

Hale’iwa Elementary School Awarded Prestigious “National Blue Ribbon” Award

An interview with the school’s principal, Malaea Wetzel

Hale’iwa Elementary School on Hale’iwa Road in Hale’iwa Town is one of only three schools in the state—and only 377 schools nationwide – to win this year’s National Blue Ribbon Award for “outstanding performance and improvement efforts” from the U. S. Department of Education. As reported by the

Honolulu Star-Advertiser, the U. S. Secretary of Education, Arno Duncan, credits the award to the school for, “the state’s highest percentage of student proficiency in math, ninety-four percent.” Hale’iwa Elementary also had the fourth-highest reading proficiency in the state: 92 percent. The Secretary

also noted that 65 percent of the school’s keiki are from “economically disadvantaged homes.”

Hale’iwa Elementary is no stranger to history. The school opened in 1871 as Waiialua English School, an “independent” school, operating with no government



Banzai Skate Board Park Open At Last

After more than fourteen years on the drawing board and many months of closure due to construction, the Banzai Skate Board Park once again open to the public. Following a park dedication at 11:00 a.m. on Wednesday, the 26th of November, just in time for the Thanksgiving Holiday, the North Shore Community finally has a skate board park that is both functional and attractive. The park project received initial funding in 2000 after lobbying efforts that some say began as long ago as 1976. The latest improvements to the site include the construction of a parking lot, extensive landscaping, the installation of an irrigation system and modifications to the bowl. The perimeter of the park needed to be fenced during the construction as a mandatory safety precaution and entrance to the park has been restricted with a guard posted at the site for the last few weeks.

I know it was frustrating for the community to be denied access to the park during the final construction phase, but liability issues compelled the restriction until the City formally accepted the work of the contractor who was responsible for the security measures. My staff and I worked closely with the Department of Parks and Recreation and the Department of Design and Construction during this last phase of the project to expedite the park opening. The last modification of the site was the addition of the stanchions and chains designed to prevent vehicles from driving on the grass while still allowing for the entrance of emergency vehicle if needed. With the help of the community, we need a plan to protect the new trees, grass and other plantings from injury, and the park itself from vandalism as was the case during the earlier phase of construction.

In 2011, the Sunset Beach Community Association established a special fund to support the project and to afford enhancements not included in the construction budget. Several potential donors indicated a willingness to make monetary contributions to the fund for useful additions to the park. Some of the preliminary suggestions included separate areas for novice skateboarders, placement of concrete planters to serve a variety of usages such as seating, skate ledges & shade trees, walkways designed to be used as skate surfaces, drinking fountains, picnic tables and benches for the grassy areas and even a viewing stand to provide seats and shade from the sun. If these suggestions are incorporated into the design of the park, the community may be able to hold various charity & fundraiser events and contests involving professional

and amateur skaters alike. The construction of this park at a cost of nearly two million dollars, was intended to provide the community with a recreational arena where skateboarders, from young children & teens to adults, can enjoy one of their favorite sports in a safe, clean and green environment.

Magnesium and Health

Many of you take a variety of supplements, such as vitamins and minerals. I would like to focus on Magnesium (Mg) due to some research indicating that habitually low intake of Mg may increase your risk for developing some health problems such as type 2 diabetes, high blood pressure, osteoporosis and migraine headache. What is Mg and the evidence for and against its effectiveness in preventing or treating these health disorders?

Mg is the fourth most abundant mineral in the body. It is involved in more than 300 body functions, including muscle and nerve function, blood sugar control, blood pressure regulation, and energy production. Mg is needed in the development of bone and the production of DNA and plays a role in transporting calcium and potassium across cell membrane, which is important in muscle contraction and normal heart rhythm.

There are conflicting data when reviewing research that has been done. For example, giving Mg supplements to people with high blood pressure only reduces their blood pressure by a few points. Studies examining the use of Mg supplements to control blood sugar in type 2 diabetes have been inconsistent. Consequently, the American Diabetes Association states "there is insufficient evidence to support the routine use of Mg in type 2 diabetes." As for migraine headaches, the author of a review suggests taking 300mg of Mg twice daily can prevent headaches. The American Academy of Neurology concludes that Mg is "probably effective in migraine prevention."

A conclusion you can glean from the inconsistent data is that your body functions well only when there are adequate amounts of a variety of vitamins and minerals that work in concert. It's like your car; it only operates well when you have enough of everything it needs like gas, oil, water, brake fluid and four tires with enough air in them.

Incidentally, too much Mg can cause diarrhea.

- For decorating outside, buy light strands, lighted displays, and extension cords rated for outdoor use.
- Buy products that bear the mark of a safety standards testing lab, such as UL, ETL, or CSA.
- Before stringing holiday lights, check for frayed wires, cracked insulation, and damaged sockets—replace defective light strands.
- Don't use staples or nails to hang light strands, and don't hang them on metal rain gutters and railings or on chain link fences.
- When decorating outdoors, keep yourself and your ladder at least ten feet away from overhead power lines.
- Turn off, or unplug, light strands and lighted displays when you go to bed or leave the house.

Oahu residents invited to view new Extreme Tsunami Evacuation Zone maps at public information and outreach workshops

Oahu residents are invited to attend a series of free public information and outreach workshops for a preview of new Extreme Tsunami Evacuation Zone maps. These maps represent an unlikely worst-case scenario and do not replace the current, standard tsunami evacuation maps. Rather, they add a second evacuation zone for a worst case, extreme, once in a thousand years tsunami event.

Newly released scientific and geological information suggests that sometime in the past 500 years, a massive 9.0 earthquake in the eastern Aleutian Trench may have generated a tsunami that far exceeded the inundations known to have occurred during tsunami events throughout recorded history in Hawaii. An event of this magnitude, referred to as an Extreme Tsunami may occur once every thousand years.

In response to these findings, the city, in conjunction with state, federal, and non-government stakeholders, have developed a new set of Oahu Extreme Tsunami Evacuation Zone maps, refuge areas, and evacuation routes to complement the current tsunami evacuation maps.

Representatives from the city's Department of Emergency Management will be on hand to present the new maps, discuss the implications for Oahu residents and answer questions.

Title and Refinancing

When refinancing a real estate property; it's good to consider the following tips:

1. Do you want to drag out your loan? Consider the length of your existing mortgage. If you have only 10 years left, do you really want to refinance to a new 15 or 30 year loan?

2. Generally, it's not fiscally prudent to refinance to buy a car, pay for a vacation or a wedding.

3. It may not be wise to refinance a primary home to help finance a business start-up. We have seen start-up businesses go belly up and the house lost due to foreclosure.

4. If you refinance to help a family member, remember that all the names on the property title have authority to decision-making. For example, if you add your family and his/her spouse' name on title, they will have to agree to decisions to be made regarding the property such as selling.

If you agree to have your name removed from the property during the refinancing process, know that legally you no longer have authority over that property.

It's important that these tips be discussed. We have seen mom and dad who own their house free and free, refinance to help their children and end up losing their primary home.

We have also seen mom and dad agree to have their homes be used for refinancing and also their names removed, thinking they don't want to be responsible for the mortgage. However, circumstances change and the children later want to sell the house while the parents do not. Needless to say, this creates a lot of friction.

Ask a loan officer as many questions as you want. They are generally very good about providing information.

Publication of New Plant Names

At Waimea Valley we have about 5,000 different types of plants. These plants are labeled to ease identification and to prick ones curiosity into the plant world. Engraved on each label is the botanical name, the common name (if any), plant family, and where the plant originated. At Waimea, our Botanical Collections Specialist, David Orr, researches for the proper current name for each type of plant and updates the plant labels as needed.

Most of us have birth certificates with our given names printed. Plants have given names as well when they were first discovered. The Latin name of a plant does not formally exist until it is published in a manner that satisfies all the requirements in the International Code of Nomenclature for Algae, Fungi, and plants (also known as the Code). This international system started in 1753 with the publication of Linnaeus's Species Plantarum. The name has to clear three processes in order to be adopted; if it fails any one of these then the name cannot be used.

The first hurdle is Effective Publication—The plant and name has to be mentioned in a publication such as a printed book, journal and magazine and recently electronic publications are accepted.

The second hurdle is Valid Publication—the name must be binomial with the genus and the species' epithet e.g. Hibiscus (genus) kokio (species); there needs to be a taxonomic description of the plant; and a type specimen of the plant located in an institution.

And lastly, the name must be Legitimate—it must be ensured that the newly-adopted name has never been validly published before or could be a type specimen of an older name.

These steps may sound complicated to follow but a lot of people have happily worked a way through them in order to publish their new species.

You can quickly and easily find information for every government agency and department, boards and commissions to include meetings and agendas, elected and appointed officials, access to online services, and so much more. You will always want to look at this site before visiting an agency, so much is available online so that you can do more without having to travel to a government office!

If you or someone you know is interested in working at the Capitol for the 2015 Legislative Session (January-May 2015), Capitol.Hawaii.gov provides information that will guide you through the process of applying for legislative session staff positions in the House and in the Senate. The work is exciting and fulfilling because you see first-hand and contribute to the lawmaking process. Many current legislators began their journey to elected office by working as legislative session staff.

Rockfall Mitigation Project on Pupukea Road

Satisfied Pupukea resident left a thank you banner for the Prometheus Construction crew. Here is some information on the Rockfall Mitigation Project on Pupukea Road: This was the second and last phase of a project for the City and County of Honolulu. The job consisted of cutting much of the unstable slope back away from the edge of the roadway an additional 4 feet; this allowed for better line of site for vehicles driving up and down Pupukea Road along with a wider and more safe shoulder. Also installed a 700' long impact barrier systems to catch any upslope rocks that might (and probably will) come down the mountain. The crew installed a wire mesh drapery system as well as a substantial amount of sculptured/stained shotcrete to stabilize the slope directly above the roadway. The area was re-landscaped with 1,000 + native plants and applied hydromulch grass (the green stuff you see on the hillside, which should start sprouting soon). Project Superintendent, Govi Tillotson, with Prometheus Construction said "we thoroughly enjoyed working on the beautiful North Shore and were very grateful for the community's support and patience throughout the course of our project."

Ka'ena Point Off-Road Use Prompts Permit System

Beginning December 1, 2014 anyone wanting to drive a vehicle into the Mokule'ia section (beyond the paved parking lot) of Ka'ena Point State Park Reserve will need to obtain a free permit. This does not apply to those who hike or bike on the dirt road behind the locked gate. Users who get a permit will be provided with the combination to the lock. People can apply for the permits at the state park offices during normal working hours. Permits take up to 5 working days.

The International Surfing Association [ISA] has confirmed that a Chinese team will compete in the ISA China Cup for the first time ever, highlighting the growth of Surfing in new territories around the world. Recently re-elected ISA President, Fernando Aguerre, made the landmark announcement as he unveiled plans for Surfing's return to China for the third consecutive year with two separate events—the ISA China Cup and the Hainan Classic—set to take place during the Hainan Wanning Riyue Bay International Surfing Festival from November 23-28 this year. The goal of the ISA is to have surfing in the Olympics.

Waimea Bay on the North Shore of Oahu is a famous big wave surf spot but few people know it is also a marine reserve! The corals in the bay and surrounding coastline are fully protected along with the entire reef ecosystem. Dr. Terry Lilly has been researching the area and has found that the giant old growth mound corals in Waimea Bay all the way to Sharks Cove started to dissolve and turn into mud. He has been diving the area since the summer. The botanical reserve in Waimea Canyon is not using toxic chemicals and the river usually empties and flows towards Hale'iwa side. The reef seems to be dying on the east side he reports. So what is killing the reef? Unfortunately no one knows. Some researchers say the giant electric military towers above have something to do with it. More studies need to be done.

Congrats to the North Shore's Dax McGill. The 16 year old surfer won the Maui and Sons Pro in Chili in November, the last event of the qualifying circuit. The 2 star WQS event was at the point break in Punta de Los Lobos in chilly water. The Volcom team rider wore a full suit, hoodie and all, in the 3-5 foot left hander to take the event. She defeated Josefina Ane from Argentina in the final by a score of 14.65 to 11.40. She ended up in 51st place for the year.

Maui's Dusty Payne was on a mission at the Reef Hawaiian Pro. Payne dropped out of the WCT tour in 2012 with a nagging ankle injury after an air maneuver that he kept surfing on. He stormed back into Hale'iwa to win the event with the highest heat total in the final. Payne grew up at Sunset Beach before he moved with his parents to Maui so he is well versed at Sunset Beach and Pipeline and now has a good chance of becoming Triple Crown Champion! Sunset is Next!

Aloha to our surfing friend Dr. Dorian "Doc" Pascowitz who passed on November 10th. Doc was an avid surfer who spent much of his life bringing surfing to the world. He was known for tooling around California in a 24 foot camper with his large family, his wife Juliette, a classical singer and nine children. In summers he set up a surfing school and preached it's Doc is also known for his book "Surfing and Health," his great surf stories and his unselfish giving of his physician services. "Live long live well" he would say. Doc was 93 years young, he will be missed.

funding and one that taught classes in English when many schools in the Hawaiian Kingdom taught in Hawaiian. It was adopted as a funded government school nine years later, and moved to its present location from Pa'ala'a Kai, a few miles inland, in 1911. The school's present picturesque buildings were built in 1921 and its name was changed to Hale'iwa Elementary in 1940.

The North Shore News (NSN) interviewed the school's principal, Malaea Wetzel, recently to discuss the school's academic success.

NSN: Tell us a little bit about yourself. Your name, Malaea; is that Hawaiian?

Wetzel: Yes. I'm a local girl, raised in Wahiawa, a Leilehua High graduate. I still live in Wahiawa with my husband.

NSN: Where did you go to college?

Wetzel: UH, with a degree in Secondary Education. My Master's degree is in Educational Counselling from the University of Phoenix. But this article shouldn't be about me, but rather about the school.

NSN: Okay, the school. Your little two-hundred-student school is one of only three schools in Hawaii to win a National Blue Ribbon Award. How did you do it? What's your "secret sauce?"

Wetzel: There's no "secret sauce." Keep in mind that the award was for superior performance over the past five years, not just last year. In all that time our

teachers have consistently worked with the students, one-on-one, to build high academic expectations and goals in the kids. We stress improvement, not perfection.

NSN: Do you have smaller classes with a lower student-to-teacher ratio? Is that one reason for your success?

Wetzel: No. It's a common misconception that a small school naturally means smaller classes. Like every school, I suppose, we are limited by our budget. So we hire teachers, or not, to accommodate a reasonable class size. Our student-to-teacher ratio is not much different than that of much larger schools. Our smaller student body, however, does allow me and the rest of the staff of eighteen teachers and twelve support people to interact more individually with each student. It's this personal interaction that I try to encourage and that is probably a reason for our academic success.

NSN: What does the Blue Ribbon award mean to you personally and to the students and staff?

Wetzel: It's very, very exciting. You may remember that in two-thousand-ten the state's DOE considered closing Hale'iwa Elementary down to save budget. Now, this award, four years later, is a validation of the decision to keep us as a vital part of the North Shore community. I couldn't possibly be prouder of this school, its staff, and its student body.

NSN: So you're happy here?

Wetzel: I love it. I'm not going anywhere.

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


