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# Legislature Passes Historic Bill for Three-Year Pilot Program To Assess Carrying Capacity of Pūpūkea Marine Life Conservation District

On April 29, 2022, the Hawai'i Legislature unanimously passed a bill, SB3330, introduced by North Shore Senator Gil Riviere and supported by Representative Sean Quinlan, to fund a three-year pilot program administered by the State Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) to assess the "carrying capacity" of the Pūpūkea Marine Life Conservation District (MLCD). The bill received 100% supportive testimony and is awaiting the signature of Governor David Ige.


Established in 1983 and expanded to 100 acres in 2003, the Pūpūkea Marine Life Conservation District (MLCD) is one of only three MLCDs on Oʻahu and eleven statewide. Based on "carrying capacity" studies conducted in 2018-2020, Hanauma Bay modernized its management system to reduce the impacts on marine life of overcrowding. That MLCD now has two "rest days" each week, limitations on visitors, and priority access for residents. In contrast, the Pūpūkea MLCD has no limitation on the number of people who can access or use the area. Certain areas of the Pūpūkea MLCD, particularly Kapoʻo Tidepools and Sharks Cove, heavily promoted by the visitor industry, have become "loved to death" — pushing out residents who have long enjoyed the area and damaging marine life habitat.

As North Shore residents know, the Pūpūkea MLCD had a brief "rest period" during the early stages of the pandemic. Marine life quickly rebounded and extraordinary water clarity returned to the nearshore areas. During that period, Mālama Pūpūkea-Waimea conducted human use and biological surveys in the Kapo'o Tidepools and Sharks Cove areas. We found that, given a break from thousands of feet a day trampling the tidepools, the marine life rebounded quickly. In Kapo'o Tidepools alone, we counted over 70 different species of fish!

This unusual "COVID pause" gave our community the rare opportunity to see an ecosystem we love recover -- on its own, in real time. But the respite was brief. Tourism has bounced back to peak levels and is predicted to increase in the near future. North Shore residents know the beaches in this area have become more crowded, now every day of the week. Data back this up. Over the past ten years, MPW has observed a tripling in visitor use of sensitive areas like the Kapo'o Tidepools – now, between 1000-2000 people each day are trampling and impacting the marine life in this fragile, shallow-water area of the Pūpūkea MLCD. Perhaps not a coicidence, Mondays are when Hanauma Bay is closed, and social media is apparently redirecting firsttime snorkelers to Kapo'o and Sharks Cove. Ironically, on high-surf days that close out nearby beaches, inexperienced visitors flock to wade in the Tidepools, unaware of the fragility and richness of that marine habitat.

Can the sensitive areas of the MLCD ecosystem sustain that level of use? The goal of SB3330 is to take the lessons learned from the "pandemic pause" and the Hanauma Bay experience, and determine how to better mangage the diverse areas of the MLCD to achieve a healthy and abundant marine reserve in perpetuity. SB3330 also requires DLNR to report back to the Legislature in 2026, which will strengthen a future management plan for the Pūpūkea MLCD, supporting the goals of the State's "30x30 Holomua Initiative" to effectively manage 30% of Hawai'i's nearshore areas by 2030.

Mahalo to our elected representatives and our community for supporting the health and abundance of the Pūpūkea MLCD!

#### The Healer Stones of Kapaemahu


Opening at Bishop Museum June 17 is an exhibition that explores the hidden history and contemporary meaning of a beloved Honolulu monument. Co-curated by north shore residents Joe Wilson & Dean Hamer with collaborator Hinaleimoana Wong-Kalu, the exhibition focuses on four boulders placed on Waikiki Beach in tribute to four legendary mahu - individuals of dual male and female spirit - who brought healing arts from Tahiti to Hawaii long ago.

Although the stones have survived for centuries, their story has been suppressed and the respected role of mahu erased. Through groundbreaking research, film, and art, the exhibition revitalizes this mo'olelo to help restore this storied site as a reminder of Hawaii's long tradition of inclusion, acceptance, and aloha.

The exhibition opens to previews on June 17, followed by a screening of PBS documentary, The Healer Stones of Kapaemahu, on the museum's Great Lawn. The exhibition runs through October 16.

Aloha,

As a project in the making for decades, the Mayor has signed off to release funding for the construction of the Haleiwa Beach Park Mauka canoe halau project.

For too long the North Shore has been without a canoe halau, an important facility that is present in other paddling communities across the island. North Shore canoe clubs produce some of the island's most talented and competitive paddling teams, despite the limited resources available to them. A contingent of leaders within the paddling community have worked for many years to have a public canoe halau in Haleiwa, similar to what has been constructed in Hawaii Kai and Ala Moana. During my time as a staffer and Councilmember, funding continued to be allocated for the canoe halau project, but nothing ever came to fruition. The paddling community continued to persevere, advocating for the project at meetings, garnering support from other paddling and community organizations and meeting with legislators and government officials to keep the project alive.

The Haleiwa Beach Park Mauka Canoe Halau project is funded for \$1.5 million dollars to construct a new halau to be utilized for the storage of competition canoes. The project is supported by longstanding canoe clubs Manu O Ke Kai and Haleiwa Outrigger Canoe Club, who provide paddling opportunities for communities from Mililani to Laie. The canoe clubs combine to serve over 350 paddlers and also students at Kahuku High School, Waialua High School, Leilehua High School and Mililani High School. A public canoe halau provides a valuable service to canoe clubs by creating a central, secured storage facility for high-valued koa and fiberglass racing canoes. This project brings some equity to the North Shore and Windward paddling communities as there are no public canoe halau along the coast from Kailua to Makaha.

In 2020, I introduced a resolution urging the City administration to construct the canoe halau which was unanimously adopted. Following adoption of the resolution, we took part in a stakeholder meeting with supporters of the project and members of the City administration which included a follow-up site visit to the project location. In 2019 and 2021, I reappropriated the past funding for the project to allow the conversation to continue in hopes that we would get to a place where we could move the project forward.

I am very excited that we are beginning to make some headway with this important project. As the Department of Parks and Recreation winds down its projects for this fiscal year, they will begin new projects, including the canoe halau project, in the next fiscal year, which begins July 1st. We will continue to stay in touch with the department to ensure the project continues to progress and keep the community up to date with the updates on the project.



#### Aloha friends and neighbors!

The 2022 Hawaii State Legislative Session has now adjourned. In the midst of the hustle and bustle at the capitol now that it has reopened and the excitement of community events allowing us to gather in person once more, I have been reflecting on my past 10 years in office. It is my honor and privilege to serve you in the State House. I am so proud of the accomplishments we have achieved so far, and I am so excited for the future. From the bottom of my heart, mahalo for working together with me for our community.

I am happy to share that my bill HB2213 Relating to Mail Theft passed through the legislature and has been sent to the Governor's desk. Package theft has been an increasing issue in our state. In our presession survey of the district, crime was a top issue. HB2213 establishes the criminal offense of mail theft to provide a solution for the increased theft of packages left outside of residences and businesses from third-party carriers like UPS and FedEx. Additionally, for the past several years I have been advocating to update the antiquated systems the state government employs to publish Environmental Impact Statements in order to create more transparency. I am happy to share that my resolution HR82 passed and will serve to update the EIS process to become a more user-friendly platform.

One of my favorite things is to have both High School and College students join me in the office and community as interns. During this legislative session, we had one High School student (Keenan Yoshizawa, a Junior at Mililani High School) and one College student (Aiden Waldrep, a Sophomore at UH Manoa) join my office as interns. Both of these impressive young men were vital additions to our team this year and I cannot speak enough about how proud I am to see them succeed. It is students like them that make me so excited for our community and hopeful for the future of Hawaii.

If your child or someone you know is interested in an internship in my Capitol office, I would love to have them apply. Open to all High School Juniors and Seniors as well as College students of any level, the internship provides a unique opportunity to work with a legislator in the House of Representatives - giving students insight into our local legislative process and how we work to improve our community, district, and state. The Hawaii State Legislative Session usually takes place between January and May every year. Legislative Internships will begin on the first





# Mauka to Makai Ecosystem

At Waimea Valley, we want our plants to be all that they can be. We support them from the time that they sprout, to the time they grow fruit and seeds, and throughout their lives to make room for the up and coming generations. As a seedling emerges from its bed of soil and leaves, it has one main goal, to make it to the top. It wants to grow and thrive (not unlike ourselves) and find a self-sustaining situation, complete with optimum sunlight, moisture, and nutrients. Maybe even one day, it will be big enough to produce seeds, and provide its own bed of leaves for the next generation to emerge from

Conservation efforts to jump start new forests, remove invasive species, and preserve existing forest, have now exceeded the 10 year mark in Waimea Valley. We can now observe a noticeable impact that has been made to reduce soil erosion and produce healthier soils that are more readily available to absorb water, than our typical O'ahu soils that have been depleted by years of use and neglect, and inundation by invasive species.

Waimea, interpreted as 'red water', historically floods and getting caught up in the run-off is our topsoils and sediments that end up in our streams and eventually the ocean. Sedimentation of reefs is a major cause of coral stress and bleaching, and it is in our interest to reduce the amount of loose sediments that enter into our watershed through reforestation efforts, and help to protect marine ecosystems. However, the periodic connection of our river to the ocean is a natural process which


allows for the eggs of the Hawaiian freshwater goby, or o'opu, to float down river into the sea where they reach juvenile stage, and eventually return to the freshwater streams to become adults. Waimea's main river known as Kamananui, contains 4 of the 5 species of o'opu.

One of the most fundamental forces making existence possible on planet Earth are our forests. They provide us with the fresh water we need to survive, clean air to breathe, and also create habitat for various forms of life. A main component of our forests are the trees and plants that make them up. Healthy forest ecosystems consist of plants well adapted to their environments, allowing for various processes to continue the cycle of life.


The conservation team would like to thank all of the volunteers that have supported our mauka forest restoration efforts, as it would not be possible without all of you. It truly shows what can be done with the work of many hands. We invite everyone willing and able to spend some time to hike with us up to our restoration sites through the Hanai 'aina volunteer program. Here we spend a few hours to malama by removing invasive plants to help existing natives, or plant more native Hawaiian species to boost the forest ecosystem.



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
