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

Then his friend asked, "You liked your booze so much, don't you ever miss it?" His answer was, "No." John then said, "I don't understand how you could give it up so easily..."

And Stuart's response was, "It's no big secret. All things are possible with God." To this John said, "That's a catchy phrase. You should write a song about it." And as they say, "The rest is history."

Hawaii's public schools to offer surfing as official sport

Hawaii public high school students will for the first time be able to compete in school sanctioned surf competitions as early as the spring of 2013, under a plan announced today by Governor Neil Abercrombie, the Hawaii State Board and Department of Education and professional surfer Carissa Moore.

Working with the appointed Hawaii State Board of Education, the DOE is developing a plan to incorporate surfing in school athletics, with collaboration from city officials, surfing organizations and the community.

"Hawaii is the birthplace of surfing. From Duke Kahanamoku to the thousands of residents and visitors who surf both recreationally and competitively, the sport is rooted in our culture and way of life," said Governor Abercrombie. "Bringing surfing to our students is another step in our collective goal to transform public education and provide our children with rich and diverse educational opportunities."

"Surfing will be an exciting addition for our students as we continue to expand and improve educational programs to increase student achievement," Superintendent Kathryn Matayoshi said. "School sports teach critical life lessons such as team work and goal-setting while helping students stay active and healthy."

The Hawaii State Board of Education in May 2004 approved surfing – the official individual sport of the state of Hawaii – as a high school sport. Despite overwhelming support from parents and students, funding and other challenges have kept surfing from becoming a fully-fledged school sport.

The BOE and the DOE are working on an implementation blueprint to make competitive school surfing a reality. The DOE intends to support the sport with outside funding sources and consult community partners and city officials to ensure that surf breaks are shared equitably and safely. The BOE will support implementation processes that address




safety.

BOE member Keith Amemiya, a former executive director of the Hawaii High School Athletic Association, said surfing will allow students to learn about their environment and themselves. He said it also will engage the community by fostering relationships and partnerships with a new group of individuals and groups.

"Surfing is a unique sport that often attracts athletes that may not necessarily be interested in more traditional sports such as football, basketball, baseball, and soccer. Therefore, we're confident that surfing will increase athletics participation numbers," Amemiya said. "In our view, the more students that engage in athletics and other after school activities, the higher our student achievement rates will become."

Hawaii's Carissa Moore, who this summer became the youngest surfer ever to win a professional surfing world title at age 18, joined Governor Abercrombie and education officials in celebrating today's announcement.

"It will open doors for a lot of students," she said, explaining that surfing taught her important life skills such as to be persevering, manage time, and be organized.

Turtle Bay Resort's SEIS Community Update provided by Replay Resorts on behalf of Turtle Bay

This article is the first in a series of updates to the North Shore community about the ongoing progress of Turtle Bay Resort's draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (SEIS) Preparation Notice. This series will include in-depth highlights of particular components of the expansion plan. As part of its efforts in addressing community expectations and preparing a SEIS for the Turtle Bay Resort Expansion Project, the resort owners have voluntarily authorized a Supplemental Archaeological Inventory Statement (SAIS) to be conducted on the property. This survey will supplement numerous surveys that have previously been completed.

The purpose of the SAIS is to determine whether areas proposed for ground-disturbing activities (grading, trenching, or excavation) contain previously undetected cultural resources in the form of archaeological features, cultural artifacts, or burials. A series of test trenches will be carefully excavated over two hundred acres of land by a team of professional archaeologists. A plan has been submitted to the State Department of Land and Natural Resources' Historic Preservation Division (SHPD) for approval and no SAIS test excavations will begin until the plan is approved.

In preparation of the SAIS approval, we are clearing tracts of land, according to an approved plan, to facilitate the future trenching. We are being very careful to not uproot existing vegetation - we are "clearing", not "grubbing" - and to preserve the wood from native trees for cultural practices. Once the SAIS plan is approved, we expect the excavation will take approximately three months. All excavation will be done under the supervision of the archaeological team. If any archaeological or cultural materials are discovered during the test excavations, the findings will be documented and evaluated. Any findings will be preserved in place while a plan to address the findings are prepared and submitted to SHPD for approval. A final report on all test excavations will be presented in the SEIS.

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Aloha, North Shore!

Ever wonder what to do with plastic bottle caps when the recycling guy makes you take them home or throw them away? How about taking them to Wahiawa Goodwill or one of three other Goodwill locations on Oahu?

Beach Environmental Awareness Campaign Hawaii (B-E-A-C-H.org) works with Goodwill in recycling plastic caps and lids with recycling codes 4 and 5 that are not acceptable for the blue bins. Bring your clean plastic caps and lids from bottles, cans and tubes including drinks, shampoo, food products, detergent, spray cans, coffee cans, toothpaste tubes, medicines and supplements (remove all paper, styrofoam and labels before recycling).

If you cannot bring these plastic items to Goodwill, it is better to toss them in the gray garbage bins because they will go into H-Power rather than the landfill, which is where misplaced items in the blue bins end up. This is but one tip I learned while helping out with the recent Aloha Aina Recycling Day at the WCA.

The Hawaii Reapportionment Commission made its final recommendations for new Representative and Senatorial district boundaries on September 26, 2011. Of great concern to our district was a last minute plan to split off Sunset Beach from our North Shore District and place it into a Windward District stretching all the way to Kahaluu.

Fortunately, our community reacted quickly and submitted a great amount of vital testimony with only 48 hours notice, and the commission revised its Draft Map Plan to retain the area north of Pupukea Road, up to Waialee Stream, in the same



district as Pupukea, Hale'iwa and Waialua, Schofield Barracks and Kunia Camp.

Unless a threatened lawsuit by some disgruntled residents on the Big Island comes forward and overturns the Commission's plan, the North Shore District (HD 46) will include the above mentioned communities, but will no longer include Wheeler Airbase, Poamoho Camp, Kahuku and Laie.

If the Commission's plan remains, our Senatorial District will move away from Wahiawa and towards Koolauloa. SD 22, currently held by Senator Donovan Dela Cruz, will include Whitmore Village, Wahiawa, Schofield Barracks and Mililani Mauka. SD 23, currently held by Senator Clayton Hee, will include all the communities from Kaena Point to Kahaluu.

Food safety presentation at next chamber meeting

Jim Hollyer of the University of Hawaii's College of Tropical Agriculture (CTAHR) and Jeri Kahana of the Hawaii Department of Agriculture will be the key note speakers at the next Chamber meeting.

Jim Hollyer is an agricultural economist, international program manager and farm food safety coach. He has worked for CTAHR at Manoa for 24 years. Jim, along with colleagues, has lead the nation-leading, on-farm food safety coaching program that helps innovative farmers learn and adhere to Good Agricultural Practices (GAPs). He will address what the average person needs to know and what they need to do to prevent food-born illnesses.

Jeri Kahana is the Hawaii Department of Agriculture's Commodities Branch Manager and Acting Quality Assurance Administrator. She has worked for the department for 33 years. Under her supervision, the Commodities Branch conducts State and Federal grading of various agricultural commodities and third party food safety audits of farms in compliance with Good Agricultural Practices. She will discuss the new Food Safety Modernization Act and the implications and the challenges it presents for local farmers.



Oahu's North Shore the home of many surfing competitions and Hawaii is home to many surfing champions, the newest one being Carissa Moore. On July 15 this year, at the age of eighteen, she became the youngest World Champion in the history of the Association of Surfing Professionals (ASP). Surfing since the age of four, Carissa has compiled a long list of accomplishments in her very successful surfing career. In May of 2009, Surfer Magazine made Carissa its first cover girl in over a decade. She is only the fourth female and the youngest ever to make the cover of the magazine in its 50-year history. Last year, Carissa was named the Association of Surfing Professionals Rookie of the Year after winning a total of six ASP Championship Events. She has won a record eleven National Scholastic Surfers Association Championships.

In recognition of her World Championship, I invited Carissa to appear before the City Council at Honolulu Hale on October 5 when she was present-



ed with an honorary certificate. Joined by members of her family, Carissa graciously accepted the certificate and impressed everyone with her cheerful personality and sparkling smile. She is an inspirational role model for the young people of Hawaii, and you don't have to be a surfer to admire her talent and appreciate her positive outlook on life. Just two days earlier, Carissa had appeared with Governor Neil Abercrombie at a press conference announcing that Hawaii will soon become the first state in the nation to call surfing an official high school sport. Commenting on the news, Carissa said she thought the move was awesome and that it may open new doors for some students. She said the sport taught her many life lessons growing up, such as hard work, perseverance, and time management. Calling it a way to channel one's energy into something positive, Carissa has taken surfing to a new level for young surfers. Considered to be barrier shattering, Carissa was granted the ASP Hawaii wildcard into The Reef Hawaiian Pro at Hale'iwa Ali'i Beach Park and the Vans World Cup at Sunset Beach. She will be the first female in the modern era to attempt to capture a men's Triple Crown title. Carissa Moore will definitely be one to watch as the North Shore season gets underway this November.

Malaekahana state recreation area comfort station repairs scheduled

The Department of Land and Natural Resources ing the construction activities," Aila added. (DLNR) is starting repairs to the comfort stations at the Malaekahana State Recreation Area, Kalanai Point section, on Tuesday, October 11, 2011. The improvements to both comfort stations include roofing and support repairs and replacements; shower, toilet, urinal and lavatory replacements/upgrades; and other improvements to comply with current accessibility requirements.

The repair improvements will start with the comfort station in Camping Area B. Due to the limited size of Camping Area B all camping sites in this area will be closed to safely accommodate the needed improvements. Portable toilets and an outdoor rinsing shower in this area will available for day users.


"The improvements are necessary for public health and safety and to accommodate all park users," said William J. Aila, Jr., DLNR Chairperson. "We understand the inconvenience of the closure, but we want to ensure the safety of our campers dur-

The current timeline expects completion of comfort station near Camping Area B by December 2011. In early 2012, the comfort station in Camping Area A is scheduled to close and portable toilets and a rinsing shower will be available for users of this park section once work begins.

"We are phasing these repair improvements to minimize our disruptions to the recreational uses of Malaekahana State Recreational Area and we appreciate the community's patience during this temporary inconvenience," said Aila.

The contractor is RK Construction Co., LLC and the project cost is \$273,000. Project funding was provided by the Hawaii Tourism Authority (HTA) through the transient accommodations tax.

"We appreciate the continued support HTA has provided to DLNR to improve our heavily visited park areas and that are frequently the gateways used by visitors to Hawaii's natural and cultural resources," said Aila.

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


