



2019 Point In Time Count Update

ALEA Bridge (AB), with the help of over 110 community volunteers, once again took the lead for the 2019 Point-In-Time Count (PITC) for Region 5, canvassing encampments throughout Mililani, Wahiawa, and the North Shore in the morning, afternoon, and evening hours of January 22nd to 25th. The annual count is a vital part of a national process to obtain federal funding for critical housing and homeless services. The organization expected a slightly lower number of unsheltered homeless compared to last year.

Groups of volunteers set out by car and on foot, seeking out homeless individuals and families willing to participate in the survey. Having incentives of water, snacks, hygiene & first aid kits on hand helped to break the ice. Most survey participants openly shared their information, although there were more people this year who chose not to participate than in previous years. HPD Officers were also on standby, in case the volunteers needed assistance. Thankfully, there were no incidents reported.

AB and its volunteers successfully surveyed and verified 251 individuals over 4 days of the Count. When the official Oahu results were released in early May, the report showed 280 unsheltered, homeless individuals in Region 5. We believe the difference is due to surveys conducted outside of the region, as well as the inclusion of the unconfirmed/incomplete surveys. So

despite AB connecting nearly 100 people to housing since the last PITC, there was only a 1% decrease from 2018 to 2019. This means we need to increase our efforts to bring more resources to the community and renew our focus to connect the most service-resistant to housing and supportive services. We must commit to making a bigger impact in the homeless population next year.

AB would like to thank its partners in this huge effort: Partners in Care, HPD District 2, Latter-Day Saints Mililani Stake, North Shore News/North Shore Foodbank, Dept. of Veteran Affairs, Hope, Inc., Living Word Ministry, Salvation Army, and Wahiawa Health. Special recognition for our elected officials, Senator Donovan Dela Cruz and Representatives Amy Perruso and Lauren Matsumoto, who provided support throughout the process. And most of all, the awesome volunteers who helped to ensure a comprehensive, accurate, and safe count. This was a tremendous team effort from many individuals and groups from the surrounding communities. Sincere thanks and gratitude for your energy, support and generosity.

Windmills and Endangered Species

The "best available science" in 2011 indicated that the Kawailoa Wind Project would take no more than 60 endangered opeapea (Hawaiian Hoary Bat) over the 20-year life of the project. Within six years, the official take of opeapea was 69. Similar results are occurring around the state at other wind farms.

"Take" means to harass harm, pursue, hunt, shoot, wound kill, trap, capture, or collect any endangered or threatened species. State and federal laws prohibit take of endangered and threatened species unless certain conditions are met.

An Environmental Impact Statement and Habitat Conservation Plan are required for consideration of an Incidental Take License. Approved ITLs allow a limited number of take, provided the take is incidental to operations, rather than purposeful, and provided an approved plan is implemented to minimize and mitigate the take.

State and federal laws diverge on one key aspect regarding endangered species protections. The feds require a determination that take will not appreciably reduce the likelihood of the survival and recovery of the species. Hawaii law requires that minimization and mitigation measures be implemented to the maximum extent practicable, in order to improve the chances of survival of the species.

How then, is it possible that Kawailoa Wind and other wind developers in Hawaii continue operating after exceeding their allowable take? Government agencies allow them to continue to operate because they are in the process of amending their HCPs and ITLs.

Common sense might suggest the wind project should stop nighttime operations, when opeapea are vulnerable, until a new, approved plan is established. Kawailoa Wind's claim they cannot afford to shut down at night is dubious because the current owners bought the project for pennies on the dollar through bankruptcy, yet sell electricity at the original, high priced purchase agreement.

Kawailoa Wind made news several months ago for its contribution to a land purchase in Helemano. They provided money as mitigation for the level of take they are now realizing in proposed Take Tier 4. The wind farm that projected they would not exceed 60 opeapea through three tiers of mitigation measures, now wants a license to take 265 opeapea in six tiers.

Nobody knows how many opeapea remain on Oahu, yet the wind farms continue to operate with

minimal restrictions. Worse, they cannot demonstrate that their mitigation efforts have increased the population by a single bat – not one! The proposed plan basically comes down to a request for a new take license that conveniently matches the existing level of take.

Kawailoa Wind's 30 turbines can potentially generate 69 MW of electricity; however, the average production is only 22 percent of capacity. The cost of electricity to rate payers is high, the electric output is disappointing, endangered species may not be adequately protected, and there is a prominent visual impact. All of these factors should be considered as we work towards a better tomorrow.

If you are not making sufficient progress or are endangering yourself or other swimmers then Water Patrol has the right to pull you from the race.

ASSISTANCE: If you receive assistance from Water Patrol in any way, you must come to the beach & turn in your timing chip. You are disqualified and are not eligible for an award.

EQUIPMENT: No fins, paddles or flotation devices except 'Swim Buddles'.

Swim Suits: Men - 'Speedo' style briefs or 'jammers'. Women - one or two piece shoulder to hip swim suits. No wetsuits, long sleeves, long legs, flotation style suits, triathlon suits or speed suits allowed.





Hawaiian Electric Companies geared up for hurricane season, urge customers to prepare

The Hawaiian Electric Companies have been working to build more resilient island grids ahead of the 2019 Central Pacific hurricane season, which begins June 1. Forecasts say up to eight tropical cyclones could develop this season, underscoring the need for customers to have emergency plans in place.

Hawaiian Electric, Maui Electric and Hawai'i Electric Light work year-round to strengthen the electric grids so that they are better able to withstand powerful storms. Much of that work centers around upgrading and reinforcing poles, lines and equipment and clearing vegetation.

Here are some examples of the companies' ongoing resilience work: Nearly \$17 million was spent in 2018 to clear trees and vegetation from around power lines and equipment, resulting in fewer and briefer outages during storms.

Hawaiian Electric:

- Replaced wooden poles with eight steel poles at Wiliwilinui Ridge Trail above Wai'alae Iki. The new poles support high-voltage lines feeding Windward and East O'ahu.
- Upgraded infrastructure to improve system reliability in West and Central O'ahu.
- In efforts to build community resilience, Hawaiian Electric is working with public agencies, volunteers and nonprofits to develop recovery strategies for some of the island's most vulnerable areas.

Maui Electric:

- Continued upgrades of utility poles rated to withstand higher wind gusts.
- Planned pilot installation of insulated power lines to reduce outages caused by falling trees and branches on conductors in forested areas of Upcountry Maui and East Moloka'i.
- Planned installation of Trip-Savers, a new device on power lines that helps isolate and protect the electrical system during outages, in parts of Upcountry Maui.

Hawai`l Island:

- Continued collaboration with public agencies and community partners to promote emergency preparedness and hasten power restoration efforts following natural disasters.
- Installed Trip-Savers and similar devices on power lines that help isolate and protect the electrical system during outages.
- Planned installation of tie-lines between circuits that provide quicker restoration options in the event of an interruption.
