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A recent column in our largest newspaper placed blame on the City Council for the not resolving monster homes problem in our neighborhoods. That couldn't be more wrong.

For the record, the City Council is not the problem. Arguably, we're the only ones trying to put more tools in the hands of enforcement agencies and more bite into our laws.

Even if the City Council passes new bills, it is not the enforcement agency. That falls to the City Administration. But since the responsible agencies appear apprehensive about enforcing current laws, the Council is stepping up and taking the initiative through Bills 50, 53 and 60.

• Bill 50 creates additional penalties for dwellings that don't comply with the Council's recently passed moratorium on building permits for large detached structures in residential districts.

• Bill 53, CD1 amends the City Building Code to strengthen enforcement provisions for structures built or altered without proper permits.

• Bill 60 explicitly makes disobeying a stop work order due to a violation punishable by a fine up to \$2,000 or by imprisonment for up to a year or both.

But my real point to the author of the column is this: The ability to force compliance and severely punish violators, including ordering the demolition of illegally built units, already exists in current ordinance. It requires only that the Department of Planning & Permitting and the Corporation Counsel jointly elevate enforcement of these laws to the highest levels.

The Council would be largely supportive if these agencies reordered their departmental priorities and personnel to aggressively identify and prosecute these scofflaws in our neighborhoods.

In my estimation, if the City Administration came forward with some truly robust proposals of its own, it would find an audience at the Honolulu City Council.

Mahalo to those of you who have RSVP'd for our Capitol Talk & Tour! If you still want to attend it's not too late! Everyone is invited to join us on Wednesday, October 10th, to our Capitol Talk & Tour from 10 am - 12 pm. At this event, I will be sharing history and interesting facts about our state capitol, discussing how you can get involved in our legislative process, and end the day with light refreshments and a talk story session. The Capitol Talk & Tour event is for all ages and during fall break, so please feel free to bring your keiki and kupuna! On my website, you'll find information about parking locations around the capitol district.

Additionally, there has been growing concern regarding the illegal dumping in our community. The benefits of regular bulky item pickup are huge for our neighborhoods, resulting in Oahu's streets and sidewalks being clutter-free and safe, and we believe this will significantly reduce illegal dumping. This, however, is only possible if everyone contributes their fair share of cooperation, as everyone must responsibly adhere to the schedule by placing items at the curb only on designated days. It is illegal to place items at the curb on any days other than the specified collection day or in area(s) other than that fronting your property; our refuse and recyclables are collected curbside weekly, while bulky items are collected monthly. For our sector in Waialua, bulky item pickup is on the 2nd Wednesday of every month. If the schedule is not convenient for you, please visit your nearest dump and/or drop-off center, or contact organizations such as Goodwill and Salvation Army if the items are still in good, usable condition. Please take the time to know the schedules and dispose of items properly by visiting the website the Department of Environmental Services at Opala.org.

If you witness someone illegally dumping items on your property, call 911 immediately and file a police report. This is our home, our island, our responsibility to care for its health and beauty. The City provides for free collection of bulky items, such as furniture, appliances, and mattresses.

Another issue that has been raised is the increase of abandoned/derelict vehicles on our public roadways. A vehicle is deemed abandoned if it is unlawfully parked on a public highway or if it is left unattended on the public and private property, for more than a day or 24 hours. If you see an issue that needs to be addressed, report it to my office, your city council member, or the police with the specifics of your report including exact location of the vehicle and possible landmarks. In addition to the location of the vehicle, please include the following information:

- Make, model, and color of the vehicle

- License plate number

- Describe whether the vehicle is still complete or already junked. (no wheels and other parts)

- The number of days, weeks or months it has been in the vicinity.

The police will go to the place of the abandoned vehicle and will put a notice to the owner to move the vehicle within a day. If the owner removes it, there will be no charges, and there will be no report. If the vehicle remains unmoved within the next 24 hours, however, it will be considered abandoned, and the Abandoned Vehicle Coordinator can contact the towing companies to remove the car. You may also report an abandoned or derelict vehicle on our website by clicking on the "Report an Issue" button on RepMatsumoto.com, and we'll handle the reporting for you!

"Seafood & A Sunset" Fundraiser Hosted by Malama Loko Ea Foundation

"Seafood & A Sunset" is a fundraiser hosted by Malama Loko Ea Foundation from 4:30-8:00pm on Sept. 29 on the private grounds of Pua'ena Point Beach and the historic Haleiwa Airstrip. The event will include great food, entertainment, and a silent auction. Individual tickets are \$125 each, and may be obtained by emailing Rowena@lokoea.org or Doreen@lokoea.org. After more than nine years of volunteer workdays, fundraisers, and community and corporate financial support, fully restoring the Loko Ea fishpond is coming closer to reality. All proceeds from Seafood & A Sunset will go directly toward the organization's capital campaign to purchase specialty dredge equipment necessary for the final step toward bringing Loko Ea back to the healthy ecosystem it once was. The foundation has identified the specific equipment for purchase and has raised \$92,000 so far toward the \$250,000 required. The goal is to purchase the dredge equipment by Nov. 1.

According to Executive Director Rae DeCoito, "This will be the first machine of its kind in this state and will enable Loko Ea to be the first fishpond to be dredged and fully functional."

Many people don't know what's behind the gate leading to Loko Ea, located behind Haleiwa Beach House. However, if you venture onto the property, says DeCoito, "Loko Ea speaks for itself. She's considered the jewel of the North Shore. It's an amazing healing place."

The mission of Malama Loko Ea Foundation is "to perpetuate the native Hawaiian culture through education, land stewardship, and community building, while sustainably restoring our precious natural resources." Toward this end, the educational programs and once-a-month volunteer workdays merge native Hawaiian traditional and contemporary practices. The foundation hosts 150 educational field trips annually, and that number is growing. The goal of the community workdays is to encourage community volunteers and students to reconnect with the land, and to one another through education and stewardship.

Anyone interested in helping to restore Loko Ea is welcome to participate in the monthly workdays

held on the third Saturday beginning with 8:45 am registration and orientation. Volunteers under 12 must be accompanied by an adult. All minors are required to have signed parental consent. Participants should bring: clothes that can get wet and muddy; a hat or visor; sunscreen and sunglasses; closed toe shoes; a refillable water bottle; and a re-usable mess kit including plate and fork. Lunch is provided. Contact 808-637-3232 for more information.

Waialua Library Featured in Honolulu Magazine

Did you know that last year, nearly 6 million books circulated among more than 946,000 registered Hawaii library cardholders, and librarians answered nearly 1.3 million questions? As the website says, "You have questions. We have answers. We're librarians. (It's what we do.)"

This month, Honolulu Magazine ran a wonderful piece on the Hawaii Public Library System and featured our own Waialua Library. Here's an excerpt:

Tim Littlejohn has been the Waialua Librarian for 21 years. Built in 1927 to serve the plantation community, the 3,000-square foot library is the smallest on Oahu and the second oldest on the island. Littlejohn bursts with pride for his patrons, staff and community partners. "We have the best community," he says. He helps farmers research soil contamination, beachcombers track the history of a glass ball and nurtures a growing interest in genealogy...

In 1997, the Public Library Association named Waialua Library the "Best Small/Rural Library in America."

Waialua children's librarian Holly Braffet draws a packed house of more than 50 at Saturday storytime at Waialua, with parents and grandparents coming along. "People are rediscovering the value of books," says Braffet and the library offers book clubs, writing clubs and an encouraging place to drop by...

Events can turn out great for more than the kids, Littlejohn recalls two single parents who met through Saturday storytime. He says the man eventually asked him to help propose by showing the woman a book where the man tore out the pages to hide the ring. Littlejohn agreed to help, she said yes and the two married. But Littlejohn confesses that, in true librarian fashion, he couldn't help asking the man: "Why are the pages missing?"

Laniakea Beach Traffic : With UH Engineer Professor Panos Prevedouros

Special mahalo to UH Professor Panos Prevedorous and three UH students for dialogue on September 8, 2018 at the Sunset Beach School Cafeteria.

Traffic congestion is worsening on this 2-lane Kamehameha Highway. The tourism count reached 9.4 million last year and the Hawaii Tourism Authority is campaigning for more, with no thought for any "carrying capacity" threshold or the quality of life for local residents.

Frustrated residents have seen concierge and activity desks in Waikiki telling the tourists attractions that are actually off limits to tour companies, like Laniakea Beach.

While all recognized that solutions were not immediate, it was refreshing to have candid discussions about what could work and what could not from an experienced civil engineer like Prof Panos.

State Representative Sean Quinlan also provided some background history to the various ongoing efforts and suggestions with State entities.

Laura Figueroa and Antya Miller shared their viewpoints on re-installing the cement aprons as part of the solutions.

Lulu Esquivel asked about "Rest Days" like that of Haunama Bay, stoplights and crosswalks.

Flo and Bobby Robinson tried to explain that, " adding more tourist stops to the north shore area was like building another Waikiki. They stated that some had already tried to build hotels or hotel-like buildings. They opined that tourist and related type businesses have already affected Sharks Cove, 3 tables, Waimea Bay. "

They felt like these areas were cloaked as "sanctuaries" but there were impacts on fishing, diving, local family outings and traffic. They felt that Laniakea Beach and Chun's Reef would become such.

Another local resident Steve Cook, with architectural and engineering background, suggested the idea of limiting access to the beach by implementing a marine life protection zone. Then reinstall the barriers with just two openings and a sign indicating parking area. Additionally the Hawaiian tourist authority needs to announce through all media methods and publications that Laniakea is a restricted beach, off limits to all tourist traffic."

Other discussions include access to the beach, asking the city and county to step up, seeking federal assistance, and exploring other alternatives. There were concerns about plans to build a bypass through By Choon James

the Kawailoa Ranch affecting important Hawaiian cultural sites.

The consensus was to see the contents in the State's final study to be completed shortly. Prof. Panos suggested that the public would then have printed information to digest and opine towards long and short-term solutions.

Residents also resolved to carry on their "civil disobedience" activities to highlight Laniakea issues.

FORECAST NOT LOOKING THE BEST FOR EARLY BIG WAVES

You have probably heard about El Nino this year. The official NOAA forecast is for 60% chance of El

Nino forming by December. That is not the best news, that is "iffy," says forecaster Pat Caldwell. Gary Kewley from Surf News Network also says it will be slow in the beginning of October. So far there are none of the typical precursors like typhoons in the west Pacific or storms near Alaska. That means odds for Oct-Nov are just the average odds of any year. Maybe some small swells and one episode of 20 plus and a few 18 foot days. "Ma Nature makes the call," says Caldwell. We are hoping for the best winter ever!

HIKIANALIA IN CALIFORNIA FOR

Hikianalia. Hawaii's sister canoe to the Hokulea made landfall at Half Moon Bay on Sept. 10 after sailing approximately 2,800-miles over 23 days. A 13-person crew demonstrated the important relationship between humanity and the natural environment as they navigated their way by the stars from Hawaii to California using cues from nature, rather than a GPS. The ship is wind and solar-powered and built by the "Okeanos Foundation for the Sea". The name is the Hawaiian name for the star Spica. The crew arrived just in time for the Global Climate Action Summit in September. Nainoa Thompson and Hikianalia captain and navigator Lehua Kamalu delivered a message about the importance of caring for the oceans. The voyagers received a standing ovation from the audience! Picture it!Congratulations to the entire crew! Although California Governor Jerry Brown was unable to attend the ceremony, he presented a proclamation, which was delivered by representatives from his office, recognizing the California Voyage and its mission.


