And if you didn't want to splurge, you could spend your nickel on enough stamps to mail 1 letter and 2 postcards. You could buy a new Ford Coupe for \$600, but who could afford one? Too bad, because gas was 11 cents a gallon.

- "coke" was a cold drink,
- "pot" was something your mother cooked in and
- "rock music" was your grandmother's lullaby.
- "Aids" were helpers in the Principal's office,
- "chip" meant a piece of wood,
- "hardware" was found in a hardware store and.
- "software" wasn't even a word.

And we were the last generation to actually believe that a lady needed a husband to have a baby. No wonder people call us "old and confused" and say there is a generation gap.

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## **Turtle Bay Resort's SEIS Community Update**

This article is the seventh in a series of updates to the North Shore News community about the ongoing progress of Turtle Bay Resort's draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (SEIS) Preparation Notice and the Revised Plan. Turtle Bay Resort (TBR) has the unique opportunity to honor and respect these lands and community by incorporating traditional Hawaiian cultural values into its environmental review process, planning and implementation of the Revised Plan. This series focused on the critical cultural components of both the SEIS and Revised Plan. All previous articles that are part of our SEIS Community Updates are available online.

Our Proposed Action, otherwise known as our master plan, includes two hotel sites, four beachside parks, and a Gathering Place amongst many site and land improvements that will be done. A draft supplemental environmental impact statement (SEIS) is currently underway that will summarize possible environmental impacts, including traffic, of our Proposed Action; it is expected to be completed and made public sometime in the first half of this year.

Identifying, inventorying, and preserving the archaeological and cultural resources of the Turtle Bay Lands remains a critical component of our Proposed Action. Earlier, we previously provided information about a Supplemental Archaeological Inventory Survey (SAIS) that the resort owners have voluntarily authorized. Fieldwork has just completed and the resulting SAIS report will complement the already extensive amount of work that has been done for Turtle Bay Resort.

From 1977 to 2006, the Turtle Bay lands have been the subject of numerous archaeological investigations that have been documented in 21 separate reports. In 2006, this work was summarized in connection with the preparation of an archaeological mitigation plan by Cultural Surveys Hawaii for the



then proposed development master plan. Three main areas have been subjected to archaeological study – Kawela Bay, Kahuku Point, and Punahou'olapa Marsh. An additional 14 sites were also investigated. No significant adverse impacts upon archaeological resources are anticipated but the possibility of such impacts will be studied and addressed in the draft SEIS. The draft SEIS will present in greater detail any specific measures that may be necessary to mitigate the effects of significant adverse impacts up on identified archaeological or cultural resources.

In addition to the voluntary SAIS that will soon be completed, a Cultural Impact Assessment will also be included in the draft SEIS that will identify valuable cultural resources in the project area, evaluate the impacts of the proposed project on these valuable resource, and allow us to develop appropriate mitigation measures to ensure that valuable resources are preserved and protected to extent possible, consistent with state laws. As with the SAIS, the draft SEIS will present in greater detail any specific measures that may be necessary to mitigate the effects of significant adverse impacts upon identified cultural resources.

With every aspect of our planning, we endeavor to preserve, enrich, and perpetuate the native Hawaiian culture as much as possible. Additionally, we will continue to strive to extend opportunities to the community for fellowship and cultural practice.





#### The debate over plastic bags

The production of plastic shopping bags dates to the early 1950s. The modern lightweight shopping bag came from Sweden in the early 1960s, leading to the design of a simple, strong bag with a high load-carrying capacity in 1965. From the mid-1980s onwards, plastic bags became common throughout the developed world and have all but replaced paper bags. Environmental activists estimate that between 500 billion and 1 trillion plastic bags are used each year worldwide. In 2009, the International Trade Commission reported that the number of bags used annually in the USA at 102 billion. Here in Hawaii we consume well over 300 million plastic bags a year, creating a major problem disposal problem. Plastic marine debris is lethal to millions of sea birds and other marine life. On land, next to cigarette butts, plastic bags are the most littered items on earth. Buildups of plastic bags clog drainage systems and contribute to flooding, as occurred in India twice in the last two decades and almost annually in Manila. It would be foolhardy to disagree with the need to resolve the negative impact of plastic bags on the environment. The source of the current heated debate locally and elsewhere is how we go about managing the problem of plastic bags. The Seattle City Council recently voted unanimously to ban plastic grocery bags and to charge a 5-cent fee on paper bags. But the vote only came in the aftermath of a contentious debate that is occurring across the country and has become a world wide issue. Three years ago, the Seattle was the first city in the country to approve a fee in paper and plastic, charging 20 cents for each bag provided to shoppers at retail stores. The hope was to reduce pollution by encouraging reusable bags though a financial disincentive. But the proposed 20-cent fee, scheduled to take effect in 2008, was soundly defeated in a mail-in voter referendum in the summer of 2009. A petition drive, financed largely by the plastic bag industry in a \$1.4 million advertising campaign against the ban, turned the tide in the weeks before the vote. A city council staff member in support of the fee said wide margin of defeat was because people are more concerned about the high cost of living than what they use to take their groceries home. Seen by many as a successful measure, a five-cent tax levied on plastic bags in Washington, DC in January 2010 resulted in a decrease in consumption from 22.5 million to 3 million bags in the first month alone. But a study issued by the Americans for Tax Reform found that the District of Columbia's five-cent bag tax had a disproportionate impact on the city's poor and cost the city over 100 jobs. In the state of Hawaii, Oahu is the only one of the four counties without a ban on plastic bags. In view of the need to address this issue in spite of previous failed attempts, I introduced Bill 10 which will be heard by the City Council on Feb 15th and refereed to the Committee on Public Works and Sustainability for review. I am optimistic that this time we can find common ground on a universal problem.

Since the North Shore of Oahu has some of the best beaches in the state and is a popular area to frequent by both residents and visitors alike, I believe that we need to ensure that areas such as these are protected from the ravages of usage and its effects on the marine life. The following is a bill I introduced which is making its way through the process:

SB 2664, relating to marine life establishes a special fund for the marine life conservation program and authorizes the collection of user fees for marine life conservation districts. The marine life conservation program has provided the State with some of its most ecologically, economically, and scientifically valuable environmental assets. The comprehensive habitat protections authorized for marine life conservation districts have resulted in the unparalleled preservation of several near-shore reef ecosystems, presenting visitors, residents, and researchers with the unique opportunity to appreciate these relatively pristine marine areas. The increasing popularity of these extremely valuable sites may require greater measures to ensure the continued health of the ecosystems they contain. The Department of Land and Natural Resources will need a more consistent and reliable source of funding to maintain these unique areas and to conserve and protect coral reef resources throughout the State.

#### 4th Annual Art at the Capitol

The Legislature has been conducting an "Art in the Capitol" day each session. This allows the public an opportunity to view the various pieces of art work in legislators' offices that choose to participate in this event. My office will be participating as we did last year when a number or people came through my office. Fortunately, my schedule allowed me to be there for at least part of the time and I was able to explain some of the artwork in my office. Some of the pieces in my office belong to me personally while the others are state property. However, each piece chosen from the state collection was personally selected by me because of a particular significance for me. There is one piece of art that is of the Liliuokalani Church in Haleiwa that I obtained from the state collection. This year, Art at the Capitol will be held on Friday, March 2, 5:00-7:00 p.m. The State Foundation on Culture and the Arts reports that there are over 900 pieces of artwork in the state capitol. Some of the art work will not be accessible to the public if the office will not be participating in this event. There will be a documentary of Ruthadell Anderson, artist of the Senate and House tapestries, and Keiki Sato, sister of artist Tadashi Sato, who did the Aquarius mosaic.

## Glamour and nostalgia blend to create an informative and fun evening in Hale'iwa

The North Shore Chamber of Commerce's Historic Preservation Committee held its third in a series of historical illustrated lectures on February 4, 2012 in the historic Hale'iwa Gym. North Shore author Vera Stone Williams' presentation was based on her book "WASPs, Women Airforce Service Pilots of World War II" recently republished by Pacific Historic Parks. Historian and aviator Captain Rick Rogers traced the history of aviation on Oahu's North Shore. The event was generously sponsored by Stearman Biplane Rides, LLC.

As a tribute to the era, the Kerry Germain Hale'iwa Gym became a time warp, transporting guests to a moment in history when war threatened the safety of our country, women were called upon to fly planes in the armed forces, and airfields were scattered across the North Shore of Oahu. Passing by vintage military vehicles provided courtesy of the Military Historical Vehicles Association, and ushered in under a sign replicating the Avenger Field Archway by volunteers in aviation attire made one feel they were about to experience a piece of history firsthand. Memorabilia and old photos adorned tabletops and complimentary commemorative World War II posters were offered by the Naval Air Museum Barbers Point. Members of The Naval Air Museum at Barbers Point who dressed up in World War II American and Japanese aviator uniforms also had a table showcasing a selection of interesting aviation related items from their museum.

Publisher's representative and historian Daniel Martinez introduced Vera Williams who too contributed to the atmosphere in a 1940's inspired Santiago blue ensemble complete with pin-curled hair, and of course, red lipstick. Williams' lecture included a brief look at the step-by-step process of becoming a WASP, as well as mentioning some of the key players in WASP history, including Jackie Cochran. Although they made a valid contribution to the U.S. Armed Forces, WASPs were scarcely acknowledged by the U.S. government until 1977, when they were awarded veteran status with no benefits by President Carter. And, again, in 2010 when President Obama awarded the female pilots with their long overdue Congressional Gold Medals. Cochran fought for the miniaturization of the WASP program and its members, writing detailed reports to congress, and purchasing uniforms to support their legitimacy. De-

spite the adversity they experienced in their service to the WASP program, Williams assured the audience that, "rather than being bitter about the short length of their service, they looked upon those two years as the best years of their lives."

Following Williams was an outstanding performance by Kahuku High School's award winning Vocal Motion who sang the old time classic, "The Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy." During intermission, a photographic presentation of life in the Islands during World War II was presented courtesy of the Hawaii War Records Depository and the former Honolulu Advertiser and Star Bulletin newspapers while patrons enjoyed an array of refreshments.

Following intermission, Captain Rick Rogers took the stage, and like Williams dressed up for the occasion sporting a vintage pilot suit during his talk about the North Shore airfields. Rogers revelation that there were four airfields on the North Shore, including the little known Pu'uiki airstrip surprised many in the audience. The Dillingham Airfield, named after Henry Gaylord Dillingham and once called the Mokuleia Army Airfield, Rogers says was used during the war for army training and by the Hawaiian Air Force following the attack on Pearl Harbor. He went on to recall the famous Taylor and Welch story in reference to the Hale'iwa Airfield, noting that the area is now mainly recognized for its television appearances. Rogers also included the Kahuku Airfield which was once paved with runways serving B-17s, B-24s, as well as cargo planes, and now shares its space with the Turtle Bay Resort.

To culminate the nostalgic atmosphere for the evening, swing dancers from the Arthur Murray Dance Studio took to the stage, encouraging guests to join in with them as Williams autographed books.


