

In Memory of Laura Lee Bolles From Laura's friends

Laura Bolles passed away in Waialua on November 10, 2021 at the age of 75 years old. Born in Sacramento, CA, she moved to Waialua in 1968 when she was recruited from the mainland due to a teacher shortage. She taught 4th grade at Solomon Elementary on Schofield Barracks and eventually became a Special Ed teacher.

Gordon Kuwada, the principal of Waialua High School, put her up in the teachers' housing on the high school's campus, even though she wasn't teaching at his school. Each cottage had four bedrooms and a shared bathroom and each teacher paid \$60 a month rent and yard maintenance. The group of mainland teachers became lifelong friends and many married "local boys."

Laura became deeply involved in the community. She served on the Waialua Community Association's Board as a trustee in the late 1970s and early 1980s, serving as President in 1981. She also served on the Neighborhood Board in the 1980s when the Hale'iwa Theater

was demolished in 1983. That tragedy galvanized the community to protect the remaining historic buildings in Hale'iwa by establishing the Hale'iwa Special Design District in 1984. Laura said that she and Meryl Andersen were the "mothers of the Hale'iwa Special District" and fought to protect it on several occasions. Laura was also responsible for preserving the historic part of the current Hale'iwa Elementary School, going through the lengthy process of getting it on the State and National Registers of Historic Places in 1980.

Laura's hobbies included being an artist, belly dancing and politics. She was a fierce advocate for what she believed in and made many other contributions to our community. She was the epitome of a great friend and an excellent cook. She is survived by her sister, Barbara, and her many friends who will treasure their memories of her as they attempt to carry on her legacy of community involvement.

Dear Doctor, "Do I need the new pneumonia vaccine?"

Earlier this year, the United States Preventative Service Task Force (USPSTF) and Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) updated their recommendations regarding pneumonia vaccines for adults. Previously, the recommendation was for "at risk" adults to receive the **pneumonia-13 vaccine (Prevnar13)** followed by the **pneumonia-23 vaccine (Pneumovax)**. The new recommendation is for anyone above age 65, or "at risk" and above age 19, to receive the **pneumonia-20 vaccine (Prevnar20)**!

What qualifies as an at-risk medical condition?

In alphabetical order, the most common risk factors are alcoholism, chronic heart/liver/lung disease, chronic kidney disease, cigarette/vape use, diabetes, and cancer. Other less common "at risk" conditions are spinal fluid leaks, cochlear implants, having no spleen, immunodeficiencies, HIV, sickle cell disease, and solid organ transplant recipients.

You may also have heard about the new **pneumonia-15 vaccine (Vaxneuvance).** This vaccine can be used similarly to the **pneumonia-20 vaccine** but requires a follow-up dose of the **pneumonia-23 vaccine** eight weeks to one year after the initial **pneumonia-20 vaccine**. The **pneumonia-15 vaccine** can also be administered eight weeks to one year following an initial dose of the **pneumonia-23 vaccine**.

Isn't that confusing?!

In summary, if you have not received any pneumonia vaccines before, are above age 65, or are "at risk" and above age 19, then you should receive the **pneumonia-20 vaccine**. If you have received one of the other pneumonia vaccines already, it is best to ask your provider which pneumonia vaccine you need and when it is due.





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

Owners & Property Managers - Know This:

Whether you're an Owner with Rental Units or a Property Manager - you should consider the following:

A. Fire Alarms: Always use the latest Fire Alarm systems that are properly placed in your rentals. *After 30 years of doing rentals and no fires - we just had two kitchen fires within days of each other! Both homes were saved by Fire Alarms! A big mahalo to both individuals that not only put out the fires with garden hoses - but, in the Waialua three level townhouse fire - rescued and saved the mother and child from a 3rd level window using a ladder! NOTE: Costco now has a sale on Fire Alarms! And - make sure the rental properties are covered for fire, liability and other coverages! Tenants should also get their own "Renter's Policies" which usually costs less than \$200/year and cover tenant contents and more! **B. Periodic Checkups:** roof, gutters, termites, cesspools, septic tanks, plumbing, garage doors, wooden decks, stairs, solar and hot water heating systems (including changing the rods and cleaning out the sediment inside the tanks every few years). C. Mold, Mildew and Airborne Contaminants: Any of these can cause illnesses and an owner or property manager can be held liable if found negligent. Some insurance policies exclude coverage for these liabilities but there are a few companies that will add a rider that would have these issues covered. D. Wastewater: Be sure to have rules on what is not allowed to go down the drains! Garbage disposals are bad but "disposable baby wipes" are the worst! And - if the rental has chronic drain clogs - it could be a clogged cesspool/septic tank or a broken drain line where roots have gotten into the pipes or the line was broken due to the ground shifting (NOTE: There are certified Sewer Scopers that will find these problems and now, even regular plumbers will have their own cameras).

Someday - I'm going to write a book with all my "war stories"! Until then - be sure you follow the above suggestions or hire a professional Property Manager that does this for a living!

After a year delay due to the COVID pandemic, the Hawai'i Swimming Hall of Fame's Class of 2021 was inducted at a dinner ceremony on October 15th at the Japanese Cultural Center of Hawai'i.

The mission of the Hall of Fame is to promote, preserve, and perpetuate Hawaiian aquatic sports for the future by: celebrating the achievements of swimmers, divers, water polo athletes, and by sponsoring aquatic exhibits and performances.

Chris was the event organizer, promoter, and race director of the NSSS from its inception, as well as many other ocean swims, biathlons, and triathlons on O'ahu for over 20 years. He is a member of the Waikiki Swim Club, National Association of Emergency Medical Technicians, Professional Association of Diving Instructors, and is in the Jacksonville Beach Surfing Hall of Fame."

The Sugar Mill Surfboard Shapers

Set behind giant banyan trees at the Waialua Bandstand Park is the old Waialua Sugar Mill. The mill is a converted Sugar Mill turned business park that hosts a collection of eclectic artists that include a soap maker, wood workers, stone cutters, local coffee, a farmers' market on Saturdays and the Banyans Island food truck which offers two sandwiches named after a couple of local surfboard shapers Eric Arakawa and Jon Pyzel respectively. There are many things happening at the mill, but it's the surfboards shapers, glassers, and fin makers that comprise an impressive collection of craftsmen and bring a special element to the mill.

The waves and ocean are so immensely strong in Hawaii that a surfer must be 100% confident in what is under their feet! There must be no doubt in the surfer's mind that the board will not fail them. The waves of the North Shore of Oahu are considered to be some of the strongest in the world and it is these waves that forge the surfboards made on the Northshore to be perhaps the best made surfboards in the world. These surfboards are made by hand and represent an art form that requires many years to develop. Surfboard makers spend countless hours developing their eye for the curves and rails of the boards, thoughts about how to create paddle power, along with strategies to enhance stability are defined and redefined board after board.

The mill may seem unassuming with its collection of ramshackle structures and potholed streets but upon entering any of the Surfboard Shops you step into a world of high-performance sports equipment, featuring surfboards that have been ridden by legends of the sport including past and current world champions. At various shops you will see boards that have been ridden by such greats as Derek Ho, Andy Irons, Bruce Irons, John John Florence, Bonga Perkins, Garret McNamara, Koa Rothman, and many more.

The Arakawa shop sits at the front of the mill. Eric Arakawa born and raised on Oahu, was the first surfboard shaper to locate at the mill in 1986. As you walk inside Arakawa's shop you enter a show room brilliantly filled with an array of beautifully sleek boards. Eric is a very easy-going person who is happy to speak to you and treats everyone who walks through his door the same whether they are a sponsored pro surfer or just someone who wants to try out the sport for the first time. Eric's son Sean mans the front counter. Sean, a surfer himself beams with pride when talking about his father's career and looks forward to continuing on the family tradition.

At the center of the mill acting as the mill's gathering place is the Waialua Surf Shop, formerly Third Stone, is home to Owl Chapman. Owl is the uncle to Kalani Chapman, a pro surfer now also making his way as a shaper by apprenticing under Owl. It was Owl and Dick Brewer who created the short board revolution. Chapman still shapes boards by hand only; focusing all his energy into every board making them each

unique for their intended rider.

Down along the back side of the Mill you will find Carl Schaper's shop. Carl grew up surfing in Virginia Beach in 1970's and immediately took to making his own boards. Surfboards quickly became a lifelong passion that took Carl all over the world, eventually landing in Oahu and making his way to the Sugar Mill in 1988. Carl's approach is that of a precision engineer constantly re-evaluating dimensions with a goal of continuous improvement in every board.

Located towards the back of the mill there is Mike Casey who has been shaping surfboards since 1967. Mike is a true one of a kind who, like Owl, continues to shape boards by hand only; without the use of computers or templates. Mike considers himself to have a "Harvard" education in surfboards as he spent his formative years learning at Channin Diffenderfer surfboards in California. Mike would eventually make his way to Oahu in the late 1970's and has been shaping boards here ever since.

Next to Mike's shop is Jon Pyzel, one of the newer surfboard shapers to locate at the mill but already making an impressive name for himself with current world champion riders.

Amongst the more prominent names there are many other surfboard builders operating at the mill such as Matty Raynor, Matt Yerxa, Daniel Jones, Josh Murray and so many more names every time you talk to someone more names come up.

The mill is also filled with many young people looking to make their own way in the business. like Zach from Oregon at the counter of the Waialua Surf Shop chasing his dreams or Taylor, a glassing apprentice stoked to be surrounded by the legends of the industry. The Waialua Sugar Mill is beyond a special place for many that work there, pass through, or visit. It's a place where you can learn something every time you visit. A surfboard can be magic and this magic permeates throughout the mill.



The Great Thanksgiving of 1918

Over one hundred years ago, Thanksgiving was a very special holiday. The wires were alive with the news that the Great War in Europe was over. Most of the 10,000 men and women from the Hawaii Territory who served in the Great War had yet to return to the islands. More than 100 would not.

The first of the post-war tourists were arriving via the luxurious steam vessels. The well-heeled travelers might spend a day or two at the Royal Hawaiian or the Moana Hotels in Waikiki, before boarding the Oahu Railroad and Land Company's train for an excursion to the North Shore. The better passenger cars were towards the front of the train. Whistle stops may be made at the Aiea and Ewa Mills, Nanakuli and again at the Waianae Station.

Kaena Point was rounded as the train turned into the wind. Wires had been strung adjacent to the tracks, so if the train was stopped for some unforeseen reason the engineer could toss a phone wire over the land line and communicate with operators around the island. The primary destination for the more affluent passengers was the Haleiwa Hotel, which opened in 1898, just a year before the line was completed all the way to Kahuku Plantation.

Standing in front of the Haleiwa Hotel, visitors were struck by the symmetry of the edifice. Large lawns sloped to the water's very edge. No better view of the splashing surf could be imagined. Inside, one found the finest hardwood floors. Beautiful paintings graced the walls. The service-ware, even the gardeners' tools were the very finest quality to be found west of the Mississippi.

The first floor was devoted to the office, parlor, dining room, and kitchen. The dining room occupied the east end of the building. A broad stairway led to the second floor, which was devoted to the sleeping compartments. The front rooms overlooking the ocean were single, while the end and mauka rooms were en suite, with a bath, and a telephone available for "central connection". The entire building and four of the cottages were equipped with electric lighting supplied by the hotel's own power plant. Water was supplied from a natural spring.

After being shown about the premises the guests were seated before a sumptuous Thanksgiving repast, complete with all the traditional trimmings and the finest delicacies which had been shipped from San Francisco. After dinner, the men retired to one of the western cottages, which had been outfitted as a billiard room. They smoked Cuban cigars and discussed other amenities. There was a stable set up across the road for those who wished to explore the Waialua Sugar Plantation. Canoes and rowboats were available for hire along the stream. The sportsman could book a space at the "Men's Lodge", a thatched roof log cabin located five miles inland at Puukapu, where shooting sports were popular.

There was much to be thankful for in 1918, now that the Great War was over.
