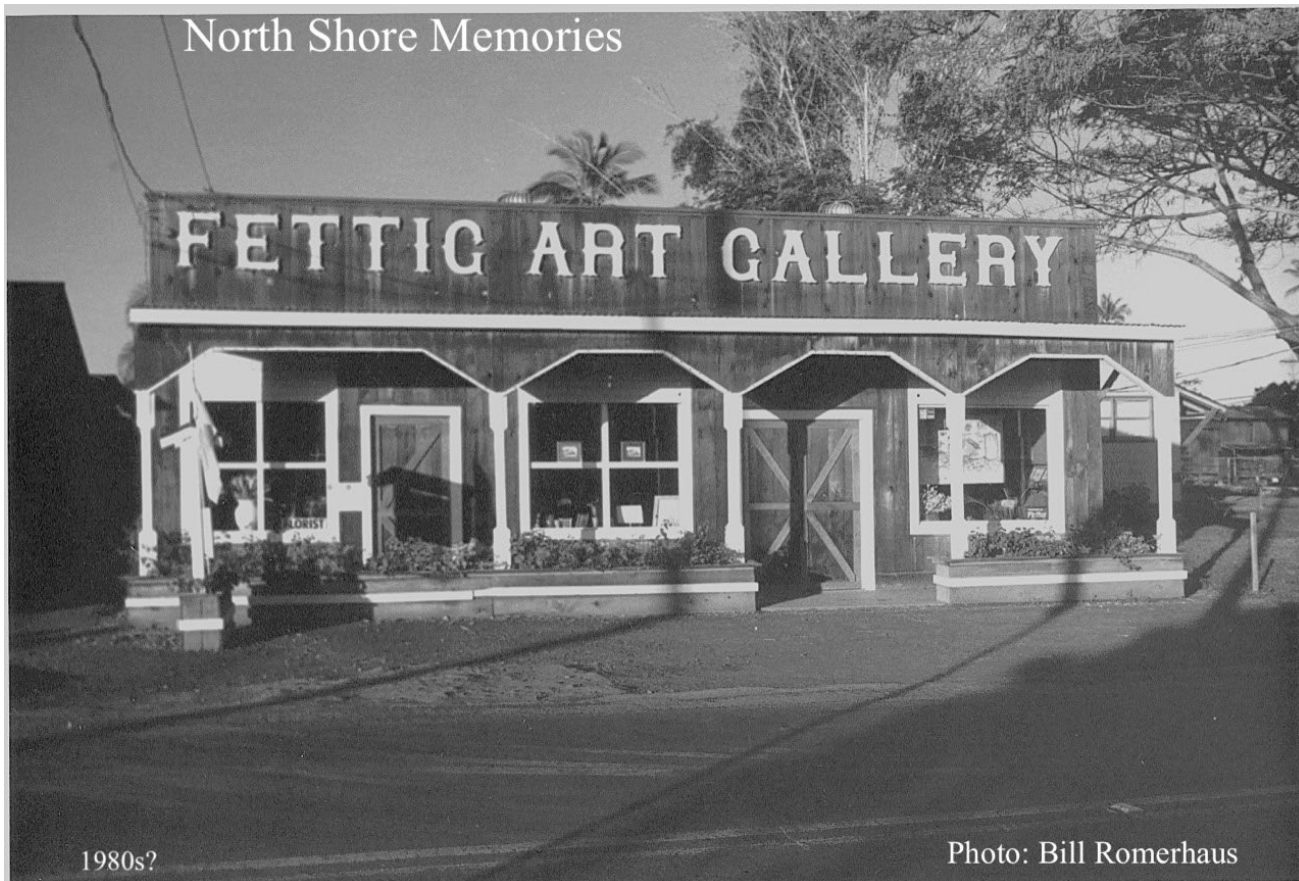

Aloha!

I wanted to take this opportunity to provide updates on projects that the City has been working to complete.

In January, the City reopened the comfort station at Three Tables in Pupukea after a complete re-roofing and refurbishment project was completed. The renovations had been completed, but small items had to be done before the facility could be turned back over to the Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR).

The Waialua District Park pool has been out of commission for years due to big issues and concerns being uncovered following a project to repair the pool deck. Electrical issues, asbestos and other problems arose which has caused a major delay to completing construction of pool improvements. We were notified that the construction bid was to be published by March at which time DDC would be able to better determine a completion date. We will continue to monitor the progress of the project and push to have it completed expeditiously.

In 2019, the City began emergency repair on a seawall at Haleiwa Beach Park. It had been closed off since April 2019 due to sinkholes developing which compromised the foundation of the wall. The emergency repair would help protect the adjacent comfort station, play area and other public facilities.

The Haleiwa Walkway Project has undergone several revisions and is scheduled to go to bid by the end of 2020. The project would rehabilitate Kamehameha Highway and provide the walkway and shoulder improvements, relocation of existing utilities and installation of planters along to help promote pedestrian safety through Haleiwa town.

The City is working on Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Improvements at Waialua District Park to construct ADA improvements to the existing park facilities. The consultant has been given the notice to proceed to finalize the construction bid documents. The project should go out to bid early this year.

The City is also working on lighting improvements for the Waialua District Park Ballfield. The project would entail demolition, replacement and upgrade of baseball field lighting system for a combination baseball/soccer field. Currently the project is undergoing construction and is projected to be completed this spring.

The City has planned to construct a multi-use path along Goodale Avenue next to the Waialua

District Park for pedestrians and bicyclists. The Department of Transportation Services (DTS) is currently completing the design of the path.

I wanted to give a big mahalo to DPR, DTS and the Department of Design and Construction (DDC) for their hard work and dedication to completing these needed projects. Their commitment to these improvements will help enhance the quality of life for both residents and visitors throughout the North Shore.

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St. Michael School to Open High School

For over 75 years, St. Michael School has been a staple in Waiialua, and many in our community have greatly benefited from a Catholic education, which focuses on academic excellence in a faith-based environment. Nearly the entire history of the school has been focused on providing a quality education for students in Preschool through Grade 8, but coming next school year, St. Michael School will be expanding to include an innovative option for high school students.

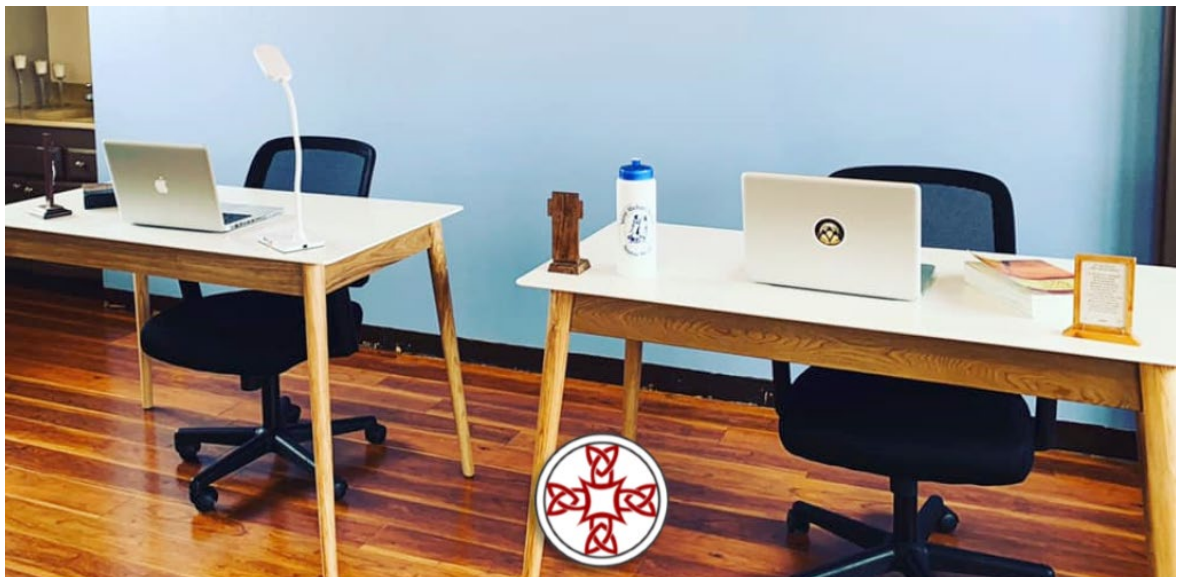
Last year, the school received a stellar recommendation for renewal of its WASC/WCEA accreditation. Part of the accreditation process included comment from the school's parents. One comment that incited much discussion from parents was their lack of options for continuing their child's Catholic education beyond St. Michael School. The nearest Catholic high school is Damien Memorial School, which is located over 27 miles away from St. Michael School, which often equates to a more than hour commute between their campus and Waiialua. Additionally, most private high school tuition rates are about twice as much as St. Michael School or even more. Parents were looking for a more convenient, cost-effective option.

In response to the parents' comments, St. Michael School has partnered with a high school program called Catholic Virtual. Instead of the traditional "brick and mortar" type school, this program offers a fully accredited online-based curriculum featuring highly qualified teachers from throughout the nation.

There will be an on-site learning center to provide students a safe space to complete their studies while being physically connected to a home campus. Families also have the option of enrolling "online-only" while still being able to participate in certain school events. Because of the virtual nature of this program, students can work independently at their own pace while having the support of an on-campus high school director as well as their teachers online. The curriculum includes participation in group projects with students on-campus and across the nation.

The format of the high school program is very similar to online courses currently offered by many colleges and universities. Part of the benefit of enrolling a student in this type of program is that it allows them to be more familiar with the online platform they will undoubtedly encounter in both post-high school studies as well as the emerging work force. Additionally, because the classes are offered online, it reduces the need to hire multiple subject area teachers or build additional spaces, so the cost of tuition is considerably less than the majority of private high schools on the island.

Town Hall Meetings

Many thanks to the hundreds of people who came to our Town Hall meetings earlier this month in Kahuku, Kahaluu and Waialua. Councilmember Heidi Tsuneyoshi, whose district is even larger than mine, joined me at all three meetings. Joining us in the areas of their House districts, Rep. Sean Quinlan attended two meetings, and Reps. Lauren Matsumoto and Lisa Kitagawa each participated in one. We live in a beautiful district amongst wonderful people.

Much of the discussion in Kahuku was about the unpopular Na Pua Makani wind project that now looms over the community but is not yet activated. Rep. Quinlan, CM Tsuneyoshi and I described our legislative efforts to establish better setback requirements, provide health monitoring studies, and even terminate the despised project. We also updated the community on the three legal challenges still in play that could prevent or delay the project from coming online.

In Kahaluu, we had a more conventional Town Hall meeting with discussion touching on a wide range of issues, legislative initiatives, and bills moving through the legislature. Community concerns ranged from Hawaiian Memorial Park expansion plans to Waikane Stream to TMT.

By the time our Waialua Town Hall arrived, news had broken that the Department of Transportation, Airport Division plans to rapidly close Dillingham Airfield. The elementary school cafeteria was filled, and dozens of people stood outside. While most attended to talk about the importance of saving the airfield, others came out to talk about agriculture lands and assorted other issues.

The halfway point of the legislature is rapidly approaching, and the culling of bill is accelerating. Watchers of the Legislature know that thousands of bills are introduced each year in January, but only a few hundred will survive the winnowing by the end of April.

Several of my proposals are still moving, including an income tax break for wage earners up to \$50,000 and no income tax on the first \$12,000. Another bill would create a renewable energy siting process to increase public participation in decisions that will involve many thousands of acres of land. The time has come to begin regulating shark boat tours, and I have a bill to provide business and financial education to inmates, so they can have a better chance to succeed when released from prison.

Other legislation coming down the path includes minimum wage increases, higher tax credits and payments for low wage earners, large investments in affordable housing projects, teacher benefits and incentives, and another proposal to create a state property tax. There will be many twists and turns yet to be seen.

As Gideon Tucker, a 19th century New York politician once said, "No man's life, liberty or property are safe while the Legislature is in session."

Aloha friends and neighbors!

Thank you to everyone who attended our town hall at the beginning of the month. I appreciated the opportunity to share about my bill package and to hear from you about important issues like Dillingham Airfield and preserving agricultural lands. Our office, along with Senator Riviere, Representative Quinlan, and Councilmember Tsuneyoshi are putting together a meeting in March at Waialua Elementary School to specifically address the future of Dillingham Airfield. We are also requesting that members from the Department of Transportation and the US Army are there to answer your questions. If you would like to be kept informed about the exact date and time of that meeting, please sign up for my e-newsletter at www.RepMatsumoto.com.

One of the bills that I shared about at the town-hall that I'm most excited about this session is moving on to its final committee before crossover. HB 2624 would create a brand-new Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) website. Anyone who's tried to find information about upcoming projects, determine when the public comment period opens and closes, or submit testimony knows how frustrating it is to find this basic information. You shouldn't have to be an attorney, lobbyist, or industry professional to find information and voice your opinion about some of the largest projects that shape our communities for years to come.

If you support transparency and accountability in State government, sign up to receive updates, submit testimony, and track the progress of HB 2624 by going to capitol.hawaii.gov and entering "HB 2624" in the "Bill Status/Measure Status" box on the left side of the screen.

In addition to representing our community in the Legislature, I'm also a co-convenor of the Women's Legislative Caucus (WLC). We're a bipartisan group of legislators made up of Hawaii's women Representatives and Senators. This year, the WLC dedicated our 2020 bill package to the Women's Suffrage Movement. Because of the hard work and sacrifice of suffragettes over 100 years ago, we can now celebrate the 100th anniversary of ratification of the 19th amendment, which gave women the right to vote.

Although we celebrate Women's History Month every March, this year is special because we remember the monumental accomplishments and leadership of the women who fought for voting equality. And as an executive board member of the national

organization Women in Government (WIG), I love to see women fight for lasting change that benefits our communities. Let's celebrate all the women in our lives and encourage them to continue using their voice in honoring and productive ways that makes a positive difference for Hawaii!

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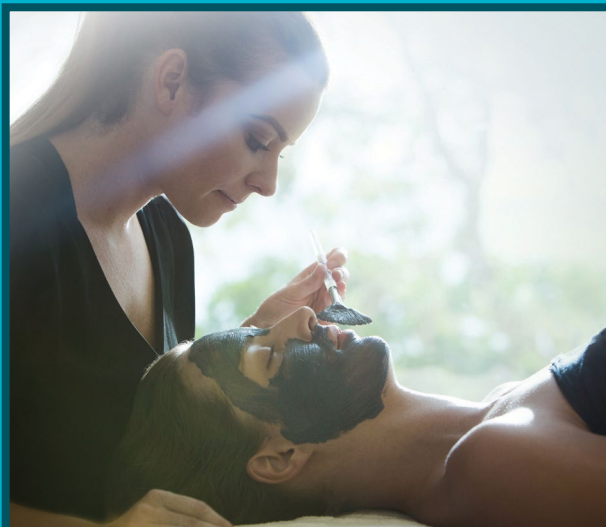

"The Council finds that equal opportunity to participate in and be involved in sport and physical activity, whether for the purpose of leisure and recreation, health promotion or high performance, is the right of every person and that historically, women's activities have often been subordinated to men's activities. City resources should be allocated fairly and without discrimination or preference on the basis of sex or gender and such allocation should redress any inequitable balance in the benefits available to women, men, and persons of any gender. SURFRIDER WORKING FOR US

Surfrider is on the go to produce new legislation to tackle the plastic pollution crisis. They have announced that the legislation is now official. The act is called the "Break Free From Plastic Act" and was introduced into congress. The legislation will require producers of plastic packages to organize and finance recycling programs and to create a nationwide beverage container refund program. This is on a federal level and will certainly make an impact. Other stipulations are ban single use plastic bags and place a fee on them. It aims to spur massive investments in U.S. recycling and composting infrastructure and pause new plastic production and more EPA regulations. It all sounds great and lets hope our Federal Government makes some changes asap.

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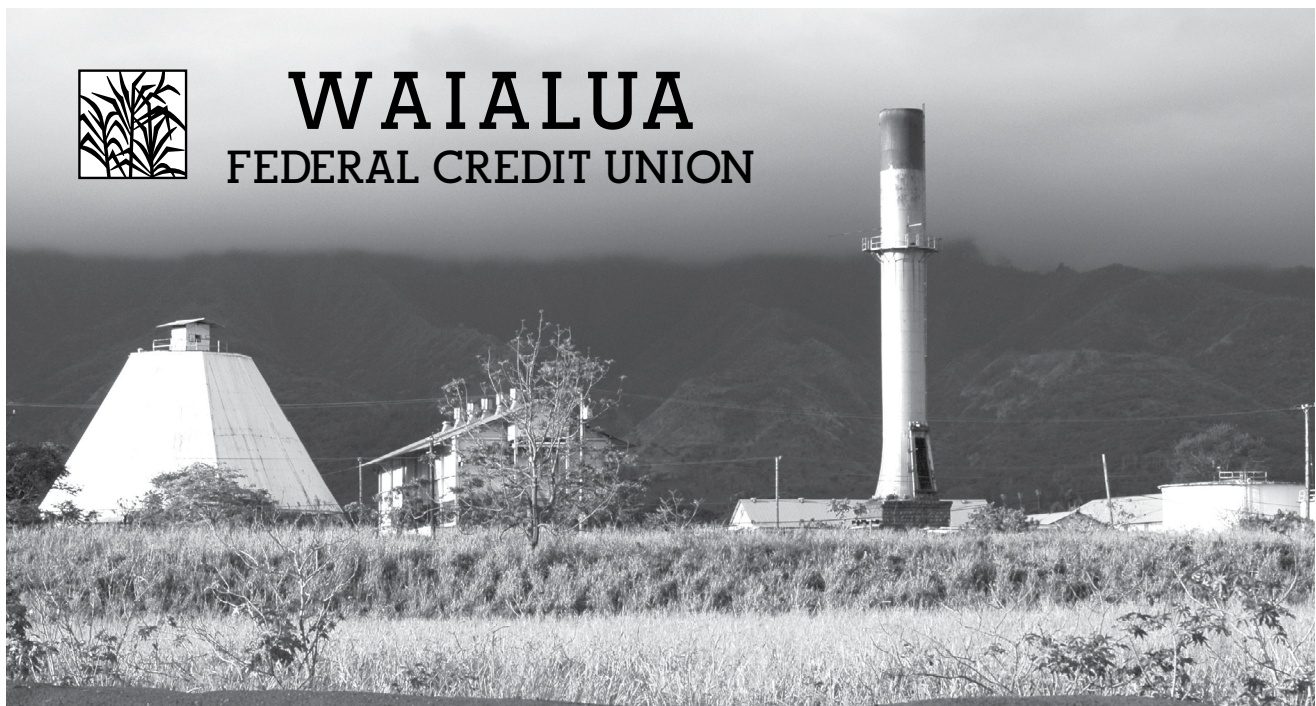

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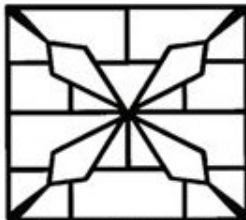
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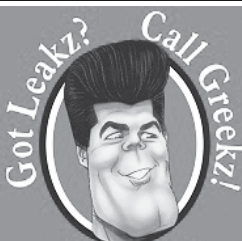
