

### Usta Be

The North Shore in the 70s was Surf City to a California kid like me. We had surfed in L.A. without wet suits (what were they?) in high school in the 50s and 60s using whatever floated ... inflatable rubber mats, or those Godawful balsa boards so heavy we had to swim the nose around to line up on a wave. My first real board was a 13-foot Hobie so heavy that it took two of us to lug it into the surf. But, hey, we were surfin' way before Gidget and the Beach Boys made it so cool, you fool.

Oahu was paradise in comparison. Warm water and North Shore surf spots usta be so plentiful in the 70s that even crappy sufers like me could catch our share without dropping in on the big boys. Seemed like every guy and lots of the wahine surfed ... every plumber's or carpenter's truck had a surf rack on top. All by yourself or maybe with one other guy in the lineup, sun on your back, Oahu's shoreline so distant. If the boys were burning off the cane fields after a harvest, surfers in the lineup had to watch out for burning sugar cane dropping from the sky ... Usta be no traffic lights between Wahiawa and Kahuku. Usta be able to drive out from town middle of the night without meeting another car going the other way or your way. Usta be that the "dawn patrol," surfers up at first light to catch an early set before work or school could load up on pastries at Country Donuts in Haleiwa Town. Usta be no "dropping in" on a surfer already on a wave ... but maybe the courtesies we remember are returning ... or maybe the kids these days feel sorry for us old farts on our long boards.

Some things have changed. When we bought our North Shore house in the 70s we paid all the money in the world. Nowadays all that money wouldn't buy the mail box. Big changes in restaurants in Haleiwa Town. Haleiwa Joe's restaurant usta be a Chart House until Joe Lazar, the Chart House's manager, got a call from corporate headquarters telling him to close down. When, sez Joe. Today, sez the voice on the phone. So Joe calls everyone in, tells them catch some waves, re-negotiates the restaurant's lease with Kam Schools, upgrades the menu, and reopens as Haleiwa Joe's (actually he reopened temporarily as Aloha Joe's, but that's another story). So Joe's was a Chart House ... which usta be The Seaview Inn ... best chicken hekka on the island, and the fishermen usta bring their guitars and ukuleles into the dining room and sing and sing ... and before that

the Haleiwa Hotel sat on that site ... and before that the first Christian church sat there, and John Emerson, the North Shore's first pastor, preached there under the 19th Century pili grass roof until he built Liliuokalani Church.

Haleiwa Joe's had competition. Bobby Lee had three eateries in Haleiwa Town. Rosie's Cantina served Mexican food before there ever was Cholo's or Luibuenos. The pro surfers hung out at Pizza Bob's (the older, smaller Pizza Bob's), and his 3rd restaurant (what was its name?) usta be the place for a fish meal fresh from North Shore fishermen.

So, like Honolulu, like the Windward Side, like everywhere, the North Shore ain't like it usta be and it ain't all that different either. More tourists, but the same kids jump off "jump rock" at Waimea and off the Rainbow Bridge in Haleiwa Town as a rite of passage. Japanese tourists still line up for shave ice at Matsumoto's and Aoki's. Local drivers still stop politely to let cars turn onto Kam Highway in town.

Usta be. Still is.

## 2019 North Shore Kama'aina of the Year-Antya Miller

The North Shore Chamber of Commerce is pleased to announce that Antya Miller, former Executive Director of the Chamber, is this year's North Shore Kama'aina of the Year. She will be honored at their Annual Christmas Party and Auction on December 11th at Waimea Valley.

Raised on Waialua Sugar Company's hospital grounds, and later near Laniakea, Antya is the daughter of Dr. Rodman and Anne Miller. In Waialua, she and her siblings would walk from their Kupahu Street home to Fujioka's Store or Matsumoto's in Haleiwa to buy crack seed, manapua or other treats and play barefoot with the gang of neighborhood kids from sun-up to sunset. Since there were no cell phones in those days, Antya's parents would call them home by blowing a conch shell, which their dogs also heeded. Their home on the plantation was literally a few yards away from the hospital's men's ward. It was an open lanai and the kids would often visit with the patients. Her dad would send her over to Julia, the lab tech, to wash the test tubes and help with other simple tasks starting at age 9. In 1965, the family moved to their new beach home and Dr. Miller started his private practice in the old Kua Aina building.

Antya enjoyed growing up on the beach swimming, surfing, playing volleyball, laying net, making bon fires and riding horses in Pupukea and hotwalking horses at the Polo Field. With Girl Scouts' activities, sewing lessons with Mrs. Aoki, movies on the weekends at the three local movie theaters (no T.V. until 1970), there wasn't time to be bored. Her parents taught her to have a strong work ethic through work at the clinic during summer vacations, to value service to one's community, and to be politically engaged.

Antya attended college at Louisiana State University, where her grandfather was a horticulture professor. She met her husband, Boyd Ready and they married and went on to grad school at Penn State where Antya studied public administration. In 1978, she answered her dad's call to help him with managing his medical practice and the transition to his new office building behind First Hawaiian Bank. Dr. Miller's clinic was a full-service family practice including lab, X-ray, and pharmacy. Antya came to know hundreds of North Shore residents as patients and friends.

When her Dad retired, she began pursuing her passion to preserve and improve Haleiwa and the North Shore. Antya wanted to preserve its special rural and historic character, agriculture, small mom & pop businesses, and close-knit community. She volunteered with Haleiwa Main Street in 1998, became president and then the volunteer administrator until 2005, when she became the paid Executive Director.

Antya was a key leader in landscaping Weed Circle, renovating of the historic Haleiwa Gym, and restoring the Mutual Telephone Company Building, transforming it into the Chamber's home and a Visitor and Business Services Center for the North Shore. She is also in her 19th year leading the annual Christmas parade, restoring this community tradition after the sugar company closed. With the Historic Preservation Committee, Antya developed the Haleiwa historic walking tour with guide map and presented six major events featuring Waialua and North Shore history. She also served on the Neighborhood Board for many years, organizing the Agriculture and Transportation Committees, completed the North Shore Disaster Preparedness Plan and many other projects. Since her retirement in 2016, Antya has been volunteering as the chair of the Chamber's Historic Preservation Committee to research local history and place interpretive plaques on the historic buildings and sites in Haleiwa.

Antya says, "I could not have accomplished anything without the support and mentorship of so many others: my family, Bill and Peggy Paty, Ron Valenciana, Meryl Andersen, Carolyne Lazar, Trish Coder and countless others. We make our communities and our country strong through volunteerism."

Husband and wife team, Mark and Tammy Becker, owners of Happy Trails since opening in 1993, have created an awesome horseback riding experience here in Haleiwa that you don't want to miss. Tammy says, "We really could not have anticipated our longevity of over 26 years, and still going!"

Happy Trails offers two lengths of tours, a 1.5 hour and a 2-hour guided ride, both offering scenic, groomed trails in gorgeous Pupukea on the North Shore. Their wranglers are experienced riders and their horses are well-trained, many of the herd are retired polo horses.

Our guides, Leilani and Sherry, made sure everyone was comfortable and provided fun information about the North Shore along the way. Guests can experience sweeping views of the ocean on horseback. Tour guide Leilani says, "Our rides are more adventurous as we are located in the mountains and cover a variety of terrain. We take the time to make more personalized tours with our guests...we make personal connections. We match the guests with our horses so that there's a good fit. Safety is key at Happy Trails."

Rides at Happy Trails are the perfect activity for family outings, a first date, or anniversary. In fact, locals tend to book the longer tour which involves a more adventurous climb in Pupukea.

The community also appreciates what Tammy and Mark have contributed to the North Shore throughout the decades. Tammy describes, "We have and still work with scouting troops for merit badges and recreational troop rides; offer week long "Horsemanship Sessions" for campers in summer programs; and opened our ranch to Marines enrolled in the "Wounded Warrior Program" once a month for Equine Assisted Therapy sessions at no charge for over 5 years.

### **Teachers Enhance STEM Instruction**

North Shore science teachers from Waialua High and Intermediate schools, Waialua Elementary and Haleiwa Elementary completed a statewide training program, STEMWorks, developed and administered by the Maui Economic Development Board to support public school teachers and students. The workshop, sponsored by Kawailoa Wind, involved working with models of wind turbines. After the workshop,

the teachers and administrators toured the Kawailoa Wind Farm for a first hand look at wind turbines in operation.



The program enables Hawaii

teachers to more effectively deliver instruction in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) classes. The MEDB/STEMWorks program focuses on professional development in teaching students about clean energy technologies.

Since its start in 2008, 649 teachers statewide have participated in the program, which has educated more than 75,000 students. STEMworks Energy™ teachers learn Department of Education approved, hands-on lessons, using inquiry and engineering design methods to develop classroom plans for implementation.

conscious gardening, so even with the ocean calling, we don't need to let the backyard garden or garden boxes go to 'guinea grass'. With all the fortune, or misfortune, the winter season brings, let's remember the integral roles that our garden and useful plants all around us provide. Studies have shown that greener cities, offices and homes create a less stressful environment.

As our grandparents reminded us, if you get a sunburn, you go outside and you find an Aloe plant. The yellowish sap has healing properties too long to list. If you get a sting or an insect bite, you go and find a young green papaya, whose sap (papain) breaks down the venom while the anti-septic properties heal the surrounding area. It seems as if they had a remedy for everything! "Eh boy, you get fever, I'll get you a couple ti leaf." The ti plant's unique leaf structure insulates and actively cools the body. It is an unfortunate day when you can't go outside and pick a sprig of rosemary, some 'olena (turmeric) root, and a few green onions as a garnish. In older times, the hau flower played an integral role in keeping keiki out of trouble. The hau flower blooms yellow throughout the day it fades to a darker pinkish color; hopefully you knew that when that flower turned pink you'd better be home, or else!

Canoe plants such as kalo, banana, 'ulu and the incredible niu (coconut), all played in integral role in establishing life on these islands. The sappy 'ulu fruit is a notorious kitchen and knife destroyer. So, to utilize this wondrous fruit get a dedicated "'ulu knife." It's a relationship worth tending to. Noni gets a bad rap because of its potent fruit, but the young leaves are just as useful! They add a delicious nutty flavor to curries and soups, and are also great as a poultice or wrap for bruises and sore muscles.

It's easy to lose sight of the usefulness of many of these plants which we consider a nuisance. In many other countries the "haole koa" or Leucaena isn't much of a problem as it is used daily as fodder for animals and for living fences, green manure in garden beds, firewood, building material, and even as a delicious and nutritious food! It seems that we are seeing a renaissance in the utilization of other pesky invasives in traditional hale building. These over-abundant and solid woods are a great alternative to once thriving ohi'a, kauila, and milo, and can be used much in the same way. In Hawai'i and other Pacific islands the fast growing and buoyant 'Albizia' wood is utilized as canoes and alaias.

Challenge yourself with utilizing any of these incredible plants at least once a month, and if you already use them, teach friends and family your favorite recipe or how to best use them. Plant language is a practiced and spoken language, if you don't use





### HUNTINGTON BEACH HOSTED THE ISA JUNIOR WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

Team USA won the gold medal at the VISSLA International Surfing Association (ISA) World Junior Surfing Championship, just one day after winning the event's first gold medal in the team Aloha Cup event. Team USA was propelled by an impressive six individual medals to take the team world champion title. Hawaii won team silver. Japan won team bronze. Spain won team copper. Hawaii's Betty Lou Sakura Johnson came home with a bronze medal for team Hawaii. Johnson is a Haleiwa local surfer who has been racking up some great results in her competitions. #### LIFEGUARD STATIONS TO HAVE LONGER HOURS!

The Honolulu City Council voted to pass Bill 39. Having longer hours for the lifeguard stations has been talked about for a long time. The council passed the measure in a 7-0 vote which will extend the hours from sun-up to sun-down for the lifeguards. It gives the Department of Emergency Services, which oversees Honolulu's lifeguards, until January 2021 to come up with a long-term plan to establish longer lifeguard schedules. The hours will start in July 2021. Ocean Safety officials say about 20 percent of ocean-related emergencies happen outside their current hours, which runs from 9 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. A pilot project at Hanauma Bay found that lifeguards' extended, 10-hour shifts saved more lives, boosted employee morale, reduced worker compensation claims and resulted in fewer sick days. There is a great video about lifeguards on you tube called "100 Years on the Beach." Check it out!

Amid the trumpeting of conch shells, Hawaiian chanting and pageantry, two "giving machines" will be unveiled in the Polynesian Cultural Center's Hukilau Marketplace at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, November 19, 2019, in time for the holiday season. They will remain in place through January 1, 2020.

In keeping with a long-standing tradition of supporting various community activities and initiatives, Center President & CEO Alfred Grace said, "We're delighted to host these unique machines for the first time in Hawaii. We are so pleased that they will benefit selected local and international charities and causes."

"Giving Machines are an initiative of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints," said Wailana Kamauu, the Church's public affairs director for Hawaii. He explained they first appeared in Salt Lake City, Utah, in 2017 as part of a "Light the World" campaign to encourage people to perform instant acts of service that make a difference in other people's lives.





"How about a couple of raw eggs?"


"Gross Grandma"
