On April 17, 2019, the Honolulu unanimously adopted a bill that would increase the real property tax exemption for tax payers. Two weeks later the mayor vetoed a bill that would save tax payers a little bit of money. Typical.

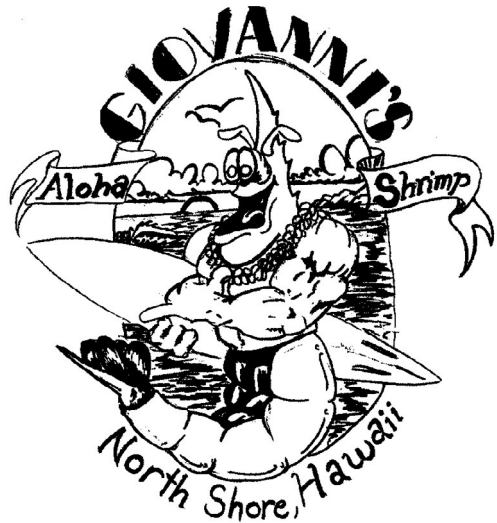
In a show of unity, the council overrode the veto with another unanimous vote in favor of the property tax saving. Bill 3 (2019), which will increase the real property tax exemption from \$80,000 to \$100,000 for homeowners and \$120,000 to \$140,000 for senior home owners on their primary residence. The resulting savings would be approximately \$70, a small drop in the bucket in comparison to the increased property valuations many homeowners face.

While some councilmembers expressed their concerns with how the increased exemptions would impact future budgets, I believe they saw the merit in looking out for the taxpayer who, for at least eight consecutive years, have seen their property valuations increase resulting in an increase property tax assessment. While to some homeowners an increased property valuation is seen as a benefit, for many looking to age in place, consistent increases are detrimental to their future in the community.

I am extremely proud of us as a council for recognizing the struggle many of our constituents face on a day-to-day basis. If we can provide them even the smallest bit of relief without having a substantial impact on our budgeting, I believe we owe that to our communities. As I mentioned during the veto override meeting, since 2013 the operating budget has increased by over \$500 million, reflecting an increase in available funds. My position from the introduction of this bill is that taxpayers face higher and higher property tax liabilities, the City enjoys an increase in property tax revenue and those essentially, "footing the bill," are left with nothing.

At the end of the day, I am appreciative of my colleagues joining me in taking a stand for those who elected us. While a small dollar amount, it speaks volumes to our commitment to ensuring our constituents are able to continue living in the place they call home.

Capital Improvement Program

The state budget expanded by an unprecedented \$1.2 billion this year. State expenditures will increase from \$14.4 billion to \$15.6 billion, an impressive 8 percent gain, in the next fiscal year. Included in the new budget is debt service on \$2.7 billion in new funding for this year's statewide Capital Improvement Program.

Our senate district is easily the largest on Oahu, stretching from Kaneohe Bay to Kaena Point, through Schofield Barracks and Poamoho Camp to Kunia Camp. Of the nearly 300 public schools statewide, our children attend three public high schools, two intermediate schools and 15 elementary schools. We also have large tracts of state watershed, conservation and agricultural lands. Here is the list of recently approved funding for Senate District 23.

- Kahuku Medical Center - \$1.5 million for renovations
- Kahuku HIS - \$4.5 million to address athletic field flooding
- Waiialua HIS - \$500,000 for planning a STEM Innovation Center
- Castle High - \$300,000 for stadium lighting
- Castle High - \$402,000 for parking and site improvements
- Kahaluu El - \$486,000 for fire alarm and site improvements
- Kahuku Agricultural Park - \$1.7 million for site improvements
- Kunia - \$1.0 million for development of new water source
- Kaena - \$22,000 for repairs of the predator proof fence
- Malaekahana - \$1.5 million for state park improvements
- Watershed Protection - \$6.583 million statewide
- Na Ala Hele - \$450,000 for updating state trails and planning
- Kamehameha Hwy - \$6.0 million for Laieloa Stream Bridge
- Kamehameha Hwy - \$4.0 million for Waiahole Stream Bridge

This is the partial list of new appropriations; many other projects are already budgeted and in various stages of completion. Laniakea Realignment remains on the books as a planning project, but DOT continues to resist moving any solution forward. Several highway resurfacing projects are also pro-

grammed for the next couple of years.

Rep. Matsumoto was instrumental in securing funds to begin planning the Waiialua STEM Innovation Center. This project will propel Waiialua High and Intermediate School to the forefront of new technology education, yet it will need substantial support in the coming years. I look forward to working with Rep. Matsumoto, school leaders and the community to bring this dream project to reality.

The Kahuku High School football field and track flooding has been an eternal tragedy. Every year, the DOE rejects athletic facility improvements because of the persistent flooding. This year, Rep. Quinlan and I pushed very hard to secure the funding to build huge storage tanks under the field to remove flooding waters from the surface. With laser-like focus and can-do determination from the right people, we should be able to finally solve the common flooding problem and get on with improving the school facilities.

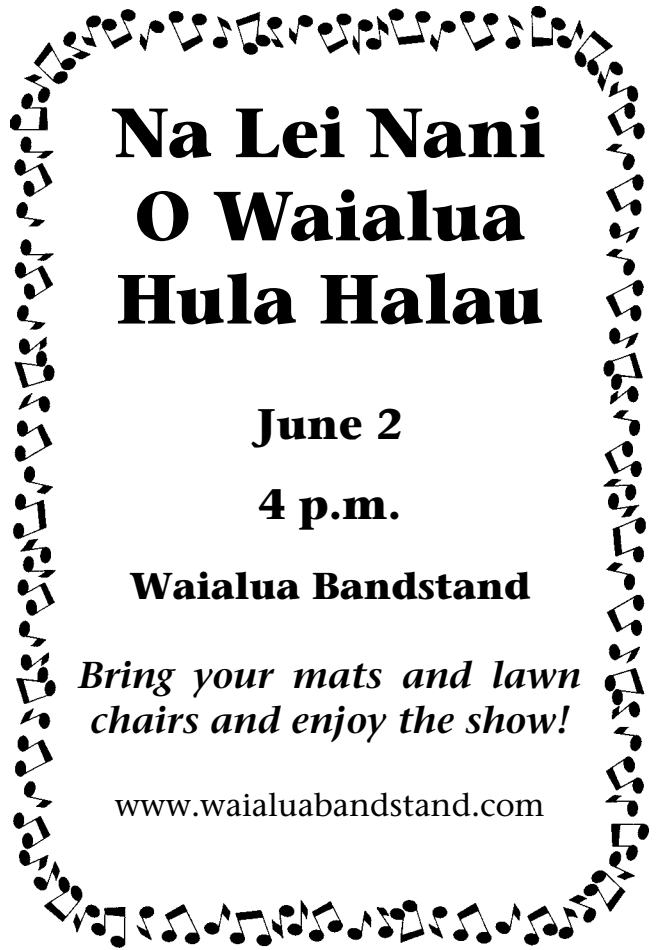

New Member Highlight: Keawe Adventures

Hawaii native Makani Christensen, founder and owner of Keawe Adventures tour company, created his business plan around 5 simple success concepts he had heard about from a local speaker: Planning, Organization, Communication, Execution and Belief. Makani says, "I use that formula and keep it simple." He hires knowledgeable veterans to guide his tours, thereby creating an authentic, quality experience for his customers.

Their signature tour is a private Pearl Harbor Experience, and they also feature small, pre-set group tours exploring Oahu by land or sea. They also specialize in fly fishing and spearfishing tours; and can accommodate most requests to include surfing, stand-up paddling, and snorkeling on any shore. Makani, a former Marine Captain served two combat tours in Iraq and Afghanistan, has a degree in Oceanography from Annapolis' Naval Academy, and is an experienced Captain.

A husband and father of three young children, Makani is also committed to being respectful of the residents here. He says, "we've been operating for 10 years, when's the last time you've seen us?" Makani emphasizes to his guides that they should have a low-key presence and a "small footprint" during their tours so that there is not a negative impact on the local residents. He keeps the size of his tours to 8 people or less. "It's not about numbers (of people on the tours), it's about creating a quality experience for our customers. We could fill a bus to capacity, but we have decided that it's more important for our customers to have a quality, personalized experience," says Makani.

News from North Shore Neighborhood Board #27

At the April 23, 2019 Board meeting, the board supported the a request to amend the lease between COYSA and the City and County of Honolulu to develop permanent rental housing resources for unsheltered youth between 18-24. There will be support services as well as on site resident managers. For the Intelsat presentation to upgrade their facilities and antennae, the board sent a letter to the Department of Planning and Permitting requesting that Intelsat be required to do a full Environmental Impact Study. Concerns included health issues as well as lack of community benefits.

At the May 28, 2019 meeting of the North Shore Neighborhood Board, we will hear updates from ALEA Bridge regarding the Point In Time count for the North Shore as well as information on the upcoming changes at Wahiawa General Hospital and the impacts to the community. There will also be reprot from the City and County, HPD, HFD, and city and elected officials, time permitting.

And mahalo to all of you who voted in the 2019 Neighborhood Board elections for the North Shore. Results will be available early June and we will publish in the June 19 issue of the North Shore News.
