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



#### 2012 election results reason for hope

It has been one of the most exciting elections in decades. With close races at every level of government prompting an above average voter turnout, the 2012 election is one for the history books. President Obama's victory reaffirmed the appeal of his message of going forward with his plans for affordable healthcare, economic growth, clean energy policies and tax cuts for companies to bring jobs back to the United States. But a narrow victory means that a great number of people are restless and will be more than mildly critical of the President's efforts to deliver on his promises over the next four years.

Here at home, the voter turnout surprised election officials with long lines at many locations and even running out of ballots at more than a dozen voting places. Hawaii's congressional delegation remains democratic and the public certainly benefited from spirited and pointed debates that helped to both define the issues and voter preferences. The close results of the Mayor's race also represent a significant challenge to the incoming Kirk Caldwell administration. It is going to take all of his legislative skill and stamina to deliver on his campaign



promise to successfully complete the rail system while simultaneously managing the maintenance of an aging city infrastructure.

The task will be made easier with the help of the Honolulu City Council which will convene in January with four new members, all of whom have extensive legislative experience and all of whom have expressed support for the rail project. The Council is prepared to officially accept the Full Funding Grant Agreement which will mean \$1.55 billion federal dollars towards the cost of construction. The project will be a boost to our local construction industry, still at 30% below the peak of 2007, bringing blessed relief from the deep slump of the recession. Although economic recovery technically began over three years ago, growth has been slow and unemployment remains high across the country. Job creation is the overriding issue both nationally and here at home in Hawaii.

A new Mayor and a new mix at the Honolulu City Council is the start of a new beginning and reason for hope and optimism. Before moving on, I want to acknowledge the hard work and dedication of outgoing Mayor Peter Carlisle and his administration. The November 6th election set the political stage for 2013 and I look forward to working together with Mayor Caldwell and my colleagues on the City Council for the benefit of all of the residents of our island home.





### The Price of a North Shore Home

The price of a home is affected by many things, like the economy, the location, the view, etc. It is also affected by the environment.

We have the "best weather on the planet" and, of course, these North Shore environmental positives:

-The SURFING environment was what originally attracted many to specific neighborhoods like Sunset Beach and Pipeline.

-The TURTLE TRAFFIC mess has caused many residents on the Sunset Side of Laniakea to re-think living there.

-The KAWAILOA WIND FARM has created less than favorable views as you look up from Waimea or across from Pupukea and Waialua.

-The quaint HALEIWA TOWN atmosphere is starting to lose its' charm when huge tour busses line the roads with their motors running.

So, why even bring this up? It's not to be negative. It's to encourage people to become "Pro-Active!" This is our North Shore and we should be the community that decides, with aloha, how our environment will look and feel!

What can we do?

-We can create rules for the Laniakea parking lot that would forbid Tour Busses from stopping on the mauka side of the highway.

-We can have better planning so we don't find ourselves looking at huge windmills from pristine locations or from our family homes!

-And we can have better planning for Historic Haleiwa Town with off-street Tour Bus parking areas and sidewalks so all can walk safely through the town.

### **Patsy Gibson to be Honored as 2012 North Shore Kama`aina of the Year** *Long-time North Shore Outdoor Circle Advocate to be Recognized at Annual North Shore Chamber of Commerce Christmas Party & Auction*

Patsy Gibson has lived in Hawaii for nearly 60 years - the last 24 in her dream town of Waialua. She'll tell you how lucky she is to have had so many interests that have led her to a rich variety of volunteer activities.

Her exceptional soprano voice found her singing in the Honolulu Symphony Chorus, the Madrigal Singers at Ala Moana Center and the Moana Hotel. As an active member of the Junior League she was asked to perform at many of their annual Holiday Balls.

In the 1960's she turned her culinary talents toward starting, with three other women, the Garden Cafe at the Honolulu Academy of Arts. Their huge success allowed the Academy to purchase several valuable works of art. Two years after becoming a member of the Garden Club of Honolulu she was elected President. There she helped in the creation of the Horticulture and Flower Show, which has been such a huge success over the years. She has been a Garden Club of America flower show judge which required traveling throughout the Mainland to judge flower shows which present the various techniques in both horticulture an garden design.

Since moving to the North Shore, Patsy has had a vital role in the many successful projects of the North Shore Outdoor Circle where she was their president for several years. The landscaping of Ke Ala Pupukea bike path, Weinberg Village and, Weed Circle are just some of the projects that she helped bring to fruition.

Fundraising became a necessity to achieve many of those goals especially the landscaping of Weed Circle. In partnership with Hale'iwa Main

Street as its Beautification Committee Chair, Patsy got busy planning house tours, luncheons, auctions and anything that would bring in the necessary funds to kick-start this project. She worked tirelessly, and after three years, Patsy's dream became a reality. With grants and tremendous community support, irrigation was installed, trees and shrubs were planted by volunteers and City employees, and the project was completed.



# World record youngest climber visit the North Shore

Jordan Romero is the youngest climber at age 13 to reach the top of Mount Everest. At the age of 15 years old, Jordan is the youngest mountain climber to successfully reach all seven highest summits of the world's seven continents, setting the world record. So of course curiosity set in to see the biggest, baddest waves in the world which motivated him to visit the North Shore. Arriving just days after the first big swell in October, he and his family were able to observe 20 foot plus sets. Thrilled to watch, he couldn't wait to try surfing himself. Coming from a mountain town of Big Bear Lake California, thrill seeking sports are just up his alley. Through local friends, Jordan was able to meet local legends Steve Andreas of Sea & Board Sports and Buttons Kaluhiokalani from Buttons surf school to get a Stand Up Paddle lesson and ride the waves. "It was fun! Steve is a great guy and didn't give up on me. Now I am hooked on paddle surfing. So fun, he couldn't wait to do it again the very first thing next morning! Several young Sunset Beach residents had a chance to meet Romero who exchanged questions & answers of his major achievements. I tell people to have a vision and stick with it," he says. Romero and his family enjoyed all of what the North Shore offers. They loved the Waimea Falls, watching the surfers at Sunset Beach, swimming at Waimea Bay, and topping

it all off with a delicious dinner with friends at Opals Thai Restaurant in Haleiwa. "I love Opals style with fresh flavorful dishes," Romero says.

### Waialua - The Saga of the North Shore Chapter 20 - Koi

Koi, a Kahuna-Nui, was a warrior priest of the Pahupu class. Some of his solders were tattooed half black / half white. Others were entirely tattooed black, with but their lips and eyes left natural. These were especially wild men in wild times. Koi held title to important heiau at Wailuku, Maui and had served as one of Kahekili's generals during the invasion of O`ahu. He had inherited the rights to officiate at Waimea from his Uncle Kaopulupulu (the subject if Chapter 14), and his father Kaleopuupuu, a close confidant of Kahekili.


After the "Waipio Rebellion" of 1785 (Chapter 19), the people of Waialua had gained a well deserved reputation for disrespect to the rule of Kahekili, which only became more outspoken when that war-lord went off to fight Kamehameha in 1791, leaving his son Kalanikupule as regent of O`ahu. The North Shore needed to be governed by a strong hand and Koi was the man for that job.

Haole ships, most of them British at first, began visiting the islands in ever increasing numbers in 1786. Waikiki became the port of call for O`ahu. Naturally, the Hawaiian war-chiefs all thirsted for foreign goods, especially the sharp edged weapons, muskets and schooners that were becoming more and more of a factor in the battles being waged then on Maui and Hawai`i.

While both Kamehameha and Kahekili employed westerners to negotiate trade deals and train their men in the use of modern weapons, there was one major difference in their dealings with foreigners; Kamehameha understood that peaceful trade and generally honest dealings would gain better results than deceit and double dealing. Kahekili, while maintaining a diplomatic front, gave secret orders for his men to take weapons from foreigners in any way possible, so long as he was not directly implicated in any treachery.

Koi had met the deserters and beach-combers more or less led by a man named James Coleman in Waikiki and he was not impressed. They were little better as translators than the Hawaiians who had by then begun to return from voyages to China and the Pacific Northwest. These types seemed easy to fool and appeared to have little to contribute other than the goods they could extract from the ships.

Back in Waimea, Koi had heard of the girls from Kealakekua who had been cast away from the "Discovery" back in 1779 (Chapter 17). He summoned Kehu to his headquarters up at the Pu`u Mahuka Heiau. Imagine the meeting of these two peculiar Hawaiians; The densely tattooed elder warrior priest with 1/2 long-haired / 1/2 shaved head and the 30ish year-old red-headed girl from Kau with curiously light colored eyes.



Kehu, still smarting from her rejection, recounted the famous details of death of Lono and of the events before and after. She was quick to explain the command structure aboard the ships and the tactics used in battle. "They all follow the ones with the bright white or blue clothing and tri-angle hats, regardless of age. Some of them carry the fire-sticks, and sharp pahu, but only the ones dressed in red are dangerous...They give away valuable pieces of iron for almost anything, even more when they drink too much of their special awa. Yes, the ships can make great noise and throw rocks very far, but they seldom kill people, usually just knocking down trees and houses.....Their ships and row-boats are much slower than canoes...They always need food and water and the men are crazily distracted by women of all classes."

On the afternoon of May 7,1792, a tubby merchant ship named "Daedalus" carrying spoiled goods for a British naval expedition was seen dropping anchor three miles off Waimea.




