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Local veteran participates in Ski Clinic for the disabled in Colorado

Eugene Gold, an Army Veteran from Waialua recently participated in the 25th National Disabled Veterans Winter Sports Clinic, held in Snowmass Village, Colorado. Cosponsored by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and the Disabled American Veterans (DAV), the Clinic creates "Miracles on the Mountainside" by being the world leader in teaching adaptive Alpine and Nordic skiing to Veterans with disabilities, while also introducing them to a variety of other adaptive sports and activities.

Gold, 62, a Veteran of Vietnam has a spinal cord injury and is among more than 350 U.S. military Veterans and active duty personnel from across the Nation who gathered in Snowmass Village to learn or improve their skills in winter sports. More than 65 active duty military personnel and Veterans from operations in Iraq and Afghanistan participated in the Clinic this year. Some are still recovering from their injuries at military treatment facilities. Gold currently receives care at the VA medical facility in Honolulu, Hawaii.

For many newly-injured Veterans, the Clinic offers their first experience in winter sports. The Clinic promotes rehabilitation by teaching downhill and cross-country skiing to Veterans with significant physical disabilities and visual impairments. For both Alpine and Nordic skiing, participants have the benefit, based on their level of ability and ski experience, to use a wide variety of specially adapted ski devices or methods taught by certified ski instructors. It also offers participants an opportunity to learn scuba diving, rock climbing, sled hockey, curling, snowmobiling, self-defense and other activities that they can continue when they return home.

Fiery finish at 19th Annual World Fireknife Championships

After four nights of fiery competition, it was former Champion Viavia "VJ" Tiumalu's skill with the Samoan fireknife that burned brightest as the 19th Annual World Fireknife Championships culminated at the Polynesian Cultural Center (PCC). This was Tiumalu's second championship, also winning it in 2008.

Second and third place went to Julian Maeva of Pago Pago, American Samoa and David Galeai of Laie, Hawaii respectively.

The three finalists competed on Friday and Saturday during the intermission of PCC's night show, Ha: Breath of Life, providing even more excitement for the sold-out crowd. The critically acclaimed evening show, which already features one of the largest group fireknife performances in the world, choreographed by this year's finalist David Galeai.

The modern fireknife dance stemmed from the Samoan ailao, a warrior's knife dance, performed with the nifo oti, or "tooth of death." This dance was displayed before battle to frighten the enemy and afterward to celebrate victory. Today, the art of fireknife dancing has become one of the most intense, skillful and beautiful of Samoan traditions. The modern dance consists of twirling a sharp knife, with both ends on fire, at high speeds and requires acute precision and acrobatic finesse. The fire is very real, and dancers often make contact with the flames, sometimes intentionally.

Kahuku High School student earns First Place in Nationwide Video Contest

Kahuku High School senior Kiana Wilson was selected as a winner in the World of 7 Billion video public service announcement contest, hosted by Population Connection. Waialua Robotics Team receives \$10,000 at annual Luau fund-raiser at Dole Plantation

At the recent annual benefit fund-raiser, Dole regional competitions with their support." Plantation Director of Operations Mike Moon presented a \$10,000 donation to Glenn Lee, teacher and is a by-product of believing in their core values of lead coordinator for the Waialua High School Robotics Team.

This is the fourth year that Castle & Cooke's Dole Plantation has organized a luau fund-raiser on behalf of the Waialua Robotics program. The company has presented the team with \$40,000 over the past four years, but has supported the team since its establishment in 1999 as the state's first robotics program.

Each year, the Waialua Robotics team travels to competitions held in various locations around the country, but it struggles to raise needed funds. Dole Plantation conceived of the Robotics Luau as a benefit to support travel to these critical competitions.

This past robotics season was by far, the most successful one ever for Waialua Robotics. In addition to winning nearly two dozen awards in competitions this year, the team was honored with the highest award in the FIRST Robotics program: the World Championship Chairman's Award – 2011 Hall of Fame Inductee. Waialua Robotics is just the 19th out of nearly 4,000 programs to have been bestowed with that Hall of Fame honor.





Ho'ala Housing & Resource Center was inspired by an eight yearold, Kawailani Fifita who attends the First Brazilian Christian Church with her mother, Keapoi Namakaeha and youngest sister, Livi.

Pastor Luiz Oliviera and members of the church supported HHRC, which originated and was blessed on September 10, 2010.

Keapoi Namakaeha, born and raised on Molokai and is a PhD candidate at Capella University. She obtained a Master in Teaching degree from Gonzaga University and Bachelor of Science in Family Resources from University of Hawaii. Current educational endeavor is to obtain her CSAC certificate and licensure while being a Program Director and founder of Ho'ala Housing & Resource Center and Kawai Foundation Inc. HHRC staffs consist of Lenora Hussain who is a Certified Substance Abuse Counselor (CSAC/Assistant to Director) and social service aids includes Jerena Madison (First to Work), Michael Fondren and Leah Koonce, Charmain Haumea, Kevin Dale, Angie McCormick, and three Amigos (Silly, Drigues & Levi). Ho'ala Housing & Resource Center is providing employment training to three staffs that are "houseless."

Program & Services


