Please note that the cut-off date and time for turning in New/Renewal Membership Applications, will be January 15, 2023 in order to vote in the Annual Membership Meeting.


Our Annual Meeting is scheduled to be held on February 15, 2023.



Dear Doctor, "What can I do to improve my health in 2023?"

As a primary care physician, I often get asked, especially toward the end of the year, what a patient can do to improve their health in the new year. The first things that come to mind are usually self-evident: drink less alcohol (if you drink); stop smoking anything (if you smoke); get more exercise (than you already do); eat more vegetables; drink more water; wear more sunscreen outdoors; and improve spiritual wellbeing, to name a few.

Working on these goals is, of course, easier said than done. One recommendation for creating goals, in life or at work, is to create "SMART" goals. "SMART" stands for Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Time-Bound.

An example of a SMART goal is as follows: my goal is to [quantifiable objective] by [end date]. I will accomplish this goal by [what steps you'll take to achieve the goal]. Accomplishing this goal will [benefit].

So, if your goal is to achieve the recommended 150 minutes of moderate-intensity exercise per week, a SMART goal would be: my goal is to exercise for at least 150 minutes every week by the end of January. I will accomplish this goal by walking around the neighborhood for 30 minutes, five days a week. Accomplishing this goal will help me to lose weight, increase my endurance, and improve my overall health.

A Year of Growth and Service

The year 2022 has been an eventful one for the North Shore Chamber of Commerce. Soon after the year began, new staff, volunteers, board members and general members united to bring transformational ideas and renewed energy to our organization. Kelli Turansky joined us as our new executive director and Daysia Basilio-Chun as her administrative assistant. The new Board of Directors was elected by our members in April. The Board includes: Mary Wood, Carol Philips, Marcia Murphy, Marianne Abrigo, Layne Larsen, Michael Biechler, Nicolas Vargas-Calvo, Lamont Brown, Alan MacPhee, Thomas Naylor, Thomas Donovan, TJ Cuaresma, and Bill Martin. These talented and dedicated individuals are available to listen to the concerns of our community businesses and residents.

The Chamber's database and website were significantly upgraded this year and focus on connecting all of us in our community. Please visit us on the web at www.gonorthshore.org to see what is happening on the North Shore and check out other helpful features. Members are able to advertise in personalized kiosks and add events, special promotions, and more to our community calendar. Each week the Chamber highlights a member business via an email blast. New members are immediately put on the list to be featured in these Member Spotlights. We encourage continuing members to take advantage of this service by contacting our office.

The Chamber Board has continued to work with the North Shore Neighborhood Board, City/County and State, as well as other public and private entities to solve problems and advance long overdue projects. These include the development of Haleiwa walkways. On that front, the latest word from the Department of Permits and Planning is that all plans have been approved, and the bidding process will begin in March. We are watching this very closely.

The Chamber has worked to uplift our business community through promotions, education, advertising, and networking opportunities. We have updated and upgraded our vibrant Visitors Center, which is open Monday through Friday. Over the past 12 months, we have welcomed and referred many visitors to restaurants, shops and recreational activities while gently educating them on responsible tourism. The office also has continued to offer business services including printing, scanning, and faxing. Additionally, we have encouraged business owners and residents to

visit us and share concerns, suggestions, or just talk story.

Pursuing Future - Respectful of Past

As a Mainstreet USA historical preservation community, our aim is to pursue the future while staying respectful of our past.

The Chamber's Historic Preservation Committee continues to work on a multi-year signage project that interprets the history of Haleiwa Town through its many historic buildings and sites. To date, commemorative plaques have been installed on 17 historic buildings and sites. Plaques like these are expected to be installed on the Matsumoto Store and the Yoshida Buildings in 2023. Additionally, four kiosks depicting the history of Ancient Waialua, the Plantation era, the Kingdom of Missionary period and the History of Surfing are near completion.

The Committee published an article in celebration of the 190th anniversary of the Liliuokalani Protestant Church in the December 14th, 2022 edition of the North Shore News. Future articles by the Committee are intended to share notable details of Historic Haleiwa. The North Shore Chamber's Historic Preservation Committee sincerely appreciates the cooperation of the North Shore News in the publication of these articles which highlight truly unique features of Historic Haleiwa.

Bringing our Community Together

As pandemic restrictions lifted in 2022, we at the Chamber decided to celebrate in the best way we know how - by bringing families and friends together. We created several first-time events that are now established as annual traditions. Those events included a fun-filled 4th of July all-day festival with live music, contests, food, vintage car show, and evening spectacular fireworks show.

The holiday season got off to a heartwarming start with our Christmas Wreath and Light Up Haleiwa contests. The Haleiwa Tree Lighting Festival soon followed including pictures with Santa, carolers, and a paper "snowball" fight. Everyone in attendance shared in this special time. We would like to extend our thanks to Howard Green for planting the Haleiwa town Christmas tree six years ago for our community.

The return of the Haleiwa Christmas Parade was jubilant. Conceived by Antya Miller 20 years ago, it remains the centerpiece of the Holiday season. The Chamber also created a commemorative holiday tree ornament of the historic Anahulu Bridge. From now on, an ornament recognizing a North Shore historical site will be created each year.

More Work to be Done

The First Waialua Sugar Plantation

We have always called the old smoke stack near Thompson Corner, standing 90 feet tall, the 'Halstead Stack,' and the 1873 to 1899 sugar plantation the 'Halstead Mill.' New revelations obtained by an intrepid former Waialua Sugar mill engineer, are leading to a new understanding.

In the Kingdom of Hawaii, in Koloa, on Kauai, the first substantial plantation dates from 1835. Their first production of 4 tons of sugar sold for \$200, or about \$0.50 per pound. But a dollar, usually in gold coin, bought 30 times more than our dollars today, so that sugar was worth \$15.00 per pound in today's money. You can see why it was attracting farmers' interest.

Here in Waialua the Chamberlain brothers, sons of a missionary family, backed by Castle and Cooke, started growing cane and making sugar just as the civil war ended. Within two years they had failed as sugar demand dropped. The 1870s saw difficult times with all hopes put on a reciprocity treaty with the US, to allow Hawaii sugar to be sold duty free.

King Kalakaua, our world-traveling 'Merry Monarch,' led his Reciprocity Commission to the United States to negotiate. It included Oahu's Governor John Owen Dominis, Queen Liliuokalani's husband, who had a country home in Waialua. They succeeded, and a Reciprocity Treaty was signed in 1875 by both governments.

Henry Gordon and Robert Halstead, friends from working at a sugar plantation in Lahaina, bought the bankrupt Chamberlain brothers' plantation from Castle and Cooke, and got to work. Gordon did the field work and supervision, and Halstead ran the mill. Unfortunately, Henry who could not swim, was swept into a flooding stream he tried to cross on a mule that slipped. He was pulled out with a rope, but got pneumonia and died within a few days. Robert continued, and brought in his two sons to help manage the plantation.

When the sugar company closed in 1996, many records were thrown out and our former mill engineer friend did some timely dumpster diving. Our historical society is now going through this treasure trove of documents. Amongst all these records was a copy of the mortgage Robert and Susan Halstead signed in 1881 to continue to operate the plantation on their own. And now to the revelation: In the mortgage with the Bishop & Company, the farm is called "Waialua Sugar Plantation, formerly owned and conducted by Halstead and Gordon..." So that 1883 smokestack, still standing strong, is the original Waialua Sugar Plantation stack.

Charles Reed Bishop and John Paty offered the Halstead's mortgage. They were partners in Bishop and Company, the original name of what is now First Hawaiian Bank. (Hale'iwa's Bishop & Company Bank

built in 1930 is still standing. It's the little Spanishstyle tile-roof building across from Haleiwa Joe's.) Charles Reed Bishop was Princess Pauahi's husband who implemented her will creating Bishop Estate, now Kamehameha Schools. John Paty, Bishop's partner, is an ancestor of longtime Waialua Sugar Company's Manager Bill Paty. John founded a shipping line, and was also a founder of the Oahu Railway & Land Company that linked Aiea, Ewa, Waianae, Waialua, and Kahuku plantations to the port of Honolulu.

So, what were the bankers' terms? In 1883 Robert and Susan mortgaged the entire farm and all equipment and fixtures, except the crop, for \$30,000.00. In today's money that would be about \$900,000.00. Repayment terms were five years, 9% interest per year, payable every 6 months in gold! But with sugar selling at an average of \$0.06 per pound, gold currency, and sugar being an 18-month to 2-year crop, he and his sons harvesting half their acreage each year, using the primitive tools they had, and rate of only 5 tons per acre, they could annually produce about 1,405,000 lbs. of raw sugar per year.


As the value of our money is 30 times less, 6 cents per pound would be \$1.80 per pound today, yielding gross sales of about \$2.5 million. After the mortgage cost of \$281,000 per year, they would have \$2,219,000 for all other costs: to clear, plow, plant, water, harvest, haul, grind, cook, dry, bag, and ship (by oxcart and boats hand loaded and rowed out to a steamer), pay shipping and taxes, repair and replace equipment, and provide wages and housing for the workers. They were able to succeed.

Robert and his family had a beautiful home near Thompson's Corner that, sadly, burned down one night in 1892. He, Susan and a daughter barely escaped a fire that started in the sewing room where the telephone was. They ended up retiring to another home in Makiki. The old mill was too worn out when the Dillingham and Castle & Cooke partners bought it in 1899, so they had to load cane onto rail cars and take it to Kahuku to be processed. Then the old mill building burned down.

The first manager for the new plantation, Mr. Goodale, built an all-steel mill, a new town, an earthen dam for Lake Wilson, expanded the farm to 14,000 acres, and went on to a 96-year successful run, reaching 80,000 tons production in the 1970s. When the Waialua Sugar Company closed in 1996, low world sugar prices and high capital costs to maintain and replace equipment, led the new owners of Castle and Cooke to decide to earn more by investing in other places. According to an interview with the last manager, Mr. Bill Paty, it was not because of the unions, as unions and the company had been working together ever since 1947.





Halstead residence, formerly near Thompson's Corner (Photo: Bishop Museum)





NORTH SHORE REAL ESTATE TRENDS

2022 YEAR IN REVIEW

REAL ESTATE PRICES: The year started with North Shore Real Estate prices zooming to new highs, however, interest rates did their own zooming and put a stop to that trend. There is now a feeling that the prices will either level off in the new year or soften if/when the Federal Reserve pushes us into an actual recession (I'll report on that in my April "Trends" article).

LANIAKEA TRAFFIC: After years of ignoring our "Turtle Traffic", the Department of Transportation finally put up temporary barriers, improved the parking lot and created two new cross-walks... helping to lessen the severity of our "Turtle Traffic".

BEACH EROSION: A house finally fell onto a beach out this way, bringing to light the need for a plan of action. Several groups were formed in 2022 to address the problem. One of them (which I helped start) is called "OPA" (Oceanfront Preservation Association). The state has made a commitment to study the options and I'm sure OPA will be working with them in the years to come.

ZONING CHANGES: It seemed like "Open Season" on City and State Ordinances affecting real estate last year. Proposed bills included: changing the "minimum rental period" from 30 to 90 days, changing the oceanfront "setback lines" from 40' to 60' (or as much as 130') and placing an additional tax on "Empty Homes" (if the owner doesn't live there full time). Although these bills are still 'pending', here are a few that passed: A bill to further prohibit any new vacation rentals (except Kuilima condos which are now granted short term rental permission), a bill to require Environmental Impact Statements for developments within Shoreline Management Areas and a bill that prohibits new septic tanks above the "no-pass" line.


RENTS: Long-term rental rates continued to rise in 2022 (nearly doubling since the year before) and short-term rental rates sky-rocketed with travel opening up and nearly all of the old vacation rentals converting back to long-term rentals or getting sold.

Senator Hirono Bill Signed to Protect Coral Reefs

Senator Hirono's <u>Coral Reef Sustainability Through Innovation Act</u> is a bipartisan bill to help protect coral reef ecosystems in Hawaii and across the nation from increasing threats such as climate change, pollution, and direct damage from humans. The legislation directs the federal agencies that are members of the U.S. Coral Reef Task Force to establish—individually or with one or more other agencies—a coral health prize competition in order to spur innovative solutions to preserve, sustain, and restore coral reef ecosystems at no additional cost to taxpayers.

"Coral reefs are vital to Hawaii's environment, providing a rich habitat for marine life while helping to protect our coastlines and prevent flooding. However, decades of pollution and ocean warming caused by climate change have left corals in Hawaii and around the world at risk of extinction," said Senator Hirono. "As we work to protect and restore coral reef ecosystems, I'm glad that President Biden has now signed into law my legislation to create prize competitions that will help incentivize innovation and inspire creative solutions to protect coral reefs. I'll continue fighting to protect Hawaii's coral reefs and all of our natural resources for generations to come."




