as well as cultural and environmental education programs that teach traditional and moder aquaculture techniques and the history of the Pond and its adjacent areas. Walkways extending north to 'Uko'a Pond could provide opportunities for interpretive nature walks."

The Trust is a private operating foundation founded in 1909. The Trust owns approximately 6,200 acres across Hawai'i. The mission of the Trust is to serve orphan and destitute children with preference given to Hawaiian children. The Trust serves approximately 10,000 children annually through direct services and reaches tens of thousands more through collaboration with community partners and community building activities.

Real estate, securities and investments provide the resources to support Trust mission-related programs and activities. The Queen Lili'uokalani Children's Center ("QLCC") is a social service agency fulfilling the Trust's and the Queen's mission. QLCC currently does have an office space above the Haleiwa Post office with 2 staff offering a variety of services. Examples of the larger QLCCs offering more services and family/community activities are visible in Punalu'u, Waimanalo, Kalihi, and Waianae.

QLCC offers an array of programs and services with Hawaiian cultural values and practices as a foundation, to help beneficiary children and families reach their potential. Services assist families in developing a strong cultural base and ensure that there is caring and nurturing to guide and mentor each child. QLCC also collaborates with a variety of community groups and organizations to establish a strong support system for these young people through a wide-range of community building and collaborative community activities. QLCC services to beneficiary children and their families are free of charge.

The portion of the Trust property currently slated for the "Shops at Anahulu" is located in the Special Management Area (SMA), requiring approval from the City and County of Honolulu for a SMA Use Permit and a Hale'iwa Special District Permit. In support of the SMA request, an Environmental Assessment ("EA") is being completed to evaluate the Commercial use. The presentation to the Neighborhood Board was part of a pre-consultation that is intended to engage input on the scope of studies included in the Draft EA, which will include studies on archaeology, cultural assessment, civil engineering, traffic and water quality. By way of comparison, the QLCC Hale'iwa Children's Center project completed these types of studies and was issued its SMA permit in 2000.

According to QLCC the Queen's motto was "E onipa'a...i ka 'imi na'auao" (Be steadfast in the seeking of knowledge). 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Ehukai's Public Bathrooms Way Less Scary

The World Surf League and the Triple Crown of Surfing donate close to \$40,000 to renovate Ehukai Beach Park's comfort station

At least a lot of them are. But that's no longer true at Ehukai Beach Park thanks to the World Surf League and Vans Triple Crown of Surfing. On Tuesday, October 6, the organizations unveiled their nearly \$40,000 renovation of the park's comfort station (yes, that's what you call a nice, clean public bathroom).

The renovation included retiling, painting, all new lights, toilets, urinals, sinks and fixtures, as well as a Microguarding that will make it easier to clean and keep stain- and odor-free.

"Cleanliness is something you want when you use a public facility, but it's the hardest thing to maintain. This will help us do that, so that's a big upgrade," said Jon Hennington from the Parks and Recreation Department.

The expensive comfort station renovation is the second one the Triple Crown has completed – last year, Ali'i Beach Park's facilities got a facelift. In 2014, more than \$150,000 in cash and kind was donated by Vans and the World Surf League to a variety of North Shore community projects, and 2015

"As one of the more visible members of the North Shore community, I think we have a responsibility to do what we can when we can. And we do that year-round," said Jodi Wilmott, director of the Triple Crown of Surfing.

The Ehukai comfort station renovation is a good example of the community-minded spirit that the island needs more of, said Michele Nekota, director of the Parks and Recreation Department. With Mayor Kirk Caldwell's Paka Kakou program calling for 24 comfort stations and 16 playgrounds around the island to be refurbished at a cost of \$2 million, the Parks and Rec Department relies on the sort of public-private partnerships exemplified here.

"We want this type of partnership so we can stretch our dollars and renovate more comfort stations. It's important, because it's the community working together to take pride and ownership in their facilities, their parks, their comfort stations, their playgrounds. So hopefully we see less vandalism and graffiti in those facilities," said Nekota.

Well, at least one thing is for certain: a massive Pipe set is once again the scariest thing at Ehukai.

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


Vans has once again committed to an extensive sustainability program that is becoming a global model for the industry, which incorporates community, environmental stewardship and local partnerships:

- The VTCS is a certified Deep Blue Surfing Event an "Ocean Friendly" event that sets a clear path for reducing environmental impacts, while also providing social
- Sustainable Coastlines Hawaii is hired each year to provide a comprehensive benefits for the local community. waste diversion strategy for the VTCS, paying a full-time crew during contest days to keep the beaches very clean and minimize waste.
- 35,894 single use water bottles were saved last year by providing athletes and crew with reusable bottles and FloWater dispensaries.
- 7,500 meals were served to athletes, officials and sponsors last year by local catering, Ke Nui Kitchen, which sources local, organic ingredients that are 100% GMO-free. All plates and utensils were of compostable materials and shredded to
- 60% of waste was diverted from landfill by composting/recycling. speed up composting.
- 80% of power needs were met with renewable biodiesel fuel.
- Alternative transportation was provided for athletes, staff and spectators.
- \$72,800 in donations as well as in-kind support went to local community groups
- The VTCS has worked to restore the public restrooms at Ali'i Beach Park and Ehukai Beach Park, which provides visitors clean accommodations and lasting and services.
- Partnering with Turtle Bay to provide shuttle service for the public, staff and benefits for residents.

Surfing: The National Sport of Hawaiians

The North Shore of Oahu was renowned in traditional times for the immensity of its waves and the resultant sound of thunder that carried over the 'aina into the uplands of Wahi'awa. Surfing large waves has been an integral part of the Hawaiian culture for centuries. During the Makahiki season, our north facing shoreline sees storm generated waves from the northern Pacific travel 2,500 uninterrupted miles until they encounter the coastline. As these powerful waves move from the deep ocean into the surf zone, they rise, climb and rumble onshore.

The composer of the traditional oli (chant) Ke Kai O Waialua accurately observed, "A ea mai ke kai o Waialua, Let the sea of Waialua ascend". When the sea ascended, Hawaiians set aside their daily tasks and set out to surf. William Ellis wrote in 1822 that "the thatch houses of an entire village stood empty" while every woman, man and child went surfing.

Hawaiian historian and scholar David Malo (c. 1793-1853) wrote that surfing was the "national sport for Hawaiians" and noted that almost every Hawaiian surfed. Malo adds it was an activity that all Hawaiians enjoyed "without regard to status, age or gender". Women were excellent surfers. Hi'iaka, Kelea, Ka'ahumanu, Namahana and Ka'iulani were several Hawaiian wahine noted for their exceptional surfing skills. In 1778, Captain James Cook and crew were astonished by "the difficult and dangerous maneuvers" of Hawaiian surfers and remarked that the Hawaiian people were ocean experts who excelled in the sea.

He'e nalu (surfing) was an integral part of traditional Hawaiian society and required experts who designed the papa he'e nalu (surfboards). Traditional boards were finless and made of solid wood. The boards were crafted from koa, wiliwili, kukui, ulu and 'ohe'ohe trees. Author and surfer John Clark notes that papa alaia were the most common surfboards at 6-9 feet long. Contemporary SUP have a Hawaiian forerunner in the papa olo which were thicker, rounder, heavier boards between 14-16 feet long. A 17 foot traditional surfboard at Bishop Museum weighs over 150 pounds.

Hawaiians also designed smaller boards called papa li'ili'i, today known as paipo boards. Hawaiians used canoe to transport surfers and boards to the line up in traditional times (Clark 2011). Canoe were also utilized for lele wa'a (canoe leaping) where surfers would leap from the canoe into the cresting wave and ride it into shore (Finney & Houston 1996). Waimea was a popular surf break back in the day as Hawai-

ians would surf directly into the mouth of the river. Another style of river surfing popular in traditional and contemporary times is called he'e pu'e wai, riding the stationary waves at a river mouth created by flood water.

The thunderous waves of the North Shore called to many surfers in traditional times. In a moʻolelo recounted by Pilahi Paki, a chief from Kauai named Kahikilani came to Paumalu to experience this renowned surf break. He fell in love with a local wahine who created a lei lehua for him every morning before he set off to surf. When he dared return home one day with a lei 'ilima around his neck from another wahine, he was turned into stone. Now, Kahikilani sits alone on the bluff above Paumalu, forever watching but never surfing the ascending waves.


For over a century, Hawaiians have been at the forefront in introducing surfing to the global community. Hawaiian scholar Isaiah Walker writes that in 1885, the Kawananakoa brothers surfed Santa Cruz while attending school in California (2008). Two decades later, Hawaiian George Freeth popularized surfing at a 1907 exhibition in Redondo Beach and went on to be known as the "Father of California Surfing". Duke Kahanamoku, the greatest swimmer of his time, introduced surfing to Australian and American audiences while participating and winning in the 1912 and 1916 Olympics.

As global surfers, tourists, media and money rolls into the North Shore like the massive winter waves, let us respectfully remember the origins of he'e nalu and the people and culture who made surfing "The National Sport of Hawaiians".



Parents, community rally to cool Laie Elementary's hottest classrooms

Leveraging community support, the parents and guardians at Laie Elementary cooled the school's hottest classrooms this month by installing insulation in the attics. Their plan took less than one month from conception to installation and impacts 175 children in seven classrooms.

Some 15 volunteers gathered at the school and installed the spray fiberglass insulation in about 14 hours total during the span of two days, while students were on fall break. Fueled by monetary donations, and free labor and equipment, the project did not cost Laie Elementary any money, said school Vice Principal Eliza Elkington.

Following phase one of the Keep Laie Cool project, students returned to:

- a 24-degree drop in ceiling temperature from 110 degrees before insulation to 86 degrees after insulation
- a 12-degree dip in classroom temperatures from 98 degrees pre-insulation to 86 degrees post- insulation.

Keep Laie Cool launched in mid-September, spearheaded by Jennifer Kajiyama, a concerned parent of a first-grader, and Carol Feinga, a community member and the aunt of a student. In about two weeks' time, their heavily promoted online site raised \$6,100 in donations. The insulation material cost \$2,800.

Project volunteers numbered about 50, ranging from two boys aged 6 and 8, who sold star fruit from their home garden and raised \$90 to an 8-year-old girl, who made bracelets and sold them for \$1. Some helpers were in their 70s. Les Harper of Brigham Young University-Hawaii led the volunteers, who installed the insulation. Prior to that, his team of BYU engineers and local solar companies conducted a heat study, which found that:

- on the hottest days, classroom temperatures reached 113 degrees
- the buildings and electrical wiring were old and unable to handle air-conditioning units
- the hottest buildings on campus lacked insulation
- on the coolest days, classroom temperatures reached 96 degrees
- there are very little trees on campus.

Future plans are to install perforated mesh banners on one school building's second floor and solar attic fans in the portables. One day is set aside to plant trees to block direct sunlight from specific areas of school buildings. These phases will cost about \$15,000 total and their target completion date is by year's end.

"I am appreciative of the time and effort that the volunteers have put into this campaign," Elkington said. "Rather than complaining about a long-standing issue, they looked for realistic and quick solutions. ... Their enthusiasm for these cooling projects is contagious."


"I am in awe of the productiveness and solutionsoriented approach taken by these parents to cool their school," said Matt Ho, Castle-Kahuku complex area superintendent. "The amount of school support from parents, guardians and the community is humbling."
