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Ask the Doctor!

Q: How does the new sunscreen law change how I can avoid getting sunburned?

A: One of the wonderful aspects of living or visiting Hawaii is our tropical weather. Sunlight is essential for our bodies to make vitamin D which is important for bone (and mental) health. However, like most things, some is good and too much can be harmful. Too much sun has been associated with sunburn, photoaging and skin cancer.

You may have heard that Hawaii recently banned certain sunscreens that have ingredients that are felt to be harmful to our beautiful coral reefs. This includes oxybenzone and actinoxate. This doesn't mean we have to stop using sunscreen all together! As long as you have skin...you need to protect it from the harmful UV rays! I have the opportunity to see people from all over the world who come to feel the aloha spirit. One of the fastest ways to ruin a Hawaiian vacation is to get sunburned. However, it's not just tourists who get sunburned.

There are still many sunscreen options. Use SPF >30 or higher and ensure it is water-resistant. The amount and timing is important and we often under-apply sunscreen.

Follow the "teaspoon rule". Use 1 teaspoon of sunscreen to the face and neck area, 2 teaspoons on the front and back torso, 1 teaspoon for each arm and 2 teaspoons for each leg. Apply at least 15-30 minutes before sun exposure and reapply every 2 hours.

Another very effective and safe option is the use of sun-protective clothing with fabrics classified as UPF 25-39 for very good protection and 40-50 for excellent protection.

A couple of years ago, I wrote a column during one of rail's ongoing financial crises that it was time for the private sector to step up to the plate and put some of their "skin in the game." Public funding alone will not cover the construction and operating costs of the system.

The federal government's private sector watchdog over the project said in its June 2018 report that while the Honolulu Authority for Rapid Transportation (HART) seems to have contained the project's wildly fluctuating construction costs, it's still forecast to be \$134 million short. The report also sets back the start of service date to 2026.

The Legislature last year extended the City's halfpercent surcharge on the General Excise Tax (GET) through 2030, but that was also taken into account by the consultant.

To his credit, Mayor Kirk Caldwell fingered the \$134 million shortfall as a concern after his review of the report by Jacobs Engineering, and said the public has been promised a 20-mile, 21-station system and that is what needs to be built.

Another reason to stick with the original plan: if the rail project makes any significant changes to the plan that's in place, it could trigger the need for another time-consuming Environmental Impact Statement.

My point back in 2016 was that landowners, developers and businesses who stand to benefit the most from rail need to get into the game in a serious way. Under a P3 (public-private partnership) contract, the private sector could complete the final portion of the project and realize some benefits. The City, through HART, could even grant incentives and zoning exemptions that would enable the P3 contractor to recoup its investment in a relatively short time.

HART's own consultant said a P3 for the last 4.1 miles would be beneficial and the contract would include construction of the Pearl Highlands Garage and Transit Center as well as long-term operations and maintenance.

HART noted at least four teams are preparing proposals for a Design-Build-Finance-Operate-Maintain (DBFOM) contract, with possibly more interest once word gets out. In HART's view, this is a global best practices approach for large public works projects.

That's encouraging, but the terms of the contract and the degree to which each partner fulfills his role is key. Either way, we must deliver the rail system that was promised to the people.

Hints of action at Laniakea?

The number one quality of life issue for much of our North Shore ohana is the lack of progress regarding the daily traffic jams at Laniakea. Barely a day passes when I do not talk about Laniakea traffic with a frustrated resident. Readers of this column have probably noticed this subject is also the most recurring topic.

There are two issues, one is short term relief, and the other is long term design. Both projects are mired in the slow-moving world of the Department of Transportation and other government bureaucracy.

In December 2013, the DOT installed the parking barriers as a temporary measure. A year and a half later, the court noticed that no effort had been made by DOT to secure the necessary permits for permanent installation, and further, that parking and public beach access should not be blocked without justification. DOT announced they should be able to secure the permits in 3-6 months. The barriers were removed three years ago.

Rather than complete the Special Management Area Permit needed for barrier installation, DOT is trying a different tactic. They are seeking approval of a shoreline certification survey that indicates the highway and the parking area are all within the shoreline. With this determination, they hope to be exempt from the SMA process and get to quicker approval for barrier replacement. We shall see.

The group that brought the legal challenge to hold DOT accountable to the permitting process have received plenty of grief. It is important to note that they have been willing to support barrier replacement, provided that some accommodation is made for parking and beach access. Unfortunately, the State DOT and City Parks Department have not shown much interest or commitment to working this option out.

Not long ago, DOT held a pair of meetings for residents on either side of Laniakea to seek their input on the latest realignment plan. I attended both meetings to listen to their comments regarding how access to their homes could be impacted. I have since learned that not all affected residents were aware or invited to the meeting.

Years ago, when the last Laniakea Realignment Task Force meeting was held, DOT was considering four realignment variations. Based on topography and archaeological considerations, they have narrowed the preferred route to the most mauka

option. This plan would see the road begin to curve about 10 houses before the existing Laniakea bridge, curve behind the city beach park land, continue on the old cane haul road and connect back to the existing roadway behind Chun's Reef at Ashley Rd.

The planners seem engaged and are waiting on a determination from the State Historic Preservation Division on whether more extensive archaeological work is needed. I am pleased to know that, finally, work is being done on the alternatives study. It could happen this year, but I am not yet holding my breath.

Aloha Friends and Neighbors!

Last session, I introduced a resolution to designate March 2018 as Bleeding Disorders Awareness month and had the opportunity to have two of my constituents, a father and son, discuss hemophilia on Live at the Legislature, an Olelo produced show that was filmed live at the Capitol.

Hemophilia, the most well-known bleeding disorder, is a rare genetic condition affecting approximately 20,000 people in the US. People with hemophilia are missing or deficient in a protein that makes their blood clot; as a result, they can spontaneously bleed into muscles and joints, which can result in long-term joint damage and chronic pain. If untreated, some bleeds can result in serious injury or death. Hemophilia is treated by directly infusing medicine containing the missing protein directly into the person's vein, sometimes as often as every other day, depending on severity. There is no cure for hemophilia, and it is a lifelong genetic disorder.

Von Willebrands (vWD) is the most common bleeding disorder, affecting 1-3% of the population, yet the most undiagnosed due to the difficulty of diagnosis. They do also bleed into the joints, but most commonly bleed in the soft tissues, i.e. nosebleeds or heavy periods. Both conditions cause very debilitating situations to the quality of life without proper treatment and support.

"Bleeding disorders are so rare, so we want to make sure that every person in Hawaii who is affected knows that they can come to us for education and support," says Donald "Ziggy" Douglas, executive director of the Hawaii Chapter of NHF, a not for profit organization that provides promoting awareness as well as education, advocacy programming. Also helping with direct financial support to families to help defray the costs of medical expenses incurred in the care and treatment of bleeding disorders.

"We have a family camp for people with bleeding disorders where they can get together, do some fun activities safely, and learn more about how to infuse and manage their disorder," says Ziggy. "But most importantly, they get the emotional peer to peer support that you can only get from people who are living with the same condition." The chapter also focus' on the youth with a teen summit event, that helps the youth receive education on their condition, the transition of care and personal advocacy from their parents to themselves.

"We raise awareness for voices that are not heard,"

is part of the mission statement of the Hawaii Chapter of the National Hemophilia Foundation. On August 4, 2018, in Magic Island – Ala Moana Regional Park in Honolulu, HI, those voices will be amplified at the Unite for Bleeding Disorders Walk, hosted by the Hawaii Chapter of the National Hemophilia Foundation.

The walk, which kicks off at 9:00am, is open to everyone who registers at www.uniteforbleedingdisorders.com. The funds raised by the walk will go to programs and services for the 40 families affected by bleeding disorders such as hemophilia and von Willebrand disease (VWD) living the in the Hawaiian Islands.

Funds raised by the Unite for Bleeding Disorders Walk will go directly to support these programs. Ziggy is hoping that more than 100 will come to the walk to support the organization. In addition to the walk, there will be music, and keiki activities. Walk up registration will be available, but to register as a walker or create your own walk team, you can register at www.UnitedforBleedingDisorders.org/event/Hawaii or contact the chapter directly at (808) 782-5506, www.HawaiiNHF.org. Local sponsorships also still available.



MANU O KE KAI CANOE CLUB LAUNCHING IT'S KOA CANOE



To get a piece of koa that is the length of a canoe is hard enough and it's a bigger job to get the specs correct in order to race it. Koa canoes must have perfect, intricate, measurements designated by race organization experts, down to an eighth of an inch, even a sixteenth of an inch. The club is working at it again and hopes to be able to race it in states this season. The canoe now sits at Ben Wilkinson's shop. Wilkinson is a big wave surfer and big wood salvage master craftsman and has paddled canoe. He offered his assistance to make the canoe great again and the club has come together to make it happen. Native Hawaiian Plant Coastal Restoration Project at Shark's Cove

On June 30, more than 60 Hawaiian Electric employees and their families volunteered to malama the environment by partnering with Malama Pupukea-Waimea (MPW) on their Native Hawaiian Plant Coastal Restoration Project at Shark's Cove. North Shore O'ahu. In less than two hours, the volunteers placed 500 native plants into the ground and removed more than 300 pounds of invasive weeds and shrubs. The group's quick work allowed them to also do an impromptu beach cleanup which resulted in removing about 50 pounds of trash and marine debris from the shoreline. The community workday is one of several programs offered by MPW to engage community and government partners in their efforts to replenish and sustain the natural and cultural resources of the Pupukea and Waimea ahupua'a for present and future generations.




