




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Paddling OFF da Island in New York Recently, the Senior Masters Women's crew of Hale'iwa-based outrigger canoe club Manu O Ke Kai

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DLNR seeks public input on designation of roads at Kaena Point State Park Reserve

Plan to address erosion, protect cultural and natural resources

es (DLNR) is beginning the process of identifying which of the multiple dirt roads in the Ka'ena Point State Park Reserve (west of Mokule'ia) will be recognized as "designated" roads and therefore officially sanctioned for motorized vehicle use.

DLNR is inviting frequent Park Reserve users to assist in the selection of future designated roads by joining DLNR staff at the Ka'ena Point Park Reserve on Saturday, September 24, 2011 for an onsite inspection and walk-through.

This will be the first of four Saturdays during which DLNR staff will assess the condition and use of all existing roads and dirt tracks and with public input, begin the process of identifying roads that ments from east to west along the coastal stretch will remain in use and those that will be closed.

"We are seeking a balance between the urgent need to significantly reduce environmental damage at Ka'ena by reducing the number of dirt roads, and wanting to provide long-standing park users with reasonable access to important shoreline areas," said William J. Aila, Jr., DLNR Chairperson.

Currently the maze of road segments that crisscross the area contribute to ongoing degradation of the coastal landscape and impacts to cultural sites, through erosion, disturbance of sand dunes, and de-

The Department of Land and Natural Resourc- nuding vegetated areas, and attracting various inappropriate and incompatible uses.

> On September 24, interested participants should meet DLNR staff at 9 a.m. in the large parking area at the end of the paved section of Farrington Highway past Mokule'ia.

> This initial inspection will cover the easternmost section (Mokule'ia side) of the Park Reserve starting with the first three-fourths of a mile from the end of the paved highway.

> The assessment should take about four hours. Please bring your own water and sun protection and comfortable walking shoes.

> Subsequent inspections will continue in incretowards Ka'ena Point until the process is complete. These are tentatively scheduled for October 1, 8 and 15, 2011.

> Once these roads and associated parking areas are designated and the public notified, any person operating motorized vehicles on non-designated roads or other areas in the Park Reserve will be subject to citation under Hawai'i Administrative Rule(HAR) §13-146-40.

Emergency Preparedness

Aloha, North Shore.

Are you prepared for disaster? Do you know what you will do when the next tsunami warning comes in the middle of the night or where you will go if a catastrophic hurricane strikes? How will you communicate if all the phone lines and cellular towers are out of service? How much food and water have you set aside to take care of your family?

It is impossible to know when the next natural disaster will strike, but it is certain that a tsunami, hurricane, earthquake, fire, flood, rockslide, or other catastrophe will come to our district. Do you have a plan? If you do, when is the last time you updated it?

Our office, in conjunction with the North Shore Chamber of Commerce, will host a panel of experts on Emergency Preparedness in a special meeting on Tuesday, September 13th, from 7 to 8:30 p.m., at Sunset Beach Elementary School's Cafeteria.

Experts from the Pacific Tsunami Warning Cen-

ter, State Civil Defense, City Disaster Emergency Management and other agencies will discuss potential life threatening events and how we can best prepare to survive and live after such an event. We only have to look at the recent devastation in Japan to understand how one event can change everything.

On a related subject, we are working on an agreement to allow emergency access to Drum Road in the event Kamehameha Hwy. becomes impassable. Drum Rd is a single lane road that essentially connects Schofield Barracks to the Kahuku Military Training Center. It was recently refurbished by the US Army for Stryker Brigades and other military vehicles to travel between the training facilities without clogging up Kamehameha Hwy.

Our office is bringing together the property owners, and military and state agencies needed to authorize a Memorandum of Understanding that would allow emergency vehicles to transit Drum Rd. under certain circumstances. The road is not suitable for two-way civilian traffic, but it can provide a lifeline of emergency support to the entire North Shore if Kamehameha Hwy. is ever disabled due to a natural disaster or long term road closure.

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On the first of July, we turned the page on another fiscal year at City Hall. As is the custom, this has been an opportunity to highlight the progress made in the past year. Having been Chair of the Council for just a short time at the end of the fiscal year, I want to acknowledge the leadership of former Chair Nester Garcia and his staff for many of the innovations that have improved the various functions of the City Council. These changes were made possible, in good measure, to an exemplary level of cooperation among our colleagues at City Hall. There were significant changes to Council policies and procedures such as the implementation of guidelines for speakers invited to deliver the message of Aloha at Council meetings to ensure compliance with the separation of church and state.

The Council's Administrative Manual was updated, providing members and their staff useful information about emergency procedures, common work areas and electronic resources. Updates included a section on the proper use of the Annual

Contingency Allowance. To promote the use of this manual, it was indexed and made available electronically to all Council staff. We created an index of all City Policy resolutions from 1959 to the present for improved accessibility to the documents. Likewise, a Collection of Memorandums was completed in June 2011, representing a collection of all internal memos issued by Council Chairs between 1986 and 2011. It details various administrative directives and procedures that reflect existing legislative operations and practices. Special measures were put in place to address security concerns and ensure optimum employee safety and security. Work is also progressing to secure funding for a joint Council-Administration digital television broadcast operation that will give Council control over production and programming of Council proceedings and provide the public with full access to these programs.

Scheduled for September 14, 2011 at the Hawaii Convention Center is the "Counties of Hawaii: Sister Cities Summit". Bringing together all of the sister cities/counties of Honolulu, Maui, Kauai and the Big Island, the featured event will be a joint signing ceremony of four new sister cities, one for each county. Honolulu will sign a new agreement with Chengdu, Sichuan Province in China. The goal is to create long-term economic benefits for Hawaii and to tie it in to the upcoming Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation summit in November. APEC is the largest and most important international forum in Asia and the Pacific region. The United States, along with 20 other members, meet once a year on a rotation basis. It will be another 21 years before APEC leaders meet again in the United States.

I would like to acknowledge the contributions of many city employees toward these efforts and others. The Office of the City Clerk, the Office of Council Services and the Office of the City Auditor provide excellent support services to the City Council and ultimately to the public we are here to serve.

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The State Reapportionment Commission is currently conducting meetings to determine how district boundaries may need to be adjusted to meet target population numbers for each district. The legislative districts need to be as equal as possible with no more than 10 percent deviation in population between the smallest and largest districts. Deviations greater than 16 percent are considered unjustifiable.

The proposal for my district is to reduce the district size, which is the largest in the state with 70,929, so that the district will only consist of Wahiawa and a portion of Mililani Mauka.

An initial draft reapportionment plan for public review and comment was due on August 7. Public hearings are scheduled throughout the island with the closest one for my district being on September 8, 6:00 p.m., at the Mililani High School cafeteria. There is also a hearing scheduled on September 7, 6:00 p.m., at the State Capitol Auditorium. For other hearing locations, please contact the Commission at the number below. The Commission will accept comments and recommendations which should be submitted in writing. All testimony should be submitted to the Commission by September 16. You may submit testimony at one of the hearings or to one of the following: email to reapportionment@hawaii.gov or fax 586-4105 or mail to Reapportionment Commission, 415 S. Beretania Street, Room 445, Honolulu, HI 96813. If you have any questions, the phone number to call is 586-4100.

The final reapportionment plan needs to be submitted to the Chief Elections Officer on September 26. The Chief Elections Officer has to publish the final plans on October 10 and the final report needs to be submitted to the State Legislature on Dec. 29.





Premier Pounders Bodyboard Meet @ Laie Beach Park

The first ever Pounders Roundup Bodyboard Meet at Laie Beach Park was recently held the last Saturday of the month, July 30th. Pounders Roundup is an annual bodyboard meet held at Laie Beach Park, aka Pounders, designed to promote the ocean as a healthy, positive outlet for the youth and adult members of the Ko'olauloa communities. After experiencing Friday's decrease in wind and swell, plus the fact it was raining all day, it was a miracle to see that the surf kicked up for the meet on Saturday. Not to mention, the sun was out all day and there wasn't even one drop of rain to account for. Finally, summer acting like summer.

The event got under way a little past 9 a.m. and stretched right until the last glimmer of sunlight. The turn out was far more than anyone could have anticipated. There were more than fifty contestants entering the eight divisions: Youth (10-14 years), Juniors (15-17 years), Mens (18+), Drop-

knee, Female, Launch, Standup Bodyboard, and Surf Expression Session. At any given time there were more than three hundred to four hundred spectators populating the park and water outside of the contest boundaries. It was, by all accounts, the most people that members of the community have ever seen at Pounders beach.

The kids and teenagers hit the water first, Youth and Junior divisions. It was pretty exciting to see the little kids in Youth charging and getting washed up by the sets. In the end, Shaydon Wolfe of Waimanalo took the victory. As for the Juniors, it was Jon Oba.

Next up was the Standup Surf Expression Session. Of course, surfing Pounders is a trick in and of itself, but with local knowledge Makamae Desoto of Hau'ula showed everyone how it was done. Then Standup Bodyboard duked showcasing two female standup bodyboarders, Momi Thompson and Kawena Garcia, who were more than impressive. They could give anyone, surf or bodyboard, a run for their money. When push came to shove, though, local boy Dane Orosco of Hau'ula prevailed.

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
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
