

Sometimes I think all the folks who grew up speaking English should be committed to an asylum for the verbally insane. In what other language do people recite at a play and play at a recital? 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Student team recognized at National Expo

A team of students earned a top honor at a conference for one of the nation's largest student service and leadership organizations. BYU-Hawaii's Students In Free Enterprise was recognized as The second runner up at the SIFE 2012 National Expoheld in Kansas City, Missouri, on May 24, 2012.

Each year, the BYU-Hawaii chapter identifies local, regional and global service, community and leadership projects geared to help develop socially responsible leaders while making a difference in the world. They draw on more than 100 student participants at BYU-Hawaii to carry out these carefully designed projects that go through a rigorous approval process before becoming official SIFE projects. Each project must have a social, economic or environmental element to be approved.

"When I think of the school's mission of creating leaders, I can't help but see its fulfillment in the work and projects we do with SIFE," said Asia Rikard, a senior from Oregon.

Nationwide, 575 colleges and universities have SIFE chapters. 
At the 2012 National Expo, held May 22-24, in Kansas City, Missouri, 17 students represented BYU–Hawaii and continued the award-winning tradition by advancing to the final round of competition for the first time in school history. Approximately 160 universities from across the United States presented their projects, outcomes and reports from the prior year and are evaluated by panels of judges on their presentation, the depth of project design and implementation, and qualitative and quantitative analysis. BYU–Hawaii's team highlighted eight of their 23 projects for 2011-2012, including a company that sells t-shirts to help children buy required school uniforms, and an initiative to strengthen the education and economy of a small island-nation, Tuvalu.

A Message From State Representative Gil Riviere

Election season is in full swing. Nominations are closed, the boundaries are set, candidates are campaigning, and signs continue to blossom throughout the land.

Since this is a reapportionment year, nearly every seat is up for election, district boundaries have changed and voters should watch to see if their government officials and voting location have changed. The prolonged uncertainty about the new districts finally came to an end in May when a Federal Court chose not to intervene. The court had been asked to overthrow the State's reapportionment plan because non-permanent military personnel and students are excluded from the population count used to reapportion districts.

The federal challenge attempted to reverse a ruling by the Hawaii Supreme Court that ordered the Reapportionment Commission to exclude all non-permanent residents from the process.

In other words, the Commission originally counted nearly everyone presently living in Hawaii,

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then extracted about 108,000 people based on the Supreme Court ruling. The Federal challenge would have forced the Commission to put everyone back into the equation. This issue will no longer affect the 2012 elections, but the debate remains unsettled

Unfortunately, Waialua has been split into two representative districts, 45 and 47. Mokuleia and most of Waialua are now in the same district as Schofield Barracks, Wheeler AAF, Kunia and Poamoho camps and part of Mililani. District 47 extends from Waialua all the way around the North Shore to Waiahole. Laie is unified again, but Waiahole is cut into two districts.

House District 45 will have a new representative. I am seeking re-election to the House of Representatives in House District 47.

The Primary Election comes a month earlier this year. The August 11, 2012 Primary Election has special importance because the Mayor's race could be decided and because there are many hotly contested Primary races.

Many voters are unaware that they can only vote within one party bracket in the Primary. They cannot vote for a Republican in one race, and a Democrat in another race until the General Election. All votes cast in partisan races must fall within that party's bracket; however, non-partisan races like the Mayor and City Council are open to all voters.

There is no Presidential vote in the Primary Election as those candidates have already been determined for the General Election on November 6, 2012

Obviously, candidates who do not survive the Primary Election will not be on the ballot in November. A small number of votes can make the difference and elections do have consequences. Voter registration information is available at the library, post office and online at www.hawaii.gov/elections or by calling 453-VOTE (453-8683).

To apply, you will need these documents:

- 1. PHOTO I.D. (for all household members 18 yrs.
- & older) Driver's License, State I.D., or Passport
- 2. CURRENT ORIGINAL GAS OR ELECTRIC BILL
- Most current, original bill from Hawaiian Electric Company/HECO or The Gas Company/Gas Co.
- 3. **PROOF OF RESIDENCE** A document, other than the gas/electric bill, showing that you live at the address listed on the bill. Ex: phone or doctor's bill
- 4. <u>PROOF OF AGE</u> (for household members 60+ and children 0-5 yrs) Seniors (60+) and children (0-5 yrs) must show proof of age, for additional benefits. Photo I.D. or birth certificate are acceptable.
- 5. PROOF OF INCOME (for all household members 18 yrs and older) Bring all that apply: All Pay Stubs since January 2012; Self Employed General Taxes; Social Security Award Letter (2012); Supplementary Security Income Letter; Welfare Determination Award Letter; Unemployment Determination Letter, etc.
- 6. <u>PROOF OF ASSETS</u> (for all household members 18 yrs and older) Bring all that apply: Current bank statements for Savings, Checking, Credit Union, stocks and bonds, cash on hand, etc.
- 7. SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS (cards for all household members)

If you are planning on applying for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)

We will need you to have the entire bill including the bottom portion of your new electric bill (the portion you mail in with your payment) or you may make a copy of the entire electric bill in order to apply for the program.

The new electric bill will only have the subscribers name at the bottom of the electric bill and if you mail in the bottom portion with your payment we will not be able to verify that it is your bill and you will have to go to HECO for a new bill.

Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) to help Oahu with energy bills

Honolulu Community Action Program, Inc. (HCAP) will be accepting applications for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) starting June 1, 2012, on Oahu.


LIHEAP is a federally-funded program to assist low-income households in meeting their home energy needs. Offered once a year, LIHEAP provides income-eligible households with assistance in paying their electric or gas bills. In 2011, HCAP helped over 5,700 Oahu families apply for energy assistance through LIHEAP.

"With the difficult economic conditions and the high cost of living, low-income families continue to struggle even with basic necessities. These families are hit hardest by rising utility rates, having to pay a higher percentage of their household incomes for energy than their middle and high income counterparts," said HCAP Executive Director Robert N.E. Piper. "We encourage all those who may qualify for LIHEAP to avail themselves of this helpful program."

Oahu residents can qualify for one of two programs available through LIHEAP in 2012. The first is "Gas or Electric Bill Payment Assistance," whereby an energy credit is applied to the gas or electric accounts of households having difficulty paying these bills. The second is "Energy Crisis Intervention," whereby households whose electricity has been shut off in the past sixty days or is scheduled to be shut off within seven days are provided financial assistance.

HCAP will be accepting applications at its five district centers and at other select locations on Oahu for one month only, starting June 1 and ending June 29, 2012. Application hours are: Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays: 9 a.m. – 12 noon; Tuesdays: 9 a.m. – 12 noon and 4:30 p.m. – 6 p.m.; and Fridays: 9 a.m. –12 noon and 2 p.m. – 3:30 p.m.

HCAP will accept applications at the Waialua Community Assoc. on Monday, June 25, 2012 from 9 a.m. – 12 p.m.
