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

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Talking Story with Tom Jacobs

As SurfNSea Surf Center Celebrates Its 50th Anniversary, Talking Story with Joe Green, the Owner

SurfNSea, the surf shop in the iconic yellow and brown building next to Haleiwa's "Rainbow Bridge" over Anahulu Stream, is 50 years old. The building itself is over 100 years in age, built in the early 1900's when Haleiwa Town was a small group of businesses

supporting the Haleiwa Hotel, one of Oahu's first go-to resort hotels. That building, then a tailor shop and dry goods store, barely survived the tsunami that rolled through the town on April 1st 1948.

In 1964 Paul Liskey and two partners invested \$100 each to start a sporting goods store that Liskey named "SurfNSea." Sales the first day amounted to three bucks. Not much, but lease rent in those early years was only \$50 a month, increasing after a while to \$100. Liskey bought out his partners and managed to get the building designated as a state historic site, saving it from tear-down. The shop sold surfing and dive equipment along with dry goods, groceries, and an impressive stock of guns and ammo that were kept locked in three big safes.

In December, 1969 another tsunami came calling. Liskey and neighbors worked through the night to move stock, surfboards, and guns to the second floor. They shored up the building by stringing ropes across the mauka (landward) side of the structure, tying them off to two coco-palms at either end. When the tsunami hit, the ropes saved the building from ending up in Kam Highway. As it was, Liskey and his employees spent days cleaning out the 18 inches of water, sand, and mud dumped on the ground floor. Liskey sold the still-struggling business to Ron Stroble in 1973, and Stroble eventually sold out to three local North Shore partners a few years later.

At about this time SurfNSea's current owner, Joe Green, made his appearance.

Sometimes it seems like every male immigrant from the mainland to the North Shore, however he ends up ... carpenter, waiter, bank president ... comes to surf. Joe was no exception. Born in Jacksonville, Florida, and raised on the Gulf Stream surf on the East

Coast, Joe made friends with Dickie Roseborough – "Roso," - a sometime North Shore resident who summered in Florida. Roso's stories of monster surf and juicy wahine were irresistible, and in 1977 Joe flew to Oahu for the winter surf season, renting a room in a Quonset hut in Pupukea from Roso. "Roso taught me a lot," Joe remembers. "How to surf the big stuff, but most of all how to get along with the locals. He taught me to be a 'humble haole.' Even today, when I'm wrestling with a tough problem, I'll ask myself, 'What would Roso do?'"

Joe moved back to Florida in the spring when the surf died, working as a carpenter and saving his money. That next fall he drove his old, beat-up Volvo to California and flew to the North Shore, this time to stay, stepping off the plane with a few dollars and even fewer job prospects. He scratched out a living

as a carpenter, by fixing up cars, but also by stacking surfboards one on top of another on another old Volvo and selling them at swap meets, first at Kam Drive-In in Aiea, then at Aloha Stadium. It was his first venture into retail surfing, a business he's still in 37 years later.

The three partners of SurfNSea made Joe an offer. He could sub-lease part of their store to sell surfboards. His rent? Fifteen present of his sales. Joe jumped at the opportunity. No more swap meets!

When one of the three SurfNSea partners opted out of the hui, Joe bought in, at the cost of the dollar value of his stock of surfboards. When another partner left the business Joe wound up as half-owner. Half owner of what? In those days of the 70s and 80a a good day's sales were \$200. On top of that, Mother Nature was not through with SurfNSea. Hurricane Ewa roared through the North Shore, taking with it SurfNSea's tin roof and leaving a wet mess in the store. The only good thing about Ewa is that the damage

Rail Needs to Stay on the Right Track

Lately, Council support has been called into question by members of the Legislature and others on the proposed extension of the General Excise Tax surcharge for rail. For the Council, it's not just about the surcharge. Holding overall financial authority for rail means Councilmembers don't have the luxury of piecemeal oversight of the project. That's the job of the Honolulu Authority for Rapid Transportation (HART), its appointed board, and the Mayor. The Council must stay focused on the big picture. And right now, that picture is troubling. Like the \$910 million hole that suddenly appeared after we received glowing reports for 2014 and the news that HART had awarded a bonus to its executive director.

The three most talked about options to plug the projected shortfall all sound simple enough—extend the General Excise Tax surcharge, increase property taxes, or scrap the project. But raising property taxes before exploring all possible remedies is irresponsible and a total stoppage is foolish and shortsighted. The City is liable for repayment of the entire \$1.55 billion federal grant if the project fails and future requests for federal transportation funds would likely be rejected. Extending the surcharge is clearly the most viable and it spreads the burden among all Oahu residents, businesses, and tourists.

The time has come for frank answers from everyone responsible for rail, from the Mayor and the Council, on down to every staff member at HART. First, do we have the right knowledge and experience on HART's executive team and staff? They must answer to the board of directors appointed by the Mayor and the Council. Secondly, is the HART board exerting the leadership and direction it was expected to provide? The answers to these questions may tell us whether it's time to reconstitute the current board with people possessing the specific expertise to oversee a project of this magnitude.

Legislators rightfully want more fiscal accountability, transparency, and cohesive information from the City. The Council shares many of those same concerns, especially the lack of reliable data on which to base important decisions. If the federal funds intended for bus and para-transit operations are removed from HART's financial plan, they must be replaced. The Council on its own is exploring other sources of local funds such as broadening the fuel tax revenue base, redirecting federal formula funds it receives, and possibly changing the City

Charter for more flexibility in expending special purpose funds.

The Council remains optimistic that the Legislature will grant some extension of the tax surcharge. I have already introduced Bill 23 (2015) to accept whatever the Legislature decides and authorize its use at the City level. I am also recommending a forensic City audit of the project that may yield useful information to guide the Council's future actions. Rail is a project with broad public benefits. Its success rests on the City getting its act together and rebuilding confidence with the Legislature and the public.



We have reached the First Crossover of the Session when bills that made it through the Senate committees come to the House, and the bills that made it through the House committees are sent to the Senate. This is the time when we begin to see which bills are really in the running to become laws.

Here is a list of bills to watch as they move through the process:

Medical Marijuana Dispensaries: HB321 HD1 Establishes a system of medical marijuana dispensaries and production centers.

Affordable Housing by the Rail: SB1369 Creates an agency to facilitate, oversee, and expedite transitoriented development of public lands around the rail stations to construct workforce rental units.

Electronic Cigarettes: HB385 HD1 Increases the minimum age from 18 to 21the minimum age to purchase any tobacco product or electronic smoking device.

HB585 Prohibits the use of electronic smoking devices in places where smoking is prohibited.

Safe Places for Youth: HB395 HD1 Requires the office of youth services to coordinate a five-year safe places for youth pilot program to establish a network of safe places where youth in crisis can access safety and services. Allows youth in crisis under 18 years of age to consent to services in the safe places program under certain circumstances.

College Credit Equivalency: HB981 HD1 Requires a previously authorized UH policy for the awarding of credits for college-level learning gained from work or other life experiences, other than military service covered under current law.

General Excise Tax Exemptions: HB984 Exempts the sale of food from the General Excise Tax.

Rail Tax: HB337 Extends the General Excise Tax increase in order to pay for the Rail.

To Prune or Not To Prune

The NSOC held a community event on Friday, February 27, at the WCA.

Guest lecturer from UH Professor Andy Kaufman showed slides of some of Hawaii's beautiful trees and shared his research on how beautifully maintained trees affect us in a positive way and improperly pruned trees affect us in a negative way. This psychological affect is both conscious and unconscious. He is also conducting research on how plants in school classrooms and offices can influence positive attitudes and outcomes. In conclusion he said a Hawaii without trees and proper maintenance of existing trees would affect everyone adversely. He put dollar amounts on the upkeep and planting of trees and the benefits far outweighed the cost of neglecting those trees.

Local resident Jeff Dorr of "Dorr to Paradise" brought indoors several large potted trees and demonstrated proper pruning techniques.

Lessons learned were many. Chose the right tree for the right location. If you do not want to have the tree grow to its (proper) height then you must start trimming it when it is young and small. Once a tree is huge is not a time to try to make it smaller. Drastic or improper pruning weakens the tree and makes it prone to rot, insects and a shortened life span.

Never top a tree. You can take out the dead, damaged, diseased, crossed or wrong headed branches to keep a tree healthy and looking good. Use the 1/3 rule of properly cutting a branch that is 1/3 or less of the size of the trunk or main leader branch of the tree. Cut the branch near the trunk but leave a ½ inch to an inch so the cuff (collar) can heal. Do not apply tar or wound treatments as once was considered proper.

Hawaiian Bananas

Bananas have long been a Hawaiian staple ever since the first Polynesians brought them on their sailing canoes across the Pacific. They brought many cultivars with them, but the most widely known are the "Pacific plantains" of which there are three main groups. They are the Maoli group, Popo`ulu group and the Iholena group. Although they have declined in popularity since the introduction of cultivars such as the Apple and Williams banana, they are absolutely delicious and deserving of recognition as one of the most fantastic foods in Hawaiian culture.

The Maoli group is characterized by its enormous fruits, some reaching 10 inches in length and looking like huge sausages. A truly substantial ba-

nana! The racks are also huge, often reaching over 90 pounds with 10+ hands of fruit. Each cultivar has unique characteristics and puts on quite a show of beauty. For example the Maoli `Ele`ele has all black leaf stalks, the Maoli Manini is completely variegated with camouflage-colored leaves, striped stalks and gorgeous white-striped fruit, and Maoli Manai'ula has fruit that emerge bright red before turning green after 30 days.

The Popo`ulu group is equally impressive with fruits that look like thick pudgy sausages. They

also form enormous racks and are coveted by Polynesians as being one of the most delicious bananas. Some of the popo`ulu cultivars form a pink jelly in the center when fully ripe. They are critically endangered and on the verge of extinction and only remain in private collections.

Iholena bananas are characterized by their emerging `cigar' leaf, which is bright in color ranging from silvery mauve to copper red. This characteristic makes them very easy to recognize. This was one of the only types of banana that women were allowed to eat in Old Hawaii. The fruit color is bright pink-orange, resembling salmon and incredibly high in vitamin A. The flowers contain a sweet nectar called pilali that is an amazing sweet treat on hot day.

Most of the Hawaiian bananas are considered to be cooking bananas and are most popular when cooked. I love taking the green Maoli or Popo`ulu bananas, peeling them, slicing very thin and frying in coconut oil and salt to make the most amazing chips you have ever had! When they get yellow and soft I slice them thicker and fry them the same way, so they come out incredibly sweet and delicious. Another popular way is to steam the ripe fruit in a steamer or an imu (this is the best!). You can also


peel and chop up the green bananas and boil them like potatoes for your curry or soup. They are great food to bring camping because they are delicious roasted in their skins over an open fire. You can also eat them raw if you let them get ripe enough.

Waimea Valley has long maintained an impressive collection of Hawaiian bananas, and although it has been threatened by diseases and pests, many plants are still thriving today. We are now selling plants from our collection every Saturday during our plant sale from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. These bananas are incredibly rare and their survival now depends on the efforts of banana enthusiasts. So swing by the

valley on Saturday and browse our collection of rare bananas for sale!

HPV and Cervical Cancer

What is HPV or human papilloma virus? It is the most common sexually transmitted virus in the U. S. About 20 million are currently infected and, with each passing year, 6 million more become infected. Most HPV infections don't cause symptoms and resolve spontaneously. There are many types of HPV and some of these cause cervical cancer in women. Cervical cancer is the second leading cause of cancer deaths in women. About 12,000 women develop cervical cancer every year and about one third are expected to die from this disease.

Cervical cancer can be prevented. There is currently a vaccine that protects against two types of HPV that cause 70% of cervical cancer. The FDA has recently approved a new vaccine, Gardisil 9. This vaccine protects against 9 types of HPV causing 90% of cervical cancer. It is administered as a series of three shots within 6 months. It is given to both females and males (since it is sexually transmitted) as early as 11 years old. Vaccination should occur before people become sexually active. The vaccine is given up to age 26; it is assumed that by then, the individual has been exposed to HPV. Are there side effects? These are mild and resolve in a short time. There might be swelling and redness at the vaccination site, headaches and mild fever.

With HPV vaccinations, people may feel that pap smears (screening for cervical cancer) may be unnecessary. Remember that before the advent of pap smears, cervical cancer was a major cause of death in women. Moreover, the new vaccine is not 100% protection.

A person who has already completed the HPV series need not be re-vaccinated with Gardisil 9. They are already well protected. The old vaccine protects against the most aggressive types of cervical cancer.

If you are less than 26, protect yourself or your partner by getting this vaccine.

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The Big Fix

The "Big Fix" spay and neuter mobile clinic scheduled for March. Poi Dogs and Popoki (PDP) has scheduled a mobile clinic this March for pet owners to get their furry friends spayed and neutered at an affordable rate.

The Big Fix, is a fully equipped mobile veterinary clinic that provides low cost spay and neuter services. The March 27, Friday services is scheduled at the North Shore Marketplace for cats.

Since its inception, the Big Fix, PDP has sterilized more than 2500 cats and dogs in communities across Oahu from Waianae to Waimanalo.

Sterilization fees include microchip and pre medication, \$50 for pet cats and \$25 for feral cats.

Special subsidies may be available for those who cannot afford the fee. Pet owners are required to schedule an appointment by emailing alicia@poidog-sandpopoki.org or call 551-7915. In the email please provide your name, contact # whether the cat is a pet or feral, male or female, and weight. Each cat will also receive a microchip identification to ensure that the cats find their way home.


