

2023 Featured Artist Judd Boloker


Judd Boloker has lived and worked in Honolulu, Hawaii for the past 13 years. His work has been exhibited in local galleries, the Honolulu Museum of Art, and throughout the Mainland at galleries in Chelsea NY, Los Angeles CA, and Scottsdale AZ. Judd is best known for his lei prints, an ongoing series begun in the summer of 2011. The work, currently numbering 75 pieces (and counting), depicts Haku sourced from Lei shops in Honolulu Chinatown to workshops of Hawaii Lei Masters.

Judd first received art training at the age of ten in the basement of a local Long Island artist, and supplemented this training with illustration courses at the Fashion Institute of Technology. The study of Japanese history has brought Eastern influences to his work, while time spent living on both the East and West Coast of the Mainland has exposed him to a wide variety of American culture, landscape, and design elements.

The search for interesting designs has even lead to lei makers living in Japan. The survey's breadth pays homage to the amazing range of work found on the islands, while the vivid presentation style gives the genre a modern twist reflecting the vibrant Hawaiian culture.

Councilmember Matt Weyer Serving You in District 2

Aloha Friends and Neighbors,

First of all, I want to extend my congratulations to the Class of 2023! It has been wonderful attending graduations and award ceremonies across the district and meeting O'ahu's promising graduates. Graduation season is a wonderful opportunity to celebrate the accomplishments of our students, our educators, and the friends and family who have helped our future leaders along on their paths.

On May 16th, I had the great privilege of attending the homecoming concert of Kahuku's own Iam Tongi, the winner of American Idol 2023! Throughout his run on American Idol, Iam represented Kahuku, the North Shore, and all Hawai'i admirably with his sincerity, humility, and hometown pride. Iam has used his platform to share the aloha spirit with an international audience consisting of millions of viewers. As the season finale showcased Iam's return to Kahuku High School, his public concert at Turtle Bay which attracted an astonishing 14,000 attendees, and his live performance of Kolohe Kai's 'Cool Down,' all of Hawai'i was beaming with pride. I know that I join the rest of the North Shore when I say congratulations to Iam, and thank you for representing your community with such grace and aloha!

In response to requests from the community, I would also like to share a quick update on Bill 10 (2022), which would revise the City's land use ordinance. At its May 4th meeting, the Committee on Planning and the Economy (P&E) approved a request from the City's Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) to grant a 250-day extension for consideration of Bill 10. In the meantime, the committee will continue to consider testimony and amendments by land use type. With commercial uses currently under consideration, other land uses such as agriculture and utilities will be considered in the coming months, should the committee chair continue consideration of the bill under this framework.

It is important for the North Shore community to maintain an active presence in Honolulu Hale, so please do not hesitate to submit testimony on any measures of interest. 

A Pennsylvania native residing on the North Shore of O'ahu since 2008, Steven Kean is an artist working primarily in the woodcut method of relief printmaking. Woodcut is a technique where the artist carves into a block of wood, leaving raised areas to receive ink. The inked block is then printed on paper. His work is a collection of coastal and wave studies utilizing this technique and has been showcased internationally, here in the islands & throughout the U.S. Kean is also a teaching artist at the Hawaii State Art Museum and is continually seeking creative growth as a working professional artist in Hawaii.

Bottles 4 College

There probably aren't a lot of 12-year old's who see a pollution problem, look for a solution and then turn that solution into a non-profit organization that turns trash into money for college, but that's exactly what Genshu Price started a few years ago.

Living on the beach, between the North Shore and the Windward side of the island, Genshu and his younger brother, Mic-key Price,7, noticed a lot of plastic bottles and aluminum cans floating onto shore, and after constantly picking up the waste in front of their home, Genshu came up with an idea that has now become the Bottles 4 College campaign.

"The mission is to create actionable items we can all do," said the now 15-year-old Genshu, in front of a large collection station at his family's home. "Hawaii is our paradise, and we all want to have an environmentally healthy lifestyle, and through Bottles 4 College, we are able to educate about our environment, and at the same time, provide money for our keiki going to college."

So far, one million cans and plastic bottles have been collected and kept from the landfills, and that will provide two, \$10,000 scholarships for two high school seniors who plan to go to college.

"We estimate about 60,000 pounds of trash has been diverted from the landfills," said Genshu, as he sorted through thousands of water bottles. "We've worked with various high schools on the island with leadership classes who organize recycling drives, we canvas and talk to people, and we were at all the major surfing competitions this winter on the North Shore, with our Bottles 4 College collection bins."

So passionate is the Price family about the environment, mom and dad help Genshu, with driving loads of recyclables to the recycle stations, which they estimate is about fifteen thousand cans and bottles every week.

Brother Mic-key is also part of the United Airlines Malama Aina campaign commercial, that is shown on every inbound UAL flight to the islands about sustainable practices and preserving the environment for generations to come.

"When Genshu was just 11 or 12 years old, I remember he used to take his little wagon around the neighborhood, door knocking and collecting cans and bottles," said his mom, Maria Price. "He's always been so passionate about the environment, even now, him and Mic-key will sift the sand in front of our house for micro-plastic waste, which hurts the marine life."

If you're willing to save your plastic bottles and aluminum cans, Genshu and his dad, Mike Price will come to your North Shore neighborhood for free to collect it, but you may have to be a bit patient, as Genshu must keep up with his own school hours.

"We take any plastic bottle that has the "HI 5 cent" label, and of course all aluminum cans," said Genshu. "But please take off all lids from bottles, because it's a lot of extra work to take off lids when we sort here."

Genshu said Bottles 4 College is also looking for a North Shore business, school, or organization that would be willing to sponsor a monthly recycling drive where North Shore residents could drop off their recyclables.

"Over 900 million cans and bottles are sold in Hawaii annually with less than 25% of them being redeemed at a recycling center," said Genshu. "Bottles 4 College has recycled over 1 million cans and bottles and that makes up less than 1% of all cans and bottles, so we have a long way to go."

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


