



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


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Funding for Public Education: Understanding the Difference Between CIP and Operational Monies

At the conclusion of the 2023 session, some of my colleagues and I disagreed with the decision to not fund core operations of the entire public education system for fiscal years 2024-2025. The 2024 session provides legislators with an opportunity to correct this failure to fund core, day-to-day operations and demonstrate meaningful support for public education, by supporting adequate funding for the public education system, pre-K through university. We should see this commitment in the budget proposals made first by the House and then in the Senate response to the Governor's proposed budget. The proof of the commitment should be evident in the final budget, to be voted on by all members of the House and Senate in the final days of the 2024 session.

Funding for capital improvement projects or "CIP funding" has been the recent focus of media attention especially as legislators have rightfully questioned the DOE's capacity to complete longstanding projects. Two critical areas of operational underfunding of the DOE have emerged, impacting the Weighted Student Formula (WSF) and Summer Learning Hubs. For WSF, the Department's request for funding addresses inflation-related increases dating back to 2020, totaling \$18,821,884 for FY 2024-25. An additional \$8,194,397 in WSF is being sought by the DOE to meet the instructional needs of English Learner (EL) students. Failing to secure these funds would not only leave schools with significantly less WSF (operational) funding than allocated in FY 2024 but also force school administrators to make difficult decisions for current staffing and intensify challenges posed by the impending federal funding cliff due to the conclusion of ESSER funding.

The Committee on Weights XIII (which determines our really critical Weighted Student Formula, on which so much school-based work depends) has recommended an increase in funds for WSF, particularly to include identified small schools (\$3.5 million) and maintain the WSF Reserve (\$2.5 million) as a recurring cost starting in FY 24-25. Without sustaining state funds, the DOE will be unable to provide for existing support for small, rural, isolated schools, and those students facing extraordinary circumstances.

Simultaneously, existing Summer Learning Hubs also face a dire funding shortfall. These hubs, crucial for addressing sustained learning loss experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic and providing social-

emotional support, require sustained funding beyond 2024 as ESSER funds expire. The loss of these funds will jeopardize vital programs, including summer school, specialized programs, and college and career readiness initiatives that have operated since 2021, impacting vulnerable student sub-groups, such as students with special needs and EL students.

Similarly, significant gaps in funding for higher education, especially the University of Hawaii (UH), have emerged. The Governor's executive budget proposal, which provides our starting point for negotiations, also falls short of fulfilling the UH Board of Regents' (BOR) approved budget request for fiscal year 2025 (FY25). For the operating budget, the BOR sought \$56.3 million, with the governor's proposal including only \$28.6 million. At the time of the development of the governor's budget proposal, revenue projections from the Council on Revenues were concerning and the governor's team was also focused on reappropriating or clawing back cash (or A funds) to address the disaster in Maui. Those projections have improved, however, and we also expect to see a high rate of federal reimbursement of disaster-related state funding which translates into future available cash funds to meet these higher education requests.

While \$21.2 million was allocated to restore state general fund support for UH to pre-COVID-19 levels. crucial requests, such as expanding the successful Hawaii Promise Program to UH's three universities, were left unmet. Furthermore, the Governor's proposed budget failed to include requests for workforce development in education, construction trades, and agriculture, as well as positions and funds for the Office of Equity Assurance to meet campus safety requirements. The University's capital improvement requests also faced substantial underfunding, with only \$66.5 million allocated out of UH's requested \$331.5 million for capital renewal, deferred maintenance, and campus modernization. Critical projects, including repairs and renovations to UHM noa student housing facilities, were excluded from the governor's budget proposal. This can and should be easily remedied, as UH has demonstrated substantial capacity to complete CIP work as evidenced by recent completion of Ching Field.

This financial shortfall expressed in the current supplemental budget proposed by the Governor raises concerns about the state's commitment to addressing key priorities in primary, secondary and post-secondary education. By failing to properly fund public education, we are only increasing the growing chasm between rich and poor, failing to make our educational system more equitable and just, and hindering progress on sustainable economic diversification. As the budget moves through this legislative session, we need to work together to advocate for comprehensive funding to support vital DOE and UH initiatives that are paramount in achieving the state's educational and societal goals. repperruso@capitol.hawaii.gov

Aloha Neighbors,

Happy New Year! Wishing everyone happiness and good health in 2024. One of the community highlights this holiday season was the Hale'iwa Christmas Parade. Mahalo to the North Shore Chamber of Commerce, volunteers, and community partners for a successful event! It was great to join our Neighborhood Board Chair and Vice Chair in the parade, right behind the City's Royal Hawaiian Band!

I am excited to share that Bill 56 (2023) also known as Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy financing programs or the C-PACE bill, which I co-introduced with Council Chair Waters, passed final reading and was approved by the Mayor late December of 2023. The measure was introduced in response to the state law that established the C-PACE program, allowing the costs incurred for qualifying improvements to be levied by each county. This program will help families from being priced out by providing financing options for resilience projects, such as cesspool conversion and fire sprinkler installations.

Another key piece of legislation that we passed in 2023 was Bill 47, which addresses ways to divert waste from our landfills and was co-introduced by Councilmember Radiant Cordero and myself. This bill would add manufactured compostables to the items that can be collected curbside in our green collection bins. By allowing manufactured compostable items and food waste in addition to green waste we already collect in our green bins, we can reduce the burden on our landfills and create a more sustainable waste stream for our communities.





On Saturday, December 30th, 60 people attended the Hale'iwa Waialua Historical Society's ceremony dedicating new history signs at the Waialua Bandstand Park. One is on Ancient Waialua and the other about Waialua Town and the Sugar Plantation.

Kumu Hula Keith Awai, Board member, gave the welcome oli, Kahu Susan King of Liliuokalani Protestant Church, the pule, and Senator Gil Riviere, Board member, served as Master of Ceremonies.

Kathleen Pahinui, Board member, summarized the mission and activities of the Society and Kendra Martyn, President, Friends of Waialua Bandstand in the Park, spoke eloquently of the community's renewed interest in revitalizing Waialua and its history.

Antya Miller, Society President, spoke of her journey from the average resident's unawareness of Waialua's history, to her now long-term dedication to making it known and available to everyone.

Boyd Ready, Lead Docent for the Historical Society, reminded everyone how different life was in the 1920s, and read a 1925 newspaper account of 3,000 people enjoying a 'Smoker,' a boxing match with band, hula, choir recital, comic interludes, and referees, organized by the U. S. Army's 64th Artillery camp at Kawailoa Beach, and the Waialua Agricultural Company.

All attendees at the dedication were invited to a reception following, at the beautifully restored managers' office in the Waialua Sugar Company's office building on Kupahu St.

Kanpai from Hawaiian SHOCHU North Shore & Ko'olauloa Keiki **Company**

Located just off Haleiwa Rd where you can hear the surf pounding in the distance and taste the salt in the air, the Hawaiian SHOCHU Company (HSC) is a present day window looking back in time.

Shochu is a Japanese distilled beverage with a recorded history dating back to the 16th century. Shochu uses KOJI combined with other ingredients that can vary from sweet potatoes, to barley, or even pineapple.

Today in Hale'iwa at the Hawaiian SHOCHU Company (HSC); Ken Hirata distills shochu in the traditional old style ways of making small batches by hand.

The distillery, which is the only shochu producer in Hawai'i, in its eleventh year just completed their 22nd batch.

The HSC distillery uses sweet potatoes which are grown right on site but also used are sweet potatoes from all over the state of Hawai'i with each batch bringing their own distinct flavors like sweetness from Moloka'i or more dry from the Island of Hawai'i.

The ingredients are fermented in 150 year old Japanese ceramic pots and then distilled in a special wooden still from Japan.

Ken, originally from Osaka, apprenticed in Kagoshima, Japan under his master for three years prior to moving to Hawai'i. He is a one man show doing everything from the process of koji making to bottling, corking, and sales. Currently the Company produces about 7000 bottles a year.

The environment from the surrounding flowers, to the composition of the soil, and the ocean air all contribute to the complex taste of the final product.

RED BULL MAGNITUDE IS ON



"SAND EROSION on our NORTH SHORE"

Why does Sand Erosion seem to be worse in this century than any in the past and what can we do about it?

There are many theories about "why" our sand is eroding more now than any time in the past, however, we certainly need to look at the problem as well as solutions.

A big part of any solution is to look at the "causes". Weather patterns (as when we had two hurricanes pass to the north) can cause erosion, Sea-Level rise and extremely high tides can cause erosion, however, we need to really study this problem and not just run from it!

If we run and do nothing except "managed retreat" then not only will many of our beachfront homes and our coastal highways be gone - but our beaches, as Chip Fletcher says, are sure to be gone as well.

For the North Shore - here are 2 possible "other causes" that are finally coming to light:

SAND MINING: The little spoken-about North Shore Sand-Mining in the first half of the 20th Century could be a major cause of today's erosion. Other than that black & white photo of the Jump-Rock in the middle of a huge Waimea Bay beach... there hasn't been much talk about where all that sand went. There was a huge amount of Sand-Mining out here and it wasn't just Waimea Bay. It was Sunset Beach, Shark's Cove and Ke Iki Beach as well. When you take away that much sand from one area of a coastline, the other areas will eventually start giving up their own sand. Should we ask the Reef Runway, Ala Moana and Waikiki to give us back our sand? The State needs to look at what we allowed to take place back then and come up with real solutions for the areas that sand was taken from!

CORAL REEFS are DYING: Our Coral Reefs are what cause the waves to break farther out and dissipate the swell impact on our beaches. If our Coral Reefs start dying and crumbling - we are truly in for a disaster. There is a video on this: YouTube.com/watch?v=NCOVciuYjg8 and the Marine Biologist that made this video, Terry Lilley, explains why specifically our North Shore Coral Reefs may be dying. I met him at Pipeline the other day and he explained how submarines have been cruising our North Shore (and the North Shore of Kauai) and testing Microwave and Electro Magnetic devices. He explained to me that, "These subs cruise our coast between midnight and

5 a.m. discharging electricity into the Coral Reef, causing a current to run through the coral which breaks down the calcium carbonate structure of the coral!" "On Kauai - they proved this to the Federal Government which caused them to stop the subs from moving across their coastline. Now - it's proven that those reefs are making a remarkable come-back!" The Navy is now seeking more permits to further do tests off our North Shore and they are seeking Public Feedback till just the end of this month! If you think they were negligent in the Red Hill disaster, if the above is true - they will be guilty of a much larger disaster and it will be right here on our own North Shore beaches. Testify, call your Federal Representatives and help stop this before we have to resort to suing the EPA for failing to prevent the Navy from killing our reefs!

The coffee van is parked on the road from before 8am until after 3pm. They have no consideration for Brew and Foam and the other established businesses whom pay rent and taxes.




What's happening? Who's allowing this? Do we


