## Ask the Doctor!

### Q: What is Prenatal Care and Why is it Important?

**A:** Having a healthy pregnancy is one of the best ways to ensure a healthy birth. Early and regular prenatal care improves the chances of a healthy pregnancy. Prenatal care involves an initial physical exam including: screening blood work, checking maternal weight and blood pressure at all visits, listening for the fetal heart rate after 10 to 12 weeks, an ultrasound at around 20 weeks, checking fundal height after 20 weeks, and then checking progression leading to labor during the last few weeks of the pregnancy. This gives both mom and fetus the best chances for optimum health and development.

Prenatal vitamins including folic acid should be taken daily even months before the pregnancy begins to prevent growth and developmental abnormalities of the fetus, preterm labor, and maternal depression after delivery. These can either be prescribed by a health care provider or obtained over-the-counter. 400 micrograms of folic acid daily reduces the risks of neural tube defects by 70%. Most prenatal vitamins contain this recommended amount. Folic acid is also found in cereals, breads, pasta, and other grain-based foods. Although a related form called folate is present in orange juice and leafy, green vegetables, folate is not absorbed as well as folic acid.

Prenatal care also involves education between the provider and expecting parents. Careful nutrition and hydration are important to keep mom healthy and provide what baby needs for healthy development. Some dietary guidelines include minimizing foods and drinks containing saccharin (an artificial sweetener) as it is known to cross the placenta and may remain in fetal tissue leading to problems. It is important to limit consumption of caffeine as it can cause spontaneous abortion and low

birth weight. Avoid unpasteurized dairy products, raw eggs, and meat spreads as those each pose risks of infection with bacteria putting the fetus at risk. Air travel is generally safe for pregnant women up to four weeks before the due date but long flights are associated with an increased risk of clotting leading to a serious condition called a deep venous thrombosis. Some over-the-counter medications are considered safe during pregnancy for symptomatic relief such as Tylenol, Sudafed, and Claritin but many others are not safe and so this needs to be discussed with the doctor.

At least 30 minutes of moderate exercise on most days of the week is a reasonable activity level for most pregnant women but this also should be discussed with the provider as some women are at risk for preterm labor.

And finally, pregnant women should avoid activities that put them at risk for falls or abdominal injuries. Questions can be discussed and other health-promoting measures reinforced during each visit as both mom and fetus are carefully monitored and screened for signs of problems.

**Serving You in District 2**

I recently submitted the following article to the Honolulu Board of Realtors magazine. It is intended to be cautionary to all local residents because almost every neighborhood, unless protected by the covenants of a homeowners' association, is potentially a target for unscrupulous property owners and contractors. Most vulnerable, in my view are the older neighborhoods built long before planned communities entered the picture. Here is the article:

One of the more contentious issues facing the City is how to deal with the so-called "monster homes," dwellings of outlandish size that dwarf neighboring houses, decidedly not in character with the neighborhood, and typically consume more than their fair share of common elements such as public street parking.

The Council did pass Bill 110, which has since become City Ordinance 18-6. It places a two-year moratorium on approving any building permits for oversized structures in residentially zoned neighborhoods.

The ordinance also established a task force comprising government, industry and first responder representatives to advise the City's Department of Planning & Permitting on long-term solutions to the problems associated with these large houses. The task force would also provide input into the criteria that would accommodate the use of these large detached homes by multi-generational families, but not as rental properties for unrelated individuals and families.

The moratorium will be in place for a maximum of two years or until another bill can become law with more permanent regulations. The Department of Planning and Permitting estimated that the bill they are working on should be ready for review by the end of 2018.

I would strongly encourage all parts of the real estate industry to be active participants in the work of the task force and the DPP. Furthermore, when departmental hearings are scheduled on this subject, it is important the you provide direct or written testimony to ensure that the task force and the City has the benefit of the broadest input by people who understand the issue and can offer insight and expertise.

Of greater concern to me is that should we fail to reach an accommodation, it is almost certain that the State Legislature will again take up the measure and impose laws on this issue that rightfully are the jurisdiction of the counties.

# Haleiwa Local Honored During 2018 Kupu Environmental Fair

## Syd Kawahakui Jr. Receives 2018 Kupu Alumnus of the Year Award

More than 100 Hawai'i Youth Conservation Corps Summer program participants, partners and sponsors attended the 2018 Kupu Environmental Fair at Aloha Tower Marketplace June 7. Now in its ninth year, the event honored past Kupu Summer program participants and partners, including the 2018 Kupu Alumnus of the Year Syd "Syd Boy" Kawahakui Jr.

"Syd Boy has been part of our Kupu 'ohana for nearly 15 years," said Kupu CEO John Leong. "He has made a huge impact on environmental efforts on O'ahu and Kaho'olawe, and has continued to be such an inspiration to us and our program participants."

Syd Kawahakui has been a member of Protect Kaho'olawe 'Ohana for the past 18 years, serving as a kua (guide) coordinating volunteer trips to help build an Alaloa, nearshore trail system circling the island. He joined Kupu in 2004 as a Summer program team leader, and went on to work for the Division of Forestry and Wildlife as a site manager for their Makiki baseyard for the past 10 years. Kawahakui is currently training to become a firefighter, but he remains involved with conservation and volunteer efforts, inspiring, mentoring and supporting the next generation of leaders in Hawaii's green jobs workforce.

"I made it a point that no matter what I did here with the state, that I would always do my best to get them involved in our programs, and by doing that, I can leave a lasting impression," said Kawahakui. "I was supposed to

be helping this change, this huli, this introduction of all these things that I practice – aloha 'aina, malama 'aina, ho'oulu 'aina – I'm supposed to continue this practice and pass that on to the next generations of people that come."

Kawahakui was presented a la'au kui'ai (wooden poi pounder) award prior to the event, since he was unable to attend.

"Kupu strives to empower youth to become environmental stewards and community leaders. Our honorees not only serve as role models for our program participants, but their legacy also inspires and influences the next generation of environmental leaders," added Leong.

Earlier this month, my office sent out our End of Session Legislative Wrap Up that highlighted multiple bills and funding that passed the legislature to constituents of my district. We also sent out a Disaster Preparedness flyer as hurricane season is started on June 1st through November 30th, and we should all be prepared in the event of any emergency. School's out, and summer is here! Summer school is certainly a great option for kids looking to continue their academic momentum. Public schools in Hawaii are offering free summer meals (breakfast and lunch) to all children 18 years old and younger. Beginning in early June, the Seamless Summer Option began serving meals at various schools throughout the state, including Waialua Elementary School. Parents may call Waialua Elementary directly to find out specific dates and times for meal service at (808) 637-8228. SSO is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and was established to ensure that low-income children continue to receive nutritious meals during the summer. Meal recipients do not have to be enrolled summer program classes to be served. Mahalo to Waialua Elementary for participating in this program!

In addition to school, there are many other options for students looking for a summer activity that takes a different approach. Camp Mokule'ia is a historic beachfront youth camp and adult retreat. The ocean-front location, with more than  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile of beach to walk on is home to honu and the occasional monk seal. It is ideal for swimming, snorkeling, kayaking, surfing, or relaxing to the gentle lap of waves, the splendor of the rising and setting sun, or stargazing in the quiet night. Nearby, there are trails for hiking and biking, a natural area reserve and even the opportunity for skydiving, gliding, and horseback riding. Camp Mokule'ia's secluded location and attentive staff assures that your kids, students, 'ohana, company or group will enjoy rest, recreation and renewal. The YMCA's Camp Erdman on the north shore also offers a variety of options for kids this summer, including a traditional overnight camp that emphasizes personal growth through choice. ## The Missile Defense Agency to Hold Public Scoping Meetings for the Homeland Defense Radar-Hawaii Environmental Impact Statement

The Missile Defense Agency (MDA), in cooperation with the U.S. Air Force and the U.S. Army, will host public meetings to review the scope of the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the proposed Homeland Defense Radar - Hawaii at Kuaokala Ridge (adjacent to U.S. Air Force Kaena Point Satellite Tracking Station) or at one of two sites at the U.S. Army's Kahuku Training Area.

The 2017 National Defense Authorization Act requires the MDA to develop a plan to procure and field a ballistic missile defense radar for the defense of Hawaii. MDA is required to evaluate possible site locations best suited for future deployment of a radar capable of protecting the homeland against threats from nations, such as North Korea and Iran. The Ballistic Missile Defense System provides protection of the U.S. from existing missile threats. The proposed radar will provide added defense capability against evolving threats to enhance the defense of Hawaii.

The potential site locations for the radar, which will be evaluated in the EIS, are at Kuaokala Ridge on State land adjacent to the U.S. Air Force's Kaena Point Satellite Tracking Station and at the U.S. Army's Kahuku Training Area.

These locations are on the island of Oahu. Your input is important to ensure significant environmental issues, other areas of concern, and alternatives are considered in the EIS process.

The public scoping meetings will be conducted in an open house format and will provide attendees with the opportunity to talk with and ask questions of representatives from the MDA and other cooperating agencies. Additionally, you will have the opportunity to provide verbal and written official comments on the proposed project. Verbal comments will be provided one-on-one to a court reporter. The MDA will use your input to help identify environmental and other issues to be considered in completing this environmental study.

In addition to attending the meeting, the public may submit written comments until **July 23, 2018**.

### New Member Highlight: Paradise Helicopters, Turtle Bay

Jaw-dropping views of the most remote areas of the Hawaiian islands can be experienced during a ride with Paradise Helicopters ("Paradise"). "You can see the entire Kualoa Valley and views of Chinaman's Hat...you'll definitely be the only ones up there," says Daniel "Lopaka" Spielman, manager of Paradise Helicopter's Turtle Bay location, when describing the unparalleled hilltop view at Kualoa Ranch.

Paradise has earned many titles of distinction over its 21 years of serving the Hawaiian Islands. In 2016, Paradise became the first air tour company in the world to be certified by the Helicopter Association International's Accreditation Program of Safety (HAI-APS) (HAI is the largest helicopter association in the world, with more than 4,000 members.) Due to its excellent safety record, Paradise was also selected to present at the 2016 CHC Helicopter Safety and Quality Summit in British Columbia on its effective Safety Management System.

Paradise Helicopters is also the first helicopter-tour company in Hawaii to be awarded a Sustainable Tourism Certification from the non-profit Hawaii Ecotourism Association (HEA), for 2017-2018. This designation recognizes the company's "commitment to protect Hawaii's unique natural environment and host culture through the promotion of responsible travel," the HEA said. Conservation and Environmental Innovation are deeply ingrained concepts at Paradise. "We don't only do tours. We also work with Oahu environmental organizations (such as "DOFAW, Department of Forestry and Wildlife, Oahu Invasive Species Committee, both Watershed partnerships, and "OANRP", Oahu Army Natural Resources Partnership.) We assist them by transporting crewmembers and equipment to help manage the native forest, eradicate invasive plants and propagate indigenous species."

Lopaka is now busy working with new partners Gunstock Ranch and Hawaii Legacy Hardwoods. Gunstock Ranch has parceled nearly 500 acres of their property for reforestation of native Hawaiian trees. Gunstock Ranch has teamed with Hawaii Legacy Reforestation Initiative, along with transportation provided by Paradise, to allow conservation minded tourists and locals to purchase and plant a tree on Gunstock Ranch property. Lopaka explains, "The tree can be dedicated to a loved one, and each tree has a RFID tag that allows guests to go to the website, [www.Findmy.LegacyTrees.org](http://www.Findmy.LegacyTrees.org), and monitor their tree's growth." On the lower levels of the property, Gunstock Ranch is growing Milo trees and the upper levels will have koa trees. "Milo trees are the backbone of the forest," says Lilia Tollefsen, General Manager at Gunstock Ranch. Sandalwood, na'u and ohia will also be added. The types of trees being planted will change as the project moves to higher elevation. "The carbon sequestration of the new tree will help to offset the carbon produced by the helicopter ride," adds Lopaka.

Paradise offers a range of flights from 20 minutes to over two hours for the public out of its four locations in Turtle Bay, Koolina, Hilo and Kona. The 60 minute Magnum Experience tour departing Turtle Bay will take you soaring over the North Shore, Pearl Harbor, Waikiki, Makapuu, Kualoa Ranch, and more in an exact replica of Magnum, P.I.'s Chopper! Customers can request to add a landing to a tour, which allows them to land at one of two ridgeline locations for about 15-20 minutes for pictures, champagne toasts, marriage proposals, etc. Paradise calls Kualoa their "epic landing spot" because of the remarkable views at the hilltop.

Daniel Lopaka Spielman has another reason to call Paradise "home." He was born and raised on the North Shore, attending Sunset Elementary and Kahuku High. Although he began his career with Paradise on the Big Island six years ago, he was thrilled when this job became available here two years ago. His parents still live just around the corner from Turtle Bay. "It's such a blessing to have a great job on the North Shore, close to my family." Lopaka is quick to remember, "Any locals receive a 25% off Kamaaina rate!" This sounds like an adventure not to miss.

On May 20, 2018 after this article was written, Daniel Lopaka Spielman passed away due to a severe asthma attack that resulted in brain death due to lack of oxygen. He leaves behind his mother Angel and father Robert Spielman along with his sister Melani.

His life may have ended early, but he lived it to the fullest. He traveled the world finding friends and loved ones including his beloved Aunt Lise. Wherever Daniel went, he was always proud of his island home and would share his "Aloha" with everyone.

Daniel was a generous person and gave the greatest gift anyone can give, his life. He was able to give his liver and both kidneys. We are sending prayers, well wishes and good energy to those recipients and hope they will live a long and happy life.

# Fruit From Here and There and Everywhere

A fruit is tied to, (not exclusively), flowering plants or angiosperms. It is known as a seed bearing structure formed from the ovary of the plant after flowering. It is a fleshy and sometimes flavorful or sweet outer layer (pericarp) of a seed. Hawai'i nei is located in the humid sub-tropics, which is essentially a fruit paradise, the climate provides a wonderful habitat for trees to thrive and allows humans the opportunity to enjoy an abundance of fruit diversity. Most food flavorings that we know today have a fruity ancestor, from brilliant reds and oranges to dark greens and black, fruit colors and flavors can seldom be rivaled.

In nature, fruits attract animals whose foraging activities disperse the seed(s) within. A well-known example of this is a mango. A mango tree produces a large seed covered with a delicious outer layer. An animal eats the fruit removes the outer layer, and sets the seed (often times in a cool shady spot away from the mother tree) ready to sprout and grow!

Humans disperse fruit seeds on a massive scale. With human action, fruits and seeds are moved across continents and oceans. They can be cultivated far and wide outside of the fruit's natural or native habitat. The story of John Chapman, more well-known as "Johnny Appleseed", is a great example of animals spreading seeds and fruit far beyond the natural range of the tree. Unfortunately, native habitats may be ill-prepared for potential invasions. In our Hawaiian home, we have seen that guava, coffee, and others can hinder the growth of our native species that leads to environmental effects like erosion and the smothering of our reefs, and habitat loss for native insect species.

It may come as a surprise that in old Hawai'i large, fleshy, delicious fruits were nearly non-existent. With the exception of a few (somewhat bland) fruits such as Haha (*Cyanea* sp.), Mamaki (*Pipturus* sp.), 'Akala (*Rubus* sp.), and ohelo (*Vaccinium* sp.). Kanaka maoli relied on few truly native fruit. Polynesian introductions included only a few staple fruits such as 'ulu (breadfruit), niu (coconut), and 'ohia'ai (mountain apple). The rest of the commonly-known fruits around Hawai'i are very recent, post-contact introductions.

With heavy reliance on Hawai'i as a trade route and key military location over the last two centuries, many new fruit introductions have been made. The tropical fruits that we are accustomed to now, share similar stories of arrival. Without the far reach of humans, these iconic fruits would not be found in the Hawaiian islands: mango, litchi, avocado, macadamia, soursop, jackfruit, citrus, papaya, tropical almond, tamarind, Surinam cherry, figs, pomegranates, java plum, wi, and rose apple all of which have made Hawai'i their permanent residence. A

few of these foreign fruit species have come to the islands and created entire industries around them (Mauna Loa Macadamia, Kona coffee, pineapple, the Hilo lychee).

Litchi chinensis (Lychee, litchi, lihzi) was imported from China in 1875 by a Honolulu merchant Mr. Ching-Chock. The tree was planted on the property of Mr. Chun Afong on the corner of Nu'uuanu and School Street. Happily growing in this location it was known locally as the "Afong tree". Some years later it was thought to be the Chinese variety of lychee called 'kwai mei' but later identified as 'Tai tso'. Many fruit trees come to the humid subtropics and thrive, others that are environmentally sensitive, such as lychee, have been improved with the hard work of horticulturist. Since the coming of the first lychee tree, we now have many "low chill" varieties which are much more suited for our local climate. Some of these improved Hawaiian varieties are 'Groff' and 'Kaimana' which are very sought after for their tolerance to no chill as well as harvest time. There is a similar story with most of the other fruit mentioned above. It is a true wonder that we have the ability to grow such abundance year around here in Hawai'i.

Everyone can agree that this lychee season and most other fruit seasons can be very abundant and even overwhelming. What is one to do with such an overabundance of fruit? Everyone loves the neighbor that gives us bags of fruit, but often times we are stuck not using the fruit that we have. There are many ways to utilize all of the fruit that is around. Depending on the fruit that you have, you may want to try freezing, dehydrating, making a puree, selling, or just going out of your way to give friends and family that perfect fruit!

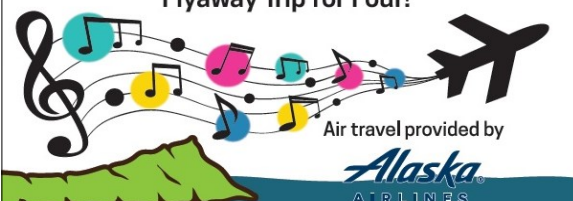

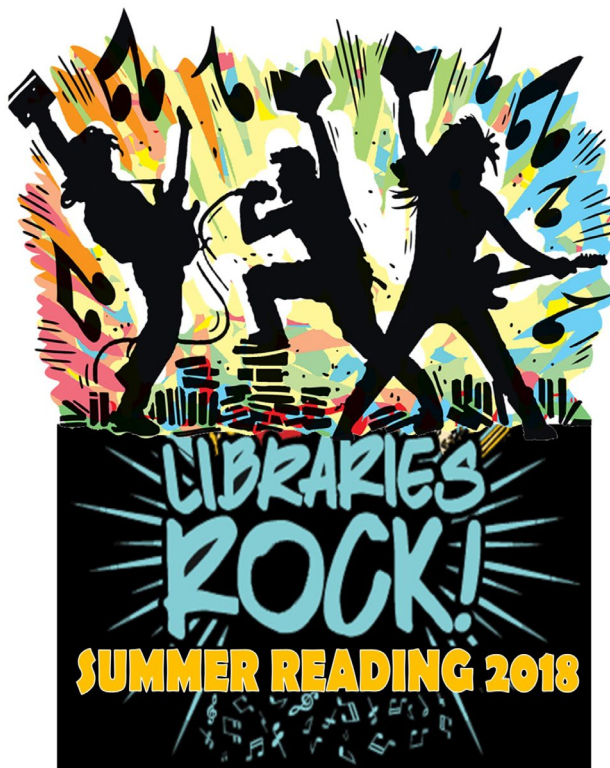

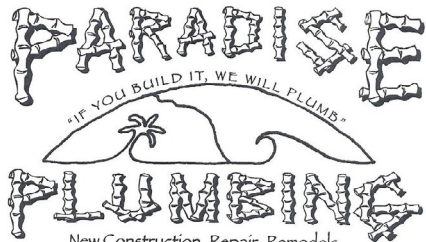
