

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## Waialua Farmers Co-op Market celebrates 12th Anniversary

The Waialua Farmers Co-op Market is 12 years old! We opened for business in 2000 and are celebrating our 12th anniversary of serving the North Shore community. The market is conveniently located at the old Sugar Mill and is open Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., and on Wednesday afternoons from 4:00 to 7:00. Our market is an extension of the Waialua Farmers Cooperative, which was started in 1996 when the Waialua Sugar Mill ceased operations. Many of the former sugar mill employees formed the Farmers Cooperative and began farming on lands leased from Dole Foods. Today there are 60 farmers in the Cooperative growing a wide variety of produce and many of those farmers sell their produce at the farmers market.

We created this market so the Cooperative farmers would have a place to sell their produce directly to the community. We have grown from just a handful of vendors in the beginning to nearly 30 today, and there are plans to add more vendors and expand the

market area. We are a true grass-roots farm organization. The market vendors donate their time and effort to run the market, and contribute a weekly fee which is used to support the market operations and to support the farmers of the Cooperative. The market also provides free space to schools and other non-profit community organizations to assist them in fund raising efforts.

Our market features locally-grown produce, plants, and prepared food items, and will soon be expanding to include locally made art and craft items from the North Shore. In order to provide full service and convenience to shoppers, and as a service especially to the seniors within our community, we also offer a limited amount of mainland produce to supplement a well-balanced nutritional food approach.

We wish to say MAHALO to all of you who have supported our market over the years, and a big ALOHA to those who have yet to come and experience our market. Come visit us and you will be pleasantly surprised at the ample parking, the wide selection of affordable locally-grown produce, and the friendly family atmosphere of our market!



I had the privilege of bestowing an Honorary Certificate from the House of Representatives to the Once a Month Church, commemorating its eight anniversary in June. Ron graciously accepted it, turned to me and said, "Thanks, Gil, this really means a lot to me."

Three weeks later, he passed away and I reflected on his comment. Ron was not thinking about himself, but rather his church and the many people who made it so successful over the years. I believe he wanted the acknowledgement to encourage us to continue good work such as the Once a Month Church and the numerous programs he created for the disadvantaged.

Many people who would otherwise have voted for me, presumed I was a shoe-in and voted in the Democrat Primary against Mufi. Meanwhile, Richard Fale from Hauula successfully turned out more supporters in Koolauloa to beat me by 76 votes. His opponent in the General Election will be Ululani Beirne from Kahana.

I am sorry that I will not be able to continue serving our community and state in the Legislature. I am proud of some profound successes these past two years and I sincerely appreciate the opportunity to have served you.





The North Shore has lost one of the most dedicated, loving, committed men in our community. Pastor Ron Valenciana. Owner and Editor of the North Shore News, he provided a voice for everyone in the community. And he kept "dis buggah" free the whole time, knowing it was more important to give than to receive. For over 30 years he has given his talents and gifts to just about everyone I know. As Editor, he helped business owners, Pastors in the community, youth leaders, community representatives, the poor, the homeless and especially the orphans and the widows. His love for the North Shore and its people are vast. He ran the North Shore Food Bank, toys for the kids on Christmas along with a breakfast for the whole community from Turtle Bay, turkey for the community on Thanksgiving, tents for the homeless, and most importantly, prayer and confession time for those seeking the Lord. He didn't do this alone but he was committed to change the world, even if that meant getting the community to help. And they did.

Then the Lord gave him a vision to create the Once a Month Church. He then proceeded to get assistance by asking anyone who would help by telling us that this church would be at Hale'iwa Beach Park once a month, that we would give grocery carts away full of food, clothe the poor, books to read, a Sunday School for kids, balloons, praise and worship then a 10 minute sermon followed by an offering. But instead of taking money, this church gave money to those who registered. And free cars! Unconventional but effective! He asked David Anana (R.I.P.) to prepare stew for about 100 folks for the first service. 300 hundred showed up! For the past 8 years, and every last Sunday of the month since then, hundreds of souls have been saved, many were baptized, relationships with neighbors were made but the best part to me was

when he would sit down and ask each child to come and say hi to him. Then he would pray a blessing over their lives and would give them a much needed hug telling them that Jesus loved them. He would also have a slow song play and invite the widows to

come have a slow dance with him. He would give them a rose and remind these lonely widows how much God loves them and tell them they are still a very important part of everyone's lives. It was the most touching part of the service that would bring some to tears. He made sure that we provided a good meal, not just a simple meal. We fed hundreds each month with fresh bbq'd chicken, fresh green salad, potatoe salad, rice, hot dogs, cake and plenty of water and juice and coffee to drink. There is so much we can say about this man of God but there isn't enough room in the world to fill it. Someone once asked me "just how many mangoes are there in one mango seed?" Hard to tell once it's planted and Ron Va-



lenciana planted many seeds throughout his life.


He will also be missed at Turtle Bay where he provided worship and a sermon for our visitors passing through. He showed them aloha and represented Hawaii and his Lord Jesus Christ very well. He was able to unite churches and people to work at the Once a Month Church. It was like working in heaven. If you have never gone there, you should. Passion in Action rings true there.

He loved his wife Alexia, his assistant Linda and all those who worked with him. He always said I love you when we spoke and was grateful for the little things. He may have left us physically, but his work, love and legacy will live on forever on the North Shore and in the hearts of those who loved him and worked with him. Aloha Ron, thank you for bringing the example of God's kingdom to earth. You will be missed. And to Alexia. You have a whole community behind you and we love you.



To prepare for their presentations, students interviewed Mr. William Paty on plantation history and change and Marsha Joyner on sit-ins and freedom rides. Thanks to 2012 graduates, Nicole Holdren and Cierra Foster, for assisting the students with their projects.

Ms. Arlander, Mr. Lebeau, and Mr. Chang, chaperoned students on their summer learning trip to Boston. Ms. Arlander's students are also part of a Social Studies Exchange program and hosted students from Timberlane Regional High School in Plaistow, NH in March. In 2014 Ms. Arlander is planning to take the students to Italy!



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
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## Waialua - The Saga of the North Shore

### Chapter 16 - The Resolution

Having sailed the HMS Resolution, followed by the HMS Discovery, from Kealakekua Bay to anchorage 3/4 of a mile off Waimea Bay, on Saturday, February 27, 1779, Captain Clerke continued his journal: "We Anchor'd...Hoisted out the Pinnacle & Cutter in which I went ashore. On landing I was recieved with every token of respect and friendship by the great number of Natives who were collected upon the occasion; they every one of them prostrated themselves around me which is the first mark of respect at these Isles...I immediately made motions for them to rise; when one who seem'd the most consequential of this assembly arose and came forward with a Pig and a piece of cloth in his Hand with which he presented me, the same time making a long ceremonious speech...I understand so much of the matter that he talk'd about Hogs, Tarrow, & of which he promis'd I should have abundance."

Meanwhile, aboard the Discovery, surgeon Samwell wrote: "The Girls ...performed a dance on the Quarter deck which we had not seen before, it might be perhaps to express their Joy on their safe arrival at this place, it was performed by two at a time - they did not jump up as in the common dance but used a kind of regular Step & moved their Legs something like our sailors dancing a Hornpipe, they moved their Arms up and down, repeated a Song together, changed their places often, wriggled their backsides and used many lascivious Gestures. Upon the whole we thought it much more agreeable than their common Dance."

His commanding officer, Lieutenant King later penned that "We were sorry in finding the Water...a wide marshy Meadow, to be mixt with Salt water; & it continued this brachish taste for 2 hundred Yards when it became perfectly fresh, & a pleasing murmuring river. I walked a little further & observed it to be the produce of 2 branches, or small streams or rivers, that come down 2 Valleys. to the right of a remarkable & romantick bluff head, about 1/2 mile from the Sea. At the bottom of this flt swampy place, the bank of this river as well as the face of

this NW part of Wo`ahoo was as beautiful as any Island we have seen, and appeared very well Cultivated & Popular; they told us here that most of the Men were gone to Morotoi to fight..., that their Chief Perree`orannee was not gone; & upon hearing of our Arrival would Certainly be here in two or three days, When we should get a profusion of refreshments."

Lieutenant King was soon to make the first written comment about our famous winter surf: "I was sent to examine farther to Leeward, but could not get near the Shore, from the rocky ground running off the Shore 1/2 a Mile or more, We got into the break of the Sea before we were well aware of our situation."

Samwerll: "The Resolution's Cutter...returned without having found a place for Watering..." (Lieutenant King was in command of the Discovery, but it was that vessel's cutter that had been stolen back in Kealakekua Bay, setting off the chain of events which led to Captain Cook's death).

King: "The Capt'n (Clerke) concluded that it would be much more tedious to water here than at Atoui, determind for the latter place."

Samwell: "...about six o'Clock both Ships got under Weigh having first sent all the Girls on shore at this place. They would willingly have accompanied us further, but at last we came to think that they had spread the news of our Misfortune far enough."

Lieutenant King finally wrote: "We were all sorry in leaving this very pleasant Island, & lamenting that we had spent so much time in worse places."
