## Family Days at the Valley

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Q: Is holiday weight gain a myth or reality?

#### A: Reality!

While the average calories consumed per person per average day is between 2,000 to 2,500, Americans consume more than 4,500 calories on Thanksgiving day and about 7,000 calories at the Christmas meal.

Rumors fly that people gain about 10 pounds over the holidays, but research published in the New England Journal of Medicine indicates it's closer to 1.3 pounds. Unfortunately, those extra pounds can take more than five months to lose. A pound or so may seem minimal, but pounds add up easily unless you work to lose them.

That doesn't mean you can't enjoy the festive holiday food and drink. The trick may be to keep eating to the holiday itself — not the season.

Knowing that temptation is around the corner is important to prepare for your worst temptations — if you want both pecan and pumpkin pie, take a tiny slice of each instead of a full serving, and after eating, take a walk. Portion control is a powerful way to avoid the extra pounds. Other tips include avoid snacking- these calories add up very quickly. Remain active throughout the holiday season. Focus on increasing fiber and drink more water and fewer beverages high in calories or sugar. Use a smaller plate and try to avoid going for seconds (or thirds!). It also helps to have a buddy that is also trying to be mindful during this time of year. Don't give in to loose clothes - wearing something more form fitting can help you pay attention to what you are eating and whether

your body changes week to week. Get your sleep. Avoid

that day-after groggy fatigue from late nights and go to

#### **Happy Holidays**

As we say farewell to 2017, reflecting back on the year brings memories of our community's successful partnerships. I believe that our community should be proud of what was accomplished with the refurbishment of the Pupukea play court. It should serve as a model for public-private partnerships.

In 2010, the Pupukea play court had the distinction of being in worse shape than any other court in the City & County of Honolulu's Department of Parks and Recreation. Seven years later, the community came together in a unique public-private partnership that painstakingly reconstructed the court and restored it to the valuable recreational asset it had been in the past.

Without our combined efforts, the court would have been left to the wayside to deteriorate beyond repair. Mahalo to the organizations, businesses and community members that worked to complete this project.

During 2017, the North Shore also saw the completion of the Kaiaka Beach Park comfort station. The comfort station had the flat roof replaced with a sloped, shingled roof. The toilets, plumbing, and light fixtures were upgraded. A new integrated surveillance system and security gates were installed. The interior walls were painted and a new sidewalk was constructed. The ADA parking stalls were also relocated.

The Pupukea Beach Park Shark's Cove comfort station also saw much needed upgrades. The old, wooden roof was demolished and reconstructed. An elastomeric coating was also applied to the roof to help protect it from weathering. A new electrical system, skylights, security gates and doors were installed. The walls were also repainted.

There are still projects in the works and if we all continue to work together, we can get it done. Mahalo and Happy Holidays to you and your loved ones.





## A Day in the Life of a Seed

As we head into our 8th year of the Waimea Valley Native Forest Project, we would like to extend a big MAHALO to the community for their support. We recently surpassed 20,000 native trees, shrubs, and ground covers planted in our restoration sites! The work that goes into each planting is truly an amazing journey that starts with a seed dangling in the wind.

It's all about timing. As we all know from gathering fruit, the abundance and timing of the harvest is always dependent on the environment. When it's time to collect seeds or fruit, we must make it our priority to do so or we risk the seeds being blown away or eaten by various insects and birds. Next we have to clean the seeds. This usually involves each seed being handled individually and cleaned to the specifications in our native plant propagation books. From here the seeds are either stored in our "seed fridge" or sown directly into the media (fancy word for potting soil). Some seeds germinate in as little as 1 week while others can take the majority of a year before we see any growth. Once our seedlings are large enough we carefully transplant them into their final pot. During this whole process, we are slowly moving the individual plants into areas of the greenhouse with less and less shade which helps them adjust to the full sun environment that they will eventually be planted in. Months go by with daily care of watering, weeding, and being shuffled around......Up on Kalahe'e Ridge, on a hopefully shady day, we find ourselves with a truck load of happy little plants and a crew of eager volunteers. Our volunteers are the final hands

that get to bless the ridge with these little solar powered warriors. Each one will play a vital role in the forest. Each plant has its own purpose and role to play. Every plant gets a little drink of water and some good intentions from the people planting, and then they are left to do what they know best. After all, this is their home. The water that they catch today will be the clean water that we and our children drink decades down the line.

Some of the trees you planted eight years ago are now 20 feet tall and reaching for the sky. They have created microclimates below them that are less hospitable to weeds (thank goodness!!!) and more inviting to the native shrubs and groundcover that they were meant to be there with. Many of the mature plants now produce seeds of their own.

Seeing the full circle makes us appreciate the numerous times each seed and plant was handled and cared for. It also makes us grateful for the work that these plants continue to do day after day on that sunny ridge with an amazing view. As an organization and an ohana, we are humbled by all the support from the local and global community. Without this support, those little seeds hanging in the wind would never have become the forest that they are evolving into today.

#### "THE MAP"


One among the many services that the North Shore Chamber of Commerce provides its members is producing the North Shore Business Locator "MAP". This is accomplished by the Chamber sanctioning one of its members, Green Turtle Publications, LLC (GTP), to publish the "MAP", and have it printed and distributed.


The "MAP" is starting its 11th year of promoting North Shore businesses. The "MAP" is targeted to tourists visiting the North Shore of Oahu. It is published twice each year for distribution March through August, and September through February; two 6-month periods. It is printed on high quality, heavy glossy bond paper, and in full color to make it very enticing for the public to pick up. It is a bifolded/accordion 18" x 32" foldout for convenient reading.


65,000 copies of the "MAP" are printed each 6-month distribution period to satisfy a high pick-up rate of over 10,000 per month. Very few are left of each edition. The two predominate distribution zones are Waikiki/Ko Olina, and the North Shore. Approximately 130 drop-off locations are included in the distribution (hotels airport, rent a car agencies, etc.) .


The success of the "MAP" to promote North Shore businesses is unquestionable. It is noteworthy to underscore the MAP's effectiveness by mentioning that several five-star hotels, such as the Halekulani and the Aulani have, through no solicitation, requested that the MAPs be regularly dropped off at their guest concierge desks. As a result of its high demand, the "MAP" is used by many businesses, including the Chamber's visitor center, as a promotional tool.

The "MAP" produces significant income for the Chamber and its programs, and its Manager, Roxana Jimenez, encourages its members to participate in the "MAP" by advertising their businesses. GTP will start publication of the MAP's 22nd Edition this January. Now would be the time to reserve ad space. ## First Day Hikes in America's State Parks Offer Invigorating Start to the New Year

Make a New Year's resolution to your health and happiness by kicking off 2018 with an invigorating First Day Hike at Kaiwi State Scenic Shoreline. On January 1, all 50 states will participate in the seventh annual national event that encourages everyone to celebrate the New Year with a guided outdoor exploration.

DLNR Division of State Parks Administrator Curt Cottrell has taken a leadership position and personal interest in the annual hike to the top of the famed Makapu'u Lighthouse lookout in east O'ahu. "Our Hike is perhaps the best attended in the country," Cottrell said, with upwards of 700 people making the short two-mile round-trip trek to the top. He added, "Sunrise will be greeted and heralded in with a pu (blowing of a conch shell) in the four cardinal directions, followed by an oli and Taiko drummers. We are hoping to also have bagpipers to round off what has become a cross cultural celebration of the New Year." In addition hikers will enjoy one of the most spectacular views in Hawai'i, might catch Humpback whales breaching and frolicking in the waters below, and weather permitting, be the last to see the sunrise in America on New Year's Day.

The gate at Kaiwi State Scenic Shoreline opens at 5:30am and sunrise is at 7:09am. The trail is paved and handicapped accessible.

## North Shore Oral History Project Seeks To Talk Story With Community Elders

The North Shore Ethnographic Field School will begin to "talk story" with community individuals in January 2018. This unique community-based project will pair undergrad and graduate students at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa with community elders in a set of interviews designed to document, preserve and honor their life histories. This opportunity, to tell your own story in your own words, will help train a new generation of students in respectful, ethical methods that empower the community they are engaged in.

The 3-year oral history project is designed to focus on site-specific places and document the activities and memories of kupuna/ohana with place. The Ka'ena, Mokule'ia and Hale'iwa areas will be the focus during the Spring 2018 semester. The field school will meet every Saturday from January through May 2018, with two life history interviews with community elders (1½-3 hours each) scheduled for Saturday mornings between February-March 2018 at various locations on the North Shore. 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
