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



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### The Importance Of Wai

Here at Waimea Valley, the staff are given a chance to learn about the intricacies of water and its movement throughout a watershed system. Each step the water particles go through is as important as the last as it cycles through our biomes.


Ahupua'a o Waimea encompasses an extraordinary fluvial system which ebbs and flows throughout the year. Fluvial systems are the processes associated with rivers and streams and the deposits and landforms they create. Within Waimea Valley, the most recognizable stream is Kamananui because it houses the famous waterfall. However, throughout Waimea Valley there are many different mountain streams and rivers that flow into Waimea River, out to the estuary area, and finally into Waimea Bay creating a large functioning watershed. Fluvial systems are described by how they flow and the placement they have within the cycle. Kamananui is a 4th order ephemeral stream before it leads to Waimea River and to the ocean, meaning it is dependent on precipation and it is fed by several 3rd, 2nd and 1st order streams that come before it. These streams all start at higher elevations in the Ko'olau mountain range and later feed into Waimea River. The three larger main streams that come into Waimea River are Kamananui, Kawiko'ele and Ele'ha'ha with smaller intermittent stream Pu'ulupe. These streams all help take care of the ecosystems in different ways and are home to many diverse native species and vegetation.

Every part of this fluvial systems provides essential natural, economic, cultural and spiritual purpose. Kamananui and other waterways help disperse rainwater around the valley, providing water to 80-acres of protected Hawaiian native plant reforestation site and the botanical garden. Guests are attracted by the waterfall, though along the walk through the valley the staff educates visitors about the significance of wai (water) within Hawaiian culture. Because the wai gives us so much, the team at Waimea feel it is our responsibility to give back to the watershed. We do this every day by helping prevent stream erosion with our native reforestation program, as well as planting slope-stabilizing natives on the sides of riverbeds. We clear the streams of any fallen materials and invasive species to maintain the water flow. We make sure to educate staff and guests on the importance of taking care of the entire ahupua'a encompassing the watershed.

Hu'ea i kai na piha'ā moe wai o uka - washed to the sea is debris of upland streams, ('Ōlelo No'eau, No.1120, Pukui 1983). This Hawaiian reminds us why it is important to think about the intricacies of our fluvial systems so that we can better care for our watershed. Each step we take caring for our ahupua'a impacts the health of the wai.

#### A Day on The Land

Trust for Public Land celebrated Earth Day with its annual "A Day on The Land," bringing together community members from across Oʻahu to care for the 'āina at Kahuku Point. More than 140 volunteers from eleven local companies cleared brush, removed invasive plants, weeded and planted native species to help restore the coastal strand and protect the wildlife. Located on the North Shore, Kahuku Point's coastal sand dune is home to one of the few remaining intact coastal strand habitats on Oʻahu.

"Kahuku Point is steeped in historical, cultural and environmental significance, and it's important we continue to play a role in stewarding the land," said Lea Hong, Associate Vice President, Hawaiian Islands State Director, Trust for Public Land. "We're honored to work alongside the North Shore Community Land Trust to bring everyone together to connect with the outdoors."

Volunteers from Oceanit, Ward Village, Bank of Hawai'i Foundation, First Hawaiian Bank Foundation, Hawai'i Gas, Hawaiian Electric, Macy's, AES, Alexander & Baldwin, American Savings Bank, and James Campbell Company attended Trust for Public Land's workday. Central Pacific Bank Foundation, ALOHA Collection, Title Guaranty Hawaii, and Turtle Bay Resort supported the annual event.

"In partnership with Trust for Public Land and the community, we preserved Kahuku Point's cultural heritage and protect the wildlife here for generations to come," said Adam Borrello, Executive Director, North Shore Community Land Trust. "Today, the community's stewardship allows us to enhance the shoreline of the places we love most on the North Shore."

Stretching five miles between Kawela Bay to Kahuku Point lies 630 acres surrounding Turtle Bay Resort, now forever protected by and for the community. Once destined for development, in 2015 the shoreline was safeguarded by Trust for Public Land, North Shore Community Land Trust, State of Hawai'i, City and County of Honolulu, the community and Turtle Bay Resort in perpetuity. The coastline holds strong cultural and natural significance to the community as a home to many native wildlife, including 'ohai, yellow-faced bees, monk seals, and serves as a nesting site for Laysan albatross and green sea turtles.

"We're grateful for the opportunity to join the community in stewarding the coastal habitat," said Jan Sullivan, Chief Operating Officer, Oceanit. "Trust for Public Land and North Shore Community Land Trust's dedication only deepens our appreciation for these lands, and we look forward to joining the next community workday."

# Celebrating the Arts with Friends of Sunset Beach

Saturday, May 6, 2023 from 5 – 10 p.m. at Waimea Valley Pikake Pavilion

More than 200 pieces of art will be up for auction by local talents and Sunset Beach Elementary students at Waimea Valley Pikake Pavilion on Saturday, May 6, 2023 from 5 – 10 p.m. for Friends of Sunset Beach's (FOSB) 12th annual fundraiser, Celebrating the Arts. FOSB is a nonprofit organization dedicated to providing art and music education to the North Shore community's youth. Each year, the ticket sales and art auction sales from this event provide the salary and art supplies for an art instructor to teach at Sunset Beach Elementary—neither art nor music education are in this small public school's budget.

This 2022-2023 school year, FOSB has been able to fund full-time art, taught by Lilly Barels daily, as well as supplies, for the K-6 students at Sunset Beach Elementary.

In the past 11 years, FOSB has raised approximately \$320,000, serving 400 Sunset Beach Elementary students annually, in addition to 700 more children throughout the year, hosting pop-up art tents at community events like the Menehune Surf Contest where children can take part in painting, crafts and other forms of artistic expression for free.

Sam Mangakahia is the evening's featured artist. Sam's art tells a story through Tā Moko (Māori tattoo) or indigenous design. Art by students in each grade from Sunset Beach Elementary will be up for auction in addition to hundreds of pieces by dozens of local artists. Guests will enjoy food and beverages from Ke Nui Kitchen and live music from surprise performers.

This is an adults only event. General admission tickets are \$105 each, however if guests purchase online by May 5th, early bird tickets are only \$95. # Councilmember Matt Weyer Serving You in District 2

Aloha Friends and Neighbors,

I hope you are all doing well! Our office has been active meeting with North Shore residents, community groups, and businesses to bring our communities' voices to Honolulu Hale.

Recently, the Council has considered bills surrounding issues such as commercial activities at parks and beaches (Bill 19, 2023) and the City's land use ordinance (Bill 10, 2022). On Bill 19, I continue to emphasize to the Council that existing protections at our North Shore beaches must be maintained or strengthened. On Bill 10, amendments to commercial uses are currently under consideration, and will be followed by uses such as agricultural and residential in the coming months. My priority is to voice the needs of the community, so I welcome any additional feedback on these two bills or others that come before the Council.

Along with these measures, the Council is currently reviewing the Mayor's proposed City budget and considering potential amendments. The City's annual budget is split between three bills: the Legislative Budget (Bill 10, 2023), the Operating Budget (Bill 11, 2023), and the Capital Budget (Bill 12, 2023). The Council has been busy meeting with the City Administration and its departments to discuss their priorities, staffing needs, and any areas where we can become more efficient.

Councilmembers are also offering amendments to incorporate 'community adds,' including local infrastructure projects and other capital investments. On the operating budget, our office has proposed adding 16 full-time positions to the Emergency Services Department's Ocean Safety and Lifeguard Services Division. These positions would allow for full compliance with the Dawn to Dusk program, established in 2021, which aims to provide lifeguard coverage from sunrise to sunset. Additionally, I have recommended budget appropriations to repave parking lots at Swanzy Beach Park and Waialua District Park to renovate facilities at Haleiwa Beach Park.

Finally, I am pleased to share that the Budget Committee passed Resolution 40 (2023), which would establish a permitted interaction group (PIG) to consider matters related to real property taxation (RPT). The PIG would allow a few councilmembers, myself included, to weigh the twenty-plus current Council bills dealing with RPT. Through this PIG, I believe that the Council will build a stronger un-

derstanding of the City's 'toolkit' – between exemptions, rate structures, and tax credits – and how we can leverage these tools to deliver long-term relief to many of those who have been burdened by recent spikes in property assessments.

#### **Medicare Preventive Visits**

If you've recently become eligible for Medicare Part B or have had Medicare Part B coverage for years, you may be missing out on your annual "Wellness" visits with your primary care provider!

Within the first 12 months that you have Medicare Part B, you are eligible for a "Welcome to Medicare" preventive visit. This visit differs from a physical exam in that it includes several screening tests, and you will leave the appointment with a written plan on the recommended preventive services you need. At this visit, you should expect to have several screening tests done, such as vision and memory testing. You will also review what an Advanced Health Care Directive is and may even complete a Hawai'i Physician's Orders for Life-Sustaining Treatment (POLST) form. This appointment is longer than a usual doctor's office appointment. However, you'll leave knowing you received all the recommended preventive care based on age and gen-

If you've had Medicare Part B for more than 12 months, you are eligible for an annual "Wellness" visit with your primary provider too! During this encounter, your primary care provider will create a personalized prevention plan and complete additional screening items. Like the "Welcome to Medicare" visit, you will leave the appointment with a written plan of what preventive services you need.

Some of the screening items done during your Medicare visits will include depression and anxiety screening, substance use/abuse screening, memory testing, and function/mobility screening. You will also be asked about all of the medications and supplements you take, and when your previous screening tests were completed, such as colon cancer screening and bone density testing.

If you have Medicare Part B and want to schedule your Initial or Annual Medicare Wellness visit, please call our clinic to schedule your appointment!





#### Memorial Day-Honor and Remember

Designed by Charter Lion Walter S. Tanabe in 1947, the memorial commemorates the supreme sacrifices made by the heroes of WWII from Waialua, Hale'iwa, and Kahuku areas. The square base represents the four corners of the world, the single shaft rising above the base represents the universal brotherhood of man, and the light at the top of the shaft represents the beacon of eternal peace and goodwill. The sixteen artillery shells represent the sixteen WWII heroes from the North Shore area. The plaque honoring the Korean War dead was dedicated in 1959 and the casualties of the Vietnam War were honored in 1986. The Lions held an annual Memorial Day Service at this site for decades.

#### In Loving Memory of Peter Trombly 1947 ~ 2023



Peter's family came to Hawaii in 1953, and he spent his childhood on Oahu's South Shore. Surfing and sailing were always a big part of his life. In 1968, he moved out to the North Shore, where he began his career as a specialty custom board glasser and shaper. Peter excelled in his field and was known for his creativity and attention to detail – a true artisan. One of the first people to windsurf in Hawai'i, he was instrumental in the evolution of the sport. Windsurfing at Sunset Point became a passion, and he was one of the "Yardbirds" – a group of avid windsurfers always ready for a session when the wind and waves came together in perfect harmony. Peter also loved to play beach volleyball and was a regular at Waimea Bay. He was a self-taught guitarist, and his imaginative music was loved by many. Later in his life, he began a daily ritual of walking the bike path from Sunset to Shark's Cove, making friends with dogs, cats, and other folks who loved walking in the cool morning air. Peter's many friends and family remember him as always having a smile and kind word for everyone.

This beautiful tribute, written by Peter's friend Larry Stanley, captures the very essence of the wonderful and unique person Peter was:

I never knew if Peter was having a bad day because, if he was, he never said.

I never heard any bits of juicy gossip from Peter because he never told any.

I never saw Peter stymied by anger or frustration because he would just smile and let it go.

I never knew if Peter had adversaries because I never heard him say anything hurtful or hateful about anyone.

I never felt I was imposing on Peter's shop time when we were working together because he enjoyed showing his skill and sharing his tricks.

I never got the impression Peter was trying to talk me out of an unusual design, because he was as interested to see if it would work as I was.

I never nagged Peter or felt sorry about his circumstances because he believed that what he had was enough; not too little, not too much; but . . . enough.

I never got the feeling Peter's friendship was forced or self-serving because when we parted, it always felt to me like it had been a good day.

I never thought Peter owed me anything because he never made me feel like I owed him anything. It was always share and share alike.

I never asked Peter to play a "song" because his noodling was as good as any music I could hope to hear firsthand. I never detected the slightest hint of condescension from Peter other than when he trounced me in Cribbage, but that's just part of the game and he was very good at it.

I never presumed to ask Peter to go windsurfing when Laniakea was firing, because if there was anything he loved more than windsurfing, volleyball, music, making a board, or Cribbage, it was surfing.

I never got fewer of the brownies than Peter, but I never got more, either.

We would like to express our deepest gratitude to his North Shore 'Ohana for all their loving support. A celebration of Peter's life will take place later this summer on his beloved Sunset Beach.

### Remembering the Japanese Americans Incarcerated in WWII

The Irei: National Monument for the WWII Japanese American Incarceration is a multi-faceted project to address the attempted erasure of those individuals of Japanese ancestry who experienced wartime incarceration by memorializing their names.

The Ireichō: "The Book of Names" displayed at the Japanese American National Museum (JANM) in Los Angeles, California lists over 125,000 persons of Japanese ancestry who were unjustly imprisoned in U.S. Army, Department of Justice, and War Relocation Authority camps.


Recently Linda Seyler (NSN) accompanied her mom Nancy Oyama to the Japanese American National Museum to acknowledge and honor their family by placing a Japanese hanko (stamp) underneath the name of each family member incarcerated.

In February 1942 President Roosevelt issued Executive Order 9066 that resulted in the internment of Japanese Americans. The Oyama family left their home and strawberry farm on Bainbridge Island, Washington; they were incarcerated at the Heart Mountain Relocation Camp in Wyoming. Nancy Oyama was in fourth grade. When the war ended in August 1945 the Oyama family settled in Santa Monica, California.

How often do I need a well woman exam?

Your pelvic exam, breast exam, and Pap test can catch early signs of cancer and other health problems before they get out of hand.

How often should you get a Pap test for cervical cancer? Pap testing is recommended for all women ages 21 – 65 years old or when they first become sexually active.

For ages 21 - 30 years old a Pap test is recommended every 3 years.


For ages 30 – 65 years old a Pap test is recommended every 5 years if the procedure is combined with testing for HPV. Or they might consider HPV testing alone instead of the pap test.

For women over age 65 with no history of cervical cancer may stop their pelvic exam if they have three negative tests over a period of ten years. Your provider will make a recommendations based on your medical history.

#### Hysterectomy – no need bother?

No! You still need an annual well woman exam because you still may need pelvic exams and cervical cancer screening.



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
