

Resources for New and Small Farms

There are more farms operating in Hawaii today than there were 20 years ago, when some people prematurely declared agriculture dead. The current number of farms in Hawaii is 7000, as compared to 5500 in 1997.

Fresh, local food production is rebounding, but still far below where it can and should be. Farmer's markets make up a small percentage of local food sales, and various restaurants buy fresh local food, too; but a real game changer will come when school lunches are mostly sourced from Hawaii grown food.

The school lunch program is, effectively, the largest restaurant in the state. The potential to provide local produce, meat, poultry, milk, and fruit to our school children is huge for our local agriculture enterprises. In the last couple years, regulatory barriers and bureaucracy have been reduced to support this goal of scaling up purchases as local production increases.

More land is available for farming since the end of the plantation era, albeit the race is on to save quality lands from speculators and developers. The State of Hawaii recently purchased hundreds of acres of former Dole land in order to preserve them from development pressures and to ensure long term availability and affordability for farming.

Nobody says it is easy to survive and prosper in agriculture, but potential farmers now have planning tools and supporting expertise like never before. The University of Hawaii College of Tropical Agriculture has long been a resource for crop research and agricultural support. What is new are the business planning, hands on experiences and careful mentoring for new farmers, and organizations that help small farmers partner to meet modern regulatory hurdles.

I recently toured the Go Farm Hawaii, Waialua Station, and was impressed with how they are coaching up new farming enthusiasts. Go Farm provides increasingly intensive education to anyone interested in becoming a farmer or improving their business model. The education begins with a twohour seminar called Ag Curious, then continues with Ag Exposure over four Saturdays to teach about the lifestyle and knowledge needed to succeed. Interested participants then graduate to Ag School, a four-month program requiring one evening and one weekend day working on the land.

Students who are still interested in farming after

Ag School then move on to Ag Pro, a six month, minimum twice weekly, program, Ag Incubator, a proof of business plan and crop production test for up to three years, and then Ag Business, an intensive, one on one consulting service to help guide the business forward as an agricultural producer. The North Shore Economic Vitality Partnership (NSEVP), is a partnership designed to support small farmers succeed and meet the regulatory requirements of the Food Safety Modernization Act by providing programs for Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) and record keeping, building food hubs, and connecting farmers with additional markets. If you have any suggestions or concerns that are important to you, please feel free to share them with me so that we can work together for the betterment of our community! If you have not received a survey and live in District 45, please contact my office at (808) 586-9490 for assistance.

With the new year, comes new laws that passed in the Regular Session of 2018, and many laws also went into effect this earlier in the summer as well. For a full list of laws that have passed that you can view online, please visit the Hawaii Legislative Reference Bureau's (LRB) website at lrbhawaii.org or give them a call at 587-0690. You may also reach the LRB via email at lrb@capitol.hawaii.gov should you need any assistance researching the new laws.

Last year, the legislature appropriated funds to the Department of Human Services for the Coordinated Statewide Homeless Initiative. This is one of the major issues we've been working on resolving as a state. Another example of a bill that was signed into law that will take effect on January 1, 2019 is the establishment of a civil penalty for knowingly misrepresenting an animal as a service animal; this act conforms Hawaii law with the definition of "service animal" under the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.

The 2019 Legislative Session will convene on January 16, 2019, and the public is welcome to the ceremony on a first come, first served basis. Legislative offices will be open to greet you in the morning after the opening day ceremony. The Hawaii State Legislature website (Capitol.Hawaii.Gov) was recently updated for the 2019 Session - if you're looking for information from the previous Session, visit the "Archives" page. To get there, scroll to the bottom left side of the main page, then click on "Archives". You can find information dating back to the 1999 Session. Now is also a great time to register to automatically receive information from the Hawaii State Legislature or update your preferences if you already have an account. As I mentioned in the previous issue, you can create personalized measure tracking lists, submit testimony online, and receive hearing notice notifications by email once you have an account at Capitol.Hawaii.Gov, and if you needed any assistance feel free to give my office a call!



The North Shore Christmas, 100 years ago By Captain Rick Rogers

The Holiday Season of 1918 was quite a festive time on the North Shore. Our troops and Red Cross volunteers were returning from the Great War in Europe. The OR&L Railroad connected Waialua to Honolulu on a daily basis. Tourists filled the Haleiwa Hotel, where some were to be found lounging on the beach, paddling up the river, or enjoying the shooting sports mauka. A large Christmas tree had been shipped in from San Francisco on the same steamship that brought most of the visitors to the islands, a week earlier. The kitchen staff was preparing a traditional holiday feast of locally grown turkey, sweet potatoes, rice, fresh fish and recently pounded poi.

The arch fronting Liliuokalani Church was wrapped with flowers, paper ornaments and candles. The Japanese Christian Church, near the Waialua Plantation Offices was diverting parishioners from both the Waialua and Haleiwa Honganji Missions, as was the Korean Christian Church, near the recently shuttered St. Michaels Catholic Church.

The most brightly decorated home was that of Albert Andrew Wilson, Manager of Waialua Water Company. Houses occupied by the German engineers

and other Europeans in Haole Camp had traditional trappings as well.

Gifts were exchanged between neighbors and neighborhoods while the Plantation sponsored a caroling contest in the park.

It was a truly wonderful Christmas, with prospects for a Very Happy New year of 1919.

LAU WINS WORLD CUP FOR SECOND TIME

Honolulu's Ezekiel Lau claimed a victory at the World Surf League, Vans World Cup, which is the last event of the QS, Qualifying Series. The finals we're held in extreme conditions topping the 12 foot range and Lau handled it well with great wave selection and calm within the storm of waves. Lau won the event in 2013 also so this is guite an accomplishment! He defeated an international field of 128 top surfers and now is in contention for a Vans Triple Crown Champion title! "This is everything," said Lau. "For me to perform at home in front of my home crowd and represent, it feels amazing. That's why I like to come and perform at home, for everyone that supports me and puts so much time into what I do. I'm glad I was able to return the favor today. In my mind I already put myself in the Final so I just kept my composure and kept my focus and I'm glad I came out with a win." The final was not the best as close out sets poured into Sunset one after the other and white washed the whole field. Lau was able to get a score early, a 7.33 out of ten. Lau beat out Brazil champion Jesse Mendes for the win but it was not even close by scores. This event was important because it was the last event that could qualify surfers to be on the elite World Tour, WCT. See the results below, the top ten qualify and Mendes was the last qualifier.

Like last year they all got caught inside right away. Jet skis were lost and turned into rubble and a few of the ladies did not recover to get waves. Jaws was clamping down and few waves were ridden through. Kennelly took off on some giant waves dropping and skidding into the abyss but not getting hurt and then doing it again with abandon. The 40 year old Kennelly did not hold back. Maui's Andrea Moller was runner up and the North Shore's Emily Erickson was so close but ended up in 3rd place. Erickson was able to find a spot and finish a few waves during the event which was keen. Afterwards the men went out and Jaws got bigger and bigger and they postponed due to danger-

ous surf. It was a crazy morning! A giant congrats to Keala Kennelly for the win and for pushing Women's big wave surfing once again!

Sex Trafficking – Not in Our Community, Right? Wrong! Sex trafficking is a growing business in Hawaii because sex traffickers respond to the demands of sex buyers and the demand keeps growing. A recent report put out by the Hawai'i State Commission on the Status of Women in September of 2018 found that in Hawaii one in eleven men over the age of 18 responded to the sex trafficking site, "Oahu Backpage.com". While it does not mean that one in eleven men are sex buyers, it is still alarming. There was one response every 24 hours with 407 contacts, more than any other city in the U.S. Hawaii has a big problem and our rural North Shore is not immune to this.

The state's location and its popularity with tourists make it the ideal trafficking corridor. One generally hears of women and children being trafficked, but it's a fact that men can also be victims of this crime. The impact to a community such as ours can be devastating to victims, family and community alike. Victims can often be society's most marginalized members and it's up to neighbors and friends to look out for one another. Citizen reporting is of



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


