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
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

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Since 1959, three hurricanes have made landfall in Hawai'i, causing severe damage in the billions of dollars. Of these, Hurricane Iniki was the strongest with winds up to 145 mph, gusts up to 175 mph and storm surge in the 15'-18' range. In 2019, we have already experienced weather anomalies and have seen some storm activity this hurricane season and possibly more on the way.

To better prepare ourselves for the possibility of a hurricane or tropical storm, please follow the tips below provided by the Department of Emergency Management:

Learn: Educate yourself on disasters that can affect you and your family and engage your friends, neighbors and co-workers on disaster planning.

Plan: Create and exercise a Family Disaster Plan. Locate a secondary meeting place and designate an off-island contact.

Develop a 14 Day Disaster Supplies Kit: Your disaster supplies kit should contain enough of the following items to last for a minimum of 14 days:

Water - One gallon of water per person per day for 14 days for drinking and sanitation

Food - Non-perishable food that does not require cooking. Popular local foods such as spam, corned beef and Vienna Sausages and peanut butter, protein shakes and nuts

Eating Utensils - Plates, mess kits, forks and chop sticks. Don't forget a non-electric can opener for canned foods

Radio - Battery-powered or hand crank radio with NOAA Weather alert.

Light - Flashlight and/or a portable fluorescent light.

Spare batteries - Check annually

First Aid - Get a good kit and consider enrolling in a certified first-aid course.

Whistle - Important for signaling for help. A whistle carries much farther than the human voice and uses less energy than yelling.

Dust Mask - Helps to filter contaminated air

Sanitation - Moist towelettes, heavy-duty garbage bags, and plastic ties for personal sanitation.

Tools - Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities, duct tape

Maps - Local area maps

Prescription - Special medications and glasses

Baby - Infant formula and diapers

Pets - Pet food and extra water for your pet

Following these few simple steps will have you

and your family better prepared in a worst-case scenario. It is imperative that we all take part in our own disaster preparedness outside of what the government can provide to ensure the safety of ourselves and our loved ones.

Vacation Rental Legislation

A long simmering, contentious issue has finally risen to center stage as both the city council and state legislature passed legislation affecting short term vacation rentals. At deadline for this article, Mayor Caldwell signed Bill 89 into law and Governor Ige announced his intention to veto SB 1292.

With few exceptions, every bed and breakfast (B&B) and transient vacation unit (TVU) on Oahu that opened since 1989 is illegal. As many as 8000 to 10,000 TVUs on Oahu advertised on Airbnb, VRBO and other platforms operate outside the law, whether or not they have paid taxes.

Bill 89 creates a new permitting process for a limited number of owner-occupied B&Bs, creates reporting requirements for online platforms, imposes steep penalties for non-compliance, and enhances enforcement tools for the City and County of Honolulu.

Those properties holding nonconforming use permits since 1989 are excluded from the provisions of Bill 89, except they will have to include their permit number in all advertisements. Certain condos near resort areas like Turtle Bay are also exempt from new regulations, except they must include their address in advertisements.

New B&B permits will be limited to a maximum of one-half percent of the total number of housing units for each region of Oahu. This would presumably allow 35 new permits for the North Shore; however, the North Shore Sustainable Community Plan contains language that prohibits any new vacation rental units and the next revision of the Plan may not come for several years.

Remember, Bill 89 does not make B&Bs and TVUs illegal – they are already illegal. After 30 years of legislative inaction, unlawful rental activity and lack of enforcement, this is an important step forward. Surely, there will be many more discussions to come regarding the future of residential neighborhoods. It is said that you can fix something, but you cannot fix nothing. Let us all respect opposing views as we work through this.

Regarding Senate Bill 1292, I was in the group of 12 who opposed its passage, 13-12, in the closing days of the Legislature. This bill requires online vacation rental platforms to collect taxes and pass them on to the State, but it would not require these platforms to ensure compliance with county ordinances or provide important data to support enforcement. The state should not covet and collect

money, and simultaneously provide a shield, from illegal activity. Governor Ige is doing the right thing by vetoing SB 1292.







Feeding the "Robot" and Feeding the Hungry at the Same Time

Chris Wall of Strafford Media and Nate Burgoyne of Integrity Online Marketing have joined forces to create a powerful program for business owners that they can use to drive more customers and clients to their business, while helping Hawaii's hungry at the same time. Their effort is called "Feed the Robot." This new program guarantees to increase a business' online visibility and also supports the Hawaii Food Bank.



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First-Ever Koʻolauloa Farmers Market Brings Fresh Produce & Family Fun To Windward Oahu

The Koʻolauloa Farmers Market is the first farmers market to serve Windward Oahu from Kahaluʻu to Kahuku. It features fresh produce grown by farmers in the community along with family activities, food and entertainment. It takes place from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on the second and fourth Saturday of each month through Sept. 28 at Punaluʻu Ahupuaʻa Farms (53-270 Kamehameha Highway, across from Punaluʻu Beach Park). Parking is free.

The Koʻolauloa Health Center organized the farmers market with grant funding from the Hawaiʻi Medical Service Association (HMSA), and will feature fresh produce grown by local farmers in Punaluʻu Valley on agricultural land owned by Kamehameha Schools.

The Koʻolauloa Farmers Market is a unique collaboration between three kamaʻaina organizations, each dedicated to improving the health and well-being of the l'hui.

"I had organized a work day to clear hau trees from an overgrown lo'i in Punalu'u Valley," said Joey Char, Land Asset Manager for Kamehameha Schools. "One of the volunteers amid the chain saws, noise and dirt was Moani Wright-Van Alst, a Communications Resource Manager for HMSA. I mentioned wanting to launch a farmers market. She said, 'I know someone you need to meet'."

That someone was Jen Awakuni, Senior Program Manager for HMSA. "Our purpose at HMSA is to improve the lives of our members and the health of Hawaii. Caring for our families, friends and neighbors is our privilege," she said. "Having this farmers market available to the community allows us to do just that. Koʻolauloa Health Center was ready to do it. Kamehameha Schools had the farmers and land. Introducing them just made sense."

"Together, our three organizations can accomplish so much more than we could on our own," said Terrence Aratani, CEO of Koʻolauloa Health Center. "Native Hawaiians comprise 40 percent of our patients diagnosed with diabetes, hypertension or obesity. We want to do our best to not only improve the quality of life for our Native Hawaiian population, but for all in our region. Through this strong partnership, we want our community to have access to healthy, affordable food. We're looking forward to a wonderful farmers market."




