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Rick Barboza To Speak On Hawaiian Native Plant Restoration

The North Shore Outdoor Circle (NSOC)is pleased to have Rick Barboza as the guest speaker at the General Membership Meeting to be held on September 23, 2019, at 6:00 pm at the Proud Peacock in Waimea Valley.

Barboza will speak on the importance of native plant restoration and the joy of putting plants in the ground that will thrive in their original habitat. He will also address the philosophy of choosing native plants as well as changing mindsets, how native plants can positively change the landscape and how native plant restoration will lead to a healthier environment in Hawai'i.

Barboza's farm, Hui Ku Maoli Ola, is situated in Haiku Valley, Heeia and the farm's plants are part of restoration projects throughout the Hawaiian Islands. Hui Ku Maoli Ola has even provided native plants for restoration work on Kahoolawe. Whether the restoration is at a public site or in a private yard, Barboza fits needs in terms of planting that mirrors what existed in particular places in Hawai'i 500 years ago.

The farm has been in existence for 20 years though Barboza has been growing native plants for the last 23 years. The farm is expanding to Waimanalo where the focus will be on growing native trees.

A graduate of Kamehameha Schools, Barboza earned his bachelor's degree in zoology from the University of Hawai'i. The focus area for his degree was conservation biology. Originally from Waimanalo. Barboza now lives on his farm in Heeia. One of his greatest joys in the restoration work he does is to see native insects and birds return to the restoration sites.

Koolauloa Health Center Outreach

Naty Camit Hopewell Koʻolauloa Community Health Center

As a Federally Qualified Health Center, Koolauloa needs to provide ambulatory primary care, OB/GYN, mental health and dental services. In addition, the mission of the health center is to meets the needs of the community. One of the ways we do that is through our Outreach Department, who sometimes partners with a variety of organizations to meet some of these needs. The main focus is the homeless and needy individuals and families.

Our workers are involved the following areas.

- Assist Koolauloa patients in applying for Quest, the Medicaid program in Hawaii. If they don't qualify for Quest, they are helped in making decisions regarding Obamacare, The Affordable Care Act.
- Assist the homeless in acquiring housing by working with the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) conducted by Aloha United Way. They have been successful in housing many homeless via this program.
- Assist clients with SNAP/TANF, Social Security, and Medicare applications. SNAP is the food stamp program and TANF is Temporary Assistance for Needy Families. For many families, the TANF program provides month-

ly cash that hep them regain their footing in times of need.

- Service Center every lst Monday of the month. Koolauloa partners with the Hauula Community Association who conducts the food bank while our team invites different groups, such as the Veterans Affairs and Ke Ola Mamo who provide a variety of services. There are also tables with donated clothes and shoes.
- Attend community events where they provide First Aid and blood pressure checks.
- Assist kids with school supplies in the summer and partner with Salvation Army for gifts in December.
- Once a week, our workers visit various places looking for the homeless who may need assistance.
- Partners with PIC (Partners in Care) to do the annual homeless count in our area.

New Member Highlight: Sabrina Zander Creates Family Heirlooms for the North Shore

"You can't frame a thumb drive. Technology will change and people won't know what to do with their digital images of all their loved ones, and their children will not have a printed history of their family." Sabrina Zander, artist, portrait photographer, heirloom creator, and picture framer has a passion for preserving memories for others. She creates custom-tailored, luxurious, heirloom-quality items, capturing families and moments in time.

She photographs high school Senior portraits, family sessions, vow renewals, and anniversaries. She says, "I can help you choose the right size for your images and create a wall gallery so families can then pass them on for generations. One day your kids are going to ask for pictures of mom, dad, grandma, grandpa. So why don't you stay ahead of the game and create prints that will outlive you. When you preserve yourself in prints, you'll be remembered. I create an experience they'll have for generations."

Sabrina Zander Photography stands out because it's a personalized boutique portrait service. Every session begins with an in-person consultation, during which she and the clients get to know one another, she learns what kinds of images they want displayed in their home and they start designing the shoot. For instance, they discuss whether they want a large ocean canvas over the sofa in their living room with 2 smaller prints on the side of each child, or if they are looking for just a family album. Afterwards, she discusses wardrobe and what will look best. She describes, "I do wardrobe myself or hire out wardrobe and makeup for any level of glam that the client wants... I like to do more of a natural look. Depending on the specific look or formality, if I can't do it I hire somebody."

Approximately 2 weeks after the session, clients come back to her studio where they have an ordering session and they choose the images and collections they love.

She takes the photos and creates folio boxes or fine leather albums. The folio boxes are unique because they are made in Italy and come in leather or vegan leather and hold up to 30, 8x10 matted prints. The mats are also hand cut in Italy too. Her prints are museum grade archival-quality, printed on cotton rag paper so they hold the ink and retain


the color and last for up to 100+ years. Her canvasses are also high-quality, made with 100% cotton with a UV protected coating.

She also likes to give back to causes near and dear to her heart. She donates her time and resources to photograph dogs for Oahu animal rescue groups. She hopes to expand her photography business to include pets and horses.

HONOLUA BLOMFIELD ON THE LONGBOARD TOUR



The final was tricky with close out sets and Blomfied was leading in the beginning. Waves were short and low scoring but a good mix between longboard and progressive style maneuvers. It was Calmon with the nod and Blomfield taking the 2nd spot. The longboard contingent now moves to New York for the last event. At least three to determine a qualification for the world champion title. Chloe has won two events in a row and sits in the number one spot. 


