Pupukea Beach Park Court Will Receive Needed "TLC"

A group of North Shore locals who are involved in the construction trades have banded together to form a team that is willing to work for free to pick up where government has left off.

Our first project was the replacement of the access stairs that were washed out by large surfat Keiki Beach. The total cost for materials was \$500. The result was the restoration of a safe pathway to the beach.

Eight years ago the Department of Parks and Recreation closed down an extremely popular play court area at Pupukea Beach Park because of an uneven surface that they considered dangerous. Since that time the only activity that goes on there are the weeds growing through the cracks in the pavement. It's the same story that we hear quite often from our city and county departments: "There is no money in the budget."

As you read this letter, Grace Pacific is in the area to repave our streets. We have spoken to them about redoing the courts while they are in the neighborhood. They have generously agreed to do the job, and to provide the men and equipment at no charge, (\$10,000 savings), if we pay for materials. The cost of materials is \$20,000. The remaining scope of work for this project is the removal of existing material (\$8500), Base course and recompact (\$1500.) then sealing and striping (\$14,000). One of the corporate sponsors already onboard is Sun Edison, who needs to see the work start before they make their donation. Their contribution is substantial: at least \$10,000.

After presenting the Idea to the Sunset Beach



All Options Must Be Considered In a Time Of Crisis

The City Administration's decision to pass on submitting a bid for the Hilo Hattie's site on Nimitz Highway was short-sighted and foreclosed an opportunity to make a real and immediate impact in managing Honolulu's homeless crisis.

With a little work, the nearly 85,000-square-foot site could have provided sufficient space to accommodate between 200 and 500 homeless with children and still offer enough room for on-site social services and possibly a daycare service to allow parents to seek employment. Families with children should be of our highest priority in dealing with the problem. Instead, the administration appears focused on the chronic homeless with histories of alcohol and drug abuse.

More ideally, the site is located in an industrial area and away from residential neighborhoods; provided a more secure, contained environment; and was next to two existing social service providers – the Institute for Human Services and the Salvation Army.

The site would have allowed between 200 and 500 homeless to be moved from the congested Kakaako and Kapalama Canal encampments, giving the City additional time to complete its Sand Island temporary housing plans and pursue other possible sites for housing and shelters.

The City Council over the past two years appropriated sufficient funds for the acquisition of the lease and for at least several years of lease rents for opportunities just like this. With the Governor's announcement that the State is stepping up its commitment to address homelessness, there was ample time to work with the Legislature to help cover the costs of operating and maintaining the Hilo Hattie site.

The implication that the site would be used to house 800 homeless on cots is a red herring. There was never any intent to create a giant sardine can. And the stated cost of providing services estimated at over \$20,000 per person per year is more sleight-of-hand because that cost is incurred regardless of where the service is provided.

There was also the slight possibility that the landlord, who ultimately submitted the only bid for the site, may have been open to renegotiation of the annual lease rent. But by failing to submit a bid, the City removed itself from the discussion.

Our district, already heavily populated with

homeless around Wahiawa and spreading to other areas of the North Shore, has a definite stake in both immediate and long-term solutions to the issue of homelessness and the lack of affordable housing. The Council will continue to work with all stakeholders toward resolving this crisis.

The Homeless Crisis

With an impassioned call for help, the director of the Children's Discovery Center in Kakaako sent an email last month to every state Senator, the Governor and other government officials. She provided video evidence of two men defecating and urinating outside the Center, and described the terrible state of affairs that regularly occurs around the Children's Center.

The homeless population has grown to more than 300 in Kakaako Makai. Contiguous tents line both sides of several streets. There are no sidewalks and passing cars must carefully negotiate these corridors where children play. One sign proclaims, "This is our home. Leave us alone!"

Representative Tom Brower was beat up at this location about a week after the email. More recently, the police released statistics on the increasing incidents of crime in the area. While most of the homeless want no problems with the law, some characters are bringing trouble for all. This situation is bad and getting worse. Of course, the homeless crisis is state-wide and there are several thousand homeless individuals.

As the new Vice-Chair of the Senate Human Services Committee, I called Senator Susie Chun-Oakland, the Committee Chair and well regarded leader in these matters. I thought that if we know these people are living in these circumstances and we are not going to provide an alternative or force them to leave, then we have accepted responsibility for the situation. If this many people are going to remain indefinitely, then we must provide a minimum level of sanitation until a decision is made to do something else.

What resulted was a meeting of government leaders, service providers and community advocates on Tuesday, July 28, 2015. This leadership team offered 10 recommendations to Governor Ige, who held a press conference the day before to announce that he would be working with Mayor Colwell and the Legislative financial committee chairs to address the homeless crisis.

Some of the recommendations were to increase capacity of the Next Step Shelter that is already operating in Kakaako; consider purchasing the Hilo Hattie building in Iwilei, which is in bankruptcy, for a comprehensive resource and training, and transitional living facility; support funding for a youth facility and family housing project that is planned in Honolulu; increase funding for rental assistance;

provide adequate maintenance funding to reduce public housing vacancies; and consider an emergency declaration to expedite actions to address this crisis.

There are many reasons why the homeless population is increasing and ignoring the problem will not make it go away. We have to provide compassionate support for those that need assistance and we have to be firm with those who would take advantage of this compassion. There is clearly no easy, permanent solution, yet I wonder if we, as a society, are ready and willing to do whatever it takes to address this situation? Half measures are not working.

AUGUST MARKS OUR 6TH ANNUAL STATE-WIDE PEDESTRIAN SAFETY MONTH

Governor Ige and the Hawaii Department of Transportation (HDOT) kicked off the state's 6th annual Pedestrian Safety Month recently with a proclamation signing at the state capitol. Hawaii is the only state in the nation with a statewide pedestrian safety month. The objective of the campaign is to create heightened awareness of pedestrian safety with the ultimate goal of saving lives and making Hawaii a safer place to walk. This is especially important because more pedestrians are out and about with the start of the new school year.

"The number one reason for pedestrian accidents is inattentive behavior on both the part of the pedestrian and the driver," HDOT Director Ford Fuchigami said. "Our Walk Wise Hawaii program is one of the important tools, along with enforcement and safety engineering, to reduce pedestrian fatalities and injuries in our state. With the recent rise in pedestrian fatalities, we must continue to be vigilant."

Walk Wise Hawaii partnered with Kamaaina Kids, an after-school program serving over 9,000 children statewide, and McDonald's Restaurants of Hawaii in an educational campaign to teach Hawaii's keiki and kupuna good pedestrian habits.

"Walk Wise Hawaii coordinated a statewide poster contest and asked keiki to design a pedestrian safety poster that depicted one of two important pedestrian habits: (1) to always make eye contact with drivers when in a crosswalk and (2) to always wear bright and reflective clothing when walking at night," Fuchigami said.

The Governor recognized the top two finalists from over 4,500 entries at a press conference. The winners were Tia Tanimoto, a fourth grader from Kaumana Elementary School in Hilo for her poster depicting a boy and girl wearing bright and reflective clothing while in a crosswalk and Ruimin Lin, a fifth grader from Salt Lake Elementary School for her poster depicting a girl prior to entering a crosswalk making eye contact with a driver. The winning posters will be printed on McDonald's Restaurant of Hawaii tray liners at 75 locations throughout the state during the month of August. It is expected that over half a million McDonald's of Hawaii customers will be exposed to this messaging.

HDOT's Walk Wise Hawaii program is teaming up with public partners such as the City & County of Honolulu's Department of Transportation Services and all four county police departments. Private partners such as AAA-Hawaii, DTRIC Insurance, Farmers Insurance Hawaii, Geico Insurance, Girl Scouts of Hawaii, Kamaaina Kids, McDonald's Restaurants of Hawaii and Moms In Hawaii are also joining the efforts to educate pedestrians. Pedestrian-related community events and campaigns will be taking place throughout the month to encourage safe pedestrian behaviors and raise driver awareness of pedestrians.

TAX CREDIT FOR CESSPOOL UPGRADE OR CONVERSION

On June 12, 2015, Governor David Ige signed House Bill 1140 into law, creating Act 120, which provides a temporary income tax credit for the cost of upgrading or converting a qualified cesspool to a septic system or an aerobic treatment unit system, or connecting to a sewer system.

For many years, the state has struggled to find ways to reduce the pollution that comes from cesspools. Cesspools are essentially holes in the ground that discharge raw, untreated sewage. The ocean, streams, groundwater, and drinking water resources are all contaminated by cesspool pollution that is disposed of by systems that do not treat the wastewater.



Section 1 of Act 120 points out that "cesspools in Hawaii release approximately 55,000,000 gallons of untreated sewage into the ground each day." There are over 11,000 cesspools on the island of Oahu alone. A reduction in the amount of cesspools is a matter of great importance to the State.

This measure is meant to help and encourage owners of cesspools to convert to a more modern septic system. The temporary income tax credit is offered to residents who do one of the following three things:

- (1) Upgrade or convert their qualified cesspools to a septic system;
- (2) Upgrade or convert their qualified cesspools to an aerobic treatment unit system; or
 - (3) Connect their qualified cesspool to a sewer

system.

I know that many residents in our district are cesspool owners and have been unable to convert or upgrade their cesspools because of financial reasons. The hope is that many cesspool owners will take advantage of this tax credit in an effort to maintain the integrity of our water resources.

LANIAKEA BARRIERS

Mahalo to all the North Shore residents who have sent emails, called our office, and spoke with me personally to share your feelings about the Laniakea barriers. If you've driven past the area recently, you've seen that the barriers are still in place. There continues to be an ongoing discussion regarding the potential removal of the barriers. As both the city and state work towards finding a solution, their main concerns are 1) How do we keep people safe? and 2) How do we help with traffic congestion?

Fungus Among Us

It's been a hot, muggy summer and I've been seeing lots of fungus and yeast problems: ringworm, jock itch, kane or "Haole Rot," and yeast vaginitis. What causes these conditions? What are they? Fungus is not a bacteria or virus. It is classified as a plant with many subcategories, such as yeast, mold and mushrooms. If you looked through the lens of a microscope at vaginal discharge smeared on a glass slide or skin scraping from fungal conditions, you would see branches with buds attached at the ends. Fungus and a variety of bacteria are part of the "normal flora" of the skin and mucus membranes (mouth, vagina) and they balance each other. Sometimes certain conditions, such as taking antibiotics (which can kill the bacteria) can offset this balance and the fungi grow excessively and cause infections. Fungi thrive in warm, dark, moist conditions. This explains the predominance of these infections in the groin area (jock itch), feet (athlete's foot), in the vagina, under breasts and in the armpit. Kane or "Haole Rot" usually occurs in the upper back, upper chest and upper arms (direct clothes contact).

These infections present as slightly scaly and red rash. For kane, the skin lesions are separate, slightly oval, flat and light (almost looks white against tanned or dark skin). In jock itch or under the breast or feet, the rash is continuous. In ringworm, the lesions are round, slightly scaly rash on the outside of the ring and may be clear in the center. In the vagina, sometimes there is cheesy looking discharge and lots of itching. Fungal infections usually itch (except for kane).

For treatment, try over the counter antifungal/yeast creams. For kane, apply Selsun Blue over the rash at bedtime, wash off in the morning; do this for 7 consecutive nights. If all this fails, consult your medical provider.



Ko'olauloa Health Center Open House Ko'olauloa Health Center will have an open

Koʻolauloa Health Center will have an open house on August 15th from 1 to 4 p.m. at its Kahuku site, next to Kahuku Hospital. There will be free health screenings for diabetes and high blood pressure, educational materials, medical and dental providers to answer questions, a community table with donated items which will be available to those who can personally use these items, local farmers with their vegetables and fruit. There will also be food for all to enjoy and drawings for a variety of prizes.

Koʻolauloa Health Center opened its doors in November, 2004 in a trailer in the old sugar mill complex in Kahuku. The Center receives Federal and state funds, which enable the health center to serve everyone, whether or not they have medical insurance. Since opening, it has expanded its health services to include medical, dental, mental health OB, pharmaceutical and outreach services. Moreover, it now has three sites: Kahuku, Hauʻula Shopping Center, and Kahuku High & Intermediate School (the first in Hawaii to provide medical and dental services at a public school.)

So, come and get your blood sugar and blood pressure checked, purchase locally grown fruits and vegetables, learn about the services provided by the health center and enjoy the food. Maybe you'll be lucky and win something.

Estuary Management at Waimea Valley

Waimea Valley, as well as being an important cultural site, is a major water shed on Oʻahu. The majority of the northwest Koʻolau Mountains are drained by the many tributaries running through it, and all eventually link to Kamananui Stream, which forms a large estuarine area as it nears the sea. This area would have been important habitat for many wetland and shoreline birds in the past, and in the past few years staff at Waimea are slowly trying to rehabilitate the area.

The main challenges facing estuarine (river/ocean) and riparian (riverside) habitats are the same facing the rest of Hawaii, with invasive species at the forefront of the problem. Water-loving California grass forms dense swards up to six feet high that choke out any other vegetation and provide ideal habitat for mongoose, rats and feral cats, all which prey on native birds. Hau bush, if left unmanaged, can form dense, impenetrable thickets that are prone to erosion, as the layer of sedges and grass holding the soil tight will be shaded out by the hau. As well, invasive tree species like paper bark, Canary Island date palms, java plums and figs crowd out more suitable native vegetation.

To combat these problems, and encourage the proliferation of native sedges and grass like ahu'awa, 'aki'aki, manyspike flatsedge and other native and endemic species, staff at Waimea have started removing the large invasive trees and mowing the California grass areas with a large bush mower. The invasive grasses do not tolerate being mowed, which allows seedlings young plant of the smaller, mowing tolerant native species to establish and flourish. As well, it drives out the mongoose, rats and cats and creates a suitable open habitat for foraging wetland birds like our native, endangered 'alae 'ula (Hawaiian moorhen) and 'alae ke'oke'o (Hawaiian coot). After a few years of mowing, this change can be seen in the large delta adjacent to the highway, as the California grass is succumbing to the mowing, and grass and sedgeland slowly creeps into the open area.

One of the best places to view wetland birds and see what years of intensive management can accomplish is the James Campbell National Wildlife Refuge, occupying what used to be shrimp farms on the way to Kahuku. This refuge is home to a significant percentage of the remaining endemic wetland birds in the state, and welcomes many seasonal migrants as well. The reserve has recently been expanded to the shoreline, and that is now being managed to eventually provide albatross and shearwater nesting sites. The reserve is closed during the nesting season (summer) but open for tours in winter, more information about wetlands and wetland birds can be found on the U.S. Fish and Wildlife James Campbell website.

Students Capture National Titles, Surpass International Competitors

Freshman Essie Workman and 10th-grader Truman Spring spent their summer traveling to the University of Maryland; competing against 3,000 students; and securing rankings as the U.S.' top #7 and #8 students, respectively, at the National History Day Contest.

The Kahuku High and Intermediate duo survived the preliminaries, during which 85 percent of the entries from the sixth- through 12th-grade contestants were eliminated. The finals consisted of the top 15 percent with some 14 entries in five categories.

Spring – Hawaii's first-place winner in the "Senior (9-12) Paper" category at the state History Day contest, the qualifying leg for June's national competition – placed eighth in the U.S. in the Essay category. His paper, "The Legacy of Caesar Augustus: The Prince of the Senate, The Price of the Peace," explored Caesar's quest for peace and his leadership style that


still exists today. At nationals, he also won the Outstanding State Entry – Senior Division award.

In Workman's Individual Performance, "Captain America: A Man Before His Time," she played various roles that conveyed the impact that the super hero inspired in minorities, women and the physically challenged during WWII. Besides placing seventh nationally, her entry earned a special World War II award. In the state contest, she placed first in her category.

Competitors in the Kenneth E. Behring National History Day Contest came from China, South Asia, Korea, all 50 United States, the District of Columbia, Central America, Puerto Rico, American Samoa and Guam

Spring's teachers were Lorey Ishihara and Debra Ulii, while Workman's was Lisa Lessing.

Hawaii History Day, a prequalifier for NHD, is a Hawaii Council for the Humanities program.



Kahuku Scores Millions of Dollars After Raising Athletic Eligibility to Highest GPABy Jorene Barut

Since raising its student-athlete eligibility level to a 2.3 GPA last school year, Kahuku High and Intermediate's scholarship awards quintupled; most GPAs reached closer to 3.0; and the great majority qualified for season-long play.

Kahuku's 2015 seniors saw a 285 percent spike in monetary value from academic and athletic scholarships compared to 2014's seniors. In 2014, \$600,000 in scholarships was awarded. In 2015, \$1.7 million was awarded.

In 2014, five seniors received athletic scholarships. In 2015, 26 seniors – more than five times as many – received athletic scholarships.

The Board of Education granted KHIS a waiver in May 2014, exempting it from the BOE policy of a 2.0 GPA. The "2.3 rule" requires all KHIS student-athletes to have no F's in all classes and to maintain a 2.3 GPA, which is a C average, for eligibility to participate in sports.

Raising the bar has led to an increase in athletes surpassing a 2.3 GPA. Based on a collection of third-quarter grades, the most recent available from last school year, 511 student-athletes, or 64 percent, earned a 2.75 or higher GPA. During the same period in 2014, only 380 students, or 46 percent, hit the 2.75 or higher mark. Annual reports submitted by schools use a 2.75 GPA as the standard benchmark.

At KHIS, 83 percent of its 931 high schoolers participate in sports. Even with the higher GPA standard, eligibility across all sports held at around 83 percent.

For the football team headed by Coach Vavae Tata, 38 percent of the football players earned GPAs above 3.0. 2015 senior scholarships numbered 11 for football; eight for rugby, which typically require a 3.0 or higher GPA; three for women's soccer; two for water polo; and 1 each for wrestling and men's

soccer.

The largest increase in GPA standings of 2.75 or higher was in softball (48.37 percent gain); track (38.31 percent); and wrestling (21.53 percent) in contrast to 2014.

Previously, "students weren't as motivated and they weren't being held accountable," said KHIS Principal Pauline Masaniai.

For the small percent below the requirement, work continues to help them. After-school study hall four times a week is mandatory for all KHIS athletes until they exceed a 2.3 GPA. However, Tata requires all football players, regardless of GPA, to attend.

Enhancing the study-hall periods, which were implemented as a tool to show students how to achieve higher GPAs, is the presence of math, English and Spanish-language teachers, who are dedicated to helping students during these times. Another vehicle leading students to succeed is the twice-weekly availability of all teachers to help students one-on-one.

"Higher expectations lead to high achievement. They can do it; they're smart," Masaniai said.

"The students show great awareness and they're actively performing in class," said KHIS Athletic Director Gillian Yamagata. "Our goal is to continue doing better so that they have more opportunities for success."

In addition to equipping students for college and career, a higher-set GPA helps ensure that student-athletes are in compliance with NCAA requirements.

"Our parents understand the focus on academics," Masaniai said, "and they proudly stand by their children when they receive their scholarships."
