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Dear Editor: Community Thwarts Latest Dillingham Ranch Development Plan

A group of six North Shore residents calling themselves the Protect Mokulē'ia Hui, led by group member and local attorney Mike Biechler, are celebrating what they say is "a major victory" after their challenge to the groundwater use permit for a 72-house subdivision resulted in the developer canceling its plans. The subdivision, which was slated to transform the historic Dillingham Ranch property in Mokulē'ia into a large lot subdivision on agricultural land, was being bankrolled by California luxury developer Kennedy Wilson Holdings Inc. In a letter filed with the Commission on Water Resource Management on January 23, 2023, the Kennedy Wilson's attorney stated that the developer was unable to meet the deadline for final subdivision due to the "uncertainty of how water would be provided to the subdivision."

Protect Mokulē'ia Hui says this most recent twist in its water challenge is a huge win for the community and the environment regardless of why the developer chose to change course. "We are almost three years into our contested case with the Water Commission, so this came as a surprise. But we are optimistic that this means the harmful impacts on coastal ecosystems caused by developments can be delayed in this area for a few more years. We also know we need to stay vigilant because there is a lot of development pressure in the Mokulē'ia area right now."

Protect Mokulē'ia Hui argued that the water needed for the 72-house subdivision would cause significant environmental damage to the marine environment, negatively impacting local sea life and interfering with traditional and customary Native Hawaiian practices that rely on the water existing in its natural state. "We're incredibly proud to have achieved this important victory," said Mike Biechler, who represented Protect Mokulē'ia Hui in the Water Commission hearings. "It was a long and difficult process but, ultimately, I think the developer finally had to consider the fact that we were going to be able to demonstrate at the hearing that the developer's plans posed an unacceptable risk to important cultural practices in the area and to our local marine environment and wildlife." The group says it now hopes to work with state and local government leaders as well as private land trusts to find alternative ways of celebrating this sensitive land and protecting it for future generations.

Dear Editor: Why is Hale'iwa a Historic Town?

The Hale'iwa Theater was torn down in 1983 which sparked the movement to protect Hale'iwa Town and its historic buildings. I think nearly everyone living here has seen photos of it. Designed by a preeminent architect, Hugo Fuchino, it was truly an amazing theater. Built in 1931 of lava rock and cement or "sugar stone," it seated 900, had a stage, trap door, dressing rooms and an orchestra pit that hosted live and Kabuki Theater. Later, it was primarily a movie theater.

Out of its destruction, the Hale'iwa Historic, Cultural & Scenic District was established in 1984 and is part of the City's Land Use Ordinance now referred to as the Hale'iwa Special Design District (HSDD). Following the HSDD, the Hale'iwa Main Street program was established in 1985 whose mission is "Economic development through historic preservation." Hale'iwa Main Street, a 501c3 non-profit, now does business as the North Shore Chamber of Commerce and was once seen as a complement to the HSDD.

The HSDD is the area along both sides of Kamehameha Hwy. from Weed Circle all the way to Papailoa Road and along Hale'iwa Road, up to and including the boat harbor. There are special rules regarding design of buildings, signs and preserving the view planes (mountains and ocean along Hale'iwa Beach Park) that all of us need to follow to keep Hale'iwa historic and special. A building is defined as any structure that does not move and it must obtain an HSDD permit before applying for a building permit. Aloha Neighbors,

I first want to say congratulations to North Shore's own Luke Shepardson for his success at the Eddie, and mahalo Luke for serving our community as a Honolulu Ocean Safety lifeguard. I also want to acknowledge and mahalo all of the wahine that competed in the Eddie, making this the first competition to have women participating.

Early this month our office also joined several City Departments at the Phase 1 Cleanup of Waiale'e Beach (Velzyland). I want to say mahalo to everyone that helped with removing four truckloads of trash, twenty-five vehicles, six motorcycles, one trailer, and one moped. Our office will continue to work with the Departments to complete the Phase 2 Cleanup and provide you with updates along the way. I have also been working with the City to increase funding for our area provider that serves our households experiencing homelessness.

It was great to join the Wahiawā Lions and Mililani Leos at their Hale'iwa Ali'i Beach Park Cleanup, which was supported by the City's Adopt-A-Park Program. I am always impressed by the youth in our community and their willingness to step up and serve. If your organization is interested in adopting a park or organizing an event, you can call (808) 768-3034 or email citypksvolunteer@honolulu.gov.

I also know that many of us have seen a dramatic increase in our home's valuation. District 2 in particular was hit with the highest increases. One of my main concerns is keeping folks from being priced out of their home due to increasing property tax bills. I believe that now is the right time to increase the home exemption for homeowners to reduce the burden on our families and kūpuna.

Many in our community have also been asking

about Bill 10 (2022), which involves amendments to our City's Land Use Ordinance. Bill 10 is currently referred to the Committee on Planning and the Economy. Our office will continue to provide updates on the bill's progress. If you have ideas or amendments that you would like to see, please send them to our office. We intend to fight for a Bill 10 that protects our community's quality of life and supports local agriculture. Earlier in January I joined Chair Waters in co-introducing Resolution 23-003, which affirms our City's commitment to our renewable energy goals.

Dear Doctor, "Why don't we have fluoride in our water?"

Depending on where you live on O'ahu and where you get your drinking water, you may or may not have fluoride in your water. For the most part, you only have fluoride added to your drinking water if you live on a military base or purposely buy children's bottled water with added fluoride. Despite numerous bills for and against the fluoridation of public water systems, the state remains one of the few states that does not add fluoride to public water systems.

The result, whether you are for or against adding fluoride to our water, is that in 2017 Hawai'i third graders had the highest rate of tooth decay in the nation, and 47% of adults between ages 45-64 had lost a tooth due to tooth decay or gum disease. The CDC has touted community water fluoridation as one of the greatest public health achievements in the country's history, reducing tooth decay by 25% in children and adults.

The USPSTF recommends that primary care physicians prescribe oral fluoride supplementation to children starting at six months of age and apply fluoride varnish to the primary teeth of all infants and children. It is also recommended that all children see a dentist within the first six months after their first tooth appears to ease them into the experience of having their mouth examined AND to provide fluoride varnish. If you want to begin your children on supplemental fluoride, check with their primary care provider to ensure they take the correct dose! The supplemental fluoride dose for children is based on age and the amount of fluoride in the public water system or bottled water that children drink. Help us help your children from having the famous silver-capped front teeth!

#### **Did You Know?**

Did you know that the biggest wave in the world was not recorded at Waimea, Pe'ahi, Mavericks, Teahupoo, or Nazare?

A wave so massive yet not caused by an offshore swell, but a force in reverse sending water from the mainland outward into the ocean.

On the night of July 9 1958, the ground rumbled and exploded with a massive earthquake along a remote bay sending a mountain side down into the bay creating a local tsunami.

The earthquake was measured at 7.7 and with enormous force from the rock slide the unfurling energy forced the water to maximize with wave heights up to 1700'. And yes this is no tall tale as along with eyewitness accounts the shoreline evidence confirmed these amazing heights. The eyewitness accounts describe that even after the initial wave passed by it was followed by additional 20-25' waves before it all settled back down. Prior to the event researchers had thought they had seen evidence of previous big wave action in the same inlet but until that fateful day none had been able to document it in person. Maybe next time someone will be ready to surf it?

Where was this great wave?....it was in Lituya Bay Alaska....and now you know.

#### The Pipeline **Bodysurfing Classic**

The holding period for the 45th annual Pipeline Bodysurfing Classic presented by Kaikeha and Pipeline World Games, on the North Shore of Oahu, will begin February 24th and will run through March 9, 2023. This event will be held when the conditions at Pipeline are the best available during the holding period (based on swell and wind direction as well as

Each year, for one to two days, watermen from around the world come together and participate in a homegrown event in Hawai'i involving Bodysurf-

Bodysurfing, called he'e umauma or kaha nalu in Hawaiian, was first enjoyed by ancient Hawaiians at the break called "Pipeline" today. It is believed that bodysurfing at Pipeline was first inspired by the dolphins seen there, long before the invention of the surfboard.

While boardsurfing has evolved into a visible and highly competitive sport, the main draw to bodysurfing is still as it ever was--the intimate relationship between the ocean and the rider in what is considered by many as the "purest form of waveriding."

The defending champion Mike Stewart (Hawaii) continues to dominate the field at the Pipeline Bodysurfing Classic.

Sixty of the world's most dedicated bodysurfers will be on-call during the holding period, and will have a ten day window to compete at Pipeline [one to two days of competition] without any surfboards.

Competitors must swim without the use of any type of board into extremely challenging at the world class break known as Pipeline.

Pipeline is world-famous for its fast and powerful breaking waves over a shallow reef. Just as Everest is the gauge of all mountains for mountaineers, Pipeline is the ultimate test for wave-riders from all over the world, rewarding the best with waves of aesthetic perfection.

Each of the 60 bodysurfers compete in preliminary rounds, semi-finals and the top four bodysurfers will compete in an intense final.

#### The People of Old

Much of what is known about ancient Hawaiian culture and the people of old is due to Samuel Kamakau. In 1815, Samuel Manaiakalani Kamakau was born in Mokulēia and became one of Hawai'i's greatest historians. He also served his community as a jurist and legislator.

In ancient times, Waialua Moku, or district, was known as āina momona or fertile land, with streams, freshwater springs and wetlands for the lo'i, or irrigated terraces for taro cultivation. Nearshore fisheries and loko i'a, or fishponds, ensured a steady supply of food. Nearby Mt. Ka'ala and the many upland forests provided plants for medicine, feathers for ornament, bark and vine fibers for chord, grasses for thatching, and trees for canoes, house timbers, and tools. Ahupua'a, or land divisions, were cared for with the understanding that what was done in the mountains affected the nearshore ocean waters below. Kamani fishing village where the Anahulu Stream flows into Waialua Bay, and the lands surrounding it, supported a large population of around 8,000 in the 1780s. Ka po'e kahiko, or the people of old, included navigators, priests, chiefs, fishermen and farmers, living for centuries along these north and west facing shores.

Waialua moku was settled by Polynesian seafarers around 1000 to 1200 A.D. They traveled nearly 3000 miles from South Pacific islands in double-hulled canoes, guided by the positions of stars, the behavior of birds and ocean animals, currents, clouds, and the wind. They brought canoe plants such as taro, banana, coconut, sweet potato, breadfruit, and sugar cane.

Kapukapuākea Heiau, a stone temple in what is now called Hale'iwa was the preferred site for installing an ali'i nui or island king from among the ranking ali'i or nobles. Chiefs also gathered here for key political decisions. The heiau is linked to the religious and political kapu system that was brought by seafarers from Tahiti and their Taputapuātea Heiau.

Near Wahiawā in ancient Waialua's uplands is one of the two birthing places in Hawai'i for high-ranking chiefs, the Kūkaniloko Birthstones. This site is said to be

the piko, or navel, of the island and was near the royal center called Līhu'e, at the junction of O'ahu's main foot trails. Many of the island's traditional and exemplary ali'i genealogies are thus linked to Waialua.

Invading Maui chiefs in the mid-1700s disturbed the peaceful lifestyle of Waialua. Local inhabitants were forced to provide so much seafood and produce for the Maui warriors that the people often went hungry. A rebellion, led by Waialua chiefs and priests, ended badly with a slaughter of the Oʻahu hierarchy and further harsh rule. Warfare resumed a generation later when Hawaiʻi Island's aliʻi nui, Kamehameha the Great, conquered Oʻahu in 1792. The new ruler redistributed Waialua lands to his favored warriors.

Later, Kamehameha prepared his war canoes to invade Kaua'i from one of Waialua's best canoe landings at Māeaea Beach in Waialua Bay facing the Ka'ie'iewaho Channel. Kaua'i was the last holdout during Kamehameha's attempt to unify all the Hawaiian Islands. That invasion was averted by a negotiated peace agreement.

Loko ea Fishpond behind Māeaea Beach dates to at least the 16th century. It was a bountiful food source with its unique multi-hued mullet. It is connected to a stream from Ukoa Pond, a mile to the north. The freshwater springs in Ukoa Pond are associated with Lani Wahine, a mo'o (lizard water spirit), that could also appear in human form.


