Kahuku Medical Center Part of Samoan Mission of Hope

asked for assistance last month in dealing with the deadly measles outbreak in Samoa, Kahuku Medical Center (KMC) nurses and staff quickly answered the call.

KMC nurses Diane Hale, Robyn Falemalu, Caridad Vila and Wilfred Husman were among 55 Hawaii

When state health officials nurses and 10 doctors that made 4, the measles outbreak had already the trip to Samoa along with a support staff to deliver much-needed immunizations and health care. The two-day medical mission was spearheaded by Lt. Governor Josh Green and state health officials.

> By the time the Hawaii medial team arrived in Samoa on December

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killed 60 people. When the team arrived at the first village, they learned an infant infected with measles had just died.

Overall, the Hawaii team helped immunize over 40,000 Samoan residents during the medical mission.

By December 6, most of the Hawaii team members were back home. Because of the connections made there, Hale said KMC is considering being a sister facility to one of the district medical centers there.

Ballots Will Be Mailed for Election 2020!

The 2019 Hawaii State Legislature adopted the mail-in voting system. There will be no voting at the traditional places like school cafeterias and public centers any more.

There will be a huge drastic reduction from the approximate 235 voting locations during the past elections.

Oahu will now only have two (2) locations, now described as "Voter Service Center" (VSC).

One VSC will be at Honolulu Hale and the other at Kapolei Hale. (There will only be a Total of eight (8) VSCs in the entire State of Hawaii).

I personally think that we need more VSCs for our voters. Otherwise, it will disenfranchise residents who do not live near the Honolulu and Kapolei VSCs. It's a long distance to Honolulu or Kapolei. Which registered voter is that motivated to take that drive?

Some Brief Information:

1. You should call or log in to see if you're registered now. The Office of Elections also would like to verify your signatures.

2. Ballots are to be mailed to voters at least 18 days before the Primary and General Elections.

3. If you do not receive your ballot by July 25 for Primary and October 19 for General, call the County

Clerks. https://elections.hawaii.gov/resources/county-election-divisions/

4. The two VSCs will be opened 10 business days BEFORE the August 8, 2020 Primary and the November 3, 2020 to collect your ballot, allow same-day registration to vote, voters with special needs. You can also vote there.

5. Your Ballot must be received by the office – not mailed or postmarked — by 7 p.m. on the same day of primary (August 8) and general election (November 3).

6. Remember to allow time to for the US Post Office to deliver your ballot. It's safe to say it's best to mail in at least 5 days before the Primary and General Elections.

QUESTIONS

There are many unanswered logistics questions for me, including these: How will the signatures be verified?

How do we know our ballots are received by the County Clerk? How will they be tracked? How and when would the ballots be counted and tracked? When will observers or the press be allowed to witness? How will the ballots be secured and verified?

This is the first implementation for this new mail-in ballot system.

At the very least, please tell your legislators that we need more service centers. Only two VSCs at Honolulu Hale and Kapolei is lacking and not public-friendly enough. Also email: elections@hawaii.gov to record your concerns or suggestions.

Thank you to all of you who have reached out with your support and prayers, and I look forward to returning soon to the Legislature's 2020 session which starts on January 15th.



They are located in Room 401 of the capitol and open to the public from 7:45 am - 6 pm, Monday through Friday during session.

Back Pain

Back pain is the most painful and non-lifethreatening condition. It is estimated that about 84% of adults have back pain at some point in their lives. Most back pain is not dangerous, but it can be debilitating. The following are some "red flag" situations: numbness in the groin; loss of bladder or bowel control; leg weakness that comes on suddenly; back pain that occurs at the same time as fever; pain that worsens instead of getting better. See your medical provider so your back pain can be evaluated.

X-rays initially then MRI may be necessary to rule out a herniation. If imaging shows a herniation, it will be between you and your medical provider to decide how to best treat it. Depending on the herniation, physical therapy and medications to reduce the pain are first line approaches because a mild herniation may respond to a nonsurgical approach. If the herniation is severe and there is leg weakness or any of the red-flag situations, surgery may be necessary to correct structural damage. The National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke recommends that exercise and movement may be the best medicine for back pain if there is no or mild herniation. While it may be tempting to lay in bed, doing so can make the back pain worse over time by reducing flexibility and muscle tone. If you are experiencing back pain because you tweaked your back, you don't have to stop your life and wait for it to heal. Apply ice, take ibuprofen 600-800 mg with food three times a day or Aleve 2 tablets with food twice a day, keep active but reduce the workload on your back till it feels better.



Lush Palm Landscapes Donates Their Time to Saving Haleiwa Town Gallons of Water

This holiday season Lush Palm Landscapes donated their time to resolving a significant irrigation leak that was taking place in the triangle park located directly across the street from Starbucks in Haleiwa Town. When performing a maintenance check on all the sprinkler heads, Lush Palm Landscapes noticed there was a massive pool of water in the grass around a sprinkler head. The leak was substantial, and the water looked like it had been pooling up for weeks. Brent from Lush Palm Landscapes called up the Board of Water Supply to help locate the leak as BWS helps

supply the park with water. BWS brought in a leak detection team to help pinpoint the hole in the system, and Lush Palm Landscapes repaired the lateral irrigation line that was causing the leak and restored the irrigation system, thus saving gallons of water. with death while surfing at one of his favorite spots-Pipeline. On December 31, 2019 on one of the biggest swells at Pipeline, Kohl was casual as usual took off on a second reef bomb. He made it to the inside but was not able to make the wave and fell, hitting his head on either his own board or the reef, He was knocked out unconscious his head split open. On his instagram he credits his rescuers Andrew Logreco, Kai Garcia and the whole lifeguard team for saving his life at Pipe. Kohl said "I am seeing the world clearer than ever. Five days in the hospital, finally home after the incredible performance and work by the Queen's neurosurgery

Local big wave surfer Kohl Christensen has a brush and trauma team. Removing blood between brain and skull, suturing the ruptured meningeal layers and installing metal plates to correct the fracture." He is seeing life differently and is expected to make a full recovery. Christensen is a co-founder of the BWRA organization, the Big Wave Risk Assessment Group. They train surfers on safety protocol which has saved his own life. He thanks everyone for being there for him! You too should get training at least basic lifeguard and water skills. You never know when these skills could save you or someone else in danger. Best wishes to the Christensen family!



Black History Series At Kahuku Library

Kahuku Public and School Library is celebrating Black History Month starting this January with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday on January 20th. A special book display, recommended reading list, timeline of African Americans in Hawai'i, artifacts, speeches, and photos are included. Taking a cue from our women's perspective panel on Kahuku's sugar plantation history during Kahuku Public and School Library's 50th Anniversary celebration last November 2018, our library is continuing to focus on uncovering stories that are not yet widely known and yet are relevant to our home here on O'ahu within the island chain of Hawai'i.

Very little is known about African Americans' contributions to Hawai'i and yet there's so much to appreciate and learn. For instance, most of us know that on March 25, 1965, Dr. King led thousands of nonviolent demonstrators to the steps of the capitol in Montgomery, Alabama, after a 5-day, 54-mile march from Selma, Alabama, to campaign for voting rights. . However, if you look at photos from the march, you will see Dr. King and other marchers wearing plumeria lei from Hawai'i. The lei were initially organized by Reverend Abraham Akaka, the older brother of U.S. Senator Daniel Akaka, of Kawaiahao Church in Honolulu to be a symbolic gesture of solidarity. . The two reverends bonded over their dedication to civil rights, nonviolence, and social justice. The lei arrived via a 5-person delegation who didn't think twice about bringing the lei because it was a gesture anyone from the islands would extend to someone at a special event.

And that's just the tip of the iceberg.

Researcher and Kahuku Public and School Volunteer Chris Kirk-Kuwaye, PhD and Professor Emeritus of Ethnic and Interdisciplinary Studies at UH Manoa Kathryn Waddell Takara, PhD (also both Ko'olauloa residents) have curated several articles, video clips, blog posts, and speeches from Dr. King's visits to Hawai'i for an interactive display to be held at our library throughout spring time.

An additional special feature will be a timeline edited by Dr. Waddell Takara on Africans and African Americans presence on the islands. The first entry is 1796 when King Kamehameha conquered O'ahu, a place were Black Jack (Keaka'ele'ele) was already living.

Another fascinating, yet rarely known fact is the contribution by the decorated US Army's 25th Negro Infantry Regiment known as the Buffalo Soldiers who arrived in Hawai'i to construct a road up to Mauna Kea on the Big Island in 1913. The road was used by volcanologist Thomas A. Jagger who needed the passage to transport equipment up the mountain for research and documentation on eruptions.

We will also have special presentations, the first being with Dr. Waddell Takara who will give an overview of Black history in Hawai'i on Tuesday, January 28th at 5:30pm in the Kahuku Public and School Library. Our Friends of the Library Kahuku will provide refreshments for this event. Come to learn, stimulate your curiosity, and meet our history buffs in the community.
