Update from the 2013 Special Session A Special Message from Rep. Richard Fale

The Governor called an unprecedented legislative special session on the 28th of October 2013. With little time given for legislators to review the main measure being reviewed, Senate Bill 1, and with even less time for legislators to take the measure to their community to get feedback, I wanted

to provide this special report to the community on what transpired.

Session opened on Monday, October 28th, beginning with hearings on SB1 by the State Senate Committee on Judiciary and Labor. Many were disappointed with the way the Senate ran its

hearing, with inconsistent rules on how to testify and with hundreds of testifiers not given the opportunity to testify when the hearing was cut short.

House Judiciary and House Finance Committees began hearing testimony on the bill on October 31. Committee Chairs tried

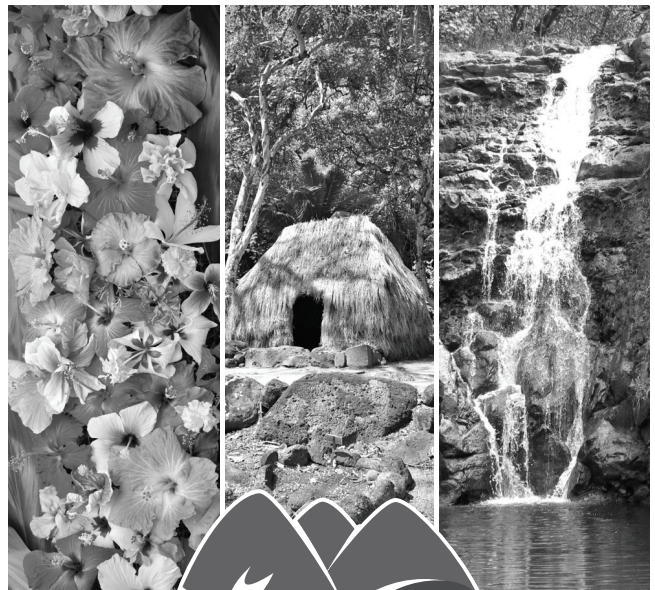
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Banzai Skate Board Park Under Construction

The long awaited completion of the Banzai Skate Board Park is now within sight of the North Shore skateboarding community. The skateboard park project received initial funding in 2000 after lobbying efforts that some say began in 1976. In addition to construction of the bowl, the first phase of the project included the installation of a temporary irrigation system and landscaping. The next and final phase includes the construction of a parking lot and permanent landscaping at a cost of \$1.3 million. I included this money in the 2012 budget in spite of some concern that the project would be affected by budget restrictions. Thankfully, the budgeted amount is sufficient to cover the construction which will include street elements such as curbs, rails and walls that will expand the available area for skating beyond the existing bowl. In addition to the construction funds allocated by the City, donations to the park can be used for future enhancements not currently included in the construction budget. The Sunset Beach Community Association established a fund to raise money to be used for park improvements and several potential donors such as Vans Triple Crown have indicated a willingness to contribute to the effort.

I have received a number of calls from concerned area residents about the activity at the site, suspecting demolition of the facility. Unfortunately, the perimeter of the park needed to be fenced during the construction as a mandatory safety precaution and some large trees had to be removed to accommodate the construction plans. I know it is frustrating for the community to be denied access to the park during the construction phase. Construction is expected to be completed in March, followed by three months of landscaping maintenance before the project is accepted by the City. I am working closely with the Department of Parks and Recreation and the Department of Design and Construction to expedite this last phase of the project to be able to provide public access in advance of the scheduled completion date. Working with the community on a plan to protect the new trees, grass and other plantings from injury, we may be able to open the park for use in the summer.

Design Partners, Inc is the project architect, Skateboard Consultant was Wormhoudt, Inc from California and the Landscape architect is Brownlie and Lee. The construction of this park at a cost of nearly two million dollars to date, was intended to provide the community with a recreational arena where skateboarders, from young children & teens to adults, can enjoy one of their favorite sports in a safe environment.

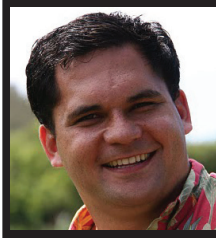

I wanted to give a brief update on traffic at Laniakea Beach. As many of you already know, after years of discussion, the Department of Transportation has decided to move forward with the installation of temporary barriers on the mauka side of Kamehameha Highway. The first step to prepare for the barrier installation was installing "No Parking" signs. The temporary barriers will remain up for at least a month, and perhaps as long as one year, while DOT officials monitor the traffic flow and assess the effectiveness of this solution.

The installation of temporary barriers was initially proposed years ago to the Kamehameha Highway Realignment Task Force as a potential solution to traffic concerns in the area. The issue was revisited during a Task Force meeting this past September. During and after the last Task Force meeting, community members expressed concerns about these temporary barriers and I do understand concerns in terms of beach access, driver and pedestrian safety. I've spoken with many frustrated North shore residents and commuters about their concerns. While all parties agree that this isn't a permanent solution, the community overwhelming agrees that something has to be done because current conditions are unacceptable. Please be sure to call our office at 586-6380 and let us know how the traffic barriers are working out.

Finally, I would like to wish you all a belated Thanksgiving and a happy holiday season. The holidays provide for a time to reflect and be mindful of all the good and important things we have in life. When dealing with the often divisive issues that are involved in politics – and many of the things that do not work in our government the way they should – I am thankful for the things that do work, like a community that does not hesitate to help those in need, for teachers who spend the extra hours in the classroom without pay because they know their students need it, for generous business owners who make go the extra mile for their customers. to give more opportunity to testifiers and hundreds took advantage of the opportunity to testify, particularly those who were denied the opportunity during Senate hearings. In total, the 55+ hours of testimony over four days set a State House record.

The unofficial count from House staffers found that of 10,749 unique pieces of written testimony submitted to the House, 8,556 (80%) were in opposition and 2,193 (20%) were in support. Of 1,032 oral testifiers, 895 (87%) opposed the measure and 137 (13%) supported it. Opposition included many who were not opposed to same-sex marriage, but instead expressed deep concern about the lack of transparency and the manner in which the bill was being pushed without an opportunity to assure all that there were no major flaws. The measure that legalized civil unions in Hawaii passed in 2011, for example, had flaws that had to be corrected.

SB1 passed the two House Committees with several amendments and the new version came to the House Floor for a vote. On the House Floor, 29 amendments were offered to address a number of flaws and constitutional issues with the bill, including a conscience clause for parents, teachers and members of the faith community. Another amendment addressed the lack of clarity in SB1 allows a person to be in a civil union, a reciprocal beneficiary arrangement and marriage here in Hawaii with more than one other person or different people. Another concern was language in SB1 that would allow anybody from anywhere to get divorced here in Hawaii without being a resident, which could potentially clog our courts with divorce cases from across the country and further burden our already strapped courts. A five-day recess was also requested to allow us to return to our communities and discuss the bill. Unfortunately, all of these amendments failed.

SB1 passed the House by a vote of 30-19 with 2 members excused and went on to pass the Senate 19-4 with 2 excused. The governor signed the bill into law on November 14, 2013 as Act 001. Here is a brief snapshot of some of the details of the measure, which took effect this past Monday, December 3, 2013.

Same-Sex Marriage Legislation Summary: Legalizes same-sex marriage (SSM) in Hawaii, recognize same-sex marriages SSM from out-of-state, and gives those couples the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities as other married couples.

Details: Provides equal treatment under the law by prohibiting government from denying same-sex couples marriage licenses, rights and benefits accorded to married couples.

- Potentially restricts rights of other individuals and businesses because of lack of a "conscience clause" or opportunity to opt out of activities for personal or religious beliefs.
- Will have fiscal impact on State of Hawaii, in-

cluding more revenue generated through increase in marriages. A task force to study the impacts of SSM in Hawaii, including economic impacts, passed the House during the 2013 legislative session but was stalled in the Senate.

Now that the special session is over, it is my sincere hope that we take time to reflect on the decisions that were made, the mistakes that were made and the lessons that elected officials must learn about transparency and process. Most importantly, I hope we can remember the divided gallery we saw during the final passage of SB1 and pledge to do our utmost best to not let this body be responsible for this kind of division again.

Below are just some of the messages I received throughout the debate. I know my colleagues received similar if not worse on social media, through email and letters and even in person. I hope the division we saw at the State Capitol will not be a permanent one in Hawaii. We can do better for Hawaii, and we must do better.

"Tell your stupid bigot friend [Richard] that SB1 is about equality, not money and yelling doesn't mean sounding smarter. Maybe in your dumpy part of the island but not where educated people live."

"Well he [Richard] did say the other day that he needed definitions in layman's terms because he is not educated like other people...Nobody's fault but his, get a damn education you derelict."

"Thank you so much for all you've done and continue to do to protect our rights and hear our voices. We stand with you and appreciate all the sacrifices you and your family make to be able to do what you do for us. Thank you we will never forget."

"I would like to thank you for being an awesome leader! While waiting in line to testify after 12:00am you came and gave all of us waiting words of encouragement and hope! I really appreciated that! Not many politicians seem to care about people's voice."

The Gift of Giving

Tis the Xmas season and a time of giving. There is a common saying that those who give of themselves receive. There are lots of studies linking giving to health benefits for the giver.

What are the health benefits? Physiological changes occur when you give. Three hormones are released: endorphins which produce a feeling known as "helper's high;" oxytocin, a hormone that causes a feeling of warmth, euphoria and a connection to others; and cortisol which decreases stress. Laboratory studies show that a dose of oxytocin causes people to be more generous and to feel more empathy toward others. Co-directors of the Research Project on Gratitude and Thankfulness find that teaching college students to "count their blessings" and cultivating their sense of gratitude causes them to exercise more, to be more optimistic and to feel better overall.

Interestingly, most of the studies on giving find that older people reap more health benefits than younger people. Is it because older adults have experienced loss of major roles, such as being a wage earner or being a parent? Volunteering to help others may give them a sense of purpose and provide a social network which protects them from social isolation.

In a study involving 51-91 year olds who volunteered at least 16 hours per month, the risk of developing high blood pressure was 40% lower than non-volunteers. Other studies show that giving or volunteering lowers the rate of depression, mortality, pain intensity in people with chronic pain, heart rate and increases cognitive performance and energy.

Whether you buy gifts, donate money to charity, help feed the hungry, or volunteer at a nursing home, consider extending yourself beyond the Xmas season. This is not only good for your health, but will give you a sense of accomplishment and happiness.

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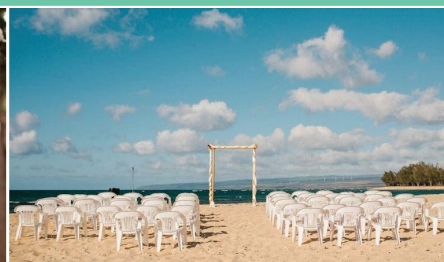
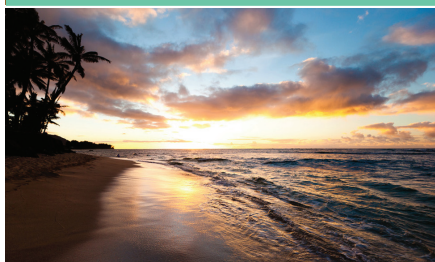
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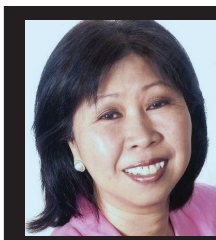

Mayor Kirk Caldwell's "Town Hall Meeting" in Kahuku – a Dog and Pony Show

The November 19, 2013 Town Hall Meeting was met with a protest outside the Kahuku high school by citizens against Caldwell's agenda to cement the Country. But the Mayor's televised show did not disclose any of that. About half of those in attendance were his cabinet members and city employees, who provided robust applause for the Mayor. There were approximately 50 city employees. Others in attendance were recognized community activists and citizens. The Mayor used all the right words and pushed the right political buttons marketing his 'Waipahu roots', peppered with some pidginspeak, and he didn't forget to remind the audience of his "compassion". But his showmanship did not fool the astute citizens.

The meeting was tightly-controlled. There was no direct questioning. Those who wanted to "participate" had to write their questions on a piece of paper to be submitted to the mayor. There was no opportunity for clarifications or rebuttal during his promotional tour that was on the city's dime.

Some found the music - "All Hawaii Stand Together" - used by Caldwell insulting and ironic. Mayor Kirk Caldwell has not met a development he does not like. Many Hawaiians are up in arms against the disappearance of their inheritances, aina, values and culture. Ko'olauloa is one of very last regions that has some semblance of local lifestyle. Former state lawmaker Bob Nakata said he supported the city's transit-oriented development plan because it promised to confine large-scale construction to urban areas. But now he's changing his mind as Envision Laie will transform Laie and Kahuku one big urban area. Hauula Resident Joshua Noga: The meeting was anything but a town hall meeting, but resembled more of a stop on his campaign trail. I have never been to a town hall meeting where the public were not able to express their concerns directly but was instead told to write their questions down on a piece of paper.

The questions were hand picked by the mayor as to which he would answer and were then read aloud by a member of his staff. Community members present watched in amazement as the mayor thumbed through questions, his face turned red with embarrassment as he looked for safe questions to answer.

Let it be known that Mayor Caldwell supports an urbanization plan that looks to amend the Oahu General Plan, a plan that would violate native Hawaiian tenant rights of kuleana landholders, rezone state-districted Ag lands in Malaekahana.

Ka'a'awa: Andrea Peatmoss: "The 'presentations' section was too long. Since our sole 2 lane Kamehameha Highway is a State road, the long pothole story was too long; and we won't have much to do with Rail and only Laie has a sewer, (still on federal consent decree that taxpayers now pay for it sounded like, but you couldn't ask questions until after), a lot was largely irrelevant to most people.

Kahuku Plantation Camp Robert Trotter: When I approached our honorable mayor last night, he pulled his

hand back, instead of out to shake my hand. First politician to not want to make the traditional move. I must have the look of a destitute homeless person. Besides the five or six uniformed police officers, there were at least seven or more very large undercover police roaming the meeting, giving people the look. There were more staff and Caldwell's people than others. He answered questions written down, but maybe 10 questions out of an easy 150 we the people delivered. A beautiful dog and pony show, but the dog was showing many large teeth.

Kahuku: Angela Huntemer: The week before he took direct questions from the audience at Waialua - because there were hardly any members of the public.

Hau'ula: Marvin Iseke: "It was a waste of time. There was no open mike. This was no town hall meeting; it was his TV show. The Mayor was hiding behind his directors. He kept saying the city had no money to save the Kahuku Golf Course or help the plantation camp evictions but he had \$13 Million for his fire station in Hauula!"

An observer from Kauai said: "You guys are too nice."

Ko'olau Loa residents in good faith took the time to attend the Mayor's Town Hall Meeting to participate and engage in a thoughtful dialogue.

What they received was the Mayor's dog and pony show that provided him two hours of free TV airtime for his perpetual campaign trail.

Tis' the Season for Plants

When we see a potted red Poinsettia plant (*Euphorbia pulcherrima*) we know that the Christmas season is fast approaching. This iconic red-green plant brings with it the holiday spirit together with the wintery pine smells and warmth of the occasion. This Mexican native was brought into the U.S. in 1825 by an American minister, Joel Poinsett, where the common name Poinsettia derives from. For those of us who are interested in adding other red Christmas plant to a collection can explore growing the rarer Jamaican poinsettia (*Euphorbia punicea*) and the Ashanti-blood (*Mussaenda erythrophylla*).

The Jamaican poinsettia is an elegant succulent shrub growing to 12 feet tall. Its showy red bracts and small yellow flowers (in the milkweed family) can attract butterflies. It is a great container plant for a focal area or a small garden. Little water with good drainage and full sun will keep this plant happy in a xeriscape garden.

The Ashanti-blood, or more commonly known as *Mussaenda*, has vivid bright red bracts with small white flowers is in the coffee family. This climbing shrub is native to tropical West Africa where the roots are chewed as an appetite stimulant. It was introduced to Hawai'i in 1915 through Singapore by the renowned botanist, J.F. Rock. These two additional types will give your garden a wonderful variation of red for the season.

The Triple Crown is in full gear and Hawaiian surfers are right on top making names for themselves in the prestigious events. Fredrick Patacchia from Pupukea showed early signs of dominance by placing second in the Reef Hawaiian Pro just behind Tahitian Michel Bourez. World tour surfer Patacchia grew up on the North Shore and started on his World Title campaign in 2005 and won the ASP rookie of the year award that year. He has added to his career earnings of nearly a million dollars. After an early season injury he will qualify for the tour next season. Congratulations!

Volcom team rider Ezekiel Lau was a standout in every heat at the Vans World Cup and won it with a solid tube ride in the final. Lau surfed from the beginning of the competition and handled every kind of surf. Sunset dished out with ease and patience. Surf was raging the first day with heights up to 15 feet and ramped down to 3-5 the last day with flash flood conditions, the full Sunset rinse cycle. Lau also beat 11 time World Champion Kelly Slater in the round of 32. He ends up the season in around 35th place just short of qualifying for the tour, so close! Florida's Damien Hobgood was second, Raoni Monteiro, Brazil third and Frederico Morais from Portugal was fourth. Morais also won the JN automotive rookie award.

Two in a row! Moona Whyte who lives at Laniakea won the KSP Cabrinha Kite Surf Pro in Maui to take the World Championship title. Last season she burst onto the scene and took the win there and did it again in substantial 5 foot surf. "I am so so happy to get the World Title at the KSP Hookipa," she said. "All the girls rode so well especially Lailou Langeree who I had a really close heat with. Thank you so much to Cabrinha for hosting the event and giving me such a great opportunity." Whyte is also an artist and student. Sanuk Shoes officially open their store in Waikiki throwing a grand opening on the 2nd of December. The division of Deckers Outdoor Corporation has been open there for a while and has three other Hawaii stores. They are known for their super comfy shoes. State Champion Zoe McDougall from Sunset Beach is one of the team riders as is singer song writer Donavon Frankenreiter, a long

The North Shore is a wave machine for sure. But there has been a lot of talk about mechanical wave machines. Recently the "Wave Garden" wave machine came into play in Spain. The facility is pretty awesome with great waves to ride. It generates about 120 world class waves an hour about 18 seconds in duration with many other waves on the inside. Imagine about 100 surfers in the lagoon at the same time. The wave is about 3 feet high and can go higher. Sounds fun, consistent! Now there will be the first ever in the United States. "Surf-Stream" will soon debut outside of Boston as part of a program called "Surf's Up NH." American Wave Machines has announced that it is to be build in conjunction with a skydiving facility with an open air "stadium like" atmosphere. 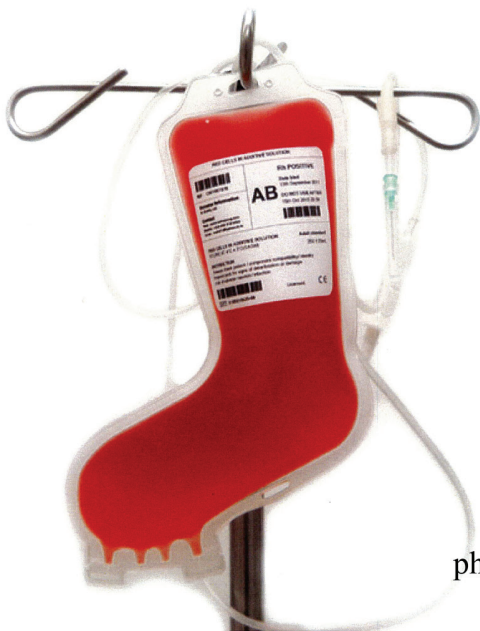

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A Journey through Wines and Spirits...

Has anyone ever asked you when tasting wine, "What do you smell in the glass?" Some will say, "smells like wine!?" or some may say, "I smell hints of apples, peaches, blackberry, vanilla, or even chocolate" Really??? Are wineries adding these flavors to these red and white wines? -----Well, Yes and No, the majority of wines made are from 100 percent wine grapes (*Vitis vinifera*). Flavored wines such as wine coolers, sangria, are most likely made with flavorings or in other words diluted with other beverages. So what causes these flavors that we hear about or read on a back label of a wine bottle? ----Each grape has its own characteristic of aroma compounds that creates these amazing flavors within its tiny fruit we call wine grapes. The style of winemaking, soil composition, and climate they're grown in will also enhance other components to the smell and taste of the wine. So for example, if the grape, let's say Chardonnay, were grown in a colder climate, the flavor profile would pick up more of a green apple, mineral (stone fruits, gooseberry) type flavor. A cooler (moderate) climate, the flavors such as peach, apricot, citrus would be more pronounced, and for hot climate it becomes more tropical in flavor. As the sun ripens the fruit, it will get sweeter as days or months goes by. If it is colder, it is the opposite and there is not enough sun to ripen causing less sugar in the grapes making it higher in acid which more likely makes it tart. Thus, chardonnay from France tends to be higher in acid due to the cooler climate compared to Napa Valley. For red wines, such as Cabernet Sauvignon, colder climates will produce more green flavors like bell peppers, mint, and herbs. Moderate temperatures would have red and dark berries, plum, and cherry like aromas, and hot climate will produce raisin and jam like flavors.

In the winemaking process different strains of yeast converts the sugar into alcohol which can contribute flavors to the wine through fermentation. Like grapes, oak wood produce aroma compounds too. When the oak barrels are made, the inside is heated to soften the wood so it can bend to its shape. Once shaped, they are toasted with a control ground fire. For example, the lighter the toast the shorter time on the fire, medium toast a little longer and so on. The level of the toast will enhance more complex flavors to the wine. Essence of cloves, sweet spices, coffee, mocha, smoke, leather, toffee, and butter all derive from the wine spent aging in oak. American Oak provides more vanilla, coconut, and stronger oak flavor and French Oak, which is known to be the finest, are rich in aromatic compounds.

It is amazing how much aromas are created without adding flavors. So when someone asks you what do you smell in that wine? Don't worry because there is never a wrong answer. Someone once

told me, "do you smell black currants?" I said, "no" haven't heard of that fruit, and so obviously I would not have memorized that flavor.

I fondly remember picking mangos with my grandma in Hawaii. The smells associated with the fruit and surroundings are already etched in my memory. And another scent I remember growing up, her closet smelling like moth balls... LoL! ----- Love my Grandma!!!

So to train yourself of these aromas, you need to smell, smell, smell, and remember them. It will help you identify flavors or aromas much easier.

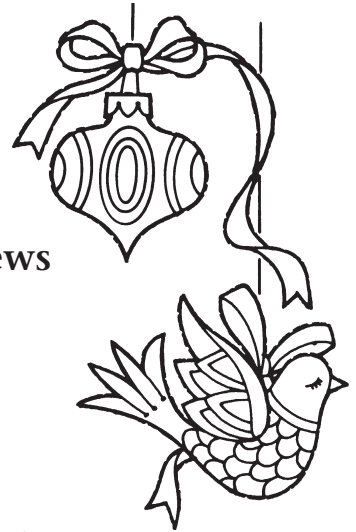

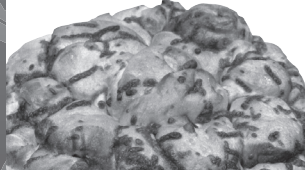
