#### Veteran's Day

Linda Seyler, who is the Publisher, Editor, and Grand Poo-Bah of the North Shore News, sent me an e-mail the other day, "... wondering if you would consider writing an article for Veteran's Day." Translation: "Get off of your okole and give me a Veteran's Day article and get it to me by Thursday's press deadline."

Happy to do it. I served in the Navy on five submarines for 32 years, from the time my congressman appointed me to the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis. I joined the Navy and became a submariner in part because of the example of my Uncle Bobby, who had joined the Navy and the submarine service during World War II over the strong objections of his family, all members of the Church of the Brethren, who like their Amish cousins were anti-military, anti-war. Bobby reported to his first submarine, USS Scorpion, in Pearl Harbor, eager to complete his first war patrol and enjoy the post-patrol pleasures of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel, which has been turned over to the submarine force during the war. Bobby never got to the Royal Hawaiian. Scorpion was lost without a trace on Bobby's first war patrol.

Veteran's Day used to be Armistice Day, which marked the end of World War I, and which now honors all of the men and women who serve or have served in our armed forces. This includes the private freezing his ears off on guard duty in Korea and the Lower Level Engine Room watchstander in a nuclear submarine in the North Atlantic to a B-52 pilot on standby in Omaha. Borrowing from today's news headlines, it includes the special ops forces fresh from their successful mission to take down al-Baghdadi and Lieutenant Colonel Alexander Vindman, whose testimony was so vital to the impeachment proceedings on Capitol Hill and who has spoken at risk to his career out of a "sense of duty … because I am a patriot."

My Uncle Bobby died serving his country. You can say that all the men and women, past, present, and future, in every armed service branch, have also served or will serve our country ... whether on active duty or in retirement.

Sailor, stand easy. Rest you oars.

#### Is Wind Energy Worth the Cost?

Extremely unpopular 568' wind turbines may soon surround the unfortunate residents in the small town of Kahuku. Na Pua Makani's 57 story monsters will be located as close as one-third of a mile from the elementary school and residents who will be subjected to the continuous whoosh and whir, infrasound, and shadow flicker of industrial energy generation.

Is the ongoing crisis in Kahuku the fault of a group of mothers who banded together to oppose the egregiously close siting of the tallest turbines in the United States, or a failure of government officials to do the right thing? It is the latter.

Hawaii's clean energy initiative is admirable and worthy of our best efforts to achieve 100 percent "clean" electrical generation by 2045. However, this drive to eliminate fossil fuels should not blind us to collateral damage and previously ignored costs. Technologies deemed to be "green" should not avoid scrutiny.

There are enormous financial and environmental costs to industrial wind energy. As we go forward with the clean energy initiative, I call on the Governor, my fellow legislators, and state agencies entrusted with the wellbeing of our residents and environment to consider three critical questions: 1) Does Hawaii need massive wind turbines? 2) Have we honestly considered all the costs and impacts of massive wind turbines? and, 3) Are massive wind turbines worth the cumulative costs and impacts?

Without huge infusions of tax dollars, massive wind turbines would not be built. They are inefficient, generating only a quarter to a third of the capacity that promoters like to tout. They require spinning reserve, or the burning of oil-fired generators to spin in neutral and not make electricity, so they can rapidly engage when wind speeds fluctuate. They kill wildlife, including endangered species like the 'ope'ape'a, or Hawaiian hoary bat. They are unsightly and mar the natural beauty of Hawaii.

Vast amounts of land are damaged in the building of new roads, clearing of trees and vegetation, moving hillsides, and pouring massive concrete foundations. The carbon footprint to build and deliver each turbine is very high. The cost to decommission each turbine is hundreds of thousands of dollars, which could be borne by taxpayers should a company go bankrupt. Used turbine parts, particularly the gargantuan turbine blades, cannot be re-

cycled and are destined for the land fill.

Ongoing legal issues for the Na Pua Makani project include a challenge before the Intermediate Court of Appeals regarding the validity of the Habitat Conservation Plan for the 'ope'ape'a, a challenge before the PUC regarding the Power Purchase Agreement with Hawaiian Electric, and concern over unauthorized use of dynamite to blow holes in the ground without permitted archeological monitoring measures.

Kahuku is already host to a 29 MW wind project. Residents are physically disturbed by the turbines, night and day. Their opposition to another wind project has been ignored over 10 years by decisionmakers in Honolulu who are forcing a new, larger project to loom even closer over them, against their vehement opposition. This is environmental injustice.

On behalf of the vast majority of constituents I represent on the North and Windward Shores, I say with confidence that industrial wind energy is by no means a panacea; not even close. If the answer to any of the three questions above is No, then we must stop forcing massive wind turbines on small, disadvantaged communities. There are alternatives.





#### **Aloha Friends and Neighbors!**

It's hard to believe that we're just two months away from the end of the year and the start of another Legislative Session!

Every year, I ask my constituents in District 45 their views, thoughts, and opinions about what they think are the most important issues for our district and our State. If you live in District 45, you should be receiving a 2020 Legislative Issues Survey in the next few weeks. I want to hear directly from you about what issues are important, what legislation you think we should consider, and what priorities you have regarding the dozens of issues that appear before the legislature each year.

In a representative democracy like ours, it's vital you make your views heard so I can represent you well!

In addition to my annual legislative survey, the 2020 U.S. Census is also coming up next year. Every ten years, the federal government conducts a population count of everyone living in the United States. Data from the census is used to determine how to spend federal funds and is used to redraw congressional and state legislative districts so that each elected official equally represents their constituents.

The U.S. Census Bureau keeps your information confidential and private. They don't share your information with anyone, even other government agencies like the FBI or police. The confidential information also isn't used to determine eligibility or participation in government programs or benefits.

Responding to the census is one of the best ways to ensure Hawaii continues to benefit from Federal Spending Programs. In just one year, Hawaii received \$3.7 billion from the federal government for things like Medicaid, SNAP, student loans, Section 8 Housing Assistance, Public Housing, and the School Breakfast Program. The information you provide to the U.S. Census ensures that Hawaii's citizens continue receiving investment from federal dollars.

#### Dear Editor,

Ku Kia'i Kahuku was founded by 9 Mothers and Aunties with the purpose of protecting our 'aina and our children from the damaging effects of building industrial turbines in Kahuku. We were founded on the principles of Kapu Aloha and have never waivered from this since our inception 2 months ago.

On Friday, October 18, 2019, HPD reported that a utility pole was deliberately cut and subsequently fell across Kamehmeha Hwy when the transport of the turbines had begun. This, in effect, blocked drivers from entering Kahuku in a timely manner.

Ku Kia'i Kahuku does not nor ever will condone this or any behavior which causes harm or damage to property or land. This does not align with the mission and purpose of our organization and it never will. We are peacefully protesting these industrial turbines and invite all to join us in our non-violent approach to stop the development and ruination of our small piece of Aloha 'Aina on the North Shore.

## **Our Care, Our Choice Act**

We in the health field deal with everything from birth to death. Last year, Hawaii passed a law allowing a person with terminal illness with less than six months to live to request assistance in ending her/his life with medications prescribed by a licensed physician. This controversial law took effect this year.

To be eligible to do this, a person must have a terminal illness, a Hawaii resident, able to take a prescribed drug by her/himself, mentally capable of making an informed decision, able to make two oral requests and provide a written request. This is not an easy decision for any person who will need to discuss this decision in depth with family or significant others.

Based on several other states' experience, Hawaii has not made it easy for a person to do this. There are many steps to this process. The person will need an attending physician who is licensed In Hawaii and qualified to make a diagnosis and prognosis about the person's illness. That physician will need to determine that the patient is capable of acting rationally and capable of making a sound decision. The first office visit where the patient is evaluated and makes a request for assistance in ending her/his life is considered the patient's first oral request. Then there is a twenty day waiting period. During this period, a second Hawaii licensed physician who is qualified to evaluate the patient's diagnosis and prognosis meets with the patient. That doctor evaluates the patient and must confirm the first doctor's prognosis. The patient then needs to see a mental health provider, a psychologist, psychiatrist or a licensed clinical social worker to confirm that the patient is of sound mind and not suffering from depression that may interfere with the patient's ability to determine the course of action suitable for her/him.

After twenty days, the patient meets with the attending physician to make a second oral request, followed by a written request. During this entire process, the patient must be reminded that s/he may change her/his mind at any point in time. Forty-eight hours after the second oral and written request, a prescription for the drugs are sent to one of two pharmacies on Oahu. This pharmacy is then responsible for putting a combination of drugs together with specific instructions on administration and mailing the package to the patient.

Again, this controversial law is not for everyone. It is an option for someone who has carefully evaluated her/his situation and who has the support of family or significant others.






