Aloha,

Built approximately 30 years ago, concerned residents advocated for the construction of the Ke Ala Pupukea Bike Path as a safe route to school for Sunset Beach Elementary keiki. The bike path is also a City and County of Honolulu Linear Park.

Currently, the bike path is in disrepair and in need of major attention. The bike path is heavily utilized by residents and visitors and the wear and tear over the years is beginning to show. There have been patchwork improvements over the years and, recently, the City administration and I have included \$500,000 in the FY2023 capital improvement budget for the planning and design of improvements, including possible reconstruction of the bike path.

It has been brought to my attention that there has been green waste dumped along the path. As a gentle reminder, please dispose of your green waste properly. The City does not provide green waste pick-up for residents as the special trucks which pickup recycling cannot fit and operate properly on our beach roads. Green waste can be taken to the Kawailoa Transfer Station located at 62-180 Kawailoa Road or any of the other City and County transfer stations or convenience centers. 



### NORTH SHORE REAL ESTATE TRENDS

The Market & Where its Going:

There's an old saying in the commodity markets: "Volume precedes price". The up markets start with higher volumes and eventually higher prices and the down markets start with lower volumes and eventually lower prices. Real estate markets are very similar.

Oahu's Home and Condo markets have already seen significant year-over-year declines in volume; down 48.2% for Homes and down 43.4% for Condos.

If this trend continues, we will finally see a real drop in prices. The Median Sales Price of Condos has already started a downward trend, however, Single Family Homes (that saw a dip after the June peak) have seen a bounce-back. Why?

My opinion: Higher Priced Homes are still being purchased by All-Cash Buyers while Lower Priced Homes are not selling as well due to the majority of those buyers needing financing. With mortgage rates doubling in the last 12 months, qualifying for those higher rate loans is more difficult. More sales of higher priced Homes and fewer sales of lower priced Homes has 'skewed' the "Median Sales Price" of those Homes back up to that high of \$1.15 million!

So - where's it going from here?

There's a push and pull right now between "INFLATION" and "RECESSION". The Federal Reserve is trying to fight inflation. If most people conclude "Don't fight the Fed!" then, a "RECESSION" is likely. The only question might be - will this be a Soft Landing Recession or a Hard Landing Recession?

I think it will be around mid-March before we know the answer to that, so - stay tuned!

# Ask the Doctor

Dear Doctor, how do I know when to see you, urgent care, or the emergency department?

Healthcare is a complex system to navigate, and this article can clarify your healthcare decisions. In Family Medicine, we encounter patients daily who are unsure where to go for their healthcare needs. Some patients have waited to see their Primary Care Provider while their medical conditions require evaluation at an urgent care or emergency department.

Healthcare has various care levels depending on the needs of the individual. Deciding which facility to contact for your care can be challenging; here are some tips to help guide your decision the next time you need healthcare.

Primary Care Medicine includes routine visits to your primary care physician, who helps to manage your overall health, including immunizations, physicals, and screenings. If you have a condition that requires a specific type of care, your physician may refer you to a specialist. Generally, these offices are closed on most holidays.

Urgent Care Medicine is a "step up" to the services that your primary care provider can offer. Most Urgent Care clinics are located within communities, usually open seven days a week, and do not require appointments. They offer diagnosis and treatment for minor illnesses and injuries like:

- Closed Simple Fractures
- Colds
- Fevers
- Headaches and Migraines
- Influenza
- Sinus Infections
- Sprains or Strains
- Skin Infections

An emergency department (ED) is associated with hospitals and is generally located within the facility. Open 24 hours a day and seven days a week, EDs treat a wide range of minor to life-threatening emergencies. You should seek emergency care if you experience conditions or injuries like:

- Chest pain
- Poisoning
- Open Fractures
- Loss of consciousness
- Serious burns
- Severe Pain
- Severe shortness of breath
- Suspected stroke

If you or a loved one is facing a life-threatening health-related emergency, call 9-1-1 immediately.







### Waimea Valley Launches Business Incubator for Kama'āina Owned Start-Ups

Waimea Valley is inviting Native Hawaiians, Veterans, and local residents, to join their culturally rooted business incubator. Kūkulu I Ka Waiwai (Building Businesses) is a free 9-month learning program for aspiring entrepreneurs who want to build a meaningful, successful business, rooted in self-sufficiency and Hawaiian cultural values. Cohort 1 begins January 21, 2023.

The incubator will collaborate with participants on how business values can align with Hawaiian values, along with the practical training and resources for their business to thrive. It'll provide business idea development, financial, marketing, and business plan strategy workshops for their clients to start, or improve, a *pono* business for themselves and our community.

"Our incubator's intention is to increase the number of successful kama'āina owned businesses in our North Shore community," says Kristien Alquero, Project Director of Kūkulu I Ka Waiwai. "The essence of our intention is to cultivate waiwai (wealth) for our community, which in the Hawaiian worldview is more than material things and money. It's about cultivating inner and outer wealth, self-sufficiency, in support of the legacy we're leaving for our family, for Hawai'i, and for generations to come."

This three-year program, funded by the Administration for Children and Families, will select 15 participants each year, and support their progress through a series of foundational business and cultural workshops, networking, and 1-on-1 technical assistance.

This program is for you if:

- You have a skill, cultural knowledge, or create art that you want to share with more people, while increasing your income
- You have a business idea that inspires you, but don't know where to start
- You want to feel confident about your sales and financials
- You wish to do work that's deeply meaningful and creates value for Hawai'i and beyond

The Business Incubator will be held at Waimea Valley, with participants having access to a co-working space with laptops and printer, and an option to join the workshops via Zoom.

Waimea Valley is seeking Native Hawaiians and Veterans, based in Hawai'i who own or desire to start a business in the next 1-3 years.

"Waimea has a track record of supporting successful local business, including wedding and event planners, tour companies, vendors, and support services," says Richard Pezzulo, Executive Director of Hi'ipaka, LLC, the non-profit that stewards Waimea Valley. "The cultural artisans practicing at Waimea Valley are all small businesses contracted by Hi'ipaka, LLC, and this program continues to grow."

### Lili'uokalani Protestant Church Now 190 Years Strong!



The area that now surrounds the intersection of Hale'iwa Road and Kamehameha Highway has seen many changes over the years. The iconic Hale'iwa Hotel was built there in 1898. The Sea View Inn was built on the site in 1955, became the Chart House in 1990 and then Haleiwa Joe's in 1998. But nearly two centuries ago, it was the location of Oahu's second oldest Hawaiian Church built by a missionary couple whose beloved legacy is the Lili'uokalani Protestant Church in Haleiwa.

Between 1820 and 1863, twelve companies of missionar-

ies were deployed to the Hawaiian Islands by the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions. The Reverend John Smith Emerson and his new bride Ursula Sophia Newell Emerson were part of the Fifth Company. After six months on a whaling ship that set sail from New Bedford, Massachusetts, they arrived in Honolulu in May of 1832.

The Emersons were assigned to serve the 8,000 residents along Waialua's thirty-mile coastline. High Chief Gideon Pele'ioholani La'anui, the Konohiki of Waialua and one of the first Hawaiians to become literate in both English and his native language, helped them to establish a simple church near the Anahulu Stream's outfall at Waialua Bay in July of 1832. The chartered name of the church

was *Ka Ahahui Kahu Malama Waiwai O Ka Ekalesia O Kawailoa Ma Waialua*, more often called the Hawaiian Church in Waialua or simply the Waialua Church. By 1841, an adobe church with a high thatched roof was built in the area of the present-day church cemetery. The Emersons raised their eight children on property near the church. Son Nathaniel Bright Emerson became Hawai'i's first Harvard-trained medical doctor. John Smith Emerson died in 1867 at age 66. Ursula Emerson continued their ministry for another 21 years, passing away shortly before a third church was built of wood in 1890.

Lumber for the construction of the New England style church was donated by Queen Lili'uokalani. The Queen worshipped with the congregation when

she stayed in her home along the banks of Loko`ea Fishpond. She donated hymnals, cut-glass chandeliers and most notably, an enormous universal-calendar wall clock. Within a diameter of 32 inches, dials kept track of the days of the week, months of the year, number of weeks in the year, and phases of the moon. Only seven such clocks were manufactured in Connecticut in 1889, but there was one feature that made this one unique: the Queen replaced the numerals on the clock with the 12 letters of her name.


Construction on the fourth and present church began in 1960, designed by architect Theodore Alameda Vierra. Born on the Big Island to an Azorean born Portuguese father and Hawaiian-Scottish mother, Vierra was the first native Hawaiian admitted to the American Institute of Architecture. He was responsible for enlisting German-born Erica Karawina, a designer renowned for her stained-glass artwork, to create the windows for the new church. Karawina donated the Rose Window at the entry of the sanctuary designed as a memorial to church members who had contributed to the building fund but did not live to see it completed.

The new church was dedicated in June of 1961 and renamed by charter to the Lili'uokalani Protestant Church in 1975. Later renovations were completed in 1985 when a new weathervane in the form of an 'iwa bird with a three-foot wingspan and a fish in its mouth was installed high atop the church steeple. The only one of its kind in the world, it evokes a passage from scripture "Follow me and I will make you fishers of men" (Matthew 4:19).

There are countless features unique to this exceptional church, but perhaps the most enduring are the contributions of the people who have devoted so much love and attention to the institution that is now 190 years strong. Established by Reverend John and Ursula Emerson in 1832 with the support of Chief Gideon La`anui, and blessed by the patronage of Queen Lili'uokalani, the church is still thriving today due to a congregation intensely dedicated to the mission of the church. These loyal members "remain steadfast in the work of the Lord" on their way to the next anniversary of a cherished Hale'iwa landmark.



### Villa Rose Waialua Fresh Eggs Making a Big Impact in a Short Time

The North Shore of Oahu along with the entire state of Hawaii has a passion for eggs. From the hard-boiled eggs that sit next to almost every cash register on the North Shore to all the loco mocos, spam and eggs, or even loaves of banana bread; eggs in Hawaii are a big deal! Historically the egg industry in Hawaii has struggled relying on main-land production. Currently there are only a handful of commercial egg farms on Oahu. In speaking with grocery stores the demand for local eggs is very high with most stores having a hard time keeping them in stock.

About six miles south from Waialua on Kaukonahua Rd sits Villa Rose Waialua Fresh Eggs. The farm which took over three years to build has now been producing eggs for one year. The farm is run sustainably off the grid using solar power, their own water source, and the chicken manure is used as fertilizer by local farmers. The management team brings a combined over 100 years of industry experience.

On a recent visit to the farm; Avery Barry, wearing a chicken shirt, steps out to greet me; we first walk over to view a giant chicken-filled barn. The chickens seem happy as they hop and cluck around their home. We jump in my car to drive around an ever-growing facility with new barns in various stages of construction. We step inside the packing facility where workers command a high-tech array of cleaning, sorting, and packing machines all while listening to music. At the conclusion of our tour Peggy Johns in HR greets us warmly. Peggy herself has over 25 years of industry experience and prefers to hire and train locally, with a goal of the facility being 100% locally run in 5 years. Entry level positions start at \$17 an hour and applications are available at the guard shack seven days a week.

The farm is also a contributor to the local food bank. Between their commitment to the community, industry, and the respect they show the land through their sustainable practices Villa Rose Waialua Fresh Eggs has made a big impact in a short time.

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
