

Serving You in District 2

It's been a disturbing couple of months reading and watching news reports of the disastrous flooding in East Oahu and Kauai that caused so much damage and disruption to people's lives. More recently, it's been the heartbreaking coverage of earthquakes and lava fissures that have destroyed houses and driven thousands of residents from their homes to safety from Madam Pele's fiery and spectacular show on the Big Island.

Our thoughts and prayers go out to all the victims of nature's fury. But one small piece of good news caught my eye and made me thankful that we live in such a gentle and generous place.

`Alohilani Resort held a grand opening on May 8. Just another posh beachfront property in our hustle and bustle tourist mecca of Waikiki, right? Not entirely. What really grabbed my attention was the resort's announcement and pledge to plant 100,000 native trees on Oahu and the Big Island.

It would seem almost counter-intuitive that a corporate entity so closely identified with glass and concrete structures, man-made artifices, and slick marketing campaigns would even bother to replenish the native plants and forests that our civilization has been methodically decimating for generations.

Yet soon, in partnership with the nonprofit Hawaiian Legacy Reforestation Initiative (HLRI), `Alohilani will be helping reforest with koa, milo and sandalwood trees. HLRI revives forests by allowing people to either sponsor or personally plant native trees.

Reading the article more closely revealed `Alohilani's motivation and reasoning.

As reported by the Honolulu Star-Advertiser, `Alohilani actually owns two forests, one on the Big Island and the other on the North Shore at Gunstock Ranch. The resort also intends to get its guests involved by encouraging them to plant a native legacy tree. For now, koa and sandalwood trees are being targeted for the Big Island, while milo is destined for replanting at Gunstock Ranch.

"The HLRI Legacy Forests are encouraging the return of rare and endangered wildlife," HLRI Director Jeff Dunster told the newspaper, "and we hope these pieces will bring a greater understanding of the environmental, cultural and historic significance of reforestation."

I'm fully aware that this is just one of many examples of companies giving back to the communities they serve and where they do business. But the timing of this story, amid all of the news of destruction and devastation, came as a cooling trade wind breeze on a hot and muggy day.

Sad State of Highways

It is no secret that portions of the state highways in our district are deplorable. Some of the craters – so big that the term pot hole fails to do them justice – have been truly jarring for many drivers. I needed a new tire after striking one particularly terrible crater near Waimea Bay, and many people might have needed their cars aligned after striking that spot near Police Beach. Mercifully, these two craters were finally repaired.

Lately, my office has received calls asking why the DOT was spending time and money to re-paint the lines when the overall condition of the roadway is so bad. When asked, the department responded it was to improve safety. Of course, it is hard to see how making brighter lines might improve safety when drivers are continuously getting bounced around or dodging pot holes, craters and other highway defects.

The obvious question is when these roads will be resurfaced. The DOT has a website with existing and proposed projects laid out on a map of Oahu. Click on a road label on the map and an information box opens. While this is a big improvement for looking up various projects, we find the site often lacks current information or incorrectly identifies poor road surfaces as fair.

Because it has been consistently difficult to get clear answers from the DOT when we ask specific follow up questions, we are developing our own list of roadways and projected repairs. This information and a link to the DOT site are available at SenatorRiviere. com under the District 23 tab.

Visitors to SenatorRiviere.com will notice two webpages dedicated to highways under the District 23 tab: Budgeted Highway Programs, and Problem Roadways and Bridges. The former page lists projects that are presently listed on the State Transportation Improvement Plan (STIP), a fiscally balanced, multiyear schedule of projects budgeted with federal funds. The latter page is our compilation of projects that are not yet on the STIP, or will be done through state highway funds and will not require placement on the STIP.

The City has done a great job resurfacing residential streets over the past few years, but they still need to get to the city section of Kamehameha Highway along Kaneohe Bay. Our list will include this section along with the state roadways and bridges that impact our district and are in obvious need of repair.

Two of the worst sections of roadway the DOT intends to send out to bid this year include

Kamehameha Hwy. from Kapuhi St. to Waialee, in August, and Wilikina Drive, in November. Hopefully, these targets will be met and construction will be complete within the next year or two. With our new status list of highway projects, we hope to be able to more effectively follow the various projects and relay the latest information to interested residents who have had to endure substandard roadways for much too long.

Aloha Friends and Neighbors!

As the Legislative Session and the school-year ends, I want to congratulate all our 2018 graduates for all their hard work and accomplishments. I wish you all the best of luck in your future endeavors. Continue to cherish the moments, experiences, and people who helped you reach this point in your lives, and may you have the courage to pursue your passions. Congratulations again on your achievements!

As we head into the interim, I would like to thank you for the honor and privilege of serving as your state house representative. Mahalo to many of you who have attended our town hall meetings, completed our constituent input surveys, called, emailed and used Rep-Matsumoto.com to share issues and concerns from around the community, and for being involved! We can make our community, our district, and our state better by working together.

Last month was the 6th Annual Kupuna Power Day here at the Capitol on April 12. There was cross section of 40 vendors, nonprofit organizations, and state and city agencies that came together to provide resources, insurance information, health care options and senior programs and services. Kupuna Power Day 2018 was also dedicated to honoring the late U.S. Senator Daniel Kahikina Akaka. Sen. Akaka was a dedicated statesman and champion for seniors, veterans, and all people of Hawai'i, and we thank him for all the work that he has done for us.

More than a third of Hawai'i's population is 50 years old or older, a fact that emphasizes the need to prepare our residents so that our kupuna are able to continue a high quality of life. There are many options, but two that I would like to highlight are Hawai'i Kupuna Care and the Kupuna Caregivers Program.

Kupuna Care is a state program designed to help non-Medicaid eligible, elderly residents so that they can continue living at home or in the community instead of in Medicaid paid-for, nursing home residential care. Kupuna Care assists families by providing a variety of different long-term caregiving and support services, such as adult day care, personal care, and transportation assistance. The program is available throughout the islands. The link for this website is: https://www.payingforseniorcare.com


Kupuna Caregivers Program is a new program helps employed individuals who are also caring for a loved one by providing support services that allows their loved one to remain at home while helping them to remain employed. Aimed at supporting working caregivers, Governor David Ige signed into law, HB 607 appropriating \$600,000 to the Executive Office on Aging (EOA) in July 2017. Recognizing the tremendous contributions of caregivers, the bill provides financial assis-

tance to support employed caregivers to remain in the workforce, provided certain criteria are met. EOA and the county Area Agencies on Aging are still working to develop and implement the program. Qualified caregivers must be actively providing care to a care recipient while also employed at least 30 hours a week outside the home by one or more employers. A Care Recipient is someone who:

- Is a citizen of the United States or a qualified alien
- Is 60 years of age or older
- Is not covered by any comparable governmental or private home and community-based care service, except kupuna care services
- Does not reside in a long-term care facility and
- Has impairments of at least:
 - Two activities of daily living or
 - Two instrumental activities of daily living or
 - One activity of daily living and one instrumental activity of daily living or
 - Substantive cognitive impairment requiring substantial supervision

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

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
