

Ballot Tracking Service Available for Hawaii Voters

As the 2022 General Election ballots are prepared for mailing, election officials want to remind voters that they can sign up to receive ballot tracking alerts at elections.hawaii.gov. Voters can sign up to receive text, email, or voice alerts letting them know where their ballot is in the voting process.

Voters who sign up will be notified when their ballot has been mailed, received, and accepted for counting. Reminders will also be sent to voters to return their ballot as the deadline nears. Additionally, voters will be notified if there is an issue with their signature on their return ballot envelope.

"Over 13,000 voters signed up for ballot tracking alerts during the Primary Election and we hope more voters take advantage to give them that peace of mind that their ballot is on its way or that it has been received and accepted for counting," said Scott Nago, Chief Election Officer. "Once your ballot has been accepted for counting, voters can also download their virtual 'I Voted' sticker," he added.

When signing up, voters can choose their preferred method of delivery and set the hours to when they would like to receive the alerts. Voters who choose not to sign up for notifications can still log in and track their ballot.

Halstead Mill, Waialua

The first sugar mill built in Waialua by the Halstead family in 1883. The family mill wasn't in operation long, it is said that the mill was destroyed in a fire in the 1890's leaving the sugar stack still standing. Sugar-cane workers cared for the sugar stack and kept it in good condition through-out the years. The Halstead sugar stack still stands off Kaukonahua Road near Kemoo Camp.

Aloha Friends and Neighbors!

This month, I want to highlight a great organization that helps and empowers those who are the most vulnerable in our community. Achieve Zero is a nonprofit organization that works to reduce homelessness in Oahu by empowering people in need to achieve self-sufficiency through genuine compassion and innovative, community-based solutions and by delivering quality, comprehensive services, and effective partnerships.

Founded in January 2016 Achieve Zero, formerly known as ALEA Bridge, champions providing outreach and after-hours outreach homeless services and referrals to North Shore, Waialua, Haleiwa, Wahiawa, Mililani as well as Aiea, Pearl City, Waipahu, Ewa, Kapolei regional communities. Currently, the organization serves more than 1,000 homeless and at-risk homeless, individuals, families, veterans, and youth.

Recently my office staff and I volunteered to help with a food distribution that Achieve Zero spearheaded. Homelessness affects so many people in our state, and this is an issue that we can help with! If you would like to volunteer there are a number of ways you can help! Some of the Volunteer jobs include:

- Send Thank You letters to donors
- Event planning
- Assist at monthly food drives
- Coordinate and plan monthly food drives
- Complete reports of families served at Achieve Zero food drives
- Visits communities and canvasses neighborhoods.
- Connect homeless clients to appropriate resources. I.E: SNAP, Medical, Behavioral Health, etc.
- Participate in outreach to homeless encampments

Achieve Zero also shared with my office about a new tool for concerned residents to use to report homeless individuals and encampments that they encounter. While in the past there was an email to report concerns, Achieve Zero has created a user-friendly online form to collect the necessary information the need to care for those in need, as well as to keep the reporter apprised of the progress of the situation.

The advantages of the new online form process are:

- 1. The reporter will receive notification via email that their request has been received by Achieve Zero.
- 2. Achieve Zero's outreach team will receive realtime notifications when a referral is received in their system.

3. After a referral has been assigned to an outreach case manager, the reporter will receive updates on whether or not contact with the person/people reported was made – case managers will make 3 attempts.







I was a successful Interior Designer in Los Angeles, but Hawai'i was calling me, so I moved here 30 years ago. I live down by Shark's Cove. So yes, I am driving in Turtle traffic every day...but I do not mind that quiet time and seeing our beautiful beaches.

I was the buyer, manager etc., for another business in Haleiwa for 15 years. It was time for me to have my own store, so I opened Kai Ku Hale. The name translates to "House on the gentle Ocean at low tide", which is what I love to do: walk the beach and collect shells, sea glass, and driftwood. I love natural products and reclaimed materials - so the shop carries lots of these types of items made by local makers. We also have some cool reclaimed boat wood/reclaimed wood furniture which I import.

Kai Ku Hale represents more than 60 artists, many of whom are North Shore residents. We have a few artists/creators from the outer islands but most live here on O'ahu. I love brainstorming with our local artists to create new items.

I have a love of Hawaiiana and vintage ceramics, so the shop sells lots of cool vintage lamps, and decorative items. Kai Ku Hale really has something for everyone. Many items are for visitors, but we also cater to locals with all the home furnishings, lamps, etc. We have five cases of handmade jewelry; each local jewelry designer has their own look and style. The shop is constantly changing as our creatives are always bringing in new creations, so each day is a juggling act of how to fit it in. You might see the lights on in the evening when we are not open... that's me in there moving things around and taking pics.



Ka Ho'olaule'a Mai'a Banana Festival

On Sunday, November 13, Hawai'i Banana Source, Slow Food Hawaii and Hawai'i SEED will be holding a first of its kind banana festival, Ka Mai'a Ho'olaule'a, with our partner Hi'ipaka LLC, in beautiful Waimea Valley. The event will run from 11:00am-4:00pm.

While most of us are familiar with local apple bananas and the ubiquitous Central American Chiquita, few of us have ever eaten a true Hawaiian banana or enjoyed a savory banana dish. We hope to remedy that at Ka Mai'a Ho'olaule'a!

The Festival is being created to expand our notion of what a banana is, and can be. We've put together a program to help island residents successfully grow and use bananas in various ways.

Noted island chefs will be on hand to provide samples and recipes for banana dishes. Bananabased plate lunches and desserts will be available for purchase.

Additionally, there will be workshops on bestgrowing practices, botanical and culinary history, and banana preservation and cookery.

Growers have experienced the impressive ability of bananas to stain clothing. We'll put those qualities to good use, letting fairgoers dye their own t-shirts or buy a t-shirt on-site to dye with banana stalks, stems and flowers.

Gabe Sachter-Smith of Hawai'i Banana Source, Pu'u o Hoku, and other growers and farmers will provide plants and fruits for sale, including some unusual types such as the Hawaiian mai'a.

Funding Opportunity From State Land Conservation Fund

Department of Land and Natural Resources

The DLNR, through its Legacy Land Conservation Program, is now accepting applications for grants to acquire and preserve land that has natural, environmental, recreational, scenic, cultural, agricultural production, or historic value, including park and trail systems that provide access to such land. Approximately \$5.9 million is expected to be available for awards during the current grant cycle.

The Land Conservation Fund is a valuable tool for conserving and protecting Hawai'i's natural beauty and all natural resources for the benefit of present and future generations. Grants from the Land Conservation Fund support efforts by state agencies, counties, and nonprofit land conservation organizations to acquire land and protect resources for public benefit. 

MAHALO!

Earlier this year, Senator Hirono helped pass the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), which will lower health care costs for more than 280,000 seniors in Hawaii who get their health care through Medicare by allowing Medicare to negotiate prescription drug costs and capping seniors' out-of-pocket drug costs at \$2,000 a year. In July, she also reintroduced the Protecting and Preserving Social Security Act, legislation that would strengthen Social Security's financial state and ensure that seniors continue to benefit from the programs they have paid into throughout their lives.





When Will the 90 Day Rule Happen for Rentals?

Ordinance 22-7 relating to Short Term Rentals has been delayed until next April, however, there is a lot of confusion on exactly when owners must change their month-to-month rentals to a minimum of 90 days and what they should do or not do with their existing month-to-month rentals.

It's my understanding that existing monthto-month rentals may continue until next April when a judge will rule on a legal challenge to this ordinance.

There is a chance that those owners who have been renting for legal 30 day Short Term Rental periods will win this lawsuit and be allowed to continue to do so (similar to what happened in 1989 when rentals under 30 days became illegal without a license). However, it's my feeling that this ordinance WILL go into effect with just a few modifications.

Once it DOES go into effect, from what I know, an owner might have to rewrite a month-to-month lease to reflect a rental period of 90 days or more (but this may change and I'll keep you posted). NOTE: My longest month-to-month rental had the same tenant in it for over 19 years! Would that mean that I would have to end that lease and start a new rental agreement for a set 90 day period?

Stay tuned to this and other new City and State rules and regulations which are being proposed!

7 Reminders for the General Election


Ahead of the 2022 General Election, we have a few key reminders for Hawaii voters.

- 1. Hawaii is a vote-by-mail state. Hawaii voters are automatically mailed a ballot at least 18 days before each election.
- 2. Check that your voter registration is current. Visit <u>elections.hawaii.gov</u> or call (808) 453-VOTE (8683) to verify that your voter registration is accurate. By law, ballots cannot be forwarded through the mail, so if you have moved or changed your mailing address, you must update your voter registration.

Need to register or update? Visit elections.hawaii. gov or complete a Voter Registration Application which can be picked up at any library or post office.

- 3. Vote your ballot. You can expect to receive your ballot by October 21. Read the instructions, mark your ballot with a blue or black pen, seal it in your return envelope, and sign the envelope.
- 4. Sign your ballot return envelope. The return envelope must be signed for the ballot to be counted. The signature on your return envelope is compared to the signature on your voter registration record. If the signature matches, your ballot is accepted and recorded to ensure only one ballot is counted for you.
- 5. Ballot must be received by 7:00 pm on November 8. Voted ballots can be returned by mail or dropped off at a Voter Service Center or Ballot Drop Box within your county. Visit elections.hawaii.gov for a list of locations and hours. Ballots received after the deadline cannot be counted.
- 6. Sign up to receive ballot alerts. Avoid missing the ballot return deadline by signing up for free ballot alerts! Visit elections.hawaii.gov or call (808) 453-VOTE (8683) for assistance with enrolling. You can receive text, email, and voice alerts when your ballot is on its way, and reminders to return your ballot as the deadline approaches.
- 7. Assistance is available. If you need assistance casting your ballot, consider the following accessible options:
- Visit a voter service center to cast your vote using accessible voting equipment. Visit elections.hawaii. gov for a list of locations and hours.
- Request an alternate format ballot and mark your ballot using your personal compatible device.

Election officials are committed to making sure your vote counts and safeguarding Hawaii's elections. For more information contact the Office of Elections at (808) 453-VOTE (8683).



Dear Doctor, "When should I start getting checked for colon cancer?"

In the last few months, several patients have asked me when they should start getting checked for colon cancer. Before May 2021, the United States Preventative Service Task Force (USPSTF) had recommended that all adults between the ages of 50 and 75 be screened with their highest grade A recommendation. Colon cancer is the third leading cause of cancer death in the US in both men and women!

In May 2021, the USPSTF broadened its recommendation for colon cancer screening to include all adults between the ages of 40 and 49. This is because 2014-2016 data showed a 15% higher incidence of colon cancer in this age group compared to the 2000-2002 time frame. As a result, the USPSTF gave this new recommendation a grade B, encouraging providers to offer this screening to all patients in this age group.

There are various colon cancer screening options other than the "dreaded" colonoscopy for adults aged 45 to 75. The annual DNA-FIT colon cancer screening card is the most popular and readily available option. This option requires a testing kit from your doctor's office or the lab and allows you to complete the screening in the privacy of your restroom. Once you collect the specimen, you can drop the testing kit off at the lab or your doctor's office, and you will get a result within a few days. If the test returns positive, you need to complete a colonoscopy. If the test is negative, then you can continue the annual DNA-FIT card!

One important caveat to the above options is that you are not a candidate for the DNA-FIT card if you have any signs or symptoms of colon cancer, have a prior personal or direct family history of colon cancer, or have a condition that predisposes you to colon cancer.

If you are between the ages of 45 and 75 and are not up to date on your colon cancer screening, please call our clinic to schedule an appointment!

Russian Hackers May Be Aiming At Your Business

The shattering events in Ukraine continue to rivet
the world's attention – but while the military and human damage rightfully capture most of the attention,
U.S.-based business owners and individuals should also
focus on the potential cyber-risk fallout to their own
operations.

A Dangerous Time

Even before the U.S. and Russia resumed a Cold War confrontation over the Ukraine invasion, business were at an increased risk of attack from state-backed actors, highlighting the need for companies of all sizes to maintain robust cloud security services. And now, with reports of increased hacker activity against U.S. companies of all sizes, many business owners are still not aware of the need to bring their security systems up to the next level with an affordable SEIM (Security Incident Event Monitoring) program and response. A SIEM program will continuously review important hardware and software logs on a real-time basis and flag suspicious activity. From these logs, most SIEM tools will leverage Artificial Intelligence (AI) to filter out the noise in a way only a computer can, to focus attention on the most important of events. The holy grail of a good IT service management or SIEM service provider is that when authorized or enabled, the service will also launch immediate responses designed to shield your identity and digital assets.

A Security Triangle

A SIEM-response package is part of the cyber security solutions "triangle" that makes up a must-have, robust cybersecurity approach. The first "leg" is preventative controls, which almost everyone has: keeping up to date on software patches, a good antivirus program, an effective firewall, and multifactor authentication.

The Second leg is a detection tool, like a SEIM or full Security Operations Center. This integrated, cyber automated response package that kicks defenses up to the highest level by monitoring and alerting users about their devices and systems, and when elected launch a real-time response to eliminate or mitigate the bad actor's malicious efforts.

The third "leg" is made up of great recovery controls, like a robust backup— preferably shielded from the rest of the system in case of infection — that can serve as a kind of fail-safe.

Most business owners just want to run their enterprise, and grow it and service customers — they did not sign up to be warriors in a digital battlefield. But as we have seen from past mass-hacking events, companies can no longer stay neutral. Like it or not, bad actors see all of us as legitimate targets. And as the global situation heats up, the threats are likely to get worse.
