
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
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## Kent Senatore Inducted into the Skateboarding Hall of Fame-2021

Congratulations to long time North Shore resident and 1970's pro-skater Kent Senatore. He was recently inducted into the Skateboarding Hall of Fame at the 2021 ceremony held at the Vans Block in Costa Mesa, California. Kent was recognized by his peers for his innovation and style that has inspired countless skateboarders. Riding at the skatepark or in backyard pools, he was known for his backside laybacks, and stylish frontside air. He is probably best-known for skating loops in the iconic half-capsule Turning Point designed by his brother, Scott Senatore, which toured cities across the US.

Kent's friends will often describe him as a humble introvert, but if you chat with him at the local skatepark, his passion for skateboarding and storytelling will quickly emerge. You may see him dropping into the pool or offering tips of encouragement to the young beginners. Kent believes that skateboarding teaches valuable skills, such as self-confidence, patience, creativity, and perseverance. Life and responsibilities can pull you in many directions, but when you can, Kent says, "Just go out and ride your skateboard."

Aloha,

It is hard to believe that 2021 is coming to a close and 2022 is right around the corner. This has been a year of challenges for the North Shore with the impacts of flooding in March and continuing stressors due to Covid-19. Through it all individuals, families, community groups and leaders have come together to support our communities in so many ways. I am continually inspired and grateful for the opportunity to work together as we continue to do our best to support each other during these challenging times.

As we close out the year, I would like to highlight one of the last bills that were past which was introduced on behalf of the North Shore communities. Bill 34 related to the regulation of commercial activities at City Parks. For many years, even before my time serving on the City Council, the District II office has overwhelmingly been contacted by residents from the North Shore regarding the high concentration of commercial activities at City beach parks.

As we know, the North Shore continues to be a main draw for Oahu visitors, but it is not just a visitor destination. Our beaches, parks and other public resources are heavily used by visitors, which creates conflict at times. While the ideal situation would be a healthy balance of commercial and residential usage, that balance has been off for a long time. The ease of obtaining permits mixed with lack of enforcement has led to a saturation of commercial activity at our parks and has indirectly pushed residents out.

The pandemic shutdowns afforded our beaches an opportunity to rehabilitate and the community to experience life without the big crowds and traffic. As Oahu began opening up, visitor numbers began hitting record highs again and the North Shore felt much of the impact. By the hundreds, visitors descended on Haleiwa. Despite it being a boon for the reeling economy, North Shore residents once again had to deal the same pre-pandemic issues. Seeing this, I felt it was necessary to take action and help mitigate these impacts to provide some relief for residents who would simply like to enjoy the beaches and parks and be able to move freely in their communities.

I recognize the need for the Department of Parks and Recreation to develop an island-wide policy that more thoroughly regulates commercial activity, but strongly believe that the North Shore communities


are in critical need of respite and regulations after requesting action for over a decade. Bill 34 was adopted on December 1st and prohibits commercial activity, including recreational tour stops by commercial tour companies, outside of commercial filming and shorewater events at Waiale'e Beach Park, Sunset Beach Park, 'Ehukai Beach Park, Pupukea Beach Park, Waimea Bay Beach Park, Haleiwa Ali'i Beach Park, Kaiaka Bay Beach Park, and the undeveloped portions of Haleiwa Beach Park commonly referred to as Pua'ena Point.

I believe that through the passage of Bill 34, we can now work to balance the usage of our parks and beaches and find a middle ground that can satisfy commercial vendors and North Shore residents alike. The 2022 session is approaching quickly! I look forward to introducing and sponsoring legislation that will help our community, and all of Hawaii, as we continue to recover from the pandemic and build for the future. My goal is that the work we do during the 2022 legislative session will benefit our community and reflect your values.

In order to do this, I need to hear from you! Every year I ask my constituents in District 45 to share their views, thoughts, and opinions about what they think the most important issues are for our district and our State. I have created a survey so that I can hear directly from you about what issues are important, what legislation you think we should consider, and what priorities you have regarding the dozens of issues that appear before the legislature each year.

Your voice is incredibly important to this process! My sincerest hope is to represent you the best I can, and in order to do that I need to hear from you. To participate in my Community Input Survey please visit my website at <u>www.RepMatsumoto.com</u>. If you prefer to fill out the survey offline, be on the lookout for a printed copy coming to your address in the mail. The results of the survey will be used to help inform my staff and I on the opinions and concerns of District 45 community members. It will help us draft the legislation I will introduce this session and inform the way I vote on all measures that will be introduced.

It is also a great time to brush up on the lawmaking process. I created a resource of instructional guides to help the public get involved. Visit www.RepMatsumoto.com and click 'How to Get Involved' at the top of the page, scroll down to 'Legislative Instructions' where you can download four PDFs that will walk you through how to register with the State Capitol website (capitol.hawaii.gov), how to track bills, how to write and how to submit testimony on issues you care about. The Public Access Room at lrb.hawaii.gov/par/ is another wonderful resource to learn more about the legislative process. They are available specifically for providing the public with information, facilities and services to assist as you engage and participate in the State legislative process. Our system of government doesn't work correctly when the community isn't involved.

Dear Doctor, what is hypertension, and how can I try to manage it without medications?

Two numbers measure blood pressure: the upper number, systolic blood pressure, is the pressure in your arteries when your heartbeats. The lower number, diastolic blood pressure, is the pressure in your arteries in between heartbeats.

The American Heart Association defines normal blood pressure as a systolic blood pressure less than 120 mmHg and diastolic blood pressure less than 80 mmHg. High blood pressure stage I, or hypertension stage I, is when your systolic blood pressure is between 120 - 129 mmHg and/ or your diastolic blood pressure is between 80 -90 mmHg. High blood pressure stage II, or hypertension stage II, is when your systolic blood pressure is greater than 140 mmHg and/or your diastolic blood pressure is greater than 90 mmHg.

Many people have blood pressure cuffs at home or borrow a family or friend's cuff to measure their blood pressure. If you want to get an accurate blood pressure reading, make sure you 1) sit in a chair with your back straight and supported by the chair, 2) keep your feet flat on the floor, 3) make sure the arm with the blood pressure cuff on is at heart level (the middle of your chest), and 4) you have rested for at least 5 minutes before checking the blood pressure. Also, make sure you follow the directions of how to appropriately apply and use your blood pressure cuff before tracking your recordings!

Below are the most effective recommendations for managing your blood pressure without medications:

• The Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension (DASH) diet, -11 mmHg in systolic blood pressure

• For every 2.2lb (1kg) of weight loss, -1 mmHg in systolic blood pressure

• 90 - 150 minutes per week of aerobic exercise, -7 mmHg in systolic blood pressure

• Reduce your alcohol intake, if you drink, -4 mmHg in systolic blood pressure

### Dr. Murata Eyes Retirement

On January 1, 2022 when most people welcome the new year, Dr. Clarence Murata will close his optometry practice in Haleiwa after 42 years. Anyone wishing a referral to another eye care practitioner should call his office at 808-637-5048.

Born and raised in Haleiwa, he attended Haleiwa Elementary and Waialua High & Intermediate School where he graduated in 1968. He then attended the University of Southern California for his Bachelor's degree then moved on to Pacific University College of Optometry in Oregon where he graduated in 1977.

Says Dr. Murata, "My goal was to always come back and practice in Haleiwa."

Upon his return, there was no space available in Haleiwa. He spent his first years working in an optical lab until he was able to share office space with Dentist Dr. Fred Sunahara at the former office of Dr. Rodman Miller. After more than 20 years at that location, he moved to his present location.

"A lot of people I attended school with have patronized me over the years. Now some of their sons and daughters and their families have been coming to see me. It has been gratifying that many of my classmates, many of my former teachers from Haleiwa Elementary School and Waialua High & Intermediate School, and so many members from the community have trusted me with their visual care."

Dr. Murata has witnessed quite a transformation in Haleiwa over the years. As a longtime North Shore Chamber of Commerce member, he has had the opportunity to share many childhood memories with Barbara Ritchie from the chamber's Historic Preservation Committee. She often has used him as a resource to help identify people in archival photos.

"One time the person she asked me to identify was my mother!" he says.

Looking forward to slowing down, Dr. Murata plans to work part-time filling in for eye doctors going on vacation. He is also planning to spend more time in his yard, play more golf, and do more traveling when pandemic restrictions are lifted. Perhaps he might return to Japan, or explore Australia and New Zealand. Most of all, he looks forward to spending more time with his wife, Karen, a retired Punahou School teacher, and his daughter Kathryn, a recent recipient of a Master's degree in International Relations and Studies now working at the East-West

## North Shore Christmas Over 100 Years Ago

The Holiday Season of 1918 was quite a festive time on the North Shore. Our troops and Red Cross volunteers were returning from the Great War in Europe. The OR&L Railroad connected Waialua to Honolulu on a daily basis. Tourists filled the Hale'iwa Hotel, where some were to be found lounging on the beach, paddling up the river, or enjoying the shooting sports mauka. A large Christmas tree had been shipped in from San Francisco on the same steamship that brought most of the visitors to the islands, a week earlier. The kitchen staff was preparing a traditional holiday feast of locally grown turkey, sweet potatoes, rice, fresh fish and recently pounded poi.


The arch fronting Lili'uokalani Church was wrapped with flowers, paper ornaments and candles. The Japanese Christian Church, near the Waialua Plantation Offices was diverting parishioners from both the Waialua and Hale'iwa Hongwanji Missions, as was the Korean Christian Church, near the recently shuttered St. Michaels Catholic Church.

The most brightly decorated home was that of Albert Andrew Wilson, Manager of Waialua Water Company. Houses occupied by the German engineers and other Europeans in Haole Camp had traditional trappings as well.

Gifts were exchanged between neighbors and

neighborhoods while the Plantation sponsored a caroling contest in the park.

It was a truly wonderful Christmas, with prospects for a Very Happy New year of 1919.

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### LUANA SILVA QUALIFIES FOR THE BIG SURF TOUR

North Shore local surfer, born and raised, has qualified for the big tour. The 17 year old regular foot power surfs at her home spot Velzyland, charges at Sunset and ventures into the outside reefs as well as Waimea. At the recent Haleiwa Challenger event she was in a tie, it was broken by a 3rd wave score to give her the nod. Born to Brazilian parents in Hawaii gives her the spirit and the aloha to greatly represent the North Side. The first WCT event will be coming up at Pipeline January 29 to February 19th. Also qualifying and winning the Haleiwa challenger event was Bettylou Sakura Johnson. Johnson is only 16, one of the youngest to ever qualify. Haleiwa is her home break where she excels. Johnson beat World Champion Carissa Moore to take the win. Kauai's Gabriela Bryan also qualified for the big tour. Hawaii has six women competing. Included on the list is Malia Manuel, Moore, Tatiana Weston-Webb and the three mentioned. On the men's side Ezekiel Lau from Honolulu and Imaikalani deVault will be representing. It will be a more interesting around the world challenge for us at home!

#### **RED BULL MAGNITUDE**

It's the second season for the Red Bull Magnitude event which features women big wave riders. The event will crown the top female big-wave surfers of the 2021-2022 season. The event is designed to provide women big-wave surfers equal opportunity in the water. The event is three months starting December 1st at three iconic surf breaks, Waimea Bay, Outer reef spots and Peahi on Maui. The event this year includes a tow-in division, with a \$50,000 purse as well as other prizes. The event pays homage to the heritage of women big wave pioneers while simultaneously paving the way for the future generation. It will provide safety crews, film crews as well as an abundance of publicity for all the competitors. It's a big deal. A contest that is unshackled by one day restrictions, unfair waiting periods and a single location. Magnitude is the ultimate test for big-wave women surfers.



### COVID19 Free Services at BYU–Hawai'i to Community by Nomi Health

For a year, the communities in Ko'olauloa have had access to free COVID19 testing services by Nomi Health at BYU-H. In August 2020, BYU-H president Dr. John Kauwe III partnered with Nomi Health to provide free COVID19 testing services to students on campus. Nomi Health is based in Salt Lake City Utah founded in 2019 as a direct healthcare company with several labs across the continent with partner laboratories to provide "burden-free" testing programs. Nomi Health's burden-free program during the COVID19 pandemic is designed to not burden the patient with requirements of insurance, doctor's note, or payment for testing services. December 2020 Kauwe opened the campus to the community to access free COVID19 testing services by Nomi Health, he believes that "Keeping our Koolauloa community safe is a top priority for BYU-Hawaii." To date, there have been approximately 10,000 free tests administered by Nomi Health. Nomi Health hired BYU-H students to work six days a week, Monday to Friday from 7 am - 2 pm, Saturday 9 am - 12 pm and closed Sunday. Nomi Health site lead and BYU-H student Lucas Taylor shared that each day there are approximately 7 - 10 staff to meet the testing needs of the students and community administering 150 – 300 tests daily. Taylor has heard from community members that have been tested or brought their children to be tested that the access and availability in Lā'ie to free COVID19 tests and quick turnaround results enable them to return to work or school also a sense of calm. The antigen or more commonly known as the rapid CO-VID19 test is on site and takes 15-20 minutes for the results to be emailed. The PCR test takes 24-72 hours for the results to be emailed. Registration is required online by going to https://mdc.nomihealth.com/easy\_registration/40/onsite. Name and social security must be filled out to schedule an appointment. Nomi Health personnel for online support and health screening results can also be contacted at 808-207-5459.

### Welcoming Father Sebastian Kumar Soosai to St. Roch and St. Joachim

Father Sebastian Kumar Soosai was welcomed as the new pastor at St. Roch and St. Joachim on July 1, 2020. Father Sebastian previously served 4 years as pastor in Maui at Maria Lanakila in Lahaina and Kihei at Saint Theresa. Born and raised in India, he knew from age 8 years old that he wanted to be a priest from his upbringing in St. Thomas church and has since been a principal, teacher, associate pastor, and administrator. He earned a bachelor's degree in Philosophy and master's degree in English. Father Sebastian arrived in the middle of COVID19 during suspended services without the opportunity for face-to-face contact. He described this time as difficult for his parishioners, but he was able to overcome this adversity by meeting with people in their homes, visiting congregants in the hospital, and through interfaith homebound food distribution in collaboration with BYU-H to anyone in need regardless of religious affiliation. When state protocols allowed, St. Roch reopened limited in person services. Father Sebastian has seen that the outdoor grotto galvanizes the elderly to sit and pray, yoga classes every Tuesday at 6 pm draw many to exercise, and excited that the youth ministry for children grades 1 - 8 reopened limited in person classes with continued online classes. St. Roch weekday mass schedule is at 9 am, Sunday mass at 7:30 am and 9:30 am. St. Joachim mass is Saturday at 5 pm and the beautiful beachside church also offers destination weddings and funerals, for more information please contact Kay Yumoto-Wagner at 808-293-5026.
