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Local veteran participates in Ski Clinic for the disabled in Colorado

Eugene Gold, an Army Veteran from Waialua recently participated in the 25th National Disabled Veterans Winter Sports Clinic, held in Snowmass Village, Colorado. Co-sponsored by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and the Disabled American Veterans (DAV), the Clinic creates "Miracles on the Mountainside" by being the world leader in teaching adaptive Alpine and Nordic skiing to Veterans with disabilities, while also introducing them to a variety of other adaptive sports and activities.

Gold, 62, a Veteran of Vietnam has a spinal cord injury and is among more than 350 U.S. military Veterans and active duty personnel from across the Nation who gathered in Snowmass Village to learn or improve their skills in winter sports. More than 65 active duty military personnel and Veterans from operations in Iraq and Afghanistan participated in the Clinic this year. Some are still recovering from their injuries at military treatment facilities. Gold currently receives care at the VA medical facility in Honolulu, Hawaii.

For many newly-injured Veterans, the Clinic offers their first experience in winter sports. The Clinic promotes rehabilitation by teaching downhill and cross-country skiing to Veterans with significant physical disabilities and visual impairments. For both Alpine and Nordic skiing, participants have the benefit, based on their level of ability and ski experience, to use a wide variety of specially adapted ski devices or methods taught by certified ski instructors. It also offers participants an opportunity to learn scuba diving, rock climbing, sled hockey, curling, snowmobiling, self-defense and other activities that they can continue when they return home.

Ensuring that Veterans receive



world-class health care and rehabilitation is a primary goal of VA and DAV. When Veterans conquer the mountain, it proves to all that a disability need not be an obstacle to an active, rewarding life.

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Fiery finish at 19th Annual World Fireknife Championships

After four nights of fiery competition, it was former Champion Viavia "VJ" Tiualu's skill with the Samoan fireknife that burned brightest as the 19th Annual World Fireknife Championships culminated at the Polynesian Cultural Center (PCC). This was Tiualu's second championship, also winning it in 2008.

Second and third place went to Julian Maeva of Pago Pago, American Samoa and David Galeai of Laie, Hawaii respectively.

The three finalists competed on Friday and Saturday during the intermission of PCC's night show, Ha: Breath of Life, providing even more excitement for the sold-out crowd. The critically acclaimed evening show, which already features one of the largest group fireknife performances in the world, choreographed by this year's finalist David Galeai.

The modern fireknife dance stemmed from the Samoan ailao, a warrior's knife dance, performed with the nifo oti, or "tooth of death." This dance was displayed before battle to frighten the enemy and afterward to celebrate victory. Today, the art of fireknife dancing has become one of the most intense, skillful and beautiful of Samoan traditions. The modern dance consists of twirling a sharp knife, with both ends on fire, at high speeds and requires acute precision and acrobatic finesse. The fire is very real, and dancers often make contact with the flames, sometimes intentionally.

Champions were crowned in the Junior Pacific and Open Group divisions on Thursday. The complete results from the 19th Annual World Fireknife Championships follow:

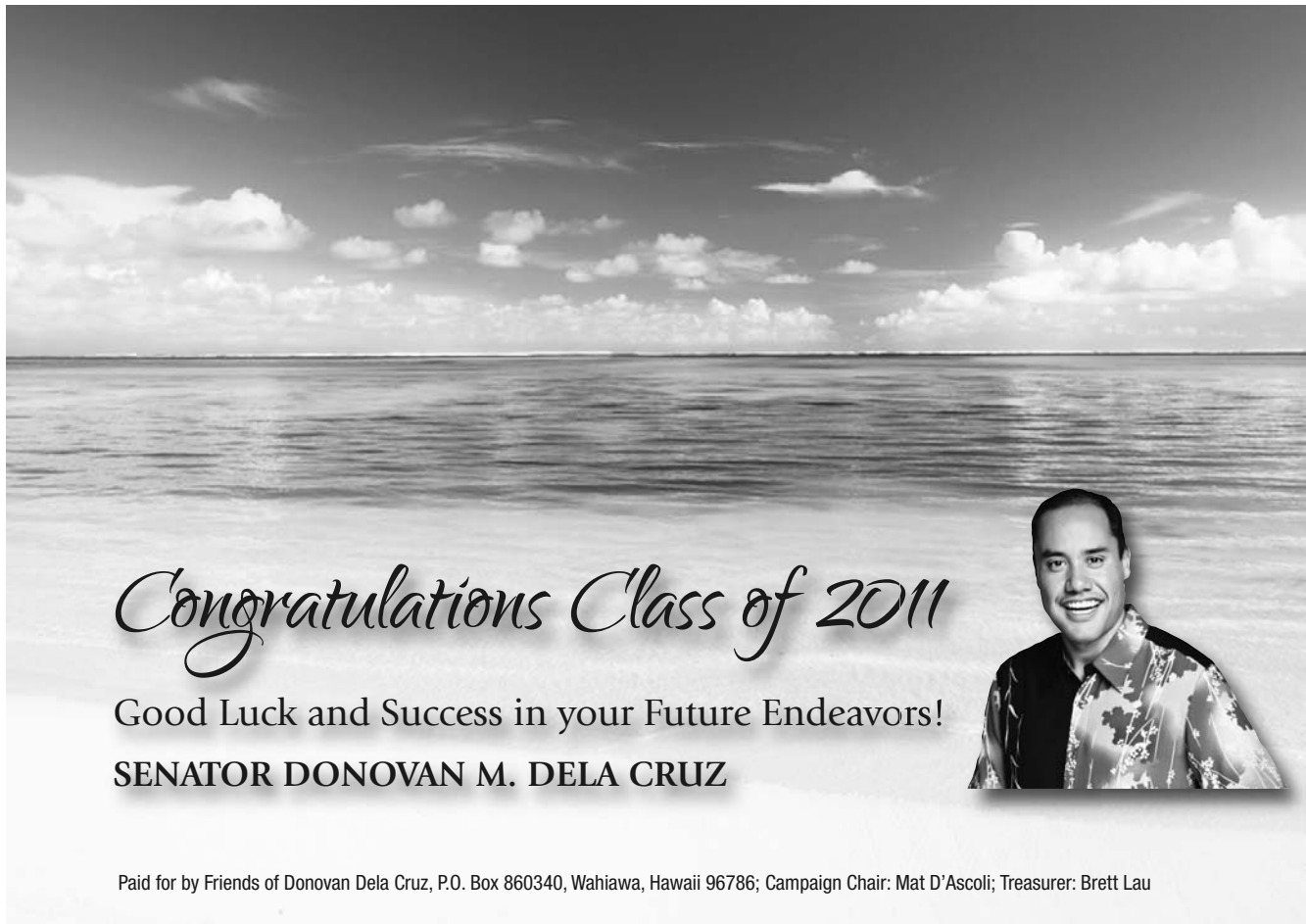



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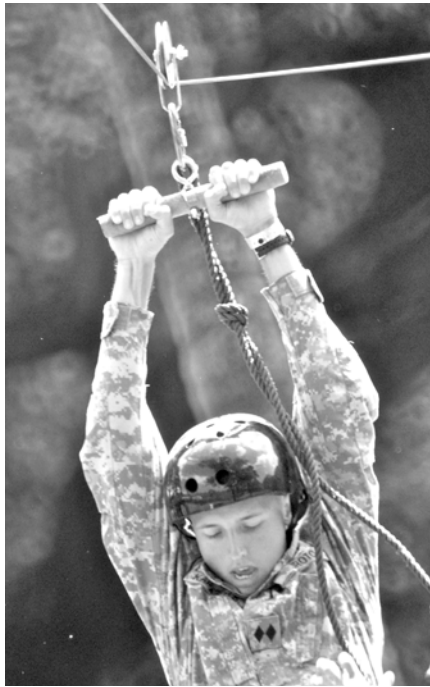

Kahuku JROTC Cadets learn to "do for your country"

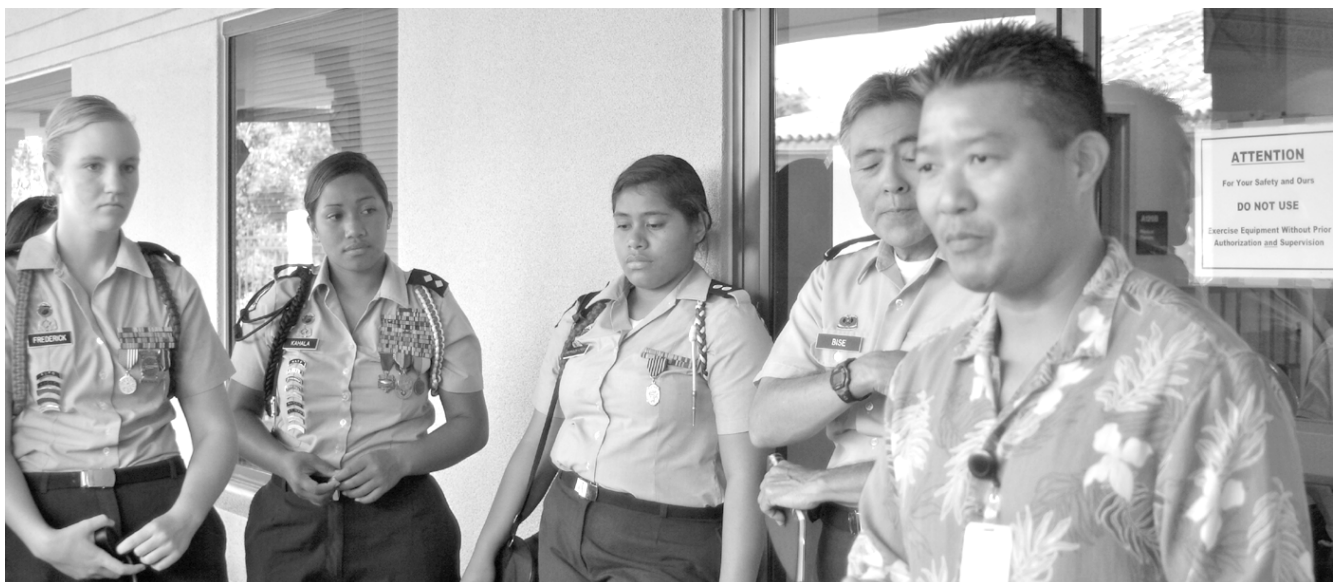

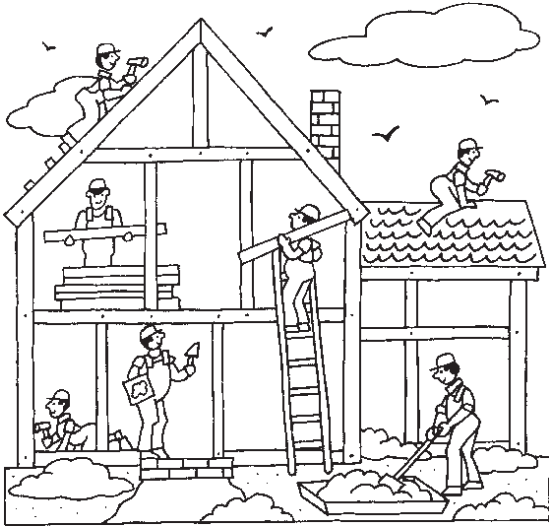

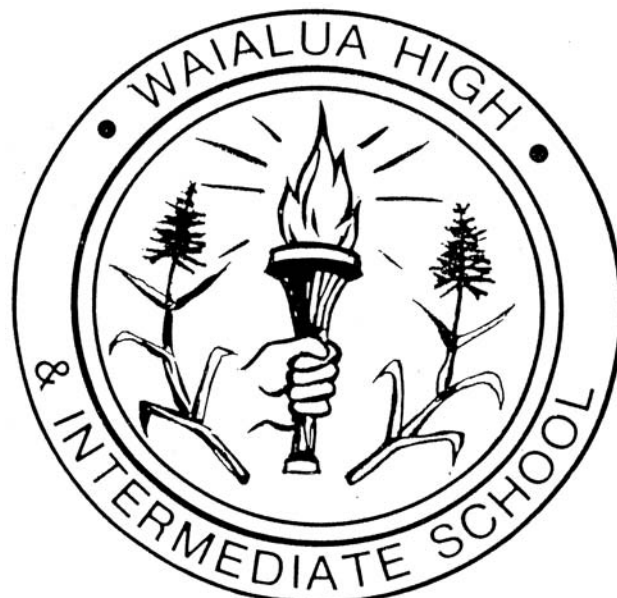

Kahuku High School student earns First Place in Nationwide Video Contest

Kahuku High School senior Kiana Wilson was selected as a winner in the World of 7 Billion video public service announcement contest, hosted by Population Connection. The contest challenged high school students to display their creativity and produce a 30-second PSA focusing on one of five topics (economics, energy, land use, public health, or water) and how it relates to world population, which is going to hit seven billion this October.

Wilson's video, "Malama i Ka Wai," was awarded an honorable mention in the 9th-10th grade category from over 600 video PSAs submitted by students from 36 states and several foreign countries. Her video earned high marks from judges and a \$250 prize for the video's message of the importance of a clean water supply and its local footage of Hawaii as a focal point of the PSA.

Waiialua Robotics Team receives \$10,000 at annual Luau fund-raiser at Dole Plantation

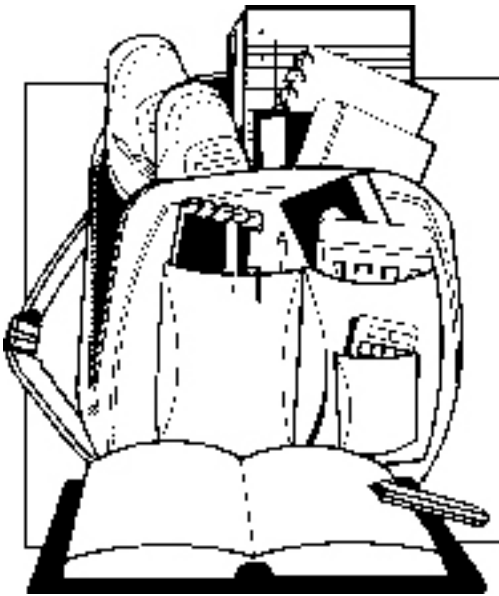
The benefit featured Hawaiian food, live musical entertainment from Aloha Na Ohana A'o Hawaii and a silent auction enjoyed by 400 guests.

Our Vision

Our mission is to work to end the cycle of homelessness in Hale'iwa by 50% in the next ten years through interagency collaborations, reallocation of state resources and increased access to immediate services, and development of new strategies using shelters as a point of contact. We will identify the services and housing needs of people who are houseless and, provide immediate services and create solutions needed to move people from houselessness to permanent housing along with support services for employment that leads to self-sufficiency.

About Us

Ho'ala Housing & Resource Center was created to respond to the increase of Native Hawaiians who are houseless on Oahu's Northshore. Ho'ala Housing & Resource Center was inspired by an eight year-old, Kawailani Fifita who attends the First Brazilian Christian Church with her mother, Keapo'i Namakaeha and youngest sister, Livi.

Pastor Luiz Oliveira and members of the church supported HHRC, which originated and was blessed on September 10, 2010.

Keapo'i Namakaeha, born and raised on Molokai and is a PhD candidate at Capella University. She obtained a Master in Teaching degree from Gonzaga University and Bachelor of Science in Family Resources from University of Hawaii. Current educational endeavor is to obtain her CSAC certificate and licensure while being a Program Director and founder of Ho'ala Housing & Resource Center and Kawai Foundation Inc. HHRC staffs consist of Lenora Hussein who is a Certified Substance Abuse Counselor (CSAC/Assistant to Director) and social service aids includes Jerena Madison (First to Work), Michael Fondren and Leah Koonce, Charmain Haumea, Kevin Dale, Angie McCormick, and three Amigos (Silly, Drigues & Levi). Ho'ala Housing & Resource Center is providing employment training to three staffs that are "houseless."

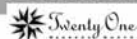

30 Years in the making, Banzai Skate Board Park moves closer to completion with the help of the local community

North Shore residents and supporters of the Banzai Skateboard Park gathered at the park on Sunday, May 22nd to demonstrate strong community support for completion of the project. Brianne Randle, a reporter for KHON and a Kahuku graduate, covered the story which aired that evening. She interviewed members of the newly formed Citizens Advisory Group and members of the Sunset Beach Community Association along with other residents as to their opinions on the current and future condition of the park. I am very optimistic that the advisory group and the community at large will have a significant impact on the final design of the park. I commend all of the supporters for donating their time and talent to the cause. There were also promises of monetary assistance to the special park fund established by the Sunset Beach Community Association. In addition to the construction funds allocated by the City, contributions to the SBCA fund will be used for enhancements not currently included in the construction budget. Providing an additional incentive for the City to expedite the work schedule at the site, Vans Triple Crown will be celebrating its 30th anniversary next year and has expressed an interest in sponsoring a skate board competition at the park. When interviewed on the financial status of the park, I reported that the City estimates it will take an

additional \$1.3 million to complete the skateboard park. Although I have included the full amount in the budget for Fiscal 2012 which begins on July 1st, there is a possibility that the administration could restrict the release of the funds due to our current economic predicament. That makes the public/private partnership between the community and the city a very viable option to finally get this project done.

In other areas of the community, I am pleased to report that Parks Director Gary Cabato has informed me that the basketball backboards at Sunset Beach courts should be replaced before this issue of the North Shore News is delivered to you on June 1st. Also on the work schedule are the tennis courts there, another project long over due. Resurfacing will begin before the end of this fiscal year on June 30th. Additionally, the resurfacing of the basketball courts will begin after the start of the new fiscal year on July 1st. I want to thank all of the community members who have patiently waited for these improvements to the recreational facilities in their neighborhood. I want to assure you that I will continue to advocate strongly to move these projects off the City's "to do" list. My goal is to develop a list of accomplishments that will directly benefit the North Shore community. If you have suggestions for this list, your input is always welcomed at emartin@honolulu.gov.

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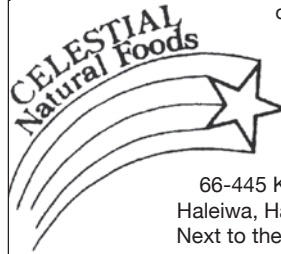

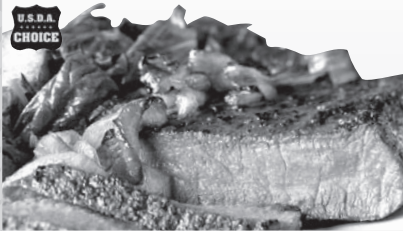

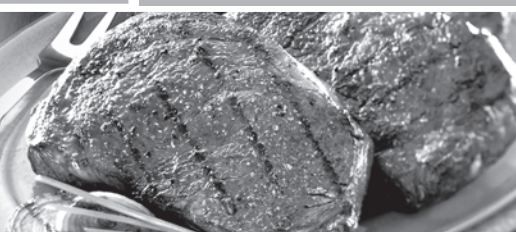
